Copy of a Letter from Vice-Admiral Kingsmill, Commander in Chief of His Majesty's Ships and Vessels on the Coast of Ireland, to Evan Nepean, Esq; dated Cork, January 17, 1799.

SIR,

PLEASE to lay before my Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty the accompanying Letter I have just received from Captain Fraser, of His Majesty's Ship Shannon, who has brought in a French Privateer, out of Granville, mounting Eighteen Carronades and Two long Twelve-Pounders, and One Hundred and Twenty-five Men, which he captured on the 15th Instant.

SIR,

I Beg Leave to acquaint you, that being on the Morning of the 15th Instant in Latitude 49 Deg. 40 Min. and Longitude 9 Deg. 30 Min. W. with His Majesty's Ship under my Command, proceeding to the Rendezvous prescribed by Captain Faulknor, I saw and, after a Chace of Seven Hours, captured Le Grand Indien, a Ship Privateer, from Granville, commanded by Gand Olivier Vubois, carrying Eighteen Brass Carronades Eighteen-Pounders, and Two long Twelve-Pounders, manned with One Hundred and Twenty-five Men.

She was only Five Days from Granville, had taken nothing, is quite new, with Provisions and Stores for a Three Months Cruize.

From the Circumstance of the Prize having carried her Main-mast by the Board while chased, (and

as the Shannon also sprung a Maintop-mast, and tore to Pieces Two Boats in shifting Prisoners,) the Wind blowing strong with a heavy Sea, I hope you will approve of my having accompanied her into Port.

THE following Address having been transmitted by his Excellency the Marquis Cornwallis, Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, to His Grace the Duke of Portland, His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department, has been by him presented to the King; which Address His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

May it please your Majesty,

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Mayor, Sheriffs, Common-Council, and Commonalty of the City of Cork, in Court of D'Oyer Hundred assembled, beg Leave most humbly to approach your Majesty with Sentiments of the most affectionate Attachment to your Royal Person and Family, and the most confident Reliance on the Wisdom and Firmness of your Majesty's Government.

Whilst we contemplate, with the deepest Concern, the unprovoked Rebellion, which has lately disgraced certain Quarters of this Kingdom, and the Treachery which invited a Foreign Enemy to its Shore, we cannot repress the Warmth of our Gratitude for the parental Anxiety manifested by your Majesty to protect us, and the prompt and affectionate Zeal with which our Sister Kingdom poured forth the Flower of her Nobility, and the most chosen of her Sons, to restore Quiet to the Land, and to repel our common and inveterate Foe.

We listen, with heartfelt Gratification, to any Measure tending more closely and indissolubly to connect Two Countries, which seem relatively situated for their mutual Support, and which none but the Enemies of each could ever wish to divide.

Convinced that the most beneficial Effects must result to the Empire at large from such a Connexion between this Kingdom and Great Britain as will terminate all Speculations on their separate Interests, and afford additional Strength and Security to each by the cordial and energetic Co-operation of both; we beg Leave most humbly to address your Majesty as our common Parent, and to declare, that we hear with the utmost Satisfaction that an Union between the Two Kingdoms is at present within the Contemplation of your Majesty's Ministers; and as your Majesty's Disposition towards your Kingdom of Ireland, has ever been gracious, munificent, and just, we feel confident that on the

present Occasion her Liberties and her Interests will be carefully considered and anxiously preserved. Done under the Common Seal of the City of Corke, at the Guild-Hall thereof, the 15th Day of January, 1799.

Whitehall, January 19, 1799

Whereas it has been humbly represented to His Majesty, That on Wednesday the 26th Day of December last, between Ten and Eleven o'Clock at Night, Mr. Ambrose Bowden, Sitter of the Custom-House Boat stationed at Cawsand, within the Port of Plymouth, in the County of Devon, being out upon Duty with Four of his Men in his Boat, rowing from Cawsand Beach towards Penlee Point on the Coast of Cornwall, in consequence of Information which he had received, that a Smuggling Vessel called the Lottery was about to land her Cargo near the said Point, he discovered a large Sloop or Cutter lying at Anchor, about Half a Mile from the Point, bearing S. W. by W.

That on coming near to the said Sloop or Cutter, Mr. Bowden perceived several Boats lying alongside of her and at her Stern; and when he got within about One Hundred Yards of the said Sloop or Cutter, some Person on board called out and asked, What Boat that was? Upon which Mr. Bowden answered it was a King's Boat; upon which some Person on board the Smuggling Sloop or Cutter, called out and said, "Keep off, or I will fire into you." Mr. Bowden again said, that his was a King's Boat, and a Revenue Boat, and dared the People on board to fire. That being by this Time within Twenty Yards of the Smuggling Sloop or Cutter, the People on board again ordered Mr. Bowden to keep off, and fired with Guns or Blunderbusses at his Boat Three Times, by which Humphry Glinn One of Mr. Bowden's Men in the said Boat, was killed:—That Mr. Bowden then took up a Musket, which he had in his Boat, and fired at the said Sloop or Cutter several Times, upon which the People on board either cut or slipped their Cable, and sailed away before the Wind to the Westward, at the same Time continuing to fire over her Stern at Mr. Bowden's Boat: That Mr. Bowden, not being able to pursue the said Sloop or Cutter, returned to Cawsand Bay, where he went on board of His Majesty's Ship Stag, and the Surgeon and his Mate examined the said Humphry Glinn, when they found that the fore Part of his Skull was shot away, and that he was quite dead.

His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in this Felony and Murder, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any One or more of the said Offenders (except the Master or Commander of the said Sloop or Cutter, and the Person or Persons who actually fired) who shall discover his or their Accomplices, so that any One or more of them may be apprehended.
