IS Royal Highness the Commander in Chief has His Majesty's particular Commands to communicate to the feveral Corps of Volunteers affembled this Morning in Hyde-Park, the great Satisfaction with which His Majefty witneffed their Regularity and Military Appearance, and the striking Manifestation of their cordial and affectionate Attachment to His Majefty. It is peculiarly pleafing to His Majefty to observe the Effects of the unwearied Diligence and Attention of the Officers, and of the Zeal and Alacrity of the Volunteers composing this truly respectable Force, which entitle them to the ftrongeft Expressions of His Majefty's Approbation, and which gratify the just Sentiments of National Pride, in the fame Proportion in which they add to the public Security.

His Majefty cannot express the Satisfaction He has received on this Occasion, without the pleafing Recollection of the Principles of Attachment to the Conflitution under which thefe Corps have been formed, and without confidering their Appearance and Conduct on this Day, as a Proof of their firm Determination to support His Majesty in transmitting it with its Bleffings unimpaired to their Pofferity.

His Royal Highness has peculiar Pleafure in making known His Majefty's gracious Sentiments on an Occasion fo acceptable to His Feelings, and he requests the respective Commanding Officers to take the earliest Opportunity of communicating them to the feveral Corps feen by His Majefty this Morning.

Extra8 of a Letter from Sir Morton Eden to Lord Grenville, dated May 18, 1799.

MY LORD,

Have the Honor of enclosing an Extraordinary Gazette published on Thursday last, containing Intelligence from the Army of Italy.

Vienna, May 16, 1799. FIELD-MARSHAL-LIEUTENANT KAIM, charged by Field-Marshal Suwarrow with the Siege of Piz-zighetone, has fent his First Lieutenant Runcle with the Particulars of the Capture of that Place on the 10th.

General Baron Sekendorff and Count Hohenzollern had previoufly furrounded the Fortrefs with a fmall Body of Troops, and with the Affiftance of the Inhabitants of the Environs had begun to construct Batteries.

On the 5th, Field-Marshal-Lieutenant Kaim received Orders to attack the Place with his Division, and to push forward the Siege vigorously. In the Night of the 5th, and during the whole Day of the 6th, they worked with fuch Difpatch to construct Batteries, that in the Night of the 6th fome Cannon were mounted.

On the 7th, before Day-break, they began to attack the Fortrefs, and to threw in fome Howitzers, the Fourth of which fet fire to a confiderable Magazine of Hay, Straw, and Wood, which continued burning all the Day.

Two Hours afterwards Field-Marshal-Lieutenant Kaim fummoned the Fortrefs to furrender. The Governor replied, that he had Orders from his Government to defend himfelf, and that he could not enter into Negotiation. The Fire was therefore continued by our brave Cannonneers with fuch Succefs, that in the Evening a fmall Powder Magazinc blew up, feveral Batteries difmounted, and even the Embralures demolished. In the Night of the 7th, and in the Morning till Nine o'Clock we con-tinued our Works in fuch a Masner that our Bat-
