Maltha, May 8.

N the 29th paft, dy'd the Great Mafter of the Order of Maltha, and the Second Inflant, the Knights Affembled, and Elected Don Gregorio Caraffa, Prior of la Rocella, in the Kingdom of Naples, and Brother to the Cardinal of that Name, to fucceed him in that Dignity.

Turin, May 22. Though the Duke of Saudy be out of his Minority, being 14 years old, yet the management of affairs remains in the fame hands it was in before, and the Duchefs his Mother, continues in effect, Regent, nothing being done without her approbation; and all publick Orders and Warrants, are Signed first by the Duke, and then by her. On Thuriday last the Abbot Moret parted from hence for Mantoua, where he is to take the place of the Sieur Gaamont, the French Minister, who has defired leave to return home, being, as is faid, much troubled, that his Negotiation at that Court, concerning Cardi, has had no better fucces.

Venice, May 25. On Tuefday laft, Signior Morofini returned hither from Conftantinople, where he was Ambalfador of this State, in which employment the Senate has made choice of Signior Gio Bapt. Donata, to fucceed him.

Strasburg, Fune 4. The French Officers have among others, obliged feveral Towns belonging to this City, to fwear Allegiance to their King. They have lately poffelled themsfelves of the Caftle of *Magdeburg*, and we doubt not, but they will do the like to the Caftle of *Falkenburg*. The Baron de Monclar, the French Kings Lieutenant-General in these parts, is at Landam, where the French Troops begin to draw together.

Cologne, fune 7. These parts have been within these few days allarmed with a Report, that a French Army will come into the Countrey of *fuliers*, and there take its Quarters for the rest of this Summer. There is likewise a Report, that 7 or 800 French are got into the City of Wormes, but that they doe not give the Inhabitants any disturbance, buying with ready Money, what they have occasion for; which needs a confirmation.

Bruffels, June 8. The French King continues to infift on the Demand made by his Commiffioners at 'Courtray, concerning the Title of Duke of Eurgundy, as appears by his Anfwer to the Englifh and Dutch Miniflers at his Court, who have laboured very earneftly in this matter, but as it feems, unfuccesfully. Many people fear, it may have great confequences, and be an occation of new differences between the two Crowns. We are told, that there has been lately found among the Papers of State here, an 'Original Treaty between the Emperor Charles the V. and France the I. by an Article of which, it is express for ever, fhall bear the Title of Duke of Burgundy. In the mean time we are told, that the French Troops are marching towards the Maele, which perhaps has given rife to the report of their being defigned for the affiltance of the Elector of Cologne, in the recovering of Haffelt and Maleyck.

Bruffels, Fune 11. On Saturday laft, the Marquis de Bourgamanero, parted from hence for Holland, from whence he will be back here in few days, having received fresh Orders, to hasten his journey to the Emperors Court. The account which the faid Marquis gave his Excellency, at his arrival here from England, of His Majefties Refolutions for the preferving the Peace of Chriftendom, and particularly that of these Countreys, has been very fully confirmed, by the Letters his Excellency received the last Post, from Don Pedro de Ronquillo, now in England, which gives this Court great fatisfaction, at a time, that the confideration of the flate of things here, and the late proceedings of the French, make them very unealy. His Excellency is refolved to go for Flanders towards the end of this week, or the beginning of the next, by the way of Antwerp, to fee whether his Prefence will have any effect, to dife pole that City to confent to the Sublidy fo often demanded. The Princess Dowager of Ligne is arris ved here from Spain, and parts again to morrow for Paris, to fettle her affairs at that Court; the French being very troublefome to the Lands affigned her for her Dowry.

Amsterdam, Fune 11, There is at present some difference between the Province of Holland, and that of Zealand, occafioned by the latters having laid a new Imposition upon Goods brought thither from hence, which they did in return of the like, which was done by this Province; but in Zealand there is a greater milunderstanding, between the Cities of Middleburg and Flufbing, which is one fo far, as that the Pofts and Meflengers have the pofts on both hit the Veffel fides; and they of Flushing hav. that goes from Middleburg to Fla ped, these differences will be by the interpolition of the Prismpoled, Age. The States-General, upon the laft Memorial of the Calogne Minister upon this Subject (which was feconded by another from the Emperors Refident)refolved, that they would be content, for the avoiding all extremities, to fubmit the matters in difference between them and the Elector, to an Arbitrage, which the Elector feems not willing to agree to, till the States have first withdrawn their Garrifons out of those places. But as for the French at the fame time, that they think it reafonable, that Mafeyck and Haffelt thould be evacuated by the Troops of this State, they remain in possession of Dinant, and several other Towns, belonging to the Bishoprick of Liege, without any intention, that as yet appears, of quitting them. The Marquis de Bourgamanero, late Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Spain, in England, arrived here laft night, and intends to goe and wait upon the Prince of Orange at Dieren in Gelderland, to confult with his Highness, concerning the prefent flate of affairs. The States of Holland have published a Placaet, for the raising the 200th Penny upon Land and Houfes, which are to be exempted from any other Tax, for the space of Two years, unlefs it be upon fome very prefling occafion. This evening Mr. Sidney went hence to the Briel, in order to his embarking there, on one of the Kings Yachts for England. From Germany we have advice, that the Deputy of the Dukes of Lunenburg at Ratisbonne, had presented a Memorial to the Dyet, demanding fatisfaction for the expences they had been at, and the damages they had fullained during the late War.

Deal, June 2. This morning passed by, about 60 Dutch Merchant Ships, under the Convoy of feveral men of War, bound for the Streights. The weather has been of late very formy, and the Wind variable.

Deal, June 4. Yesterday the Ships that were in the Downs, outward bound, failed, but the Wind coming about, they were forced to return.

Edenburg, May 29.
