Extract of a Letter from Captain Griffiths, Commander of His Majesty's Ship Diamond, to Evan Nepean, Esq; dated at Spithead, the 12th Instant.

ON the 29th Ultimo the Revolutionaire captured L'Hipolite French Letter of Marque, from Cayenne, bound to Nantes, and in Latitude 46 Deg. N. and Longitude 24 Deg. W. we recaptured the Brig Margaret, from Greenock bound to Savannah, who had been taken but a few Hours before by the Determiné French Ship Privateer then in Sight; and which, after a Chace of Fourteen Hours, was captured by the Revolutionaire. I have brought her to Spithead: she is a very compleat Vessel, sails uncommonly fast, and is well calculated for His Majesty's Service: she is pierced for Twenty-four Guns, mounts Eighteen Brads Twelve and Nine-Pounders, and had One Hundred and Sixty-three Men on board when taken.

rather bald, about Five Feet Four Inches high, about Fifty Years of Age, of a middling Stature, and has lost Part of the Fore Finger of one of his Hands.

Roger Toms—A very dark Complexion, long Face, short curled Black Hair, rather Bald, about Five Feet Five or Six Inches high, Forty-five Years of Age, middling Stature, and has a Rupture.
