HIS Majesty having been pleased to appoint Richard Maister, Esquire, to be Captain-General and Governor in Chief of the Island of Tobago and its Dependencies, in America, he this Day took the Oaths appointed to be taken by the Governors of His Majesty's Plantations.

AT the Court at *St. James's*, the 16th of October 1799,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS His Majesty was graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Twenty-sixth Day of December, One thousand seven hundred and ninety-two, to promise and declare, that the Bounties of Five Pounds for every Able Seaman, and Two Pounds Ten Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, fit for His Majesty's Service, should be paid in the Manner thereby directed to every such Able and Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should, on or before the Twenty-eighth Day of February then following, enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majesty's Ships or Vessels, or Officers employed on Shore for raising Men for the Service of the Royal Navy: And whereas His Majesty was also graciously pleased, by his said Proclamation, to declare, that all Able-bodied Landmen, not above the Age of Thirty-five nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should so enter themselves as aforesaid, should receive the Sum of Thirty Shillings each Man, as His Majesty's Royal Bounty: And whereas His Majesty was also graciously

pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Sixteenth Day of the said Month of February, One thousand seven hundred and ninety-three, to promise and declare, that a Reward of Twenty Shillings for every Able and Ordinary Seaman, fit to serve on board His Majesty's Ships, should be paid to any Person who should discover any Seaman or Seamen who might conceal him or themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's Service, on or before the Thirtieth Day of April then next, by any of His Majesty's Sea Officers appointed to raise Men on Shore, or by the Captains or Commanders of any of His Majesty's Ships or Vessels in the Ports or on the Coasts of this Kingdom: And whereas the Time limited by the said Proclamations for Payment of the said Bounties and Reward hath been prolonged and extended to the Thirty-first Day of this instant October; and it being judged expedient for His Majesty's Service that the said Bounties and Reward should be continued to be paid for some Time longer; His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, that the Time limited for Payment of the said Bounties and Reward be prolonged and extended from the said Thirty-first Day of this instant October to the Thirty-first Day of December next inclusive:—Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament, passed in the Twenty-sixth Year of His late Majesty's Reign, intituled "An Act to oblige Ships " more effectually to perform their Quarantine, and

" for the better preventing the Plague being brought from Foreign Parts into Great Britain or Ireland, or the Isles of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, or Man," it is among many other Things enacted, that all Ships and Vessels arriving, and all Persons, Goods, and Merchandizes whatsoever, coming or imported into any Port or Place within Great Britain, or any of the Isles before-mentioned, from any Place from whence His Majesty, his Heirs or Successors, by and with the Advice of his or their Privy Council, shall judge it probable that the Infection may be brought, shall be obliged to make their Quarantine in such Place and Places, for such Time, and in such Manner as has been, or shall from Time to Time be directed by His Majesty, his Heirs or Successors, by his or their Order or Orders made in his or their Privy Council, and notified by Proclamation, or published in the London Gazette: And that until such Ships, Vessels, Persons, Goods, and Merchandizes shall have respectively performed and be discharged from such Quarantine, no such Persons, Goods, or Merchandizes, or any of them, shall come or be brought on Shore, or go or be put on board any other Ship or Vessel, in any Place within His Majesty's Dominions, unless in such Manner, and in such Cases, and by such Licence as shall be directed or permitted by such Order or Orders made by His Majesty, his Heirs or Successors, in Council as aforesaid: And that all such Ships and Vessels, and the Persons or Goods coming or imported in, or going or being put on board the same; and all Ships Vessels, Boats, and Persons receiving any Goods or Persons out of the same, shall be subject to such Orders, Rules, and Directions concerning Quarantine, and the Prevention of Infection, as have been or shall be made by His Majesty, his Heirs and Successors, in Council, and notified by Proclamation, or published in the London Gazette as aforesaid, under such Pains and Penalties as are inflicted by the said Act: And whereas by an Act, passed in the Thirty-eighth Year of His present Majesty, intituled An Act to amend Two Acts, made in the Twenty-sixth Year of King George George the Second, and the Twenty-eighth Year of His present Majesty, respecting the Performance of Quarantine, &c. it is enacted, that the said Acts passed in the Twenty-sixth Year of His late Majesty's Reign, and the Twenty-eighth Year of His present Majesty's Reign, and all and every other Acts or Act of Parliament then in Force in any Way regarding the Performance of Quarantine, shall be extended to all such Diseases or Distempers as His Majesty, by and with the Advice of his Privy Council, shall judge to be probably infectious, and shall so declare by Order in Council, notified by Proclamation, or published in the London Gazette: And whereas Information has been received of a

malignant Disease existing in the City of Philadelphia, in the State of Pennsylvania, and in New York, within the United States of America, and that the same is probably infectious; His Majesty, by and with the Advice of his Privy Council, doth deem it expedient to declare, and by this Order doth declare, that the said malignant Disease is probably infectious, within the Intent and Meaning of the said Act of the Thirty-eighth Year of His Majesty's Reign, and doth order, and it is hereby ordered, that all Ships, Vessels, Persons, Goods, and Merchandizes now arrived, or that shall hereafter arrive in any Port of this Kingdom, or the Isles of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, or Man, from Philadelphia and New York, or any Port within the State of Pennsylvania, or any Port within the Province of New York, do make their Quarantine for Fourteen Days, which is to commence and be computed from the Day each Ship or Vessel shall come to Anchor in the Place appointed for the Performance of Quarantine, and not before.

That the Places hereinafter named shall be and are hereby appointed to be the Places wherein such Ships or Vessels (not having the Infection on board) shall respectively perform Quarantine, that is to say; all Ships or Vessels which are or shall be bound to the Port of London, or any Member, Creek, or other Parts thereof, or to the River Thames or Medway, shall perform their Quarantine in Standgate Creek; all Ships or Vessels which are or shall be bound to the Ports of Ipswich, Yarmouth, Lynn, Boston, Hull, Newcastle, or Berwick upon Tweed, or any of them, or any Member or Creek thereof, or other Place therein, shall perform their Quarantine in Whitebooth Road, between Hull and Grimsby; all Ships or Vessels which are or shall be bound to the Ports of Carlisle and Chester, or either of them, or any Member or Creek thereof, or other Place therein, or to any Part of the Isle of Man, shall perform their Quarantine in a Place called Highlake, near Liverpool, at the West End thereof; all Ships or Vessels which are or shall be bound to the Ports of Milford, Cardiff, Gloucester, Bristol, Bridgewater, or any of them, or any Member or Creek of them, or any of them, or to Padstow or St. Ives, being Members of the Port of Plymouth, or to Ilfracombe or Barnstaple, being Members of the Port of Exeter, or to any other Place within the said Ports of Milford, Cardiff, Gloucester, Bristol, or Bridgewater, or within the said Members or Creeks, shall perform their Quarantine in Kingroad and Porshute Pill; all Ships or Vessels which are or shall be bound to the Ports of Plymouth, except such Parts thereof as have been hereinbefore-mentioned, or to the Port of Exeter, except such Parts thereof as have been hereinbefore-mentioned, or to the Port of Pool, or

any of the Members or Creeks, or other Places within the said Ports of Plymouth, Exeter, and Pool, except as hereinbefore excepted; or to Falmouth, a Member of the Port of Plymouth, or any Creek thereof, or any other Place therein, shall perform their Quarantine in a Place called St. Ives Pool, within the Mouth of the Harbour of Falmouth; all Ships or Vessels which are or shall be bound to the Ports of Southampton, Chichester, Sandwich, or any of them, or any of the Members or Creeks thereof, or any of them, or any other Place within the same, shall perform their Quarantine at a Place called the Motherbank near Portsmouth; all Ships or Vessels which are or shall be bound to the Eastern Coast of Scotland, comprehending the Ports of Leith, Borrowstonefs, Alloa, Dunbar, Kirkaldy, Anstruther, Preston Pans, Dundee, Perth, Montrose, and Aberdeen, or to any Member, Creek, or other Parts thereof, shall perform their Quarantine in Inverkeithing Bay; all Ships or Vessels which are or shall be bound to the Western Ports of Scotland, comprehending the Ports of Port Glasgow, Greenock, Irvine, Campbeltown, Oban, Rothsay, Fort-William, Air, Port-Patrick, Stranraer, and Wigtown, or to Member, Creek, or other Parts thereof, shall perform their Quarantine at Lamlash in the Island of Arran; all Ships or Vessels which are or shall be bound to the Northern Ports of Scotland, comprehending the Ports of Inverness, Zetland, Orkney, Caithness, and Stornaway, or to any Member, Creek, or other Parts thereof, shall perform their Quarantine in Cromarty Bay in the Murray Firth; all Ships or Vessels which are or shall be bound to the South-West Ports of Scotland, comprehending the Ports of Dumfries and Kircudbright, or to any Member, Creek, or other Parts thereof, shall perform their Quarantine at Carlthorn, at the Mouth of the River Nith; all Ships or Vessels which are or shall be bound to the Isle of Jersey, or any Part thereof, shall perform their Quarantine at a certain Place on the Coast of the said Island, called Belle Croute, or at some Place hereinbefore appointed for Performance of Quarantine on the Coast of England; and all Ships or Vessels which are or shall be bound to the Islands of Guernsey, Sark, or Alderney, or either of them, or any Part of them, or any of them, shall perform their Quarantine in a Place near the Island of Guernsey, called the Little Road, or at some Place hereinbefore appointed for Performance of Quarantine on the Coast of England.

That no Pilot shall go on board any Ship or Vessel, obliged to perform Quarantine, in order to conduct the same into any Port or Place, but shall perform such Service in some other Boat or Vessel, which Boat or Vessel shall keep as much to the Windward of the Ship or Vessel so to be conducted as possible; and if any Pilot or other Person

shall go on board such Ship or Vessel, such Pilot or other Person shall perform Quarantine in like Manner as any Person coming in such Ship or Vessel shall be obliged to perform the same.

That all Goods, Wares, and Merchandizes liable to Quarantine as aforesaid shall be opened, unpacked, and aired, unless His Majesty shall think fit, by his Order in Council, to direct otherwise, and so remain a Week, other than Hemp and Flax, Paper, or Books, Silk, raw, thrown, or wrought; Linen, Cotton Wool, Cotton Yarn, or manufactured; Wool, raw, or anywise wrought; Feathers, Grogram, or Mohair Yarn; Human Hair, Goats Hair, Carmania Wool, Carpets, Camblets, Burdets, or other Manufactures of Silk and Cotton; Kid Skins, and Skins in the Wool or Hair; Spunges, Wines, and Oil in Chests; Thread Stockings; all Goods packed with Straw or Cotton; Straw Hats and Brushes; Matting and Artificial Flowers; which Goods and Merchandizes so as aforesaid enumerated are to be opened, unpacked, and aired, unless His Majesty shall think fit, by his Order in Council, to direct otherwise, and so remain for the Space of a Fortnight.

That all Goods imported by such Ships and Vessels respectively shall be aired in the following Places: that is to say, All such Goods as shall be imported to the Port of London, or any Member, Creek, or other Parts thereof, or to the River Thames or Medway, shall be aired in Standgate Creek; all such Goods as shall be imported to the Ports of Ipswich, Yarmouth, Lynn, Boston, Hull, Newcastle, or Berwick-upon-Tweed, or any of them, or any Member or Creek thereof, or other Place therein, shall be aired in Whitebooth Road, between Hull and Grimsby; all such Goods as shall be imported to the Ports of Carlisle and Chester, or either of them, or any Member or Creek thereof, or any other Place therein, or to any Part of the Isle of Man, shall be aired in a Place called Higblake near Liverpool, at the West End thereof; all such Goods as shall be imported to the Ports of Milford, Cardiff, Gloucester, Bristol, Bridgewater, or any of them, or any Member or Creek of them, or any of them, or to Padstow or St. Ives, being Members of the Port of Plymouth, or to Ilfracombe or Barnstaple, being Members of the Port of Exeter, or to any other Place within the said Ports of Milford, Cardiff, Gloucester, Bristol, or Bridgewater, or within the said Members or Creeks, shall be aired in Kingroad and Porshute Pill; all such Goods as shall be imported to the Port of Plymouth, except such Parts thereof as have been hereinbefore mentioned, or to the Port of Exeter, except such Parts thereof as have been hereinbefore mentioned, or to the Port of Pool, or any of the Members or Creeks, or other Places within the said Ports of Plymouth, Exeter, and Pool, except as before excepted, or to Fal-

mouth, a Member of the Port of Plymouth, or any Creek thereof, or any other Place therein, shall be aired in a Place called St. Ives Pool, within the Mouth of the Harbour of Falmouth; all such Goods as shall be imported to the Ports of Southampton, Chichester, Sandwich, or any of them, or any of the Members or Creeks thereof, or of any of them, or any other Place within the same, shall be aired at a Place called the Motherbank near Portsmouth; all such Goods as shall be imported to the Eastern Coast of Scotland, comprehending the Ports of Leith, Borrowstoness, Alloa, Dunbar, Kirkcaldy, Anstruther, Preston Pans, Dundee, Perth, Montrose, and Aberdeen, or to any Member, Creek, or other Parts thereof, shall be aired in Inverkeithing Bay; all such Goods as shall be imported to the Western Ports of Scotland, comprehending the Ports of Port Glasgow, Greenock, Irvine, Campbeltown, Oban, Rothsay, Fort William, Air, Port-Patrik, Stranraer, and Wigtown, or to any Member, Creek, or other Parts thereof, shall be aired at Lamlash in the Island of Arran; all such Goods as shall be imported to the Northern Ports of Scotland, comprehending the Ports of Inverness, Zetland, Orkney, Caithness, and Stornaway, or to any Member, Creek, or other Parts thereof, shall be aired in Cromarty Bay in the Murray Firth; all such Goods as shall be imported to the South-West Ports of Scotland, comprehending the Ports of Dumfries and Kirkcudbright, or to any Member, Creek, or other Parts thereof, shall be aired at Carthorn at the Mouth of the River Nith; all such Goods as shall be imported to the Isle of Jersey, or any Part thereof, shall be aired at a certain Place on the Coast of the said Island, called Belle Croute, or at such Place hereinbefore appointed for Performance of Quarantine on the Coast of England, where the Ships, in which such Goods are imported, shall respectively perform their Quarantine; and all such Goods, as shall be imported to the Islands of Guernsey, Sark, or Alderney; or either of them, or any Part of them, or any of them, shall be aired in a Place near the Island of Guernsey, called the Little Road, or at such Place hereinbefore appointed for Performance of Quarantine on the coast of England, where the Ships in which such Goods are imported shall respectively perform their Quarantine.

That whatsoever Ship or Person shall receive any Men or Goods from on board any Ship or Vessel under Quarantine shall be compelled to perform the like Quarantine.

That such Persons, as after Quarantine performed, shall be employed in the Hold of any Ship or Vessel for the taking any Goods, not liable to retain Infection from the Goods and Merchandizes before enumerated, shall be obliged to perform a new Quarantine.

That the Captains of every of His Majesty's Ships of War, who shall meet any such Ship or Vessel coming to any of the Ports of Great Britain, or of the Isles of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, or Man, shall take due Care to prevent the landing any Goods, Seamen, or Passengers from on board the same until they shall be put under the Direction of the Officers of His Majesty's Customs.

That the Commissioners and other Officers of His Majesty's Customs do use their utmost Diligence and Care that the Quarantine before directed be duly performed.

That the Commanders of His Majesty's Ships of War, as likewise the Commanders of His Majesty's Forts and Garrisons lying near the Sea Coasts, and all Justices of the Peace, Mayors, Sheriffs, Bailiffs, Chief Magistrates, Constables, Headboroughs, Tythingmen, and all other Officers and Ministers of Justice, be aiding and assisting to the said Officers of His Majesty's Customs, and to all others that shall be concerned in stopping all such Ships as aforesaid, and in bringing them to the Places appointed for the Performance of their Quarantine, and in due Performance thereof.

And the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master-General and the Rest of the principal Officers of the Ordnance, His Majesty's Secretary at War, and the Governors or Commanders in Chief, for the Time being, of the said respective Isles of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, Sark, and Man, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the last Session of Parliament, intituled "An Act for enabling His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation and permit the Importation of Corn, and for allowing the Importation of other Articles of Provision without Payment of Duty, to continue in Force until Six Weeks from the Commencement of the next Session of Parliament," it is enacted, that from and after the passing of the said Act, and until the Expiration of Six Weeks from the Commencement of the then next Session of Parliament, it should be lawful for His Majesty, his Heirs, and Successors, and he and they were thereby authorized, with the Advice of his or their Privy Council, whatever might be the general Average Price of any of the said Sorts of Corn, or of Oatmeal, in England or Scotland respectively, from Time to Time, when

and as often as the same should be judged expedient, to prohibit generally, for a limited Time, the Exportation from England and Scotland respectively, of any British or Foreign Wheat, Rye, Barley, Beer, or Bigg, Pease, Beans, Oats, or any Meal, or Flour, or Bread, Biscuit, or Malt made thereof, or any Indian Corn, or Maize, or Meal, or Flour, made thereof; and to permit generally the Importation into England or Scotland respectively, of any Foreign Corn or other Articles as aforesaid, in any British Ship or Vessel, or in any other Ship or Vessel belonging to Persons of any Kingdom or State in Amity with His Majesty, and navigated in any Manner whatever, without Payment of any Duty whatsoever; and also the taking out of Warehouse for Home Consumption, of any such Foreign Corn, or other Articles as aforesaid, without Payment of any Duty whatsoever; and in like Manner to recall such Prohibition or Permission, either in Part or in the Whole, if Circumstances should appear so to require, any Thing in any Act, or Part of any Act to the contrary notwithstanding, subject, nevertheless, to the Provisions therein mentioned and hereinafter contained; which Act, by an Act of the present Session of Parliament, hath been continued till the Thirtieth Day of September One thousand eight hundred; His Majesty therefore, by and with the Advice of his Privy Council, and in pursuance of the Powers vested in him by the said Act, has thought fit to order, and it is hereby ordered, that from and after the Date of this present Order, and until the Thirtieth Day of September One thousand eight hundred, no Person or Persons whatsoever shall export or shall load, or lay on board any Ship or other Vessel, with the Intent to export from any Port or Place of this Kingdom, any Wheat, Rye, Barley, Beer, or Bigg, Pease, Beans, Oats, or any Meal, or Flour, or Bread, Biscuit, or Malt made thereof, or any Indian Corn, or Maize, or Meal or Flour made thereof:

His Majesty, nevertheless, by the Advice aforesaid, hath thought fit to order, and it is hereby ordered, that nothing herein contained shall extend or be construed to extend, to prohibit the Exportation from this Kingdom of any Foreign Corn, or Meal or Flour, that shall have been imported and warehoused in the Manner and on the Conditions mentioned in an Act passed in the Thirty-first Year of His present Majesty's Reign, intituled "An Act for regulating the Importation and Exportation of Corn, and the Payment of the Duty on Foreign Corn imported, and of the Bounty on British Corn exported," and shall not have been taken out of such Warehouse for Home Consumption, nor to prevent the carrying Coastwise, or carrying out, or the Exportation of the several Sorts of Corn or other Articles as aforesaid from this Kingdom, for any of the Purposes mentioned in the

said Act passed in the Thirty-first Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, or an Act passed in the Thirty-third Year of His present Majesty's Reign, for amending the last-mentioned Act or either of them, in like Manner, and in the same Proportions and Quantities, and from and to the same Ports and Places, as is allowed by the said Two Acts passed in the Thirty-first and Thirty-third Years of His present Majesty's Reign, or either of them, at such Times as any of the several Sorts of Corn or other Articles as aforesaid are prohibited to be exported, in consequence of the Provisions contained in the Two last-mentioned Acts, subject to the like Securities, Conditions, Regulations, and Restrictions, Forfeitures, and Penalties as are by the said Two Acts, or by either of them, in any such Case required and imposed.

And His Majesty, by and with the Advice aforesaid; hath thought fit further to order, and it is hereby ordered, that from and after the Date of this present Order, and until the Thirtieth Day of September One thousand eight hundred, it shall be lawful to import into any Port or Place of this Kingdom any Foreign Corn, or other Articles as aforesaid, in any British Ship or Vessel, or in any other Ship or Vessel belonging to Persons of any Kingdom or State in Amity with His Majesty, and navigated in any Manner whatever, without Payment of any Duty whatsoever; and also to take out of Warehouse, for Home Consumption, any such Foreign Corn, or other Articles as aforesaid, without Payment of any Duty whatsoever.

And whereas by the said Act, passed in the last Session of Parliament, it was further enacted, that from and after the passing of the said Act, and until the Expiration of Six Weeks from the Commencement of the then next Session of Parliament, it should be lawful for His Majesty, his Heirs, and Successors, and he and they were thereby authorized, with the Advice of his or their Privy Council, from Time to Time, when and as often as the same shall be judged expedient, to permit generally, for a limited Time, the Importation into Great Britain, from any Port or Place whatever, in any British Ship or Vessel, or in any other Ship or Vessel belonging to Persons of any Kingdom or State in Amity with His Majesty, and navigated in any Manner whatever, any Beans called Kidney or French Beans, Tares, Lentiles, Callivances, and all other Sorts of Pulse, and also Bulls, Cows, Oxen, Calves, Sheep, Lambs, and Swine, Beef, Pork, Mutton, Veal, and Lamb, whether salted or otherwise, Bacon, Hams, Tongues, Butter, Cheese, Potatoes, Rice, Sago, Sago Powder, Tapioca, Vermicelli, Millet Seed, Poultry, Fowls, Eggs, Game, and Sour Crout, without the Payment of any Duty whatever, at all Times before the said Expiration of Six Weeks from the Commencement of the then next

Session of Parliament, and in like Manner to recall such Permission, either in Part or in Whole, (if Circumstances should seem so to require,) any Thing in any Act or Acts of Parliament to the contrary thereof in anywise notwithstanding, subject, nevertheless, to the Provisoos therein mentioned, and hereinafter contained; which Act, by an Act passed in the present Session of Parliament, hath been continued, as aforesaid, until the Thirtieth Day of September One thousand eight hundred: His Majesty thereupon, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, and in pursuance of the Powers vested in him by the said Acts, has thought fit to order, and it is hereby ordered, that from and after the Date of this present Order, and until the Thirtieth Day of September One thousand eight hundred, it shall be lawful to import into any Port or Place of this Kingdom any of the Articles aforesaid, in any British Ship or Vessel, or in any other Ship or Vessel belonging to Persons of any Kingdom or State in Amity with His Majesty, and navigated in any Manner whatever, without Payment of any Duty whatsoever. Provided always that a due Entry shall be made of all such Articles as aforesaid that shall be so imported, with the proper Officers of the Customs at the Port where the same shall be imported, under the Penalties and Forfeitures in the said Act mentioned. And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary Directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS the Colony of Surinam, in South America, has been surrendered to His Majesty's Arms, and the Territory and Forts in the same are delivered up to His Majesty, and the said Colony is now in His Majesty's Possession; His Majesty is thereupon pleased to order and declare, and it is hereby ordered and declared, That all His loving Subjects may lawfully trade to and from the said Colony of Surinam, subject, nevertheless, to the same Duties, Rules, Regulations, Conditions, Restrictions, Penalties, and Forfeitures to which the Trade to and from His Majesty's Colonies, Plantations, and Islands in the West Indies is, or shall be, subject by Law.

And His Majesty is further pleased to order and declare, and it is hereby ordered and declared, That all Commodities being of the Growth, Produce, or Manufacture of the said Colony of Surinam, being in His Majesty's Possession, shall be permitted to be imported into any of the Ports of this Kingdom in British Ships, owned by His Majesty's Subjects, and navigated according to Law,

subject to the same Duties, Rules, Regulations, Restrictions, Conditions, Penalties, and Forfeitures as Articles of the like Sort are subject to, coming from His Majesty's Colonies, Plantations, or Islands in the West Indies: And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, and the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

DISPATCHES, of which the following are Copy and Extracts, have been received from Lieutenant-Colonel Ramsay and Lieutenant-Colonel H. Clinton, by the Right Honorable Lord Grenville, His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Foreign Department.

Copy of a Dispatch from Lieutenant-Colonel Ramsay to Lord Grenville, dated Head-Quarters, Shaffhausen, September 30, 1799.

MY LORD,

IT is with extreme Regret I inform your Lordship, that an Attack has been made on the Allied Army, the Result of which has been favorable to the Enemy.

The combined Operations of the Allies, of which your Lordship is already informed, were intended to have taken place on the 26th and 27th; and Six Battalions of the Army, commanded by General Korfakof, were detached to Uznach on the 25th, for the Purpose of increasing the Force destined to act in that Quarter.

The Enemy, who was, no doubt, apprised of this Circumstance, attacked the Russian Army on the 25th, at a very early Hour in the Morning: a brisk Attack of Musquetry was heard on our Left in the Neighbourhood of Wallishofen, accompanied by a Cannonade on our Right, which appeared to proceed from the Neighbourhood of Baden.

The Attack on our Left was intended merely for the Purpose of drawing the Attention from the true Point; and the Enemy passed the Limmat in great Force in the Neighbourhood of Weinengen, between Zurich and Baden.

By this Manœuvre they broke the Line in that Quarter, cut off from the Army the Eight Battalions under the Command of Generals Markof and Duralof, who were posted between Weinengen and the Rhine; and, after leaving a Corps for the Purpose of observing and attacking them, they ascended the Limmat towards Zurich.

A Regiment of Dragoons being, in consequence of the Detachments that had been sent away, and the Troops that had been drawn to the Left, the only Force remaining in the Part where the Passage was effected, the Enemy advanced and arrived in the Neighbourhood of Zurich before they experienced any Resistance of Consequence; the Plain in Front of Zurich between the Limmat and the Heights, which, running parallel to the Limmat, form a Continuation of the Albis to the North-West, being occupied at the same Time by a Line of their Infantry and Cavalry, who, with a very numerous Train of Artillery, attacked with great Vigour the Troops in Front of Zurich, and prevented their detaching to their Right the Point on which the great Efforts of the Enemy were directed.

At a late Hour in the Forenoon some Reinforcements arrived on this Side of the Limmat, but the Enemy were already Masters of some of the principal Heights which command the Town; and notwithstanding the Bravery displayed by the Russians in their repeated Attacks, the Superiority in Point of Force and Position on the Side of the French rendered it impossible for them to regain that which had been lost. At Sunset the French had made themselves Masters of Part of the Zurich-Berg and nearly surrounded the Town.

The Attack on the Position of General Hotzé had terminated rather in Favour of the Austrians, but General Hotzé was unfortunately killed at the Commencement of the Action, and General Petrasch, who succeeded to the Command of the Army, having resolved, in consequence of the Loss he had sustained, to avoid the Attack which he expected the next Morning, retreated in the Night from Uznach.

The Situation of the Russian Army was thus rendered still more critical, and it became absolutely necessary to abandon Zurich, and the Position in that Neighbourhood, without Delay. On the 26th in the Morning the Retreat took place, and the Whole arrived in the Course of that Night in the Neighbourhood of Eglisau and Schaffhausen without experiencing any Loss of Consequence during their March.

We have to regret the Loss of between Two and Three Thousand Men killed, wounded, and missing; and Ten Pieces of Cannon have, with a Part of the Baggage, fallen into the Hands of the Enemy. A nearly equal Number of French Cannon were taken by the Russians, but the Want of Horses, which prevented them from taking away their own, was the Cause of their being also obliged to leave these.

The Army under the Command of General Korsakof is at present posted with its Right to Eglisau, and its Left to the Lake of Constance.

By a Letter just arrived from Field-Marshal Suwarrow, it appears that he has taken the Mont St. Gothard, and is at present advancing towards Altdorf and Schweitz.

Extract of a Dispatch from Lieutenant-Colonel Ramsay to Lord Grenville, dated Head Quarters, Schaffhausen, September 30th, 1799.

YOUR Lordship has already no Doubt received Accounts, through France, of the Calamities which

have befallen us in this Country, in which our Losses have most probably been exaggerated to a great Degree. Aware of this I would if possible have sent your Lordship an earlier Account; but it was impossible for me to give a correct Statement of the real State of Things, which was much worse to Appearance when the Army first arrived here than at present.

General Petrasch has retreated from the different Positions between Uznach and Rheineck, where it is supposed he has already passed the Rhine, and this Part of Switzerland may be considered as completely evacuated for the present; it is the more unfortunate, as the Successes of Field-Marshal Suwarrow would have rendered the Success of the projected Operation almost certain, if we had fortunately been able to retain our Position. At present the Field-Marshal's Situation will be rendered very critical, if timely Notice has not been received by him of the Retreat of the Armies.

I am sorry to inform your Lordship, that from the Reports I have received, there is Reason to apprehend that the Swiss Regiments of Bachman and Rovorca have suffered considerably. I have as yet had no exact Accounts, and I will defer therefore making any Report to your Lordship till another Opportunity occurs, as I am in Hopes their Loss has been chiefly occasioned by Dispersion, in which Case it will probably every Day diminish.

Extract of a Letter from Lieutenant-Colonel Henry Clinton to Lord Grenville, dated Bellinzona, September 16, 1799.

HAVING been directed by Lord Mulgrave to attend Field-Marshal Suwarrow on his March to Switzerland, and to transmit to your Lordship Accounts of the Proceedings of this Army, I have the Honor to inform you, that it reached Tavence, about Ten Miles short of this Place, Yesterday Evening; having performed in Five Days a Distance of One Hundred and Sixteen English Miles. It was the Field-Marshal's Intention to have recovered, by the Length of his Marches, the Three Days lost by the false Alarm for the Safety of Tortona; but the Assemblage of Mules which was ordered to be made at this Place not being completed, and the Impossibility of Carriages proceeding any further in the Mountains, obliges him to halt for One Day.

Extract of a Letter from Munich, dated September 29, 1799.

TWO Thousand Four Hundred Men, as a Part of the Elector's Contingent, are to march on the 1st of next Month from the Neighbourhood of Donauwerth to join the Army of the Archduke Charles.

The Plan for forming into Military Corps the Inhabitants of the Palatinate, is to have its Effect throughout the Circle of Bavaria. It is framed for Twenty Thousand Men, and is to be commanded in Bavaria by Major-General Duroy, an Officer enjoying a high Military Character.

Head Quarters, Savigliano, September 18th, 1799.

ON the 16th the Austrian Army arrived at Bra. On the same Day the French advanced from the Side of Coni and Pignerol, to Fossano and Savigliano. In the latter Place they succeeded in taking

by Surprise an Austrian Detachment consisting of Four Hundred Men, with Two Pieces of Cannon. It was reported that the French intended the Day following to form a Junction of all the Corps in the different Vallies, for the Purpose of advancing into the Plain with the greater Security, in order to Pillage and Plunder the Country. To prevent this Movement, the Main Army marched from Bra in Two Columns on the 17th; One under the Command of General Kray attacked Fossano. The Enemy, who were in Force there, defended themselves with great Bravery for near Two Hours; but the superior Courage of the Austrian Troops obliged them to abandon the Post with the Loss of about Two Hundred and Fifty Prisoners. The Austrian General Sechendorf, an Officer of great Reputation, was very severely wounded. The Column of General Melas took Possession of Savigliano without great Resistance. Two Pieces of Cannon and Two Hundred Prisoners were taken. The whole Army will encamp near this Town to-day.

By the judicious and energetic Employment of the National Force, guided by the Wisdom of your Majesty's Counsels and auspicious Government, by the liberal Aid of Parliament, by the patriotic Zeal, Spirit, and Loyalty, of your People, by the distinguished Skill and Bravery of your Fleets and Armies, and with the great and powerful Co-operation of your Majesty's Allies, Victories the most splendid and momentous, have been obtained.

From these great Achievements it has resulted, that some Nations after having been rescued from the oppressive Dominion and Treachery of France, and from the galling Necessity of yielding a reluctant and forced Compliance with her wildly-ambitious and destructive Schemes, have been restored to their rightful Sovereigns and legitimate Governments; other Nations, not only of Europe, but of

distant Quarters of the Globe, have been awakened to a Sense, and have been preserved from the Influence of the delusive and baneful Principles of France; and have been protected and secured against the Calamities of French Invasion and Conquest; and a confident and well-founded Hope and Expectation have arisen over Europe, and throughout the World, that, by a steady Perseverance in the Prosecution of these mighty Objects, your Majesty and your Allies will at last prevail over that revolutionary Power and Spirit in France, which threatened with Ruin and Subversion, all Nations, alike by the Force of Arms, and by the Dissemination of Principles incompatible with Peace, Happiness, and Security, and destructive of civil and religious Duty.

To the final Accomplishment of these Objects we look forward with anxious Expectation, but patient and manly Firmness, knowing that by their Attainment only a fit Termination can be put to the present arduous Struggle, (though in a just and necessary War,) and an honorable, secure, and permanent Peace can be obtained.

That your Majesty may long reign over a loyal and grateful People, is our ardent Wish.
