Milan, April 24.

OLlr Governor has occafioned fiveral pieces of Cannon to be brought from Pavia, to fupply fuch places as want. The new Fortifications that are refolved to be made, will be gone on with, and all other things done (as far as the prefent circumftances of things will allow) to put this Countrey in a pofture of Difince, although the danger feems not at prefent fo great, at leaft to thoie that are not in the fecret of affairs, as it did a Mot th or two fince.

Bruffels, Alay 9. This morning the Great Council was Affembled, from Ten in the' morning till Two in the afternoon. Don Pedro Ronquillo, who is to fucceed the Marquis de Bourgamanero, as Envoye Extraordinary from the King of Spain to the Court of England, is now ready to begin his journey; and it's believed, the fame Yacht that brings over the Marquis, will tranfport Don Pedro thither. Our Letters from Mons (which arecunfirmed by he palfengers that come from thence) fay, that 10 or 12000 French were drawing togerher in that neighborbood, with what difign was not known. The news we have from Germany, of the Leagues that are negotiating at the Courts of leveral Princes, by the Minilters of the King of England, and of the difpofitions the Emperors Minilters find the Princes of the Empire they are fent to, in, gives people here great encouragement, and feems very much to fortifie them againft the apprinenfions the motions of ehcir ncighbors may jultly give them.

Amplerdam, May 14. As to the proceedings of the States of Holland, we can only repeat what has been often faid alceady, to wit, that they are not as yet come to any refolution in the matter of the monnys they are to raife, but it's hoped they will now very fpeedily, the occafions of the State requiring it. The Heer Zitters, who goes Ambalfador to England, will begin his Voyage this Week. Lpon his arrival in England, the Heer Van Leeureen will immediately leave that Court, and return home. There is a report of fome difurders lately happen:d at Feriogenbofch, of which we have not yet the Particulars.

Hague, May 14. The States of Holland having had a flort rec is fince lalt Saturday, met again this day, and are endeavouring to fini(h the great bufinefs (which has employed them folong) about finding a Fond to defray the neceffary Charges of the prefent year, wherein it's believed they will make a confiderable Progrefs this week. As foon as they have retled this important affair, they will Adjourn till the latter end of the next Montl); during which recels the Prince of Orange intends to goe for Gelderland to hunt, and the Princefs is noer fo well that the will accompany bis Highnefs thither; and accordingly preparations are making for their Journey. The French who make them-
felves every day more and more uneafy to the Elector Palatine, have lately feiz:d upon foveral Caitles b, longing to him, and befides pretend to great Arrears of Contributions: Whereupon His El-ctoral Highnefs has very earnefly defircd this State to incerpofe their good Offices with the moft Chri+ ffian King in his behalf, which they have promiled to do in the molt effectual manner. The Elector of Cologne, finding the feveral Inftances he had made to this state, concerning the reftitution of Haffelt and Mafeyck, to bave been hitherto without any effect, has it feems applied himfelf to the French King, that he would concern himelf inthis affair, who has accordingly rent Orders to his Am ${ }^{-}$ balfador here to interpofe with the staces, that the faid places may be reftored to the Elector. From Berlin we have an account, That the Englifh and Imperial Minifters are very active in their N-gotiations at that Court, which they promife themfelves a good fucc fs in, and that the French Envoy, the Sieur Rabenac, had received an abfolut: Denial from the Elector to the Propofitions he had made him.

Pendennis, May 3. Off Friday laft in the morning failed the Virginia bhips mentioned in our laft, the Wind then blowing a very frelh Gale at N . In the Evening the Wiad changed, and the next day they were forced to put in here again.
Lime, May 5. Yelterday and the day before, 2 confiderable Fleet. of Ships was feen in this Bay plying to the Ealtward, being bound home from the Streights: By fome Veffels put into this Pore we have an account, That this Flect came from Tangiet the beginning of April, That the Moors lad then run a Trencla between the Town and Claries Fort, in order, as was helicved, to the Atracking the latter, which was very well provided, and mage frong'r by fome new Fortifications; That there were [everal Men of Warin the Road, who, if there were occafion could fupply the Town with a con(derable number of Scamen; That they ucredaily expecting the Arrival of the fames Galley and the $S_{\text {wan }}$ Frigat with 400 m in from Ireland, which would be a great reinforcement to the Garifon; and that the Adverture, Captain Looth Commander. after an Engagement of Several hours with an Al gierine of $3_{2}$ Guns, had forced hr alhoar, where the Ship and moft of the Turks perifhes, Captain Booth having faved a great many Chriftians, of which Several were Englilh, and fome of them belonging to this Town:
