Extract of a Letter from the Earl of St. Vincent, K.B. Commander in Chief of His Majefly's Ships and Veffels in the Mediterranean, to Evan Nepean, Efq. Dated at Gibraltar, the 26th of February, 1799.

Enclose Letters from Captain Bowen, of His Majefty's Ship Argo, and Captain Bowen, of Fis ma-jefty's Ship Argo, and Captain Sanders, of His Majefty's Sloop L'Efpoir, giving an Account of the Capture of the Santa Terefa Spanish Frigate, and Africa Xebeque; also a Letter from Captain Markham, of His Majefty's Ship Centaur, relating the Events of his Cruize on the Coalt of Catalonia.

SIR, Argo, off Port Mahon, Feb. 8, 1799. Have great Pleafure in acquainting you, that in I flave great i feature in acquainting you, that in a carrying your Orders into Execution, in Company with the Leviathan, on the 6th Inftant, at Four P. M. drawing round the East End of Majorca under Storm Stay Sails, with a violent Gale Welterly, I difcovered Two large Spanish Frigates at Anchor, near a fortified Tower on the South Point of the Bahia de Alcudé, who, immediately on feeing us, cut their Cables, and made Sail to the N. N. E. We inftantly gave Chace with all the Canvafs the Ships could bear; unfortunately the Leviathan's Main-top Sail gave way, which caufed her to drop a-ftern; the Enemy feeing this took the Advantage of it, and after the Close of Day spoke each other and separated; one hauling her Wind to the Northward, and the other fet Top-gallant Sails and kept away before it ; which latter I followed. The Darknels of the Night precluded the Leviathan from feeing their Manœuvre, as also my Signal to her to alter her Courfe to Port; however the Leviathan kept Sight of the Argo, and was near up with us at Midnight, when I got alongfide of the Enemy, who ftill perfevered in his Endeavours to get off, (although his fmall Sails were either fhot or carried away in the Chace,) and did not furrender until he had received our whole Broadfide, which wounded Two Men, and did much Mifchief to his Rigging. She proved to be the Santa Terefa, commanded by Don Pablo Perez, mounting in all Forty-two Guns, be-
