*Malta, May 8.*

**O**N the 29th past, dyed the Great Master of the Order of *Malta*, and the Second Instant, the Knights Assembled, and Elected Don *Gregorio Carrassa*, Prior of *la Rocella*, in the Kingdom of *Naples*, and Brother to the Cardinal of that Name, to succeed him in that Dignity.

*Turin, May 22.* Though the Duke of *Savoy* be out of his Minority, being 14 years old, yet the management of affairs remains in the same hands it was in before, and the Duchess his Mother, continues in effect, Regent, nothing being done without her approbation; and all publick Orders and Warrants, are Signed first by the Duke, and then by her. On Thursday last the Abbot *Moret* parted from hence for *Mantoua*, where he is to take the place of the *Sieur Gaumont*, the French Minister, who has desired leave to return home, being, as is said, much troubled; that his Negotiation at that Court, concerning *Cardi*, has had no better success.

*Venice, May 25.* On Tuesday last, Signior *Morofini* returned hither from *Constantinople*, where he was Ambassador of this State, in which employment the Senate has made choice of Signior *Gio Bapt. Donata*, to succeed him.

*Strasbourg, June 4.* The French Officers have among others, obliged several Towns belonging to this City, to swear Allegiance to their King. They have lately possessed themselves of the Castle of *Magdeburg*, and we doubt not, but they will do the like to the Castle of *Falkenburg*. The Baron de *Monclar*, the French Kings Lieutenant-General in these parts, is at *Landau*, where the French Troops begin to draw together.

*Cologne, June 7.* These parts have been within these few days alarmed with a Report, that a French Army will come into the Countrey of *Fuliers*, and there take its Quarters for the rest of this Summer. There is likewise a Report, that 7 or 800 French are got into the City of *Wormes*, but that they do not give the Inhabitants any disturbance, buying with ready Money, what they have occasion for; which needs a confirmation.

*Brussels, June 8.* The French King continues to insist on the Demand made by his Commissioners at *Courtray*, concerning the Title of Duke of *Burgundy*, as appears by his Answer to the English and Dutch Ministers at his Court, who have laboured very earnestly in this matter, but as it seems, unsuccessfully. Many people fear, it may have great consequences, and be an occasion of new differences between the two Crowns. We are told, that there has been lately found among the Papers of State here, an Original Treaty between the Emperor *Charles the V.* and *Francis the I.* by an Article of which, it is expressly stipulated, that the Emperor and his Successors for ever, shall bear the Title of Duke of

*Burgundy.* In the mean time we are told, that the French Troops are marching towards the *Maeße*, which perhaps has given rise to the report of their being designed for the assistance of the Elector of *Cologne*, in the recovering of *Hasselt* and *Maseyck*.

*Brussels, June 11.* On Saturday last, the Marquis de *Bourgamano*, parted from hence for *Holland*, from whence he will be back here in few days, having received fresh Orders, to hasten his journey to the Emperors Court. The account which the said Marquis gave his Excellency, at his arrival here from *England*, of His Majesties Resolutions for the preserving the Peace of Christendom, and particularly that of these Countreys, has been very fully confirmed, by the Letters his Excellency received the last Post, from Don *Pedro de Ronquillo*, now in *England*, which gives this Court great satisfaction, at a time, that the consideration of the state of things here, and the late proceedings of the French, make them very uneasy. His Excellency is resolved to go for *Flanders* towards the end of this week, or the beginning of the next, by the way of *Antwerp*, to see whether his Presence will have any effect, to dispose that City to consent to the Subsidy so often demanded. The Princess Dowager of *Ligne* is arrived here from *Spain*, and parts again to-morrow for *Paris*, to settle her affairs at that Court; the French being very troublesome to the Lands assigned her for her Dowry.

*Amsterdam, June 11.* There is at present some difference between the Province of *Holland*, and that of *Zealand*, occasioned by the latters having laid a new Imposition upon Goods brought thither from hence, which they did in return of the like, which was done by this Province; but in *Zealand* there is a greater misunderstanding, between the Cities of *Middleburg* and *Fushing*, which is gone so far, as that the Posts and Messengers have <sup>been</sup> kept on both sides; and they of *Fushing* have <sup>been</sup> kept the Vessel that goes from *Middleburg* to *Flap*, these differences will be <sup>imposed</sup> by the interposition of the <sup>age</sup> Colonel *Manfell* is lately come over <sup>in Eng</sup> land, and is lodged with Sir *W*.

*Hague, June 11.* It is reported, that the Ambassador here, has said, that affairs of these Countreys, that something very considerable will be put all people into a great <sup>to</sup> a fear, that the French <sup>to</sup> *Cologne*, to recover *Maseyck*, <sup>Passes</sup> their Troops, which are now <sup>Marching</sup> marching towards the *Meuse*, are designed for that service. The States-General, upon the last Memorial of the *Cologne* Minister upon this Subject (which was seconded by another from the Emperors Resident) resolved, that they would be content, for the avoiding all extremities, to submit the matters in difference between them and the Elector, to an Arbitrage, which the Elector seems not willing to agree

to, till the States have first withdrawn their Garrisons out of those places. But as for the French, at the same time, that they think it reasonable, that *Mafeyck*, and *Hasselt* should be evacuated by the Troops of this State, they remain in possession of *Dinant*, and several other Towns, belonging to the Bishoprick of *Liege*, without any intention, that as yet appears, of quitting them. The Marquis de *Bourgamaneiro*, late Envoy Extraordinary from the King of *Spain*, in *England*, arrived here last night, and intends to goe and wait upon the Prince of *Orange* at *Dieren* in *Gelderland*, to consult with his Highness, concerning the present state of Affairs. The States of *Holland* have published a Placet, for the raising the 200th Penny upon Land and Houses, which are to be exempted from any other Tax, for the space of Two years, unless it be upon some very pressing occasion. This evening Mr. *Sidney* went hence to the *Briel*, in order to his embarking there, on one of the Kings Yachts for *England*. From *Germany* we have advice, that the Deputy of the Dukes of *Lunenburg* at *Ratisbonne*, had presented a Memorial to the Dyer, demanding satisfaction for the expences they had been at, and the damages they had sustained during the late War.

*Deal, June 2.* This morning passed by, about 60 Dutch Merchant Ships, under the Convoy of several men of War, bound for the *Streights*. The weather has been of late very stormy, and the Wind variable.

*Deal, June 4.* Yesterday the Ships that were in the *Downs*, outward bound, failed, but the Wind coming about, they were forced to return.

*Edenburg, May 29.* This being His Majesties Birthday, Fifty old Men, all in new Blew Gowns (to each of which was given Fifty shillings) went from the Abby to the Great Church, to assist at the publick Devotions: which being ended (our Dean having Preached) the Trained-Bands of the City drew up about the Cross, which was adorned with Orange, and Lemon Trees, variety of Flowers, &c, whither came the Lord Provost, Bayliffs, and Council, in their Formalities, and having drank their Majesties, and their Royal Highnesses Health, distributed the Oranges and Lemons, with variety of Sweetmeats among the People; the Cross running at the same time with Claret, at Eight several Conduits, and the Great Guns from the Castle being several times discharged, amidst the Volleys of the Trained-Bands, and the acclamations of the People; the night concluding with Bonfires, Ringing of Bells. &c

*Windsor, June 2.* His Majesty has been Graciously pleased, in consideration of the Great and Eminent Services of the Earl of *Rothes*, Lord Chancellor of *Scotland*, to confer upon him the Honors and Dignities of a Duke and Marquis, &c. of that Kingdom, by the Title of Duke of *Rothes*, and Marquis of *Bambreich*, Earl of *Leslie*, Viscount of *Lugtown*, Lord *Acmutie* and *Casbery*.

*Windsor, June 4.* This evening arrived here, an Officer from *Tangier*, from whence he came on the 25th of *April* last, and hath given His Majesty an account of the condition he left that place and Garrison in, which was such, as that they had not any apprehensions of the Moors, who had not attempted anything, since their repulse on *Easter-day* at *Henrietta Fort*, but continued to work in their Trenches, which in several places they covered with Boards, to shelter themselves, as is believed, from the heat of the Sun. The Troops desigued for *Tangier* are hastening away, the Foot being most of them already ship'd in the River; as the Horse will be in few days at *Portsmouth*.
