> Lieutenant-General Thomas Trigge and ΒY Vice Admiral the Right Honorable Lord Hugh Seymour, Commanders in Chief of His Britannic Majesty's Land and Sea Forces employed at the Windward and Leeward Iflands:

A Squadron of His Britannic Majefty's Ships being arrived upon the Coaft of Surinam with a very confiderable Military Force, we feize the firft Moment to offer Terms fo evidently for the Advantage of the Colony placed under your Com-mand, that we truft they will immediately be fubfcribed to; and particularly as the fimilar Mark of our Sovereign's gracious Disposition has been pro-ductive of every possible Happinels and Advantage

to vour late Sifter Colony of Demerara. We have fent Captain William Cayley, Senior Captain of the Squadron, and Lieutenant-Colonel the Baron de Rottenberg, commanding a Battalion on this Expedition, with thefe Terms for your Confideration, and shall wait Twenty-four Hours for your Decifion on this Subject. Should the Offer made on our Part in the Name of His Britannic Majefty not be accepted, you must yourfelf be anfwerable for the Effusion of Blood and the Lofs of Property which may be the Confequence of Terms not being attended to in Time, which are formed for the general Welfare of the Colony over which you are placed, as well as the Comfort and Happiness of its Individuals.

ARTICLES of CAPITULATION agreed upon between Lieutenant General Thomas Trigge and Vice-Admiral the Right Honorable Lord Hugh Seymour, Commanders in Chief of His Britannic Majefly's Land and Sea Forces employed at the Windward and Leeward Charibbee Iflands, and Jurian François Friderici, Governor General of the Colony of Surinam and its Dependencies, Major-General of Infantry, and Com-mander in Chief by Sea and Land in the faid Colony;

According to which the faid Colony and its De-pendencies shall be put under the immediate Protection of His Britannic Majesty, in Conformity to

the Summons which has been fent by the faid Commanders in Chief, dated on board His Majefty's Ship the Prince of Wales, off Bram's Point, the 16th August 1799, and the Additional Articles proposed by the faid Governor-General, and agreed to by the faid Commanders in Chief the 19th August 1799.

Art. I. The Colony of Surinam with its Dependencies shall immediately be placed under the Pro-tection of His Britannic Majesty, and shall quietly and peaceably submit to His Government.

Art. II. The Inhabitants of the Colony shall enjoy full Security to their Perfons and the free Exercile of their Religion, with the immediate and entire Possession of their private Property whether on Shore or Afloat, fuch only being excepted as may appear to belong to the Subjects of the King of Spain or to thole of the French Republic; the ancient Laws and Ufages which have hitherto been obferved in the Colony refpecting Property continuing in Force.

Art. III. All Ships of War, Artillery, Provisions and Stores in the Public Magazines and Warehoufes, . as well as the Effects of every Description belonging to the Public shall be given up to His Britannic Majelly in the State they now are, regular Lifts being immediately taken by Officers appointed for this Purpofe by each of the Contracting Parties.

Art. IV. All the Debts of the Colony which may Imposts of the faid Colony, or by its Revenues.

Art. V. No Change what foever shall take place in the Laws of the Colony, without it fhall hereafter appear for the mutual Advantage, and meet with the Concurrence of the Parties interested on that fulject.

Art. VI. In cafe the Colony of Surinam remains in the Poffeffion of His Britannic Majefty at the Conclusion of a General Peace, it shall enjoy every Right and every commercial Privilege enjoyed by the British Colonies in the Welt Indies.

Art. VII. The Troops now in the Colony of Surinam, as well as the Officers belonging to the different Corps ferving under its prefent Govern-ment, may, if they with it, enter into His Britannic. Majefty's Service, on the fame Footing in refpect to Appointments and Pay as the Reft of his Army, provided they take the Oath of Allegiance and Fi-delity to His Majelly, and engage to ferve him where. their Services may be required. Seamen will likewife he admitted into His Britannic Majefty's Service, and will be fure to receive every poffible Encouragement.

Art. VIII. The Perfons employed in the Civil Administration of the Colony who shall be recommended for their good Conduct, may, on requelting it, continue in their prefent Offices while their Behaviour is proper, and that it accords with the Oath of Fidelicy and Allegiance to His Britannic Ma-jefty, which they will be required to take. But the Command of the Troops muft be placed in the Hands of the British Officer who shall be named by His Majefly, or by the Commander in Chief of his Troops employed in the Weft Indies.
