Have the Honor to inform you, that on the 10th Instant, His Majesty's Ship Clyde, under my Command, captured L'Air Schooner Letter of Marque, from Brest to Saint Domingo; and on the 13th, a Brig Privateer, called Le Bon Ordre, carrying Sixteen Guns and Sixty-five Men. She failed from Granville on the 20th December, and had captured One Brig from Newfoundland on the 6th Instant.
