French King, in case the Dauphin be chosen King of the Romans; but whether th y be Authentick, or whether they come from some private Hand, who has a mind to publish his politick Conceits, we can not tell. The Conditions as they fland in the faul Paper, are: That the most Christian King and the Dauphin will make good the Imperial Capitulations, That the Dauphin will bear a due Restest to the Emperor That Burgandy, Lorrain, the Lower and Opper-Al-face, the Bishopricks of Metz, I oul, and Verdun, with other Lands and Places, shall be restored to the Em-pire 3 and the City of Friburg to the Emperor; That 60000 Men fra. l be maintained in Hungary, to be employed dyainif the Turks, without any charge to the Empive, which shall only maintain a Body of 16000 Men. That all places that shall be taken in Hongaty, shall be put into the Hands of the Emperor; That a considerable Fleet shall be employed against the Turks, near the Dardanellos; That Two Universities shall be established in Germany for the several Religions; and Lastly, That the French Kiag will renounce all pretensions to the Lands poffeffed by Charles the Great.

Strasburg, June 7.
