A PROCLAMATION.

GEORGE R.

WHEREAS We have Reason to apprehend that divers Persons engaged in the Treasonable Conspiracy against Us in Our Kingdom of Ireland, which lately manifested itself in open Acts of Rebellion and War against Us in Our said Kingdom, have not abandoned their Treasonable Designs against Us, and acting in concert with Our Foreign Enemies, are preparing to assist Our said Enemies in an Invasion of Our Kingdoms, and for that Purpose are endeavouring to incite and stir up Rebellion and War against Us in this Kingdom; We have therefore thought it necessary for the Safety of Our Kingdoms, to prevent all Persons engaged in such Treasonable Designs from passing from Our said Kingdom of Ireland into this Kingdom: and We do, for that Purpose, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, order, and do hereby strictly charge and command, That, from and after the Twentieth Day of March instant, no Person whatsoever be permitted to pass from Our said Kingdom of Ireland into this Kingdom, except such Persons as shall be in Our Service, and actually so employed, and such Persons as shall obtain a Passport for that Purpose from Our Lord Lieutenant of Our said Kingdom of Ireland, his Chief or Under-Secretaries, the Mayor, or other Chief Magistrate, of some City or Town in Ireland, or One of Our General Officers commanding Our Forces within the several Districts in Our said Kingdom; and by and with the Advice aforesaid, We do further order, and hereby strictly charge and command, that no Person whatsoever, (except as aforesaid,) coming from Our said Kingdom of Ireland, be permitted to land in this Kingdom without Our Licence for that Purpose first obtained; and that all such Persons (except as aforesaid) who shall land or attempt to land in this Kingdom, without such Licence as aforesaid, shall be forthwith taken into Custody, and detained in Custody until Our Pleasure shall be further known; and We do further order and require, that all Persons, having such Passports as aforesaid, shall produce the same to some Officer of Our Customs at the

Port or Place to which such Persons shall come, before such Persons shall be permitted to land at such Port or Place; and We do hereby, by and with the Advice aforesaid, strictly enjoin, require, and command all and singular Justices of the Peace, Mayors, Sheriffs, Bailiffs, Constables, and all other Our Officers and Subjects, to use their utmost Endeavours for the due Execution of these Our Commands.

Given at Our Court at St. James's, the Fifteenth Day of March One thousand seven hundred and ninety-nine, in the Thirty-ninth Year of Our Reign.

BRIDPORT.

My Lord, *Ethalion at Sea, March 6, 1799.*

I Have the Pleasure to inform your Lordship, that this Day His Majesty's Ship under my Command captured the Indefatigable Privateer Ship of Nants, of Eighteen Guns and One Hundred and Twenty Men, after a Chace of Ten Hours; she is quite new, coppered, victualled for Four Months, and had been out but one Day. I purpose seeing her safe in, and taking that Opportunity of getting rid of the Prisoners. Yesterday Evening we fell in with the Naiad, when she captured another Privateer of Nants, of Eighteen Guns, which is the

only Success we have had since the Anson parted Company; but we have had very severe Weather.

Extract of a Letter from Admiral Sir Hyde Parker, Knt. Commander in Chief of His Majesty's Ships and Vessels at Jamaica, to Evan Nepean, Esq; dated the 10th February, 1799.

I Enclose a List of the Armed Vessels taken or destroyed, with the Number of Merchant Vessels taken or destroyed, by His Majesty's Ships and Vessels under my Command since the last Report; and I have the Pleasure to state, for their Lordships' Information, that from the Activity of the Cruizers, few Privateers are at Sea.

A List of Ships and Vessels captured or destroyed by the Squadron under my Command, between the 4th June, 1798, and 10th February, 1799.

By the Queen—The Spanish Armed Schooner L'Amiable Marfeilles, of Four Guns and Forty Men, taken.

By the Queen and Lark—A French Schooner Privateer, Name unknown, of Four Guns and Thirty Men, cut out of Port Nleu.

By the Acasta—The French Brig Privateer Active, of Eight Guns and Thirty-six Men, the Spanish Armed Schooner Cincinnatus, of Two Guns and Thirty-three Men, taken—a French Schooner Privateer, Name unknown, of Six Guns and Sixty Men, burnt.

By the Trent and Acasta—The Spanish Armed Ship Penada, of Fourteen Guns and Forty Men, taken.

By the Renommée—The French Sloop Privateer Le Triomphant, of Six Guns and Fifty-six Men, taken.

By the Renommée and Squirrel—The Spanish Armed Brig Neptune, of Four Guns and Twenty-three Men, taken.

By the Magicienne—The Spanish Armed Schooner Julie, of Four Guns and Twelve Men, taken.

By the Surprise—The French Schooner Privateer Laurette, of Six Guns and Forty-six Men, taken.

Copy of a Letter from Vice-Admiral Harvey, Commander in Chief of His Majesty's Ships and Vessels at the Leeward Islands, to Evan Nepean, Esq; dated at Martinique, the 6th February, 1799.

SIR,

I Have to acquaint you, for the Information of their Lordships, that Captain Westbeeck, in His Majesty's Sloop Favorite, on the 8th December last captured a Genoese Ship from Rio de Plate bound to the Havannah, laden with Jerked Beef, Tallow, and Hides, and carried her into Tobago; and that on the 20th Ultimo, Captain Warren, of the Scourge, captured a Spanish Brig from Cadiz bound to La Guira, laden with Wine, Brandy, and Merchandize, which he carried into Trinidad.

Extract of a Letter from the Earl of St. Vincent, K.B. Commander in Chief of His Majesty's Ships and Vessels in the Mediterranean, to Evan Nepean, Esq. Dated at Gibraltar, the 26th of February, 1799.

I Enclose Letters from Captain Bowen, of His Majesty's Ship Argo, and Captain Sanders, of His Majesty's Sloop L'Espoir, giving an Account of the Capture of the Santa Teresa Spanish Frigate, and Africa Xebeque; also a Letter from Captain Markham, of His Majesty's Ship Centaur, relating the Events of his Cruise on the Coast of Catalonia.

SIR, *Argo, off Port Mahon, Feb. 8, 1799.*

I Have great Pleasure in acquainting you, that in carrying your Orders into Execution, in Company with the Leviathan, on the 6th Instant, at Four P. M. drawing round the East End of Majorca under Storm Stay Sails, with a violent Gale Westerly, I discovered Two large Spanish Frigates at Anchor, near a fortified Tower on the South Point of the Bahía de Alcudé, who, immediately on seeing us, cut their Cables, and made Sail to the N. N. E. We instantly gave Chace with all the Canvases the Ships could bear; unfortunately the Leviathan's Main-top Sail gave way, which caused her to drop a-stern; the Enemy seeing this took the Advantage of it, and after the Close of Day spoke each other and separated; one hauling her Wind to the Northward, and the other set Top-gallant Sails and kept away before it; which latter I followed. The Darkeness of the Night precluded the Leviathan from seeing their Manœuvre, as also my Signal to her to alter her Course to Port; however the Leviathan kept Sight of the Argo, and was near up with us at Midnight, when I got alongside of the Enemy, who still persevered in his Endeavours to get off, (although his small Sails were either shot or carried away in the Chace,) and did not surrender until he had received our whole Broadside, which wounded Two Men, and did much Mischief to his Rigging. She proved to be the Santa Teresa, commanded by Don Pablo Perez, mounting in all Forty-two Guns, be-

fides Swizels and Cohorns, and manned with Two Hundred and Eighty Seamen and Marines, besides Two Hundred and Fifty Soldiers; in all Five Hundred and Thirty Persons on board.

My First Lieutenant Mr. Thomas Lyne has much Merit in keeping Sight and observing the different Shifts of the Enemy, by which great Advantage was gained by the Argo during the Chace; much Commendation is due to his professional Skill and great Exertions after taking Possession of the Prize, in saving her tottering Mast from tumbling overboard, which he could not have done had not Captain Buchanan sent him speedy Assistance of Officers and Men from the Leviathan, to whom I feel myself much indebted.

Great Praise is due to all my Officers and Seamen for their Vigilance and Exertions in shortening and making Sail in Squalls during the Chace, and had the Enemy given them an Opportunity of shewing further Proofs of their Zeal and Loyalty, I am convinced they would have behaved as British Seamen always do upon these Occasions.

P. S. The Santa Teresa is just out of Dock, rebuilt, new coppered, and is in every Respect almost as good as a new Ship; she was completely stored and victualled for Four Months, and is esteemed One of the fastest sailing Frigates out of Spain, of large Dimensions, upwards of Nine Hundred and Fifty Tons, and fit for immediate Service. Her Comfort, the Prosperpine, that made her Escape, is of the same Force but not so large.

Extract of a Letter from Captain Guthbert of His Majesty's Ship Majestic, to the Earl of St. Vincent, dated at Sea, the 23d February, 1799.

I Have the Honor of enclosing a Letter to your Lordship, received from Captain Sanders, Commander of His Majesty's Brig L'Espoir, giving an Account of his having engaged and captured the Africa, a Spanish Xebec, mounting Fourteen Guns, long Four-Pounders, and Four Brass Four-Pound Swivels, in the Service of the King of Spain, and commanded by Joseph Subjado.

Having been an Eye-Witness to the Action, it's not in the Power of my Pen sufficiently to extol the meritorious Conduct of Captain Sanders and his Ship's Company on the Occasion.

SIR, *L'Espoir at Sea, Feb. 22, 1799.*

AT a Quarter past Noon, Town of Marbello bearing N. N. W. Three Leagues, a Brig and Two Xebecs in the S. E. Quarter, appearing suspicious, I hoisted my Colours to them, when the Brig and One of the Xebecs hoisted Spanish, upon which a Moorish Brig in Tow was cast off, and L'Espoir hauled to the Wind in Chace; it was soon perceived they were armed Vessels, but not being so fortunate as to weather them, we exchanged Broadfides with both in passing: L'Espoir being tacked, soon brought the Xebec to close Action, which continued for an Hour and a Half, when a favourable Opportunity of boarding her was embraced, and after a sharp Contest of about Twenty Minutes she surrendered, and proved to be the Africa, commanded by Joseph Subjado, in the Service of the

King of Spain, mounting Fourteen Long Four-Pounders, and Four Brass Four-Pound Swivels, having on board Seventy-five Seamen and Thirty-eight Soldiers from Algofamus, bound to Malaga. Lieutenant Richardson (in whom I have much Confidence) all the Officers and Seamen of His Majesty's Sloop I have the Honor to command, behaved with the same Courage they have done on former Occasions. During the Action the Brig (which, I have since learned, mounted Eighteen Guns) stood in Shore and anchored.

SIR, *Centaur, at Sea, 16th February, 1799.*

I Have the Honor to inform you, that in Obedience to your Orders I proceeded to Sallo Bay in His Majesty's Ship under my Command, after the Spanish Frigates, and having been joined by the Cormorant alone, of the Squadron under Captain Bowen, I at length, after beating against heavy Gales of Wind from the 28th January till the 9th February, reached Sallo Bay, in which I found Twenty-one Swedish and Danish Merchantmen, but no Men of War had been in Sight of Sallo since the 2d of February. Having looked into Fangel Bay and Tarragona, also where Lord McKerr, in the Cormorant, took a Tartan, and drove another on Shore, I proceeded towards Majorca, and at Daylight the Cormorant took a Settee laden with Oil, and I chased Two large Xebecs and a Settee, all Privateers in the Royal Spanish Service; One of which, La Vierge de Rosario, I captured at Two o'Clock, mounting Fourteen Brass Twelve-Pounders and Ninety Men, the other Two escaped by the Wind shifting at Dark when within Shot. The same Night the Aurora joined and proceeded for Tarragona, in consequence of Intelligence I received of Two Spanish Frigates being bound there with Swiss Troops from Palma. On the 15th I fell in with the Argo and Leviathan, and the next Morning stood in for Sallo Bay. Finding the Frigates were not in the Neighbourhood, I attacked the Town of Cambrelles, and the Spaniards having quitted their Guns on a Tower, sent the Boats in under Lieut. Grossett of the Centaur, who, after dismounting the Guns, burnt and captured as per Margin^a; La Velon Maria was taken in the Offing, from Aguilas bound to Barcelona.—The Prosperpine Frigate, Confort to the Santa Teresa, taken by the

Corfu, March 3, 1799.

This Day the French Garrison surrendered by Capitulation to the United Forces of the Russians and Turks. The Leander, and the Brune Frigate, were taken in the Port.

Dublin-Castle, 25th March, 1799.

THIS Day his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant went in State to the House of Peers, and being seated on the Throne with the usual Solemnity, Thomas Lindlay, Esq; Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, was sent with a Message from his Excellency to the House of Commons, signifying his Pleasure that they should immediately attend his Excellency in the House of Peers. The Commons being come thither accordingly, his Excellency gave the Royal Assent to

An Act for granting, for One Year, the several Duties therein mentioned in Lieu of all other Duties payable upon the Articles therein specified during the said Term, and for regulating the Trade between this Kingdom and His Majesty's Colonies, and for other Purposes therein mentioned.

An Act for securing the Payment of the Annuities and of the Interest upon the principal Sums therein provided for, and towards the Discharge of such principal Sums in such Manner as therein is directed, and for enabling the Officers of His Majesty's Treasury to receive certain Sums for a limited Time in Manner therein mentioned, and for granting unto His Majesty a certain Sum of Money out of the Consolidated Fund, and for applying a certain Sum of Money therein mentioned for the Service of the Year One thousand seven hundred and ninety-nine, and for other Purposes.

An Act for granting to His Majesty, his Heirs and Successors, several Duties therein mentioned, to be levied by the Commissioners for managing the Stamp Duties.

An Act for granting to His Majesty, for One Year, the Duties therein mentioned on Fire-Hearths,

in Lieu of all Duties payable on the same during the said Term.

An Act for granting to His Majesty, his Heirs and Successors, certain Duties and Rates upon the Portage and Conveyance of all Letters and Packets within this Kingdom.

An Act for defraying the Charge of the Pay and Cloathing of the Militia for One Year from the Twenty-fifth Day of March One thousand seven hundred and ninety-nine.

An Act for regulating the Payment of Bounties on the Exportation of certain Manufactures of this Kingdom.

An Act for further continuing an Act, intituled "An Act for facilitating the Trade and Intercourse between this Kingdom and the United States of America."

An Act for punishing Mutiny and Desertion, and for the better Payment of the Army and their Quarters within this Kingdom.

An Act for the Suppression of the Rebellion which still unhappily exists within this Kingdom, and for the Protection of the Persons and Properties of His Majesty's faithful Subjects within the same.

An Act for indemnifying such Persons as have acted since the Sixth Day of October, One thousand seven hundred and ninety-eight, for the Preservation of the Public Peace and Suppression of Insurrections prevailing in several Parts of this Kingdom.

An Act for continuing an Act, passed in the Thirty-third Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act for establishing Regulations respecting Aliens arriving in this Kingdom, or resident therein, in certain Cafes, and Subjects of this Kingdom, who have served or are serving in Foreign Armies," and for continuing another act passed in the Thirty-sixth Year of His present Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act to prevent the Importation of Arms, Gunpowder, and Ammunition into this Kingdom, and making and removing, selling and keeping of Gunpowder, Arms, and Ammunition without Licence;" and also for continuing several Statutes therein recited, for more effectually suppressing Insurrections, and preventing the Disturbance of the Public Peace.
