**W**HEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the Thirtieth Day of May last, for prohibiting the Exportation out of this Kingdom, or carrying Coastwise, Gunpowder or Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, will expire upon the Seventh Day of December next: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, and the Safety of this Kingdom, that the said Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer: His Majesty doth therefore, with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no Person or Persons whatsoever, (except the Master-General of the Ordnance for His Majesty's Service,) do, at any Time during the Space of Six Months, to commence from the Seventh Day of December next, presume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom, or carry Coastwise, any Gunpowder or Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, or ship or lade any Gunpowder or Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, on board any Ship or Vessel, in order to transporting the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, or carrying the same Coastwise, without Leave or Permission in that Behalf first obtained from His Majesty, or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring and suffering the respective Forfeitures and Penalties inflicted by an Act, passed in the Twenty-ninth Year of His late Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act to impower His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Saltpetre, and to enforce the Law for im-

powering His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms and Ammunition; and also to impower His Majesty to restrain the carrying Coastwise of Saltpetre, Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition."—And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master General of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

P R E S E N T,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

**W**HEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the Thirtieth Day of May last, prohibiting the Transportation into any Parts out of this Kingdom, of the Wood called *Lignum Vitæ*, will expire upon the Tenth Day of December next: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, that the said Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer: His Majesty doth therefore, with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, That no Person or Persons whosoever do, at any Time for the Space of Six Months, to commence from the said Tenth Day of December next, export; or attempt to export, transport, carry, or convey, or lade or lay on board of any Ship, Vessel, or Boat, in order to be exported, transported, carried, or conveyed out of this Kingdom, any of the Wood called *Lignum Vitæ*, without Leave, or Permission being first had and obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring the Forfeitures inflicted by an Act, passed in the Thirty-fourth Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act for indemnifying all Persons who have been concerned in advising or carrying into Execution an Order of the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury respecting the Exportation of Pot-Ashes or Pearl-Ashes; for preventing Suits in consequence of the same; for authorizing His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation or carrying

"Coastwise of Pot-Ashes or Pearl-Ashes, and for making further Provisions relative thereto:" But it is, nevertheless, His Majesty's Pleasure, that nothing herein contained shall extend, or be construed to extend, to prevent any Ship or Vessel from taking or having on board any of the said Wood called *Lignum Vitæ*, which may be necessary for the Use of the said Ship or Vessel during the course of her intended Voyage; nor to prevent the Exportation of the said Wood called *Lignum Vitæ* to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, or Man, or to His Majesty's Colonies or Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or to the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies: Provided that, upon the Exportation of the said Wood called *Lignum Vitæ* to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, or Man, or to His Majesty's Colonies and Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to the Island of Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or the British Settlements or Factories in the East-Indies, the Exporters of the said Wood called *Lignum Vitæ* do first make Oath of the true Destination of the same to the Places for which it shall be entered Outwards, before the Entry of the same shall be made; and do give full and sufficient Security, by Bond, to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, to carry the said Wood called *Lignum Vitæ* to the Places for which it is so entered Outwards, and none other; and such Bond shall not be cancelled, or delivered up, until Proof be made to the Satisfaction of the said Commissioners, by the Production, within a Time to be fixed by the said Commissioners, and specified in the Bond, of a Certificate or Certificates, in such Form and Manner as shall be directed by the said Commissioners, shewing that the said Wood called *Lignum Vitæ* has been duly landed at the Places for which it was entered Outwards: And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

*Extract of another Letter from the Earl of St. Vincent, K. B. to Evan Nepean, Esq. Dated at Gibraltar, November 15, 1798.*

YOU will perceive by the inclosed Copy of a Letter and List of Captures and Recaptures from Captain Middleton, of His Majesty's Ship the Flora, that the Position I placed her and the Caroline in furnished a considerable Degree of Protection to the outward-bound African and West-India Trade.

*His Majesty's Ship Flora, off the*

*Salvages, October 4, 1798.*

My Lord,

I Have the Honor to inform your Lordship that the Salvages bearing N. by W. Six or Seven Leagues distant, I fell in with His Majesty's Ship the Caroline in Chace of a Cutter; after passing the private Signal, I joined in the Chace until Nine A. M. when she struck. She proves to be the President Parker, of L'Orient, Citizen Ferry, Commander; a new Vessel, sails well, and belongs to the Republic, but has a Letter of Marque for Six Months. In the Chace, he hove all her Guns overboard, also the Shot and a Quantity of Provisions. She had captured the Bird, of Liverpool, Robert Tyne, Master, bound to Africa, which Captain Bowen, of the Caroline, had re-captured this Morning at Four o'Clock. Annexed I send your Lordship a List of Guns thrown overboard; and have the Honor to be,

Portuguese Brig Nossa Senora de Monte, of 12 Men, belonging to Madeira, bound from Madeira to St. Michael, laden with Bale Goods, Prize to L'Abeille French Privateer, recaptured the 1st August, 1798, off Palma, by the Flora, and sent to Madeira.



Spanish Packet Grimaldi, of 2 Guns and 28 Men, belonging to Corunna, bound from Corunna to the Havannah, laden with Wine, &c. captured the 4th September, 1798, off Teneriffe, by the Flora, and sent to Madeira.

Spanish Ship La Carlota, of 19 Men, belonging to Teneriffe, bound from the River de Plata to Teneriffe, laden with Leather and Tallow, captured the 30th September, 1798, off Teneriffe, by the Flora, and sent to Madeira.

English Ship Bird, of 10 Guns and 30 Men, belonging to Liverpool, bound from Liverpool to the Coast of Guinea, laden with various Guinea Stores, Prize to President Parker Privateer, recaptured the 4th October, 1798, off the Salvages, by the Caroline, and sent to Madeira.

French Cutter Privateer President Parker, of 12 Guns and 50 Men, belonging to Dunkirk, bound from L'Orient on a Cruise, captured off the Salvages, by the Flora and Caroline, and sent to Madeira.

French Lugger Privateer L'Esperance, 1 Gun with Musquets, and 38 Men, belonging to Santa Cruz, bound from Santa Cruz on a Cruise, destroyed the 16th October, 1798, at Teneriffe, by the Caroline's Boats.

French Ship Polacre Privateer Le Baret, 10 Guns and 77 Men, belonging to Malaga, bound from Grand Canary on a Cruise, captured the 20th October, 1798, off Teneriffe, by the Caroline and Flora, and sent to Madeira.

*Philadelphia, Nov. 4, 1798.*

The Contagion which has for the last Three Months raged so violently in this City, has as heretofore yielded at length to a Succession of Frost which has prevailed during the last Week, and the Committee of Health has invited the Inhabitants to return to their Homes, under an Assurance of perfect Safety, under proper Precautions as to cleansing and airing their Houses, Bedding, and Clothing. The Coldness of the Season has worked the same happy Change in New York, Boston, New London, and Wilmington, where the same Species of Disease raged at the same Time, and proved infinitely more malignant than the former Diseases with which those Places have been visited.

#### NOTICE to MARINERS.

*Copenhagen, August 30, 1798.*

IN order to render those Mariners who frequent the Port of Bergen more confident of their Situation when on that Coast, particularly when failing to and from the said Port by Skuddenees, a new Lantern-Light has been erected on the Point of that Naze, which will begin to burn on the 1st of January, 1799, and continue on the same Regulations as the Rest of the Lights, viz. during the Summer, from Easter till Michaelmas, when it will be lit One Hour after the Setting of the Sun; and during the Winter, from Michaelmas till Easter, it then being lit Half an Hour after the Setting of the Sun, and continuing to burn till Day-light. It is further made known, that this Lantern will be hoisted on a Mast or Pole, close to which a Shed is built and painted White; therefore the same must

be seen very plainly in those Directions in which it presents itself to View. The Lantern will be about Three Hundred Feet above the Surface of the Water. It is already known that there has long been a Coal-Light on the Isles of Hvidding, and a Lantern-Light close to Hoyvarden, the latter serving when one has entered Carmsound, to assist in choosing a good Berth to anchor in. Whenever one may wish to bear away for the Bay and enter Carmsound, one ought, with due Attention, be able to distinguish the Light of Skuddenees and Hvidding Isles. This last, which is suspended between Two Poles, gives a Blaze-Light, but that on the Skuddenees, as has been observed, is a Lantern, and gives a clear and steady Light; and besides, this Light cannot be seen when one comes from the Westward, unless one is so much to the Southward that the Cliff of Giatongen does not interrupt the View of it, or that you have it due N. E. by E.: And in this Point of the Compass, the Navigation is clear from Hvidding Isles; one may therefore, if one got Sight first of one Light, and were in Doubt a short Time which of them it was, steer a little East, for were it Skuddenees Light that appeared, one would shortly after see the Blaze of Hvidding Isles, unless it were a Fog, hazy Weather, or Snow Storm. If, however, by steering more to the Eastward, another Light does soon appear, it must naturally be that on Hvidding Isles, and one may then by Soundings set one's Course accordingly and take a View of the other, since, if from the Situation of Skuddenees Light being hidden from the high Land, a Light appears more to the Eastward, than due N. E. by E. be assured it must be Hvidding Isles. Knowing this, one may with Safety keep under Skuddenees, as one may now by the new Light know to a Certainty where the Bite is, and accordingly run in under the Land, and so into Carmsound. When one comes near the Smorf-takken, one may expect to see all the Three Lights; and again, if the Light of Skuddenees is hidden by the high Land, then the Two others, particularly that close to Hoyvarden, will prove sufficient to direct one to a good Anchorage in this Harbour. But if one is unacquainted, and will not venture to run into Carmsound without Pilot, or other Obstacles presenting themselves, then the Lights on the Isle of Hvidding and Skuddenees will prove a remarkable Assistance to those who find themselves obliged to cruise here during the Night; but in that Case it is absolutely necessary to be particularly attentive that the Current (which is frequently very strong here) does not drive the Vessel on either Side.

Whitehall, December 8:

*As several Artificers and Manufacturers, Subjects of Great Britain, have, from Time to Time, gone into Foreign Countries to exercise their several Callings, contrary to the Laws of these Kingdoms, the following Abstracts of Acts of Parliament of Their late Majesties King George the First and Second, and of His present Majesty, for preventing such Practices, are published, for the Information of all Persons who may be ignorant of the Penalties they may incur by Disobedience to them: And it will be observed, that such Penalties likewise extend to those who are any ways concerned or instrumental in the Sending or Enticing Artificers or Manufacturers out of these Kingdoms, or in the Exportation of the Tools and Instruments used by them, as well as to the Artificers or Manufacturers themselves.*

Statute 5 George I. Chap. 27.

**I**F any Person shall contract with, entice, or solicit, any Artificer in Wool, Iron, Steel, Brasses, or other Metal, Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other Artificer of Great Britain, to go into Foreign Countries out of the King's Dominions, and shall be convicted thereof, upon Indictment or Information in any of the Courts at Westminster, or at the Assizes or Quarter-Sessions, he shall be fined any Sum not exceeding ONE HUNDRED POUNDS for the first Offence, and shall be imprisoned Three Months, and till the Fine be paid. And if any Person having been once convicted shall offend again, he shall be fined at the Discretion of the Court, and imprisoned Twelve Months, and till the Fine be paid.

If any of the King's Subjects, being such Artificers, shall go into any Country out of His Majesty's Dominions, to exercise or teach the said Trades to Foreigners; and if any of the King's Subjects in any such Foreign Country, exercising any of the said Trades, shall not return into this Realm within Six Months after Warning given by the Ambassador, Minister or Consul of Great Britain, in the Country where such Artificers shall be, or by any Person authorized by such Ambassador, &c. or by one of the Secretaries of State, and from henceforth inhabit within this Realm; such Persons shall be incapable of taking any Legacy, or of being an Executor or Administrator, or of taking any Lands, &c. within this Kingdom, by Descent, Devise, or Purchase, and shall forfeit all Lands, Goods, &c. within this Kingdom, to His Majesty's Use, and shall be deemed Alien, and out of His Majesty's Protection.

Upon Complaint made, upon Oath, before any Justice of Peace, that any Person is endeavouring to seduce any such Artificer, or that any such Artificer hath contracted or is preparing to go out of His Majesty's Dominions, for the Purposes aforesaid, such Justice may send his Warrant to bring the Person complained of before him, or before

some other Justice; and if it shall appear by the Oath of One Witness, or by Confession, that he was guilty of any of the said Offences, such Justice may bind him to appear at the next Assizes or Quarter Sessions: And if such Person shall refuse to give Security, the Justice may commit him to Gaol till the next Assizes or Quarter Sessions; and until he shall be delivered by due Course of Law: And if any such Artificer shall be convicted; upon Indictment; of any such Promise, Contract, or Preparation to go beyond the Seas, for the Purpose aforesaid, he shall give such Security to the King not to depart out of His Majesty's Dominions, as such Court shall think reasonable; and shall be imprisoned till Security given.

If any of the above Offences shall be committed in Scotland; the same shall be prosecuted in the Court of Justiciary or the Circuits there.

Statute 23 George II. Chap. 13.

**I**F any Person shall contract with, or endeavour to seduce any Artificer in Wool, Mohair, Cotton, or Silk; or in Iron, Steel, Brasses, or other Metal, or any Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other Artificer in any other of the Manufactures of Great Britain or Ireland, to go out of this Kingdom or Ireland into any Foreign Country not within the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, and shall be convicted, upon Indictment or Information, in the King's Bench at Westminster, or by Indictment at the Assizes or General Gaol Delivery for the County, &c. wherein such Offence shall be committed in England, or by Indictment in the Court of Justiciary or any of the Circuit Courts in Scotland, or by Indictment or Information in the King's Bench at Dublin, if such Offence be committed in Ireland; the Person so convicted shall, for every Artificer contracted with or seduced, forfeit FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS, and shall suffer Imprisonment in the Common Gaol of the County or Stewartry wherein such Offender shall be convicted for Twelve Calendar Months, and until Forfeiture be paid: And in case of a subsequent Offence of the same Kind, the Persons so again offending shall forfeit, for every Person contracted with or seduced, ONE THOUSAND POUNDS, and shall suffer Imprisonment in the Common Gaol of the County or Stewartry wherein such Offender shall be convicted, for Two Years, and until such Forfeiture be paid.

If any Person in Great Britain or Ireland shall put on board any Ship or Boat, not bound directly to some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to some other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, any such Tools or Utensils as are commonly used in, or proper for the Preparing, Working up, or Finishing of the Woollen or Silk Manufactures, or any Part of such Tools, he shall, for every Offence, forfeit all such Tools, or Parts thereof, put on board, and TWO HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered by Action of Debt, &c. in any Court of Record at Westminster, or in the Court of Session in Scotland, or at any of the Four Courts in Dublin respectively, wherein no Essoin, &c. shall be allowed.

It shall be lawful for any Officer of the Customs in Great Britain, or for any Officer of the Revenue

in Ireland, to seize and secure, in some of His Majesty's Warehouses, all such Tools or Utensils prohibited to be exported, as such Officer shall find on board any Vessel not bound directly to some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to some other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain; and all Tools so seized shall, after Condemnation, be publicly sold to the best Bidder; and one Moiety of the Produce shall be to the Use of His Majesty, and the other Moiety to the Officer who shall seize and secure the same.

If the Captain of any Vessel in Great Britain or Ireland knowingly permit any of the said Tools, prohibited to be exported, to be put on board his Vessel, he shall, for every such Offence, forfeit **ONE HUNDRED POUNDS**, to be recovered as the Penalties inflicted upon Persons exporting the Tools; and, if the Vessel belongs to His Majesty, the Captain shall not only forfeit **ONE HUNDRED POUNDS**, but shall also forfeit his Employment, and be incapable of any Employment under His Majesty.

If any Officer of the Customs in Great Britain or of the Revenue in Ireland, take, or knowingly suffer to be taken, any Entry outward, or sign any Cocket or Sufferance for the Shipping or Exporting of any of the said Tools, or knowingly suffer the same to be done, he shall forfeit **ONE HUNDRED POUNDS**, to be recovered as aforesaid, and also forfeit his Office, and be incapable of any Office under His Majesty.

One Moiety of the Forfeitures shall be applied to the Use of His Majesty, and the other Moiety to the Use of the Person who shall sue for the same.

*Statutes 14, 21, 25, and 26 of His present Majesty.*

BY these Statutes the like Penalties and Forfeitures as above-mentioned are extended to Persons packing or putting on board any Vessel, not bound directly for some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, any Machine, Engine, Tool, Press, Paper, Utensil, or Implement whatsoever, used in or proper for the working or finishing of the Cotton, Steel, or Iron Manufactures of this Kingdom, or any Part or Parts of such Machines or Implements, or any Models or Plans thereof; and all Captains of Ships and other Persons receiving or being in Possession of any such Articles, with an Intent to export the same to Foreign Parts, and all Custom-house Officers suffering an Entry to be made thereof, are respectively liable to the like Penalties as are above-mentioned, in the case of Tools and Utensils used in the Woollen and Silk Manufactures.

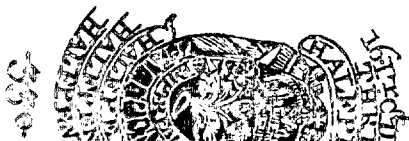
