THIS Day the Lords being met, a Message was sent to the Honorable House of Commons by Sir Francis Molyneux, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorised by virtue of His Majesty's Commission for declaring His Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate Attendance of this Honorable House in the House of Peers to hear the Commission read*; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly; and the Royal Assent given to

An Act for granting to His Majesty a certain Sum of Money to be raised by a Lottery.

An Act for enabling His Majesty to raise the Sum of Three Millions for the Uses and Purposes therein mentioned.

An Act for raising the Sum of Three Millions Five Hundred Thousand Pounds by Loans or Exchequer Bills, for the Service of the Year One thousand seven hundred and ninety-nine.

An Act for raising the Sum of Three Millions by Loans or Exchequer Bills, for the Service of the Year One thousand seven hundred and ninety-nine.

An Act for repealing the Duties on Salt made in Scotland, and on Salt imported from Scotland into England and Wales, and granting other Duties in lieu thereof.

An Act for the more secure Conveyance of Ship Letters, and for granting to His Majesty certain Rates of Postage thereon.

An Act to continue until the Tenth Day of November, One thousand eight hundred, and amend an Act, passed in the present Session of Parliament, for continuing an Act of the last Session of Parliament for granting to His Majesty additional Duties on Distilleries in the several Parts of the Highlands of Scotland for a limited Time, and for regulating the Duties on Distilleries in the respective Districts in Scotland, and for granting to His Majesty certain additional Duties on Spirits distilled for Consumption, and a Duty on unmalts Grain used in Distillation in Scotland.

An Act to enable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury to issue out Exchequer Bills, to a limited Amount, on the Credit of such Monies as shall arise by virtue of an Act of this Session for granting certain Duties on Income.

An Act for altering the Period of making up the Annual Account of the Duties on Stamped Vellum, Parchment, and Paper.

An Act to amend an Act, made in this present Session of Parliament, intituled, An Act to repeal the Duties imposed by an Act, made in the last Session of Parliament, for granting an Aid and Contribution for the Prosecution of the War, and to make more effectual Provision for the like Purpose by granting certain Duties upon Income in lieu of the said Duties, so far as relates to the Assessments made upon Trustees, Agents, Receivers, and Guardians.

An Act for exempting certain specific Legacies which shall be given to Bodies Corporate, or other Public Bodies, from the Payment of Duty, and also the Legacy of Books and other Articles given by the Will of the late Reverend Clayton Mordaunt Cracherode to the Trustees of the British Museum.

An Act for ascertaining the Rate of Duty to be paid for Retail Spirit Licences, and for authorising the Justices of the Peace for any County to grant Licences to sell Ale, Beer, or other Liquors, by Retail, in Cities and Places where a sufficient Number of Magistrates cannot be found qualified to grant such Licences.

An Act to repeal so much of an Act passed in the Seventh Year of the Reign of Queen Anne, and also so much of an Act, passed in the Seventeenth Year of the Reign of His late Majesty King George the Second, as puts an End to the Forfeiture of Inheritances upon Attainder of Treason after the Death of the Pretender and his Sons.

An Act to enable Matthew Boulton, Esquire, to export the Machinery necessary for erecting a Mint in the Dominions of His Imperial Majesty the Emperor of all the Russians.

An Act for reviving and making perpetual an Act, made in the Fourteenth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled, An Act to prohibit the Importation of Light Silver Coin of this Realm from Foreign Countries into Great Britain or Ire-

land, and to restrain the Tender thereof beyond a certain Sum.

An Act for further continuing, until the First Day of February One thousand eight hundred and three, an Act, made in the Twenty-seventh Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled, An Act to enable the Lord High Treasurer, or Commissioners of the Treasury for the Time being, to let to farm the Duties granted by an Act, made in the Twenty-fifth Year of His present Majesty's Reign, on Horses let to hire for travelling Post, and by Time, to such Persons as should be willing to contract for the same.

An Act to permit Goods, the Produce of any Foreign Colony in America, imported directly from thence in any Ship or Vessel belonging to the Subjects of any Country or Place in Amity with His Majesty, to be entered and landed without Payment of the Duty granted by an Act of the last Session of Parliament for the better Protection of the Trade of this Kingdom.

An Act to ascertain the Salary of the Master and Worker of His Majesty's Mint.

An Act for defraying the Charge of the Pay and Cloathing of the Militia, in that Part of Great Britain called England, for One Year, from the Twenty-fifth Day of March, One thousand seven hundred and ninety-nine.

An Act to allow the Importation of Spanish Wool in Ships belonging to Countries in Amity with His Majesty.

An Act for the more effectual Suppression of Societies established for Seditious and Treasonable Purposes, and for better preventing Treasonable and Seditious Practices.

An Act for better regulating the Manner of carrying Slaves in British Vessels from the Coast of Africa.

An Act to prevent unlawful Combinations of Workmen.

An Act to continue and amend so much of an Act, made in the Thirty-third Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, as permits Sir William Bishop, George Bishop, and Argles Bishop, to carry on the Manufacture of Maidstone Geneva.

An Act for transferring, to the Commissioners for auditing the Public Accounts, the Duties now performed in the Offices of the Auditors of the Land Revenue; and for directing the Mode of attesting the Accounts of the Paymaster-General of His Majesty's Forces.

An Act to enable the Lords Commissioners of the Treasury to contract with the most Noble Charles Duke of Richmond, for the absolute Purchase of the Property of the said Duke, and all others interested in a certain Duty of Twelve Pence per Chaldron on Coals shipped in the River Tyne to be consumed in England, and to grant a Compensation for the same by way of Annuity, payable out of the Consolidated Fund.

An Act for erecting the County of Edinburgh into a separate District for the Purpose of regulating the Importation and Exportation of Corn.

An Act to encourage the Trade into the Levant Seas by providing a more convenient Mode of performing Quarantine, and for reducing the Duty granted by an Act of the last Session, on Goods, the Manufacture of Great Britain, exported to any Place within the Streights of Gibraltar.

An Act to continue several Laws relating to the further Support and Encouragement of the Fisheries carried on in the Greenland Seas and Davis's Streights, until the Twenty-fifth Day of December, One thousand eight hundred; and to the discontinuing the Duties payable on the Importation of Tallow, Hog's-Lard, and Grease, until the Twenty-fifth Day of March, One thousand eight hundred and six.

An Act to revive and continue, until the End of the next Session of Parliament, an Act, made in the Thirty-fifth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, to continue and amend an Act, made in the Twenty-sixth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled An Act for the more effectual Encouragement of the British Fisheries; and to amend an Act, made in the Twenty-sixth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, for extending the Fisheries, and improving the Sea Coast of this Kingdom.

An Act to revive and continue, until the First Day of January, One thousand eight hundred and one, the Bounties granted by an Act, made in the Twenty-sixth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, for encouraging the Fisheries carried on at Newfoundland and Parts adjacent, from Great Britain, Ireland, and the British Dominions in Europe.

An Act for enabling His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation and permit the Importation of Corn, and for allowing the Importation of other Articles of Provision without Payment of Duty, to continue in Force until Six Weeks from the Commencement of the next Session of Parliament.

An Act for regulating the Manner in which the United Company of Merchants of England trading to the East Indies shall hire and take up Ships for their regular Service.

An Act to explain and amend an Act, passed in the Thirty-sixth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled, An Act for amending and reducing into One Act of Parliament, Two several Acts, passed in the Thirty-fourth and Thirty-fifth Years of the Reign of His present Majesty, for the better ordering the Militia of the City of London, and for the further regulating the Trained Bands or Militia of the said City.

An Act for making Allowances in certain Cases to Subaltern Officers of the Militia in Time of Peace.

An Act to amend an Act, made in the Twenty-ninth Year of the Reign of King George the Second, intituled, An Act to enable His Majesty to grant Commissions to a certain Number of Foreign Protestants, who have served Abroad as Officers or Engineers, to act and rank as Officers or Engineers in America only, under certain Restrictions and Qualifications.

An Act to amend Two Acts, passed in the Twenty-sixth and Thirty-seventh Years of the Reign of His present Majesty, so far as the same relate to the Militia of the Counties of Middlesex and Surrey, and for applying certain Monies remaining in the Hands of the Clerks to the Deputy-Lieutenants of the County of Middlesex, and other Persons, towards the completing of the said Militia.

An Act to protect Masters against Embezzlements by their Clerks or Servants.

An Act for rendering more commodious, and for better regulating the Port of London.

An Act for enabling the Grimsby Haven Company to finish and complete the Navigation of the said Haven, and for amending an Act, passed in the Thirty-sixth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, for widening, deepening, enlarging, altering, and improving the Haven of the Town and Port of Great Grimsby, in the County of Lincoln.

An Act for empowering the Company of Proprietors of the Forth and Clyde Navigation to repay into the Court of Exchequer in Scotland, the Sum advanced to them for the Purpose of completing the said Navigation, for repealing so much of an Act of the Twenty-fourth Year of His present Majesty as relates to the said Company, and for enabling the Barons of the said Court of Exchequer to advance Part of the Sum so to be received to the Company of Proprietors of the Crinan Canal, on certain Conditions.

An Act for settling the Right of Patronage or Presentation of or to the New Chapel of Cradley, in that Part of the Parish of Halefowen which lies in the County and Diocese of Worcester; and for other Purposes.

An Act for making and maintaining a Tunnel or Road under the River Thames from or near to the Town of Gravesend, in the County of Kent, to or near to Tilbury Fort, in the County of Essex.

An Act for making a New Street from the Haymarket into Charles Street, Saint James's Square, within the City and Liberty of Westminster.

An Act for amending, widening, altering, and keeping in Repair the Road leading from Cheadle through Alveton, to the Uttoxeter and Ashborne Turnpike Road, at or near Quickshill Bank, and also the Road leading from the Stone and Uttoxeter Turnpike Road at Bear's Brook, through Hollington to the said Uttoxeter and Ashborne Turnpike Road, at or near the Churnet Bridge at Rocester in the County of Stafford, to continue in Force for Twenty-one Years, and from thence to the End of the then next Session of Parliament.

An Act to continue for Twenty-one Years, and from thence to the End of the then next Session of Parliament, the Term and Powers of an Act, passed in the Seventeenth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled, An Act for amending, widening, and keeping in Repair the Road leading from the Turnpike Road in the Parish of Asthall, in the County of Oxford, to the Turnpike Road at or near Buckland, in the County of Berks.

An Act for continuing for Twenty-one Years, and from thence to the End of the then next Session of Parliament, the Term, and enlarging the Powers of Three Acts passed in the Fourth and Twenty-fourth Years of the Reign of His late Majesty King George the Second, and in the Seventeenth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, for repairing the Roads leading from the most Southern Part of Butt Lane in the Parish of Lawton, in the County Palatine of Chester, to Lawton, and from thence to Henhall's Smithy upon Cranage Green, in the said County.

An Act for continuing for Twenty-one Years, and from thence to the End of the then next Session of Parliament, the Term, and altering the Powers of an Act, made in the Seventeenth Year of His present Majesty, for repairing the Road from the Town of Skipton to the Turnpike Road from Leeds

to Ripon, near Okbeck, in the Township of Bitton with Harrogate, and from thence to the Road leading from Knaresborough to Wetherby, in the West Riding of the County of York.

An Act for enabling William Stephen Poynts, Esquire, and the Honorable Elizabeth Mary his Wife, to charge the Estates, late of the Right Honorable George Samuel Lord Viscount Montague, deceased, in the County of Sussex, with a competent Sum of Money for improving the same, and for other Purposes.

An Act for confirming and rendering effectual a Partition and Division between the late Honorable Penn Asheton Curzon, deceased, and the Right Honorable Thomas Lord Libbleddale, (then Thomas Lister, Esquire,) of the Rectory of Whalley, and of the Chapels, Glebe Lands, Messuages, Tenements, Tythes, Obventions, Profits, and Hereditaments thereto belonging, now held under a Lease from the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, and for that Purpose to enable the said Lord Archbishop and his Successors, at all Times hereafter to grant the said Rectory and Premises by Two several Leases according to the said Partition and Division.

An Act for vesting a Piece of Ground and Hereditaments in the Parish of Saint Mary Woolnoth, in the City of London, belonging to the Parish of Saint Mary-le-Bow, in Abraham Roberts, William Curtis, Ellis Were, and Charles Hornyold, of the said City of London, Bankers and Copartners, in Fee Simple, upon Payment of the Sum of One Thousand Three Hundred and Fifty Pounds upon Trust, to be applied in the Manner therein mentioned for the Support of a Lecturer, and for better regulating the Appointment of the said Lecturer.

And Twelve Private Acts.

Westminster, July 12, 1799.

THIS Day His Majesty came to the House of Peers, and being in His Royal Robes, seated on the Throne with the usual Solemnity, Sir Francis Molyneux, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, was sent with a Message from His Majesty to the House of Commons, commanding their Attendance in the House of Peers. The Commons being come thither accordingly, His Majesty was pleased to give the Royal Assent to

An Act for granting to His Majesty a certain Sum of Money out of the Consolidated Fund, for applying certain Sums of Money therein-mentioned for the Service of the Year One Thousand seven hundred and ninety-nine; and for further appropriating the Supplies granted in this Session of Parliament.

An Act for granting to His Majesty certain Stamp Duties on Bills of Exchange and Promissory Notes for small Sums of Money.

An Act for the Augmentation of the Salaries of the Judges of the Courts in Westminster-Hall, and also of the Lords of Session, Lords Commissioners of Justiciary, and Barons of Exchequer in Scotland; and for enabling His Majesty to grant Annuities to Persons to certain Offices in the said Courts of Westminster-Hall, on the Resignation of their respective Offices.

An Act to amend and render more effectual several Acts for the Redemption and Purchase of the Land-Tax.

An Act for the Reduction of the Militia Forces at the Time and in the Manner therein limited, for enabling His Majesty more effectually to increase his Regular Forces for the vigorous Prosecution of the War, and for amending the Laws relating to the Militia.

An Act to amend an Act, made in the Eighteenth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, for erecting a Building for holding the Courts, and exercising the Jurisdiction of the Dean and Chapter of the Collegiate Church of St. Peter in Westminster, and for holding the Quarter Sessions of the Peace, and transacting the other Public Business of the said City and Liberty.

An Act to permit until the First Day of August, One thousand eight hundred and two, the Importation of certain Naval Stores from Hamburg and other Ports of Germany.

An Act for the better recruiting of the Forces of the East India Company.

An Act for enabling His Majesty to incorporate, by Charter, a Company to be called The Globe Insurance Company for Insurance on Lives, and against Loss or Damage by Fire, and for other Purposes therein mentioned.

An Act to enable His Majesty, by Order in Council, to permit, until Six Weeks after the Commencement of the then next Session of Parliament, such Goods as shall be specified in such Order, to be imported into this Kingdom in Neutral Ships.

An Act to enable such Persons as His Majesty may be pleased to appoint to the Office of Chief Justice, or One of the Justices of either Bench, or of Chief Baron, or One of the Barons of the Exchequer, to take upon themselves the Degree of a Sergeant at Law in Vacation.

And One Private Act.

After which His Majesty was pleased to make the following most gracious Speech;

My Lords and Gentlemen,

THE favourable Appearances which I announced to you, at the Commencement of the present Session, have since been followed by Successes beyond My most sanguine Expectations.

By the Progress of the Imperial Arms, under the Command of the Archduke Charles of Austria, a great Part of Switzerland has already recovered its ancient Religion, Laws, and Liberties; and the uninterrupted and brilliant Victories of the Combined Armies, under the Command of Field-Marshal Suwaroff, have, in the short Period which has elapsed since the Opening of the Campaign, nearly accomplished the Deliverance of Italy from the degrading Yoke of the French Republic.

The Decision and Energy which distinguish the Councils of My Ally the Emperor of Russia, and the intimate Union and Concert happily established between Us, will enable Me to employ, to the greatest Advantage, the powerful Means which you have entrusted to Me, for establishing, on permanent Grounds, the Security and Honour of this Country, and the Liberty and Independence of Europe.

I have the Satisfaction of seeing, that internal Tranquillity is in some Degree restored in My Kingdom of Ireland.

The Removal of the only remaining Naval Force of the Enemy to a distant Quarter must nearly extinguish even the precarious Hope which the Trai-

torious and Disaffected have entertained of Foreign Assistance.

But Our great Reliance for the immediate Safety of that Country must still rest on the experienced Zeal and Bravery of My Troops of all Descriptions, and on the unshaken Loyalty and voluntary Exertions of My faithful Subjects in both Kingdoms.

Its ultimate Security can alone be ensured by its intimate and entire Union with Great Britain; and I am happy to observe that the Sentiments manifested by numerous and respectable Descriptions of My Irish Subjects justify the Hope, that the Accomplishment of this great and salutary Work will be proved to be as much the joint Wish, as it unquestionably is the common Interest, of both My Kingdoms.

The Provisions which you have made for suppressing those dangerous and seditious Societies, which had been formed for the Purpose of disseminating the destructive Principles of the French Revolution, are peculiarly adapted to the Circumstances of the Times, and have furnished additional Security to the established Constitution.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons,

The unusual Sacrifices which you have made in the present Moment, on Behalf of My Subjects, are wisely calculated to meet effectually the Exigencies of this great Crisis. They have, at the same Time, given additional Security to Public Credit, by establishing a System of Finance, beneficial alike to yourselves and to Posterity; and the Cheerfulness with which these heavy Burthens are supported evince at once the good Sense, the Loyalty, and the Public Spirit of My People.

My Lords and Gentlemen,

It is impossible to compare the Events of the present Year with the State and Prospects of Europe at the Distance of but a few Months, without acknowledging, in humble Thankfulness, the visible Interposition of Divine Providence, in averting those Dangers which so long threatened the Overthrow of all the Establishments of the civilized World.

It may be permitted to Us to hope, that the same protecting Providence will continue to Us its Guidance through the Remainder of this eventful Contest; and will conduct it finally to such an Issue as shall transmit to future Ages a memorable Example of the Instability of all Power founded on Injustice, Usurpation, and Impiety; and shall prove the Impossibility of ultimately dissolving the Connection between Public Prosperity and Public Virtue.

Then the Lord Chancellor, by His Majesty's Command, said;

IT is His Majesty's Royal Will and Pleasure, That this Parliament be prorogued to Tuesday the Twenty-seventh Day of August next, to be then held; and this Parliament is accordingly prorogued to Tuesday the Twenty-seventh Day of August next.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS it has been represented to His Majesty at this Board, that the Price of Copper has very greatly increased within the last

Twelve Months, and is now exceedingly high ; and that there is a great Want thereof for the Use of His Majesty's Navy, as well as for the Merchant Shipping and Manufactures of this Kingdom : His Majesty, taking the same into Consideration, doth therefore, with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no Person or Persons whatsoever do at any Time for the Space of Six Months, to commence from the Date of this His Majesty's Order, presume to export out of this Kingdom to any Parts beyond the Seas, any Sheet Copper, or Copper in Bolt-Staves, Bars, Sheets, Rings, and Nails, or Copper in such a State as may be easily converted into or made useful as a Naval Store, or ship or lade any of the Articles abovementioned, on board any Ship or Vessel, in order to exporting the same beyond the Seas, without Leave or Permission being first had and obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring the Forfeitures inflicted by an Act passed in the Thirty-third Year of His Majesty's Reign, Cap. 2 ; and also by an Act passed in the Thirty-fourth Year of His Majesty's Reign, Cap. 34 ; any Thing contained in His Majesty's Order in Council of the 26th Day of June last to the contrary notwithstanding : and the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.
