A PROCLAMATION,

For a General FAST.

GEORGE R.

WE, taking into Our most serious Consideration the just and necessary War in which We are engaged, for the Maintenance of the Independence of Our Crown, for the Defence and Protection of the Commerce, and of the Rights and Liberties, Civil and Religious, of Our Subjects, and putting Our Trust in Almighty God, that He will graciously bless Our Arms, both by Sea and Land, have resolved, and do, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, hereby command, That a Publick Fast and Humiliation be observed throughout that Part of Our Kingdom of Great Britain called England, Our Dominion of Wales, and Town of Berwick upon Tweed, on Wednesday the Twenty-seventh Day of this instant February; that so both We and Our People may humble Ourselves before Almighty God, in order to obtain Pardon of Our Sins; and may, in the most devout and solemn Manner, send up Our Prayers and Supplications to the Divine Majesty, for averting those heavy Judgements which Our manifold Sins and Provocations have most justly deserved; and imploring His Blessing and Assistance on Our Arms, and for restoring and perpetuating Peace, Safety, and Prosperity, to Us and Our Kingdoms: And We do strictly charge and command, That the said Publick Fast be reverently and devoutly observed by all Our loving Subjects in England, Our Dominion of Wales, and Town of Berwick upon Tweed, as they tender the Favour of Almighty God, and would avoid His Wrath and Indignation; and upon Pain of such Punishment as We may justly inflict on all such as contain and neglect the Performance of so religious and necessary a Duty. And for the better and more orderly solemnizing the same, We have given Directions to the Most Reverend the Archbishops, and the Right Reverend the Bishops of England, to compose a Form of Prayer suitable to this Occasion, to be used in all Churches, Chapels, and Places of Publick Worship; and to take care the

same be timely dispersed throughout their respective Dioceses.

Herewith you will receive a Copy of a Letter from Captain Gore, of His Majesty's Ship Triton, which I transmit to you for their Lordships' Information.

BRIDPORT.

His Majesty's Ship the Triton, at Sea, January 29, 1799.

My Lord,

I Have the Satisfaction to inform your Lordship, that after a Chace of Eight Hours and a Half His Majesty's Ship Triton captured the French Brig L'Aimable Victoire, mounting Sixteen Brass Eight-Pounders, Two Iron Six-Pounders, and

Eighty-six Men; sailed from Cherbourg Yesterday Evening, has not taken any Thing.

I have reason to feel satisfied at this Capture, as she sails very fast, is of large Dimensions, and, being her first Cruise, might have injured the Trade of this Country. She is quite new, and I think fit for His Majesty's Service.

*W*hereas it hath been humbly represented to the King, that on the Night of the 26th December last, as the Officers and Patrole belonging to the Public-Office, Bow-Street, were executing a privy Search-Warrant at a disorderly Public-House in Maynard-Street, Saint Giles's, and endeavouring to apprehend a Number of idle and disorderly Persons found there, that they were violently attacked while legally discharging their Duty, by a desperate Gang of Irish Men and Women, harbouring in that Neighbourhood, armed with Cutlasses and Bludgeons, who overpowered the Officers, and inhumanly cut, maimed, and beat them so that the Lives of many of them were in great Danger, several of whom have not yet recovered the Use of their Limbs; and that Duncan Grant, one of said Patrole, languished of the Wounds he so received until the 22d Day of January last, when he died; and by an Inquest since taken before the Coroner, it hath been found that the said Duncan Grant was wilfully murdered by some Persons unknown.

His Majesty, for the better apprehending and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in the above Outrage and Murder, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any of them (except the Person who actually wounded the said Duncan Grant) who shall discover his Accomplice or Accomplices therein, so that he or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.
