PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council, TAT HEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the Twenty-fourth Day of October last, prohibiting the Exportation out of this Kingdom of any Sort of Rock Salt, will expire upon the Twenty-ninth Day of this instant April; And whereas it is judged expedient that the said Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer; His Majesty doth therefore, with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no Person or Persons whatsoever do, at any Time, during the Space of Six Months, to commence from the said Twenty-ninth Day of this instant April, export, or attempt to export, transport, carry or convey, or load or lay on hoard of any Ship, Vessel, or Boat, in order to be exported, transported, carried, or conveyed out of any Port or Place in Great Britain, any Sort of Rock Salt whatsoever, without Leave or Permission being first had and obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incur-

ring the Forfeitures inflicted by an Act passed in the Thirty-sixth Year of His present Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act for indemnifying all Persons intituled, "An Act for indemnifying all Persons "who have been concerned in advising or carrying "into Execution an Order of His Majesty in "Council respecting the Exportation of Rock "Salt, for preventing Suits in consequence of the "fame, for authorising His Majesty to prohibit the "Exportation or carrying Coastwise of Rock Salt, and for making further Provisions relative therem to:" His Majesty, nevertheless, by the Advice aforesaid, hath thought fit to order, that nothing herein contained shall prevent Rock Salt being carherein contained shall prevent Rock Salt being carried Coastwife, under the usual Rules, Regulations, and Restrictions, nor the Exportation of the same to Ireland, or to any other of His Majesty's Dominions, under the usual Conditions and Regulations, and upon Security being given by the Exporter, and Two other Persons, (of whom the Master of the Veffel shall be one,) by Bond, in such Penalty as shall be directed by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, that the faid Rock Salt shall be exported to some Port or Place in His Majesty's Dominions, and none other, and that a Certificate shall be produced, within Six Months from the Date of the Bond, if such Rock Salt shall be entered out for any Part of His Majesty's Dominions in Europe; and within Twelve Months, if for any Part of His Majesty's Dominions in America or the West Indies; and within Eighteen Months, if for any of the British Settlementsor Factories in Asia or Africa, under the Hand of the Principal Officer of the Customs at the Port or Place where fuch Rock Salt shall be fo landed; and if there shall be no Officer of the Customs, then under the Hand of the Chief Magistrate of the Place, testifying that the said Rock Salt has been duly landed at the Port or Place for which the fame was entered out.—And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

Extract of a Letter from Admiral Kingfmill, Com-mander in Chief of His Majefly's Ships and Veffels on the Coast of Ireland, to Evan Nepean, Efq; dated at Cork, the 22d April, 1799.

SIR,

PLease to lay before my Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty the inclosed Letter received from Captain Moore, of His Majesty's Ship Melampus, just returned from her Cruife, giving Account of a French Privateer of Twenty Guns, faid to be Le Nantois, which he was in chace of, having overfet, and that unfortunately none of her Crew could be faved.

SIR, Melampus, at Sea, April 19, 1799.

Have the Honor to inform you, that Yesterday

Morning in Latitude to Day 17. Morning in Latitude 50 Deg. 23 Min. North, Longitude 15 Deg. 20 Min. West, we chased a Ship, which, on our firing at her, hoisted French Colours. The Wind blowing exceedingly hard at N. W. with a very high Sea, she got before the Wind when within Half Gun Shot of her, and fetting all possible Sail, obstinately persisted in attempting to escape; after carrying away our Studding-Sail-Booms, we continued firing our Chase Guns, when she suddenly gave a broad Yaw to Windward, instantly overfet, and in the Space of Two Minutes she went down, and not an Atom of the Wreck could be seen. The greatest Exertion and the utmost Expedition was used in bringing the Melampus to the Wind as near the Spot as possible, with the View of faving these unfortunate People, but nothing remained on the Surface.

I find by the Information of the Captain and Officers of Le Papillon, which failed from Nantes about the same Time with this Ship, and who knew her both from her Appearance and the Signals she made to us, that she was Le Nantois, of Fourteen Twelve and Six Pounders, and One Hundred and Fifty Men; and I am very forry to add, that from other Circumstances there is no Room for Doubt, that the Master and Part of the Crew of the Echo, of Poole, which she had taken, were amongst the Sufferers on this melancholy Occasion.

From the latest Reports received from Field-Marshal Lieutenant Kray, it appears, that after the Battle of the 5th, near Magnan, the Enemy had abandoned on the 6th Instant, Isola della Scala and Villa Franca; had posted their Rear Guard at Roverbella; had retired upon the 7th beyond the Mineio near Govto; and having left a strong Garrifon in that Place, the Rest of the Rear Guard had directed their March towards La Volta, probably in the Defign either of reinforcing the Garrison of Peschicra, or of throwing Provisions into it.

This induced Field-Marshal Lieutenant Kray to push forward his Advanced Guard as far as Villa Franca, to cause Three Battalions and some Chasseurs to advance as far as Vallegio upon the Mincio | Hundred Men and several Officers were made Pri-

to defend the Bridge at that Place, and Four Di-

visions to support them.

We found at Isola della Scala Two Hundred wounded, the greater Part of whom were French; but some of them our own People. Amongst the former was General Pigeon, who died on the 7th of his Wounds.

On the Departure of the Courier we had already made Two Thousand Five Hundred Prisoners, of whom One Hundred and Thirty were Officers: We also took Sixteen Pieces of Cannon, and Forty Ammunition Waggons. The Loss of the Enemy is estimated at Eight Thousand Men. The Disorder was so great amongst them, that the Generals were plundered by their own Soldiers. were plundered by their own Soldiers.

Vienna, April 16, 1799.

Field-Marshal Lieutenant Kray, exclusive of the circumstantial Details which he gives of the Movements in the last Battle near Magnan, and of the Consequences which resulted from them, adds, that Major-General Klénau had penetrated as far as Governello with his Light Troops; that he had taken from the Enemy Eighteen Thousand Muskets, Sixty Oxen, a great Quantity of Brandy, and made One Hundred and Fifty Men and Two Officers Prifoners.

At the same Time Colonel Dreskovich, supported by the Inhabitants of the Po di Goro, near Ariano, feized Three Gun-Boats with Thirteen Cannon, Seventeen Thousand Nine Hundred and Thirty-two Sacks of Salt, Twenty-four Merchant Veffels with

their Cargoes, and Twenty others unladen.

Vienna, April 17, 1799.

Letters have been received from General Bellegarde, from Schludern, dated the 9th Inflant, but nothing of Moment had passed in that Quarter since the Defeat of the French at Munster and Santa Maria.

Vienna, April 18, 1799.

His Royal Highness the Archduke Charles has fent an Account here, dated the 14th Instant, of General Count Nauendorf having taken Possession of Schaf haufen, on the 13th in the Evening, after having made feveral Attacks upon the Town with Part of his Advanced Guard.

The faid General punctually obeyed the Orders of His Royal Highness in sparing the Town as much as possible, and wished also to enter into an Engagement with the Enemy not to destroy the beautiful Bridge, which is confidered a Masterpiece of Work-manship; the Enemy, however, rejected this Propofition and placed themselves in a Posture of Defence, but were driven back with Precipitation. then fet fire to the Bridge, which foon became a Prey to the Flames, and also Two Houses that were situated close to it. In all other Respects the Town remained uninjured. His Royal Highness will foon transmit the Particulars of this Affair.

By a further Account received from General Kray, dated the 8th Inflant, it appears, that General Count Klénau had taken Possession of the Post of Governolo, the only one which the Enemy was thill able to retain on the Lower Mincio; and in that, as well as in the Fortress near Ponte Molino, One soners; by which Circumstance we are entire Masters of the Tartaro and Tions.

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the British Inhabitants of Calcutta, being deeply sensible, however distantly removed from the Seat of Empire, of the numerous Blessings we enjoy under our present free and happy Constitution, feel an irresistible Impulse, at this important Crisis, when the internal Peace and Happiness of your Majesty's Kingdoms are threatened by a desperate and implacable Enemy, to offer, at the Foot of the Throne, our most ardent Professions of Attachment to your Majesty's Royal Person, the Rights of your illustrious House, and the Honor and Interests of the British Crown.

To your Majesty, as the hereditary Guardian of that Constitution which has so long continued the Admiration and the Envy of the whole civilized World, we owe the strongest Declarations of our determined Resolution to support, with our Lives and Fortunes, your Majesty's Government against the Machinations and Attacks of an ambitious and inveterate Enemy, the common Disturbers of all settled States, the Foes to all Religion, Morals, Order, and genuine Freedom; who, perverting the sacred Name of Liberty, have established the most awful System of Usurpation and Tyranny through

one of the fairest Regions of the Globe.

On the Wisdom of your Majesty's Councils, on the Patriotism and Loyalty of all Orders of your Majesty's Subjects, on the known Bravery of your Armies, on the distinguished Valour of your Majesty's Fleets, whose recent Victories have even surpassed in Splendour the former glorious Achievements of the British Navy, under Divine Providence we considently rely for the ulimate Consussion and for such continued Triumphs of the British Arms, as shall enable your Majesty to procure for your People (the evident and anxious Wish of your Heart) a lasting, safe, and honorable Peace.

To the great Disposer of Events we offer our humble Supplications, that it may please his Divine Goodness to prolong, to a very distant Period, your Majesty's invaluable Life, and that your Majesty's Posterity, following the virtuous Example of your Majesty, may continue to the remotest Ages to protect, with the British Sceptre, our free and happy Constitution.
