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From Thursday May 20. to Bonday May 24. 1680.

HE Duke of Savoy, who is now entred into his Majority, Signed this day an Instrument by which he confirms the present Council of State, and prays the Dutchess his Mother to continue in the Direction of the Government, and to that purpose gives her the same Power she had before. There are those that still speak somewhat doubtfully of the Marriage intended between our Duke and the Insanta of Portugal, and think difficulties may yet arise that may hinder the execution of the Treaty that has been made concerning it.

Prague, May 14. The Emperor has not yet begun his Journey for Pardubits, as was intended, several Important Affairs requiring his presence here for some time longer. The Papers of Count Serini have been examined, and he is removed to the Castle of Borzelits; and the Count of Hoffkirken has been likewise secured by the Emperors Order. The Count de Zinzendorf, who had the direction of the Emperors Revenues, and of whole difgrace we have already told you, was Examined on Tuefday last by Commissioners appointed for that purpose, and it's said he will be brought to a Trial; but in the mean time things are kept very secret. We have Letters from Constantinople which say, That Monsieur de Guilleragues, the French Ambailador there, having at his Audience of the Grand-Vizier, taken exception at his not being permitted to fit where he pretended he ought to do, th: Turks were so much offended, that they very rudely thrust him out of the Room, and as it's faid, not without some blows.

Copenhagen, May 7. The Contract of Marriage between the King of Sweden and the Princels Ur rique Eleanor of Denmark is Signed, and till she parts from hence the will be every day entertained with new Divertisements, as the was the ath Instant with a running at the Ring, which was performed by 24 Knights, (each bearing the name of some Heroe) divided into two Squadrons. The first the King commanded, and the other, Prince George his Brother. There were appointed seven Judges of the Field; who were Count Allefeldt the Great Chancellor, the Sieur Bielke Great Admiral, the Sieur Corwitz Great Mareschal, Count Anthony of Olden-burg, the Sieur Wintwick Under-Chancelor, the Baron Fens Fewel President of the Colledge of Commerce, and the Baron Niels fuel Admiral General, all Knights of the Order of the Elephant, and of the Kings Council. About Noon the two Squadrons entred the Place (Captain Braun being appointed to carry the Orders, by the name of Mercury.) At the head of the Kings marched twelve Gentlemen, commanded by the Sicur Lindenam, followed by 24 led Horses, 12 Pages, and two Collonels, who went immediately before the King, whose Plume of Feathers and Ribons were incarnat and white, as were those of all the Knights of his Squadron. Next came Prince George likewise preceded by 12 Gentlemen, his led Horses and Pages, and followed by his 11 Knights, whose Colours were green and white. There were four Prizes, of which the King gainethe first, Count Guldenlieu. Viceroy of Norway the second and the fourth, and the Baron of Winterfelds the third. At night the Court was entertained with very fine Fireworks.

Straburg, May 20. The French Troops that are to compole the two flying Armies, the one in Alsace, commanded by Monsieur Monclar, and the other on the Saar, by Monsieur de Biffy, are now drawing together. Monsieur de Monciar will in a day or two take his Journey to Weissenburg and Landaw, near which latter place he has caused a Camp to be Marked out, and in the mean time he has commanded the Country people not to stir from their houses, assuring them that he will observe so strict a Discipline in the March of his Troops, as that they shall not receive any disturbance. There are advices from several parts which tell us that the French have a defign upon this City, and that we ought therefore to be upon our Guard, and which whether there be any ground for or not it's hoped our Magistrates will make the good use thereof which the present posture of Affairs requires

Francfort, May 21. Our Magistrates have now forbid the French Officers to raise any more men' within their Jurisdictions, which most people are of opinion they ought to have done sooner they having raised a great many men in these parts during all the last Winter. The Apprehensions of the de gns of France encrease every day, and we are particularly in some pain for Straburg, which it's generally believed the French have an eye upon: The Letters from thence say that the French Army would begin to March in sew days, under the command of Lieutenant General Monclar.

Coiogne, May 24. The Duke and Dutchess of Juliers continue at Aix-la Chapelle, from whence they will, some time the next week, rerurn to Duse dorp. We are now expecting to hear when his Highness will enter upon the Government of the Spanish Netberlands, which we were some time since told his Highness had accepted of, though at the sum time it was said some of his Counsellors advised him against it. The Deputies of the Circle of Westphalia are still here, about regulating the Mint, which has been long endeavouring, but hitherto without any great Success. For the rest, the Proceedings of the French in Flanders as well as in Germany is the main subject of peoples thoughts as well as discourses, and different Remarques are made upon them.

Lamburg, May 24. From Zell we have an account that Sir, Cabriel Silvius, Envoy Extraordinary from the King of England to the Dukes of Lunenburg,

was arrived there. Our Letters from Denma k fay that the King of Sweden met his Queen the 15th Instant at a place called Schottorf, where he confummated his Marriage, and the next day their Majesties went thence to Helmstadt. It is expected that Wilmar will now in few days be delivered up to the Swedes. From Warlaw they write, That an Officer had been beheaded there for raifing men for the Service of the Hungarian Rebels.

Amsterdam, May 28. The States of Holland. before their last recess, resolved to send a Deputation to this City, to dispose them to agree with the other Towns concerning the raifing the Mon.ys which has taken up so much of their time; but they deferred putting it in execution till their remeeting this day, when if they come not to a resolution in this matter, the said Deputation will The Heer Van Hemskirke, Ambassador be made. from this State to the King of Spain, begun his Journey this day, as the Heer Zitters, who goes with the same Character for England, will do about the beginning of the next week. The Spanilh Envoy at the Hague has given in to the States General a very sharp Memorial concerning the French proceedings in Flanders, which we are told the French Ambassador is much netled at, and is going to Answer by a Memorial he intends likewife to present to the States. It was reported that the Elector of Trier, had written to the French King, to acquaint him that he did submit the matters in difference between them to his Majestics Determination; But our Letters from that Electors Court assure us of the contrary. So soon as the States of Holland are separated, the Prince and Princess of Orange intend to make a turn to Breda.

Hague, May 28. The Spanish Envoy who prefented the last week a very long Memorial to the States General, concerning the proceedings of the French in Flanders, is it's faid preparing another upon the same subject; and at the same time we are told the French Ambassador will not remain idle, but that he will Answer those Memorials by others as sharp, which will appear in few days. From Germany they write of nothing but the new prefentions of the French in the Palatinate and elsewhere, and of their seizing upon those places which they pretend to be dependencies of their Conquests, Those Letters add, That the Bishop of witsburg had been summoned to quit the Title of Duke of Franconia, which the French King says belongs only to himfelf; which being lookt upon as a thing of great consequence, the Germans are no less concerned at it than the Spaniards are to have their Kings Title of Duke of Burgundy disputed. The Heer Zitters, who goes Ambassador for England, will certainly part hence some time the next week. The States of Holland having been feparated fince last Friday, they are to meet again to morrow, when it's hoped they will agree upon the method of raising the Moneys they have been to long debating about. The Prince of Orange went last Saturday for Gelderland to Hunt, and is expected back this Evening.

Paris, May 24. Orders are given for the preparing all things for the Kings Progress, which he begins the next Month.

Lime, May 17. Yesterday came in here a small Veilel from Guernsey: The Master tells us, before he came away, the Lord Hatton, Governor of that Island, arrived there.

Portsmouth, May 20. On Tuesday the Guernsey Frigate, Captain Cannon Commander, came to an Anchor at Spithead, being bound to the Westward, to Cruise.

Plimouth, May 18. This afternoon arrived here from Portsmouth the Pearle Frigate, Captain Williams Commander, who to morrow will Sail again with the Phanix to Cruise in the Soundings.

Welminster, May 21, I his day the Lord Viscount Stafford, one of the Lords, Prisoners in the Tower, was by Habeas Corpus brought to the Kings-Bench-Bar, and defired he might be Bailed in regard he had been long a Prisoner; but the Court told him they could not Bail him, and remanded him to Prison.

Philip le Mar and Frances Loveland, his Mother, where brought to their Trials epon an Indictment for conspiring against the Duke of Buckingham, to charge him with Sodomy &c. and were found Guilty.

Westminster, May 22. This day Sir Henry Titchburn, Mr. Roper, and Mr. Caryl, Prisoners in the Tower were brought to the Kings-Bench Bar upon their Writs of Habeas Corpus; and there being but a fingle Testimony against them, they were Bailed.

William Gawen and John O-Cullen were tryed as Romith Priests: the first was acquitted, the other being au Irish man, (who as he was going for Ireland by Sea, was put alhore by stress of Weather, and there Apprehended ) The Jury brought in a special Verdict, and it is left to the Law to deermine whether he be within the Statute.
