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Madrid, May 16.

WE have of late been entertained with various reports, of the march of several French Troops towards the Frontiers of *Biscaye* and *Navarre*, many Expresses have passed to and fro, on occasions thereof, and several extraordinary meetings of the Councils of State and War have been held, to provide for the worst; though many are of opinion, the design of the French King, in these marchings of his Troops, is rather to awe his own Subjects, than to molest his neighbors. On the Eleventh Instant, the Marquis *de la Laguna* (Brother to the Duke *de Medina Celi*) parted from hence for *Cadiz*, to embark on the Fleet for *New Spain*, being made *Viceroy* of *Mexico*. The last Account we had from *Langwier*, was, That the Moors had been bravely repulsed in an Attack they made upon *Henrietta's Fort*, which was defended only by 30 Men, Commanded by a Lieutenant; That the Moors however continued their Trenches, which were so deep, that a Horseman could ride in them undiscovered; that by means of these Trenches, the communication between *Charles* and *Henrietta's* Forts, and the Town were cut off; but these Forts being well provided with all things necessary for their Defence, they did not fear what the Moors could do, as long as their Provisions lasted, of which they had for five or six months.

Copenhagen, May 28. The 16th Instant, at Ten a clock at night, the King of *Sweden* was married to the Princess *Eleanor*, at a place called *Schutterup*, where they continued till the Eighteenth, and then went thence to *Helmstadt*, from whence they parted again the 22 for *Stockholme*, the King taking his journey by the way of *Gothenburg*, and the Queen, and the Queen Mother, theirs by *Fenckopping*. Our King begins his journey for *Holstein* presently after the Holy days.

Hamburg, May 31. The Duke of *Zell's* Troops remaining as yet possessed of *Boxboede*, the Swedes press extremely to have that place likewise restored to them, but they are answered, that the Duke of *Zell* will not part with it, till the Moneys he is yet to receive, by virtue of the late Treaty of Peace, be paid him. Sir *Gabriel Sylvius*, the King of *Englands* Envoye at that Court, had had Audience of the Duke, and several Conferences with his Ministers, while at the same time, the French Minister there, was not idle, but endeavouring to render Sir *Gabriel's* Negotiation ineffectual. From *Berlin* we have an account, that the Elector of *Brandenburg* had been there, and was gone again to his House at *Potsdam*.

Francfort, May 28. A short time will now let us see, what the designs of the French are, who by

the preparations they have made, and the Troops they are now drawing together in *Alsace*, do very much alarm the neighboring Princes. Some have said, that *Strasburg* would be attacked, but that City seems not to have any such apprehensions, or at least think, they are in a condition to defend themselves, and are perhaps, for that reason, the less concerned at the motions of the French.

Strasburg, May 27. The French Troops are now marching towards *Landau*, the place of their Rendezvous; the last night, the Regents of *Conde* and *Rouffillon* came to a small place called *Eckelsheim*, a German mile from hence, and the next day early, continued their march towards *Ingenheim*. The Royal Chamber at *Brisac*, has summoned all the Bailiwicks of the Lower *Alsace*, and even several places belonging to this City, to appear by their Deputies within three weeks, before the said Chamber, there to acknowledge the French King to be the Sovereign Lord of all *Alsace*. The new Walls of *Schlestadt* are finished, as the Out-works, which they have now in hand, will be very suddenly. They are likewise working with great diligence, on the Fortifications of *Brisac* and *Hunningen*. Count *Mansfeldt*, the Emperors Envoye to France, continues very ill at *Aszburg*, which place he chole to make his Quarantine in.

Cologne, May 28. Several Expresses have of late passed between the Duke of *Neuburg* and his Son the Duke of *Fuliers*, and people suppose the occasion of them to be, the King of *Spains* offering the latter the Government of the *Spanish-Netherlands*, concerning which, and the terms upon which it is offered, it's not doubted, but the young Duke is desirous to consult his Father. It is certain that the Prince of *Birckenfeldt* has put himself and his Countreys, under the protection of the French King, to avoid the trouble and vexation, he was otherwise like to receive from the Chamber of *Metz*; which example, it's feared, others will follow, though the Prince Palatine of *Veldentz*, who is in the same ill circumstances, has hitherto refused to do it, and has presented a Memorial to the Dyet at *Ratisbonne*, wherein he acquaints them, That two different Sentences have been given against him by the Chamber at *Metz*; and that at *Brisac*, by which he is commanded not to acknowledge for the future any other Sovereign, than the French King, or any other Tribunal, than the Parliament of *Metz*; and desires the advice of the said Dyet, how to govern himself in a matter of this importance, both to himself and them, seeing he is required to change his Sovereign, and that they will loose one of their Members.

Amsterdam, June 4. The States of *Holland*, after many Conferences and Debates, came finally to a resolution on Friday last, to raise the 200 penny upon Real Estates, to be paid in Two years, viz. one half before the First of *July*, of this present year, and

and the other before the First of *March* of the year following, with an allowance of Six *per Cent.* to those that shall pay their Moneys before the time: and if the Sum that shall be thus raised, do not suffice, then another 200th penny, is to be raised upon Personal Estates. In the *Texel* are arrived Five Merchant Ships from *Spain*, and bring advice, that the Spanish *New Spain* Fleet, intended to sail from *Cadix* on the 20th of the last month. Our Letters from *Cologne* tell us, that the proceedings of the Chamber, established at *Metz*, did put several Princes of the Empire into very great perplexity, they being summoned to prove their Titles to Lands, which they had been possessed of, they and their Ancestors, time out of mind.

Hague, June 4. The States-General having written to the States of the several Provinces, concerning the arrears of Subsidies, due to the Elector of *Brandenburg*; the States of *Zealand*, whose proportion comes to 54600 Crowns, have thought fit to offer half of that sum by way of Composition, which his Electoral Highness being informed of, he is much dissatisfied thereat, and has written a complaining Letter to the States-General, on occasion thereof. The States of this Province have at last agreed upon the method of raising the Moneys, they have thought necessary for the defraying the charges of the present year, and have Adjourned themselves till the middle of the next month. And in the mean time, the Prince and Princess of *Orange*, are gone to pass some time in *Gelderland*. From *Germany* we have advice, that the French are forming a Body of 30000 Men, between *Wormes* and *Hunningen*, and that it's suspected, they have a design upon the Fortress of *Philipsburg*, which, as well as the Baillage of *Udenheim*, they pretend are dependences of *Croon-Weissenburg*. The same Letters add, that they had summoned the Duke of *Deuxponts*, to appear before the Royal Chamber at *Metz*, to prove his Title to the Castle of *Lichtenberg*, though it had belonged to his Family, without any interruption, above Three hundred years.

Brussels, May 31. We expect our Spanish Letters every moment; till they arrive, we can say nothing of his Excellencies journey to *Flanders*, it much depending upon the Orders his Excellency receives, concerning his leaving this Government, which some have reported, that the Duke of *Fuliers* declines, but what ground they have for it, we cannot learn. The Marquis de *Bourgomanoero*, our Kings late Envoye in *England* (where Don *Pedro de Ronquillo*, his successor, is arrived) goes not till the next week for the *Hague*. The French are at present pretty quiet in these parts, and people, who are apt to believe what they desire, persuade themselves they will continue so; and that the French Kings journey, which he begins about the middle of the next moneth, is only to visit his Conquests. But our Letters from *Germany* make ample relations of the apprehensions they have of the designs of the French on that side, as well as of the vexation they put many Princes of the Empire to; by summoning them, not only to do homage to their King, for the Territories they hold, depending, as they say, on the Three Bishopricks of *Metz*, *Toul*, and *Verdun*, but likewise to make out, by authentick proofs, their Title and Right to those Territories, in which, most of those Princes, who have, no prospect of being protected by the Empire in case they should stand

it out, are like to submit to the Decrees of the Chambers of *Metz* and *Brisac*, how unreasonable soever they think them, and some of them have already actually submitted, and particularly, the Prince of *Birkenfeldt*. The Duke of *Aerschor* is come back from *Amwerp*, having in the name of our Governor, assisted at the Creation of the new Magistrates there, but not been able to obtain the Subsidy his Excellency demanded; those Magistrates protesting, their disability to comply therewith, by reason of the great decay of Trade, there being at present in that City, above 1200 Houses that stand empty.

Brussels, June 3. The four Spanish men of War that lately arrived at *Ostend* with Soldiers, will, it's believed, continue there, till the Duke de *Viba Eremosa* leaves this Government, being designed to transport his Excellencies Family and Baggage to *Spain*. We are told, that the English and Dutch Ministers at the French Court, are endeavouring to induce that King, to depart from the Declaration that has been made by his Commissioners at *Courtray*, concerning the Title of Duke of *Burgundy*; or at least, to allow the Spaniards a longer time, than till the 15th of the next month, to consider of it; and in the mean time, that the Conferences there may be continued.

Paris, June 2. We are told, that the King has declared his resolution, to begin his Progress the 13th Instant, which he will take towards *Flandre*, to visit his Conquests; in doing of which, it's said, he will pass two or three months. We have advice that our Gallies are at Sea in two Squadrons, Eighteen Commanded by the Duke de *Fruonne*, and Twelve, with which, Six men of War are joyned, under the Command of the Duke de *Navailles*. Our King does absolutely insist, to have the King of *Spain* quit the Title of Duke of *Burgundy*, which if he do not by the 15th of the next month, the Conferences at *Courtray* will be quite broke up, and the French Commissioners will return hither.
