As several Counterfeits of Foreign Copper Coins Lave been lately illegally made, as well as Counterfeits of the Gold and Silver Coin refembling the Gold and Silver Coin refembling the Gold and Silver Coin of Foreign Princes and States; the following Abstrates of Two Alts of Parliament, for preventing such Pradices, are published for the Information of all Persons who may be ignorant of the Description of them. Penalties they incur by Difobedience of them.

By Statute 37 George III. Chap. 126.

IF any Person or Persons shall make, coin, or counterfeit any Kind of Coin, not the proper Coin of this Realm, nor permitted to be current within the fame, but resembling, or with Intent to resemble, or look like any Gold or Silver of any Foreign Prince, State, or Country, or to pass for such Foreign Coin, such Person or Persons offending therein shall be deemed and adjudged to be guilty of Felony, and may be transported for any of Years not exceeding Seven Years; and Justices may grant Warrants for fearching suspected Places for such last-mentioned Foreign Coin.

And if any Person or Persons shall bring into this Realm any fuch false or counterfeit Coin as aforefaid, refembling, or made with Intent to refemble, or look like any Gold or Silver Coin of any Foreign Prince, State, or Country, or to pass as such Foreign Coin, knowing the same to be false or counterfeit, to the Intent to utter the same within this Realm, or within any Dominions of the fame; all and every fuch Person or Persons shall be deemed and adjudged to be guilty of Felony, and may be transported for any Term of Years not exceeding

Seven Years.

And as several Counterseits of Foreign Copper Coins called Tompes and Sous Marques, current in His Majesty's Colonies in the West Indies and America, have lately been exported from England to the said Colonies; the following Abstract of an Act of Parliament, passed in the 38th Year of His Majesty, is published for the Information of all Persons who may be ignorant of the Penalties they may incur by a Disobedience to them.

By Statute 38 George III. Chap. 57.
ALL Copper Coin whatfoever, not being the legal Copper Coin of this Kingdom, and all counterfeit Gold or Silver Coin made to the Similitude or Resemblance, or intended to resemble any Gold or Silver Coin, either of this Kingdom or of any other Country which shall, under any Pretence. Name, or Description whatsoever, be exported or shipped, or laden, or put on board any Ship, Vessel, or Boat, for the Purpose of being exported from this Kingdom to the Island of Martinique, or any of His Majelty's Islands or Colonies in the West Indies or America, shall be sorfeited, and the same shall and may be seized, sued for, prosecuted, and recovered in such Courts, and by such Ways, Means, and Methods, and the Produce thereof disposed of and applied in such Manner, and to such Uses and Purposes, as any Forseiture incurred by any Law respecting the Revenue of the Customs, may now be seized, sued for, prosecuted, or recovered, disposed of, and applied either in this Kingdom or in any of His Majesty's Islands in the West Indies as the Case may happen to be, either in this Kingdom or in the West Indies; and every Person who shall so export, or shall so ship, vessel, or Boat, in order to be re-exported, or shall cause or procure to be so exported, shipped, or put on board any Ship, Vessel, or Boat, or shall have in his or her Custody, in order to be so exported, any such Coin as aforesaid, shall, for every such Ossence, forseit the Sum of TWO HUNDRED POUNDS, and double the Value of such Coin to be recovered by Bill, Suit, Action, or Information, in any of His Majesty's Courts of Record at Westminster.

#### Whitehall, May 11.

As feweral Artificers and Manufacturers, Subjects of Great Britain, have, from Time to Time, gone into Foreign Countries to exercife their feweral Callings, contrary to the Laws of these Kingdoms, the following Abstracts of Acts of Parliament of Their late Majestics King George the First and Second, and of His present Majesty, for preventing such Practices, are published, for the Information of all Persons who may be ignorant of the Penaltics they may incur by Disobedience to them: And it will be observed, that such Penalties likewise extend to those who are any ways concerned or instrumental in the Sending or Enticing Artificers or Manufacturers out of these Kingdoms, or in the Exportation of the Tools and Instruments used by them, as well as to the Artificers or Manufacturers themselves.

Statute 5 George I. Chap. 27.

IF any Person shall contract with, entice, or solicit, any Artificer in Wool, Iron, Steel, Brass, or other Metal, Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other Artificer of Great Britain, to go into Foreign Countries out of the King's Dominions, and shall be convicted thereof, upon Indictment or Information in any of the Courts at Westminster, or at the Assizes or Quarter Sessions, he shall be fined any Sum not exceeding ONE HUNDRED POUNDS for the first Offence, and shall be imprisoned Three Months, and till the Fine be paid. And if any Person having been once convicted shall offend again, he shall be fined at the Discretion of the Court, and imprisoned Twelve Months, and till the Fine be paid.

If any of the King's Subjects, being such Artificers, shall go into any Country out of His Majesty's Dominions, to exercise or teach the said Trades to Foreigners; and if any of the King's Subjects in any such Foreign Country, exercising any of the said Trades, shall not return into this Realm within Six Months after Warning given by the Ambassador, Minister or Consul of Great Britain, in the Country where such Artificers shall be, or by any Person authorised by such Ambassador, Forseiture be paid.

&c. or by one of the Secretaries of State, and from henceforth inhabit within this Realm; fuch Perfons shall be incapable of taking any Legacy, or of being an Executor or Administrator, or of taking any Lands, &c. within this Kingdom, by Descent, Devise, or Purchase, and shall forfeit all Lands, Goods, &c. within this Kingdom, to His Majesty's Use, and shall be deemed Alien, and out of His Majesty's Protection.

Upon Complaint made, upon Oath, before any Justice of Peace, that any Person is endeavour-ing to seduce any such Artisicer, or that any such Artificer hath contracted or is preparing to go out of His Majesty's Dominions, for the Purposes aforefaid, fuch Jullice may fend his Warrant to bring the Person complained of before him, or before some other Justice; and if it shall appear by the Oath of One Witness, or by Confession, that he was guilty of any of the faid Offences, such Justice may bind him to appear at the next Assizes or Quarter Seffions: And if fuch Person shall refuse to give Security, the Justice may commit him to Gaol till the next Assizes or Quarter Sessions, and until he shall be delivered by due Course of Law. And if any fuch Artificer shall be convicted, upon Indictment, of any such Promise, Contract, or Preparation to go beyond the Seas, for the Purpofe aforefaid, he shall give fuch Security to the King not to depart out of His Majesty's Dominions, as such Court shall think reasonable, and shall be imprisoned till Security

If any of the above Offences shall be committed in Scotland, the same shall be prosecuted in the Court of Justiciary or the Circuits there.

Statute 23 George II. Chap. 13.

IF any Person shall contract with, or endeavour to seduce any Artisicer in Wool, Mohair, Cotton, or Silk, or in Iron, Steel, Brass, or other Metal, or any Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other Artisicer in any other of the Manusactures of Great Britain or Ireland, to go out of this Kingdom or Ireland into any Foreign Country not within the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, and shall be convicted, upon Indictment or Information, in the King's Bench at Westminster, or by Indictment at the Affizes or General Gaol Delivery for the County, &c. wherein such Offence shall be committed in England, or by Indictment in the Court of Justiciary or any of the Circuit Courts in Scotland, or by Indictment or Information in the King's Bench at Dublin, if such Offence be committed in Ireland; the Person so convicted shall, for every Artisicer contracted with or seduced, forseit FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS, and shall suffer Imprisonment in the Common Gaol of the County or Stewartry wherein such Offender shall be convicted for Twelve Calendar Months, and until Forseiture be paid: And in case of a subsequent Offence of the same Kind, the Persons so again offending shall forseit, for every Person contracted with or seduced, ONE THOUSAND POUNDS, and shall suffer Imprisonment in the Common Gaol of the County or Stewartry wherein such Offender shall be convicted, for Two Years, and until such Forseiture be paid.

If any Person in Great Britain or Ireland shall put on board any Ship or Boat, not bound directly to fome Port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to some other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, any such Tools or Utensils as are commonly used in, or proper for the Preparing, Working up, or Finishing of the Woollen or Silk Manufactures, or any Part of such Tools, he shall, for every Orthodox fence, forfeit all fuch Tools, or Parts thereof, put on board, and TWO HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered by Action of Debt, &c. in any Court of Record at Westminster, or in the Court of Seffion in Scotland, or at any of the Four Courts in Dublin respectively, wherein no Essoin, &c. shall be allowed.

It shall be lawful for any Officer of the Customs in Great Britain, or for any Officer of the Revenue in Ireland, to feize and fecure, in some of His Ma-jesty's Warehouses, all such Tools or Utensils prohibited to be exported, as fuch Officer shall find on board any Vessel not bound directly to some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to some other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain; and all Tools fo feized shall, after Condemnation, be publicly fold to the best Bidder; and one Moiety of the Produce shall be to the Use of His Majesty, and the other Moiety to the Officer who shall seize

and fecure the same. If the Captain of any Vessel in Great Britain or Ireland knowingly permit any of the faid Tools, prohibited to be exported, to be put on board his Vessel, he shall, for every such Offence, forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered as the Penalties inflicted upon Persons exporting the Tools; and, if the Vessel belongs to His Ma-jesty, the Captain shall not only forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, but shall also forfeit his Employment, and be incapable of any Employ-

ment under His Majesty.

If any Officer of the Customs in Great Britain or of the Revenue in Ireland, take, or knowingly fuffer to be taken, any Entry outward, or fign any Cocket or Sufferance for the Shipping or Exporting of any of the said Tools, or knowingly suffer the same to be done, he shall forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered as aforefaid, and also forfeit his Office, and be incapable of any Office

under His Majesty.

One Moiety of the Forfeitures shall be applied to the Use of His Majesty, and the other Moiety to the Use of the Person who shall sue for the

Statutes 14, 21, 25, and 26 of His prefent Majesty.

BY these Statutes the like Penalties and Forfeitures as above-mentioned are extended to Persons packing or putting on board any Vessel, not bound directly for some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, any Machine, Engine, Tool, Press, Paper, Utensil, or Implement whatfover, used in or proper for the working or finishing of the Cotton, Steel, or Iron Manufactures of this Kingdom, or any Part or Parts of fuch Machines or Implements, or any Models or Plans thereof; and all Captains of Ships and other Persons receiving or being in Possession of any fuch Articles, with an Intent to export the fame to Foreign Parts, and all Custom-house Officers suffering an Entry to be made thereof, are respectively liable to the like Penalties as are above-mentioned, in the case of Tools and Utenfil, used in the Woollen and Silk Manufactures.
