AT the Court at *St. James's*, the 19th of December, 1798,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the Twentieth Day of June last, prohibiting the transporting into any Parts out of this Kingdom, any Pig-Iron, Bar-Iron, Hemp, Pitch, Tar, Rosin, Turpentine, Anchors, Cables, Cordage, Masts, Yards, Bowsprits, Oars, Oakum, Oker, Sheet-Copper, or other Naval Stores, will expire upon the Twenty-fifth Day of this instant December: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, and the Safety of this Kingdom, that the said Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer; His Majesty doth therefore, with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no Person or Persons whosoever do at any Time, for the Space of Six Months, to commence from the said Twenty-fifth Day of this instant December, presume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom, any Pig-Iron, Bar-Iron, Hemp, Pitch, Tar, Rosin, Turpentine, Anchors, Cables, Cordage, Masts, Yards, Bowsprits, Oars, Oakum, Oker, Sheet-Copper, or other Naval Stores, or ship or lade any of the Articles above mentioned on board any Ship or Vessel, in order to transporting the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, without Leave or Permission being first had and obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring the Forfeitures inflicted by an Act passed in the Thirty-third Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act to enable His Majesty to restrain the Exportation of Naval Stores, and more effectually to prevent the Exportation of Salt-Petre, Arms, and Ammunition, when prohibited by Proclamation or Order in Council." But it is, nevertheless, His Majesty's Pleasure, that nothing herein contained shall extend, or be construed to extend, to any of His Majesty's Ships of War, or any other Ships or Vessels or Boats, in the Service of His Majesty, or employed or freighted by His Majesty's Board of Ordnance, or by the Commissioners of His Ma-

jesty's Navy; nor to prevent any Ship or Vessel from taking or having on Board such Quantities of Naval Stores as may be necessary for the Use of such Ship or Vessel during the Course of her intended Voyage, or by Licence from the Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, or the Commissioners of the Admiralty for the Time being; nor to the Exportation of the said several Articles to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Yards or Garrisons, or to His Majesty's Colonies or Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or to the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies; provided that, upon the Exportation of any of the said Articles, for the Purposes of Trade, to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Yards or Garrisons, or to His Majesty's Colonies and Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to the Island of Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies, the Exporters of such Articles do first make Oath of the true Destination of the same to the Places for which they shall be entered Outwards, before the Entry of the same shall be made, and do give full and sufficient Security, by Bond, to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, to carry the said Articles to the Places for which they are so entered Outwards, and for the Purposes specified, and no other; and such Bond shall not be cancelled or delivered up, until Proof be made, to the Satisfaction of the said Commissioners, by the Production, within a Time to be fixed by the said Commissioners, and specified in the Bond, of a Certificate or Certificates, in such Form and Manner as shall be directed by the said Commissioners, shewing that the said Articles have been duly landed at the Places for which they were entered Outwards. And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

I Have to acquaint you, for the Information of their Lordships, that since my Letter to you of the 10th February last, the Ships and Vessels of

His Majesty's Squadron under my Command have recaptured Six British and Sixteen American Vessels of different Denominations, bound to and from these Islands, and have also detained Twenty Vessels under Neutral Colours on Suspicion of having Enemy's Property on board.

SIR,
I Am to acquaint you, for the Information of their Lordships, that since my Letter to you of the 8th Ultimo, His Majesty's Ships Concorde and Lapwing have captured the undermentioned French Privateers (Schooners) belonging to Guadaloupe. La Buonaparte, of Eight Guns and Seventy-two Men.

L'Amazone, of Ten Guns and Eighty Men.

La Sauveur, of Four Guns and Twenty-one Men.

La Fortune, of Two Guns and Twenty-two Men.

And the Lapwing captured, on the 12th Ultimo, the Invariable Schooner Letter of Marque, of Four Guns and Twenty Men, laden with Dry Goods, from St. Bartholomew's, bound to Guadaloupe.

Copy of another Letter from Rear-Admiral Harvey to Mr. Nepean, dated October 22, 1798.

SIR,
YOU will be pleased to acquaint their Lordships, that since my Letter to you of the 8th Ultimo, Three French Privateers belonging to Guadaloupe have been captured and sent to this Island by His Majesty's Ships under my Command, as under mentioned.

By the Bittern, September 8th, off Marigalante, Le 10 Aout Brig, of Twelve Guns and Fifty Men; she had been cruising on the American Coast, where she had taken Three American Vessels, and One Dane, and was returning to Guadaloupe.

By the Matilda, the 5th Instant, off the N. E. End of Antigua, L'Intrepid Brig, of Fourteen Guns and Seventy-four Men; had been out Three Days from Guadaloupe, without making any Captures.

By the Pearl, the 14th Instant, off the East End of Antigua, the Scévola Sloop, of Ten Guns and Seventy-three Men; had been out Two Days and taken Nothing.

And the Pearl, a few Days previous to the last Capture, likewise destroyed a small French Privateer Row Boat, under Dominica.

Copy of a Letter from Admiral Earl of St. Vincent, K. B. Commander in Chief of His Majesty's Ships and Vessels in the Mediterranean, to Evan Nepean, Esq; dated on Board Le Souverain, Gibraltar, November 27, 1798.

Herewith you will receive the Copy of a Letter from Rear-Admiral Lord Nelson, inclosing one from Captain Ball, of His Majesty's Ship Alexander, with the Capitulation of the Island of Goza.

My Lord, *Vanguard, at Sea, Nov. 1, 1798.*
I Have the Honor to transmit you a Letter received from Captain Ball, dated October 30, together with the Capitulation of the Castle of Goza, and a List of Ordnance, &c. found in it; the Prisoners are now embarked in the *Vanguard* and *Minotaur* till I can get a Vessel to send them to France. Captain Ball, with Three Sail of the Line, a Frigate, and Fireship, is entrusted with the Blockade of Malta, in which are Two Sail of the Line and Three Frigates ready for Sea; and from the Experience I have had of Captain Ball's Zeal, Activity, and Ability, I have no Doubt but that in due Time I shall have the Honor of sending you good Account of the French in the Town of Valetti.

Alexander, off Malta, October, 30, 1798.

SIR,
I Have the Honor to acquaint you, that the Commandant of the French Troops in the Castle of Goza, signed the Capitulation the 28th Instant, which you had approved. I ordered Captain Creswell, of the Marines, to take Possession of it in the Name of His Britannic Majesty, and His Majesty's Colours were hoisted. The next Day the Place was delivered up in Form to the Deputies of the Island, His Sicilian Majesty's Colours hoisted, and he acknowledged their lawful Sovereign.

I embarked Yesterday all the French Officers and Men who were on the Island of Goza, amounting to Two Hundred and Seventeen.

I inclose the Articles of Capitulation, and an Inventory of the Arms and Ammunition found in the Castle, Part of which I directed to be sent to the Assistance of the Maltese, who are in Arms against the French. There were Three Thousand Two Hundred Sacks of Corn in the Castle, which will be a great Relief to the Inhabitants, who are much in Want of that Article.

ARTICLES of CAPITULATION

Between Alexander John Ball, Esq; Captain of His Britannic Majesty's Ship Alexander, appointed to conduct the Blockade of Malta, under Rear-Admiral Sir Horatio Nelson, K. B. on the Part of Great Britain, and Lieutenant-Colonel Lochey, Auj. de Batt. Commander of the French Troops in the Castle of Goza.

I. THE French Troops shall march out of the Castle of Goza, with the Honours of War, and shall lay down their Arms as they get out of the Gate.

II. The Castle of Goza, with all the Military Implements and Stores, shall be delivered up to the British Officer appointed to take Charge of them.

III. The French Officers and Troops shall be protected in their Persons and Effects, and the Officers allowed to retain their Side-Arms; they shall be embarked immediately on board His Britannic Majesty's Ships, and sent to France in Transports, at the Expence of the French Government. They are not to

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serve against His Britannic Majesty, or his Allies during the War, until regularly exchanged.

Rear-Admiral Sir Horatio Nelson, K. B. has entered into Articles with the Inhabitants of Goza, that if the French surrender to the British, they shall be considered as under their Protection, and they will not offer them the smallest Insult or Molestation.
