Parts we had only Twelve Feet Six Inches. On our approaching Medenblic at Noon, I made the On Signals for the Dart and Gun Brigs to weigh and join me; and at Three P. M. I anchored with the Squadron off Enkhaufen, and a Boat came off with Four Men wearing Orange Cockades; in confe-quence of which I went on Shore attended by the Captains; —we were received by all the Inhabitants with every Teftimony of Joy at their Deliverance from their former tyrannical Government, and in the highest Degree expressive of their Loyalty and Attachment to the Houfe of Orange.

I proceeded to the Stadthoufe, and having fummoned all the old and faithful Burgomatters, who had not taken the Oath to the Batavian Republic, I inftantly reinftated them, until His Highnels the Hereditary Prince of Orange's Instructions were received; to whom, and to His Royal Highnefs the Duke of York, I immediately fent an Express, and at the fame Moment fummoned before me and diffolved the Municipality, amidft the joyful Ac-clamations of the Inhabitants around the Stadthouse, Part of them at the fame Time cutting down the Tree of Liberty, which they inftantly burned; all of which was done in the most loyal, quiet, and regular Manner.

I have detached Capt. Boorder, in the Espeigle, with the Speedwell, to four the Coaft from Steveren to Lemmer; but previous to his going on that Service I fent him to Steveren, to bring me Intelligence of the Disposition of the Inhabitants : Intelligence of the Dipolition of the Inhabitants: he returned Yesterday Morning with the pleafing Information of their having hoilted the Orange Co-lours, and most of the neighbouring Towns had done the fame, and the Inhabitants joyfully com plying with the fame Terms as Enkhauleu and Medenblic; I have likewife detached the Dart, with Two Gun-Brigs, to cut off the Communication with Amsterdam and the Towns in East Friezland. with Amsterdam and the Towns in East Friezland, that have not returned to their Allegiance.

Our Appearance in the Zuyder Zee with fuch an unexpected Force has had a most wonderful and happy Effect, and given the greatest Confidence to thole well difpoled to the Houle of Orange. I shall not lofe a Moment's Time in moving for-

ward, when the Wind and Tide will permit, to complete, as far as lays in my Power, what is finally intrufted to my Charge.

SIR, Triton, at Sea, September 13, 1799. THIS Morning a Lugger came out of L'Orient, which, on coming near endeavoured to ef-cape, but I got up with and captured her; fhe is called Le St. Jacques, mounts Six Four-Pounders, and Sixteen Men, bound to Rochefort with a Cargo of Shells confilting of Six Hundred and Sixte-two of Shells, confifting of Six Hundred and Sixty-two of Thirteen Inches, with other Things. She belongs to the Republic, is new, and in good Condition.

DISPATCH, of which the following is a А Copy, has been received from Lieutenant-Colonel Ramfay by the Right Honorable Lord Grenville, His Majeily's Principal Secretary of State for the Foreign Department.

MY LORD. Zurich, September 8, 1799. Have the Honor to inform your Lordship, that L the Enemy made an Attack this Morning, with about Three Thoufand Men, on the Polt of Waldifhoff, in Front of Zurich, occupied by about Six Hundred Men of the Ruflian Battalion of Effen.

The Enemy, by advancing rapidly, and availing themfelves of the Darkness of the Night, contrived to fall rather unawares on a small advanced Piquet, and some Prisoners fell into his Hands at the Commencement of the Affair : terminated, however, in a Manner which, if it were possible, would add to the diftinguished Reputation of the Ruffian Troops, and the Enemy were driven back to their Camp in great Diforder by the Battalion of Effen, who, without Hefitation, notwithstanding the disproportioned Superiority of the Enemy's Force, immediately advanced upon them and charged them with their Bayonets.

The Ruffians loft about Thirty Men killed and wounded; that of the French has not been afcertained, but there is Reafon to fuppofe, from the Number of Dead left upon the Field, and other Circumstances, that it was more confiderable. I have the Honor to be, &c.
