A PROCLAMATION.
GEORGE R.

WHEREAS We have Reason to apprehend that divers Persons engaged in the Treasonable Conspiracy against Us in Our Kingdom of Ireland, which lately manifested itself in open Acts of Rebellion and War against Us in Our said Kingdom; have not abandoned their Treasonable Designs against Us, and acting in concert with Our Foreign Enemies, are preparing to assist Our said Enemies in an Invasion of Our Kingdoms, and for that Purpose are endeavouring to incite and stir up Rebellion and War against Us in this Kingdom; We have therefore thought it necessary for the Safety of Our Kingdoms, to prevent all Persons engaged in such Treasonable Designs from passing from Our said Kingdom of Ireland into this Kingdom: and We do, for that Purpose, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, order, and do hereby strictly charge and command, That, from and after the Twentieth Day of March instant, no Person whatsoever be permitted to pass from Our said Kingdom of Ireland into this Kingdom, except such Persons as shall be in Our Service, and actually so employed, and such Persons as shall obtain a Passport for that Purpose from Our Lord Lieutenant of Our said Kingdom of Ireland, his Chief or Under-Secretaries, the Mayor, or other Chief Magistrate, of some City or Town in Ireland, or One of Our General Officers commanding Our Forces within the several Districts in Our said Kingdom; and by and with the Advice aforesaid, We do further order, and hereby strictly charge and command, that no Person whatsoever, (except as aforesaid,) coming from Our said Kingdom of Ireland, be permitted to land in this Kingdom without Our Licence for that Purpose first obtained; and that all such Persons (except as aforesaid) who shall land or attempt to land in this Kingdom, without such Licence as aforesaid, shall be forthwith taken into Custody, and detained in Custody until Our Pleasure shall be further known; and We do further order and require, that all Persons, having such Passports as aforesaid, shall produce the same to some Officer of Our Customs at the

Port or Place to which such Persons shall come, before such Persons shall be permitted to land at such Port or Place; and We do hereby, by and with the Advice aforesaid, strictly enjoin, require, and command all and singular Justices of the Peace, Mayors, Sheriffs, Bailiffs, Constables, and all other Our Officers and Subjects, to use their utmost Endeavours for the due Execution of these Our Commands.

Given at Our Court at St. James's, the Fifteenth Day of March One thousand seven hundred and ninety-nine, in the Thirty-ninth Year of Our Reign.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the Twenty-eighth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled, "An Act for regulating the Trade between the Subjects of His Majesty's Colonies and Plantations in North America, and in the West India Islands, and the Countries belonging to the United States of America, and between His Majesty's said Subjects and the Foreign Islands in the West Indies," It is, amongst other Things, enacted, That it shall and may be lawful for His Majesty in Council, by Order or Orders to be issued and published from Time to Time, to authorize, or by Warrant or Warrants, under His Sign Manual, to empower the Governor of Newfoundland for the Time being to authorize, in case of Necessity, the Importation into Newfoundland of Bread, Flour, Indian Corn, and Live Stock, from any of the Territories belonging to the said United States, for the Supply of the Inhabitants and Fishermen of the Island of Newfoundland, for the then ensuing Season only; provided always, that such Bread, Flour, Indian Corn, and Live Stock, so authorized to be imported into the Island of Newfoundland, shall not be imported except in conformity to such Rules, Regulations, and Restrictions as shall be specified in such Order or Orders,

Warrant or Warrants, respectively, and except by British Subjects and in British-built Ships, owned by His Majesty's Subjects, and navigated according to Law. And whereas it is expedient and necessary that Provision be made for fully supplying the Inhabitants and Fishermen of the Island of Newfoundland, for the ensuing Season, with Bread, Flour, Indian Corn, and Live Stock; His Majesty doth thereupon, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order and declare, That, for the Supply of the Inhabitants and Fishermen of the Island of Newfoundland, for the ensuing Season only, Bread, Flour, Indian Corn, and Live Stock may be imported into the said Island from any of the Territories belonging to the said United States, by British Subjects, and in British-built Ships, owned by His Majesty's Subjects, and navigated according to Law, and which shall, within the Space of Seven Months previous to the Time of such Importation, have cleared out from some Port in Great Britain, or some other Part in His Majesty's Dominions in Europe, for which Purpose a Licence shall have been granted by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs in England or Scotland, or the Commissioners of His Majesty's Revenue in Ireland, or any other Person or Persons who may be duly authorized in that Kingdom respectively, in the Manner and Form hereinafter mentioned; which Licence shall continue and be in Force for Seven Calendar Months from the Day of the Date upon which such Licence is respectively granted, and no longer; provided that no such Licence as aforesaid, granted after the Thirtieth Day of September, One thousand seven hundred and ninety-nine, shall be of any Force or Effect: And His Majesty is hereby further pleased to order, That the Master, or Person having the Charge or Command of any Ship or Vessel to whom such Licence shall be granted, shall, upon the Arrival of the said Ship or Vessel at the Port, Harbour, or Place in the Island of Newfoundland, where he shall discharge such Bread, Flour, Indian Corn, and Live Stock, deliver up the said Licence to the Collector or other proper Officer of the Customs there, having first indorsed on the Back of such Licence the Marks, Numbers, and Contents of each Package of Bread, Flour, or Indian Corn, and the Number of Live Stock, under the Penalty of the Forfeiture in the said Act mentioned. And the Collector or other proper Officer of the Customs of Newfoundland is hereby enjoined and required to give a Certificate to the Master, or Person having the Charge or Command of such Ship or Vessel, of his having received the said Licence, so indorsed as before directed, and to transmit the same to the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs in England or Scotland, or to the Commissioners of His Majesty's Revenue in Ireland, respectively, by whom such Licence was granted. *Steph. Now be it known, That the said [Person's Name] hath Licence to lade on board the said Ship [Ship's Name] at and from any Port or Place belonging to the United States of America, Bread, Flour, Indian Corn, and Live Stock, the Produce of the said United States, and no other Articles whatsoever, and to carry the said Bread, Flour, Indian Corn, and Live Stock to some Port or Place in the Island of Newfoundland; and on the Arrival of the said Ship at any Port, Harbour, or Place of Discharge in Newfoundland, the Master, or Person having the Charge or Command of the said Ship, is required and enjoined to deliver up the said Licence to the Collector or other proper Officer of His Majesty's Customs there, and to indorse on the Back thereof the Marks, Numbers, and Contents of each Package of Bread, Flour, or Indian Corn, and the Number of Live Stock, and shall thereupon receive a Certificate thereof from the said Collector or other proper Officer of the Customs.

 hands of the Enemy for Whe like birds of pray
 will prively liye in wait to spil the bloud of the

 declair that thou shalt not say I am safe when
 thou goest to they bead for beware that thou listest
 not thine eyes up in the mist of flames and when
 thou goest out behour if you can that thou re-
 turns in safety the bloud of every one that wishes

 bloody act Whe are deturmined to have if at the
 expence of ours Whe cannot but say that there
 is plenty of room for alterations for Whe cannot
