Sunderland, April 22.

A Small Vessel of about 40 Tuns, is just now put in here, having yesterday been chased by some Dutch Ships, which we suppose to be the Squadron of Van Gent with his Convoy passing about to the Northwards.

Portsmouth, April 23. This Morning arrived Captain Gumble with his Privateer, but without a ypriz. Cruising some days since, towards the Islands near St. Paul de Lys, he met with four small Vessels of Bretagne, whom he chased, two of them ran ashore at the mouth of the Harbor of Amalais, where they were cast away; the others got in undamaged, being defended by Guns from the shore, and by the Country people that came into their assistance. After which, he returned to Guernsey, where having refitted, he again stood for St. Malo and St. Paul de Lys, where he took on board a Man of War of four Guns; the next day he fell foul with the Governor of Jersey's Privateer, with whom he had a warm dispute, they both mistaking one the other, but perceiving their Errors, after the hurt of some few men, they mended their Rigging, and afterward gave chase to a Fishing Merchant Man that came from St. Malo, in which the Jersey Privateer altering her course, the Flushingger escaped. The twenty first instant, he discovered a Merchantman off the Gaskets, which he chased so closely, that the Merchant being in danger, to be taken or run ashore, either by choice or accident, blew up, and all her men, as well as the Skipper perished.

Hull, April 24. The Hampshire hath taken a Sloop of one Gun and eighteen men, which has done much mischief upon these coasts in disturbing the Trade; and it is believed, the Pearl and Little Victory, have taken another Privateer upon the Dogger.

Lisbon, April 5. The Treaty so long negotiata between the two Countries of France and Portugal, is at the last effected and concluded. Yesterday the 4th Instant, the Articles were signed, and the 7th Don Francisco Fereira Rebello, formerly designed Agent into France, is to go forward with them. This League is to continue for 10 years, but the particulars of it not yet publicly known.

Venice, April 14. Some few days since His Imperial Majesty commanded a Letter to be written to the Archbishop of Granada, to whom he has during the Vacancy committed the Administration of the Palatinare of Hungary, that he suddenly repair to this Court with the Chancellor and Principal Ministers of those States, to consult with him about the Affairs of that Kingdom, and the Corporation of the Empress a Queen of it, i.e. which the Emperour desires may be performed the next August.

The Civility of the Viceroy of Buda to our Merchants sent thither for the Establishment of Commerce, highly encouraged them to prosecute that Affair. During their stay there, he allowed them 15 Rix dollars a day for their expences, promising them all the assistance possible in settling their Trade, and for the future to the best of his Abilities between them and most other Nations, in not taking of them above one per cent.

On Tuesday last the Emperour upon the Popes desire gave the Cardinals Capri to the Marquis Spinola the Ninth, the Solemity being performed with much Ceremony in the Church of the Augustines; which ended, the Prince de Lohewring treated his Eminency, with the Spanish Ambassador and several Lords of the Council, at an excellent Din-

ner. That Evening, the Cardinal in testimony of the Satisfaction he received in the Honour that day conferred on him, filled all the Windows of his House with Double Lights of White Wax, and proclaimed his Joy with the sound of Trumpets and Kettle Drums, which continued till Mid-night.

Towards the end of this Month the Emperour intends to go from hence for Laxenburgh, where he will continue till Whitsonside.

By some Letters lately arrived here, we are told, that the Archbishop of Granada is dead of an Apoplexy; which will put us upon new thoughts in relation to the Palatinare, and may a little alter the other Designs of the Emperour.

We are advised from Nuremberg, that the Marquis de Pio and Collonel Danewold, who left this Court some Weeks since upon a Challenge, are both of them wounded in the Combat, but the former is believed mortally. The Marquis de Granna, that was Second to the Marquis de Pio, was arrested by the Emperour's Order in his own Houles. But is this day released, for which He is gone to the Court to make his acknowledgements to the Emperour.

The Regiments quartered in Bohemia, Moravia, and Hesse, have Orders sent them to march to the Frontiers of Poland.

Venice, April 15. Some few days since arrived here a Vessel from Corfu, aboard the which, were several passengers, and amongst them, some from our Fleet, but have been so long upon the way, that they bring little news with them. Only they tell us, that General Moretta had raised above a thousand able Soldiers at Cephallenias, whom he had sent aboard his Ships, and that a great number more would be speedily sent after him, and that he had laden one Ship with Bullets, and several others with other necessaries for the service of the Fleet. That the General was since arrived at Zante, where after some Conference with the Maggots Ville, they were both sailed thence for the Armada. The same passengers were some time in company with a Fellow, passing to Otranto with Letters from the Fleet, which is since likewise come in here, and confirms to us the news we had of the Proveditor Barbaro's taking two considerable priz's with his single Galley in his passage to the Captain General, to whom he went to take his leave, by reason of his distemper, before his return home. That one of them had aboard her 120 Turks, and the other good quantities of Provision, both intending for Creta. They assure us also, that a Turkish Galley was lately brought into the Fleet, surprised and carried off by the Christian Slaves that were aboard her, the manner thus.

Aboard this Galley, where were above 180 Turks, with their Officers, there happened to be a Renegado Greek, which it seems, repenting himself of his Apostacy, contrived this plot, for the fraying both of himself, and the Christian Slaves that were there condemned to the Oars. He went down privately into the Hold of the Galley, where he bored several holes to let in the water, which when he had done, he ran up hastily upon the Deck, crying out to the Turks, that the Vessel had sprung such Leaks, that it would inevitably be lost; whereupon the Turks immediately made to a Rock that was near them, where they ran on shore, the Slaves taking the opportunity rowed off the Galley, and stopping the holes, brought her off to Patras, and presented it to the Captain General, who immediately sent out two Gallies well armed to the Rock, where they sailed upon all the Turks, except only five or six that were drowned, hoping to have saved themselves by swimming. The prisoners are all of them

them old Soldiers; and divers of them considerable persons.

We have not by this *Felucca* any news from *Candia*, which induces us to believe, that the *Turks* had not as yet formed any League before the Town.

General Valiero is now embarked, and his Galleys will be specially ready to sail, as will also our Convoy for the Levant, under the command of Daniel Morosini, who goes Commissary to the Armada.

Ditto, April 22. Letters lately arriv'd from Dalmatia, assure us, that a great part of *Sibaria* has extremely suffered by a terrible Earthquake, which hapned to them on *Holy Thursday* last, which threw down a great many Houses in *Cattaro*, with a considerable part of the Wall towards the Sea, involving at the least 600 persons in the ruines: That *Budua* was wholly swallowed up, scarce any sign of it remaining, in which there perisht likewise about 600 persons. Both these places un'er the jurisdiction of this Republick. And that *Durzigno* and *Castel Nuovo*, two places possest by the Turks, were both of them sunk, onely the Forte of the former, and a House of the latter preserv'd, wherein were kept some Slaves. Besides these, *Raguse* is more then half destroyed, with the death of 5 or 6000 of the Inhabitants.

Some *Haidukes* of *Gettarò* being then abroad upon a party to look after prey, saw some Mountains in the Turkish Borders, that in the time of the *Barthquake* seemed to open, out of which, issued out some fire with abundance of smoak.

Paris, May 4. His Maj:sty hath ordered the General Rendezvous of his Army to be at *Cressy upon serre*, not far distant from *Marles* and *Vervins*; himself intends the 8.h instant for *Compeigne*, where after a weeks stay, he will leave the Queen, who is thought to be wth child; and after a Weeks stay there to go to *Fountainbleau*, and about the end of this Month to be in person at the General Rendezous.

His M^r. Joffre has made the Marshal D' Aumont, General of a Flying Army, of about five or six thousand Foot and two thousand Horse in Boulogne, and the Count de la Feuillade, now Duke of Rohan, Lieutenant General, with a yearly Pension of 12000 Livres, besides the 100000 Livres given him before his Marriage.

The Marquis de Greys is likewise to command another Army in Algeria, who is also admitted to his former Charge of General of the Guards, which it is believed will not this year go to Sea.

The Duke de Novailles is to command 4900 Foot and 2000 Horse upon the Frontiers of Cachonia, but with Orders, as have also the Forces intended for Alsatis, to keep themselves only in a posture of defence.

A Spanish Vessel going from S. Sebastien, in view of Brest, was by Order from the Duke de Beaufort, chased by four of the nimblest Vessels of the Fleet sent out after her, to search her and seize on her Letters, but being not able to reach her, they returned to Brest, with some other Prize they lighted on in their way.

Holland, 1667. The States of Holland are now separated, having examined and taken Order for all Points necessary for the induction of their Deputies, whom they are to send imployed. The whole number of them, for the Provinces, will be Eight in all, viz. one from each Province, and two from Holland; though much art has been used to persuade the lending only of Three, in the Name of all the United Provinces. We are yet only assured of the Nomination of Three of the intended Eight, viz. Bevering for Holland, Tussimus de Flueber Pensionary of Zeeland, for that Province, and Bonck Bart for Fries.

From Amsterdam we are advised that the Great Ships are not yet fallen down to the Texel, being hindered for want of water, which has also detained those of Friesland and North Holland's but the Wind being changed, and the Rains falling, incline us to believe that impediment will be speedily, if it be not already taken off.

From the Texel we are informed that 13 or 15 of our Men of War, with four Frigates, set sail from thence, under the command of Lieutenant Admiral Van Gent; and the next day were followed by three or four other Men of War,

with a Fleet of Merchants of 140 or 150 Sail, intending a
tour by the North, bound some for the Sound, others for
France and the Straights; that four or five Men of War con-
tingue still there, and 15 or 16 more at the Hly., expecting
the arrival of the Great Ships.

We are also inform'd that 14 of our Men of War are fallen down the *Mae* to *Helvoetsluys*, well equipped and victualled for three Moneths; the Officers and most of the men to be employed in them, are already sent aboard, and that four or five Fire-ships were fitting up at *Rotterdam*, to be sent forwards with all expedition.

Bruges, May 3. The Sentence lately passed against Peter Pillart, for the plot contrived to have delivered up Luxembourg to the French, was accordingly executed yesterday about eleven of the clock in the Market place of Brussels, though by the favor of the Marquels not with that rigor which the Sentence required; yet his punishment ended not with his person, his children being likewise condemned to banishment, his Goods to be confiscated, and his Houses both within and without the Walls of Luxembourg to be pulled down to the ground, and on the place a Pillar erected with an inscription to this effect. Here stood the House of Peter Pillart, who pleased to betray this Town to the King of France.

Cadiz, April 3. Four days since Rear-Admiral Knobthorn with his Squadron, Captain Elliot in the *Revenge*, and the *Constant Warwick*, with 22 Merchant Ships from hence and St. Lucars, went towards the Straights Mouth; met the *Pembroke* Fregat, with 16 or 17 Sail more under his Convoy, who are supposed to be now past the Straights on their way homewards.

Weymouth, April 24. On Monday night last arrived here the *Mary-Rose* from the Straights, who informs us of the good condition of our Straights Fleet, and the probability of their speedy arrival.

Yesterday we discovered Fiye and twenty Sail, which by their course we judged to be a part of the Convoy; but their standing off again to sea before night, gives us some cause to doubt the contrary.

Portsmouth, April 25. Yesterday arrived here the ~~Adm~~
Rosa from Weymouth; and this morning we saw a good
distance off St. Helens, several Ships making in for the
place, which we judge to be Rear-Admiral Kempton's Squad-
ron, with the Straights' fleet under his Convoy.

Termouth, April 26. Yesterday were sent into this place three prizes, whereof one laden with Deals.

Aiberough, April 27, On Thursday in the afternoon, a French Privateer of 10 or 12 Guns, chased a Vessel into the Bay, but being discovered by one of our Fregats, ran to S.s, and was pursued till it was dark. On Friday morning he appeared again plying to the Northwards, and came into Achor in Sizewell Bay; but such care is taken to cut the reefs, that we doubt not but some of our Fregats will speedily give a good account of him.

Whitehal, April 26. This day the Ambassador Extraordinary of Sweden, took leave of their Majesties in an solemn Audience in the Banqueting-house, whither they were conducted in His Majesties Coach in the usual manner by the Right Honourable the Earl of Carlisle, accompanied with Sir Charles Cottrell, Master of the Ceremonies, and attended with a numerous Train of Coaches, being in few days to part hence for Breda, to assist at the Treaty.
