The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council. WHEREAS His Majesty was graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Twenty-fixth Day of December, One thousand seven hundred and ninety-two, to promise and declare, that the Bounties of Five Pounds for every Able Seaman, and Two Pounds Ten Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, fit for His Majesty's Service, should be paid in the Manner thereby directed to every such Able and Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should, on or before the Twenty-eighth Day of February then following, enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majesty's Ships or Vessels, or Officers employed on Shore for raising Men for the Service of the Royal Navy: And whereas His Majesty was also graciously pleased, by his faid Proclamation, to declare, that all Able-bodied Landmen, not above the Age of Thirty-five nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should so enter themselves as aforesaid, should receive the Sum of Thirty Shillings each Man, as His Majesty's Royal Bounty: And whereas His Majesty was also graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Sixteenth Day of the faid Month of February, One thousand seven hundred and ninety-three, to promise and declare, that a Reward of Twenty Shillings for every Able and Ordinary Seaman, fit to ferve on board His Majesty's Ships, should be paid to any Person who should discover any Seaman or Seamen who might conceal him or themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's Service, on or before the Thirtieth Day of April then next, by any of His Majesty's Sea Officers appointed to raife Men on Shore, or by the Captains or Commanders of any of His Majesty's Ships or Vessels in the Ports or on the Coasts of this Kingdom: And whereas the Time limited by the said Proclamations for Payment of the faid Bounties and Reward hath been prolonged

October; and it being judged expedient for His Majesty's Service that the said Bounties and Reward should be continued to be paid for some Time longer; His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, that the Time limited for Payment of the said Bounties and Reward be prolonged and extended from the faid Thirty-first Day of this instant October to the Thirty-first Day of December next inclusive:—Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council. HEREAS by an Act of Parliament, passed in the Twenty-fixth Year of His late Majesty's Reign, intituled "An Act to oblige Ships "more effectually to perform their Quarantine, and for the better preventing the Plague being brought from Foreign Parts into Great Britain or Ireland, or the Isles of Guernsey, Jersey, "Alderney, Sark, or Man," it is among many other Things enacted, that all Ships and Vessels arriving, and all Perfons, Goods, and Merchandizes whatfoever, coming or imported into any Port or Place within Great Britain, or any of the Isles before-mentioned, from any Place from whence His Majelty, his Heirs or Successors, by and with the Advice of his or their Privy Council, shall judge it probable that the Infection may be brought, shall be obliged to make their Quarantine in fuch Place and Places, for such Time, and in such Manner as has been, or shall from Time to Time be directed by His Majesty, his Heirs or Successors, by his or their Order or Orders made in his or their Privy Council, and notified by Proclamation, or published in the London Gazette: And that until such Ships, Vesfels, Persons, Goods, and Merchandizes shall have respectively performed and be discharged from such Quarantine, no such Persons, Goods, or Merchandizes, or any of them, shall come or be brought on and extended to the Thirty first Day of this instant | Shore, or go or be put on board any other Ship or

· Veffel, in any Place within His Majesty's Dominions, unless in such Manner, and in such Cases, and by such Licence as shall be directed or per-mitted by such Order or Orders made by His Majelty, his Heirs or Successors, in Council as aforesaid: And that all such Ships and Vessels, and the Persons or Goods coming or imported in, or going or being put on board the same; and all Ships Vessels, Boats, and Persons receiving any Goods or Persons out of the same, shall be subject to such Orders, Rules, and Directions concerning Quaran-"tine, and the Prevention of Infection, as have been for shall be made by His Majesty, his Heirs and Succeffors, in Council, and notified by Proclamation, or published in the London Gazette as afore-menctioned, under such Pains and Penalties as are in-flicted by the said Act: And whereas by an Act, ipassed in the Thirty-eighth Year of His present Majesty, intituled An Act to amend Two Acts, smade in the Twenty-fixth Year of King George George the Second, and the Twenty-eighth Year of His present Majesty, respecting the Performance of Quarantine, &c. it is enacted, that the faid Acts passed in the Twenty-sixth Year of His late Majesty's Reign, and the Twenty eighth Year of His present Majesty's Reign, and all and every other Acts or Act of Parliament then in Force in any Way regarding the Performance of Quarantine, shall be extended to all such Diseases or Distempers las His Majesty, by and with the Advice of his Privy Council, shall judge to be probably infectious, and shall so declare by Order in Council, notified by Proclamation, or published in the London Gazette: And whereas Information has been received of malignant Difease existing in the City of Philadelphia, in the State of Pennsylvania, and in New York, within the United States of America, and that the same is probably infectious; His Majesty, by and with the Advice of his Privy Council, doth deem it expedient to declare, and by this Order doth declare, that the faid malignant Disease is probably infectious, within the Intent and Meaning of the faid Act of the Thirty-eighth Year of His Majesty's Reign, and doth order, and it is hereby tordered, that all Ships, Vessels, Persons, Goods, and Merchandizes now arrived, or that shall here-lafter arrive in any Port of this Kingdom, or the Isles of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, or Man, from Philadelphia and New York, or any Port within the State of Pennfylvania, or any Port within the Province of New York, do make their Quarantine for Fourteen Days, which is to commence and be computed from the Day each Ship or Vessel shall come to Anchor in the Place ap pointed for the Performance of Quarantine, and not before.

That the Places hereinafter named shall be and are hereby appointed to be the Places wherein such Ships or Vessels (not having the Insection on board) shall respectively perform Quarantine, that is to say; all Ships or Vessels which are or shall be bound to the Ports of Dumsries and Kircudbright, or to any Member, Creek, or other Parts thereof, or to the River Thames or Medway, shall perform their Quarantine in Standaday, shall perform their Quarantine or shall be bound to the Ports of Ipswich, Yarmouth, Lynn, Boston, Hull, Newcastle, or Berwick upon Tweed, or any of them, or any Member or Creek

thereof, or other Place therein, shall perform their Quarantine in Whitebooth Road, between Hull and Grimfby; all Ships or Vessels which are or shall be bound to the Ports of Carlisse and Chester, or either of them, or any Member or Creek thereof, or other Place therein, or to any Part of the Isle of Man, shall perform their Quarantine in a Place called Highlake, near Liverpool, at the West End thereof; all Ships or Vessels which are or shall be bound to the Ports of Milford, Cardiff, Gloucester, Bristol, Bridgewater, or any of them, or any Member or Creek of them, or any of them, or to Padstow or St. Ive's, being Members of the Port of Plymouth, or to Illracombe or Barnstaple, being Members of the Port of Exeter, or to any other Place within the faid Ports of Milford, Cardiff, Gloucester, Bristol, or Bridgewater, or within the faid Members or Creeks, shall perform their Quarantine in Kingroad and Porshute Pill; all Ships or Vessels which are or shall be bound to the Ports of Plymouth, except such Parts thereof as have been hereinbesore-mentioned, or to the Port of Exeter, except such Parts thereof as have been hereinbefore-mentioned, or to the Port of Pool, or any of the Members or Creeks, or other Places within the faid Ports of Plymouth, Exeter, and Pool, except as hereinbefore excepted; or to Falmouth, a Member of the Port of Plymouth, or any Creek thereof, or any other Place therein, shall perform their Quarantine in a Place called St. Ive's Pool, within the Mouth of the Harbour of Falmouth; all Ships or Vessels which are or shall be bound to the Ports of Southampton, Chichester, Sandwich, or any of them, or any of the Members or Creeks thereof, or any of them, or any other Place within the same, shall perform their Quarantine at a Place called the Motherbank near Portlmouth; all Ships or Veffels which are or shall be bound to the Eastern Coast of Scotland, comprehending the Ports of Leith, Borrowstoness, Alloa, Dunbar, Kirkaldy, Anstruther, Preston Pans, Dundee, Perth, Montrose, and Aberdeen, or to any Member, Creek, or other Parts thereof, shall perform their Quarantine in Inverseithing Bay; all Ships or Vessels which are or shall be bound to the Western Ports of Scotland, comprehending the Ports of Port Glafgow, Greenock, Irvine, Campbeltown, Oban, Rothfay, Fort-William, Air, Port-Patrick, Stranraer, and Wigtown, or to Member, Creek, or other Parts thereof, shall perform their Quarantine at Lamlash in the Island of Arran; all Ships or Vessels which are or shall be bound to the Northern Ports of Scotland, comprehending the Ports of Invernels, Zetland, Orkney, Caithness, and Stornaway, or to any Member, Creek, or other Parts thereof, shall perform their Quarantine in Cromarty Bay in the Murray Firth; all Ships or Vessels which are or shall be bound to the South-West Ports of Scotland, comprehending the Ports of Dumfries and Kircudbright, or to any Member, Creek, or other Parts thereof, shall perform their Quarantine at Carsshorn, at the Mouth of the River Nith; all Ships or Vessels which are or shall be bound to the Ide of Instance of the Ide of Ide of Instance of the Ide of the Isle of Jersey, or any Part thereof, shall per-form their Quarantine at a certain Place on the Coast of the faid Island, called Belle Crontes or at some Place hereinbefore appointed for Perform-📿 - ล้าวรูปส่งสหาร และ ยา สะใหม่จะผู้ ดหานี

That no Pilot shall go on board any Ship or Vessel, obliged to perform Quarantine, in order to conduct the same into any Port or Place, but shall perform such Service in some other Boat or Vessel, which Boat or Vessel shall keep as much to the Windward of the Ship or Vessel to to be conducted as might be and if your Pilot or other Person ducted as possible; and if any Pilot or other Person shall go on board such Ship or Vessel, such Pilot or other Person shall personn Quarantine in like Manner as any Perfon coming in fuch Ship or Veffel

shall be obliged to perform the same.

That all Goods, Wares, and Merchandizes liable to Quarantine as aforesaid shall be opened, unpacked, and aired, unless His Majesty shall think fit, by his Order in Council, to direct otherwife, and fo remain a Week, other than Hemp and Flax, Paper, or Books, Silk, raw, thrown, or wrought; Linen, Cotton Wool, Cotton Yarn, or manufactured; Wool, raw, or anywife wrought; Feathers, Grogram, or Mohair Yarn; Human Hair, Goats Hair, Carmenia Wool, Carpets, Camblets, Burdets, or other Manufactures of Silk and Cotton; Kid Skins, and Skins in the Wool or Hair; Spunges, Wines, and Oil in Chests; Thread Stockings; all Goods packed with Straw or Cotton; Straw Hats and Brushes; Matting and Artificial Flowers; which Goods and Merchandizes to as aforefaid enumerated are to be opened, unpacked, and aired, unless His Majesty shall think fit, by his Order in Council, to direct otherwise, and so remain for the Space of a

Fortnight.

That all Goods imported by fuch Ships and Veffels respectively shall be aired in the following Places: that is to fay, All fuch Goods as shall be imported to the Port of London, or any Member, Creek, or other Parts thereof, or to the River Thames or Medway, shall be aired in Standgate Creek; all fuch Goods as shall be imported to the Ports of Ipswich, Yarmouth, Lynn, Boston, Hull, Newcastle, or Berwick-upon-Tweed, or any of them, or any Member or Creek thereof, or other Place therein, shall be aired in Whitebooth Road, between Hull and Grimsby; all such Goods as shall be imported to the Ports of Carlille and Chester, or either of them, or any Member or Creek thereof, or any other Place therein, or to any Part of the Isle of Man, shall be aired in a Place called Highlake near Liverpool, at the West End thereof; all such Goods as shall be imported to the Ports of Milford, Cardiff, Glouces-Member or Creek of them, or any of them, or to Padstow or St. Ives, being Members of the Port of Plymouth, or to Ilfracombe or Barnstaple, being Members of the Port of Plymouth, or to Ilfracombe or Barnstaple, being Members of the Port of Exeter, or to any other Place within the faid Ports of Milford, Cardiff, Gloucester, Bristol, or Bridgewater, or within the said Members or Creeks, shall be aired in Kingroad and Porshute Pill; all such Goods as shall be imported to the Port of Plymouth, except such Parts thereof as have been hereinbefore mentioned, or to landing any Goods, Seamen, or Paffengers from on the Port of Exeter, except such Parts thereof as board the same until they shall be put under the Ditave been hereinbefore mentioned, or to the Port of rection of the Officers of His Majesty's Customs.

That fuch Persons, as after Quarantine persormed, shall be employed in the Hold of any Ship or Veffel for the taking any Goods, not liable to retain Infection from the Goods and Merchandizes before enumerated, shall be obliged to perform a new Quarantine.

That the Captains of every of His Majesty's Ships of War, who shall meet any such Ship or Vessel coming to any of the Ports of Great Britain, or of the Isles of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, or Man, shall take due Care to prevent the His Majesty's Customs do use their utmost Diligence and Care that the Quarantine before directed

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council. THEREAS by an Act, passed in the last Seffion of Parliament, intituled "An Act for 44 enabling His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation and permit the Importation of Corn, and for al-66 lowing the Importation of other Articles of Pro-"vision without Payment of Duty, to continue in "Force until Six Weeks from the Commencement of the next Seffion of Parliament," it is enacted, that from and after the passing of the said Act, and until the Expiration of Six Weeks from the Commencement of the then next Session of Parliament, it should be lawful for His Majetty, his Heirs, and Successors, and he and they were thereby authorized, with the Advice of his or their Privy Council, whatever might be the general Average Price of any of the faid Sorts of Corn, or of Oatmeal, in England or Scotland respectively, from Time to Time, when, and as often as the same should be judged expedient, to prohibit generally, for a limited Time, the Exportation from England and Scotland respectively, of any British or Foreign Wheat, Rye, Barley, Beer, or Bigg, Peafe, Beans, Oats, or any Meal, or Flour, or Bread, Biscuit, or Malt made thereof, or any Indian Corn, or Maize, or Meal, or Flour, made thereof; and to permit generally the Importation into England or Scotland respectively, of any Foreign Corn or other Articles as aforefaid, in any British Ship or Vessel, or in any other Ship or Vessel belonging to Persons of any Kingdom or State in Amity with His Majesty, and navigated in any Manner whatever, without Payment of any Duty whatsoever; and also the taking out of Warehouse for Home Consumption, of any such Foreign Corn, or other Articles as aforefaid, without Payment of any Duty whatfoever; and in like Manner to recall fuch Prohibition or Permiffion, either

His Majesty, nevertheless, by the Advice aforefaid, hath thought fit to order, and it is hereby ordered, that nothing herein contained shall extendor be construed to extend, to prohibit the Exporta, tion from this Kingdom of any Foreign Corn, or Meal or Flour, that shall have been imported and warehoused in the Manner and on the Conditions mentioned in an Act passed in the Thirty-first Year of His present Majelly's Reign, intituled "An "Act for regulating the Importation and Exporta"tion of Corn, and the Payment of the Duty on
"Foreign Corn imported, and of the Bounty on
British Corn exported," and shall not have been taken out of fuch Warehouse for Home Consumption, nor to prevent the carrying Coastwife, or carrying out, or the Exportation of the feveral Sorts of Corn or other Articles as aforefaid from this Kingdom, for any of the Purpofes mentioned in the of His present Majesty, or an Act passed in the Thirty-first Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, or an Act passed in the Thirty-third Year of His present Majesty's Reign, for amending the last-mentioned Act or either of them, in like Manner, and in the same Proportions and Quantities, and from and to the same Ports and Places, as is allowed by the said Two Acts passed in the Thirty-first and Thirty-third Years of His pre-sent Majesty's Reign, or either of them, at such Times as any of the several Sorts of Corn or other Articles as aforefaid are prohibited to be exported, in confequence of the Provisions contained in the Two last-mentioned Acts, subject to the like Securities, Conditions, Regulations, and Restrictions, Forfeitures, and Penalties as are by the faid Two-Acts, or by either of them, in any fuch Case required and imposed.

And His Majesty, by and with the Advice aforesaid, hath thought fit further to order, and it is hereby ordered, that from and after the Date of this present Order, and until the Thirtieth Day of September One thousand eight hundred, it shall be lawful to import into any Port or Place of this Kingdom any Foreign Corn, or other Articles as aforefaid, in any British Ship or Vessel, or in any other Ship or Vessel belonging to Persons of any Kingdom or State in Amity with His Majesty, and navigated in any Manner whatever, without Payment of any Duty whatsoever; and also to take out of Warehouse; for Hama Confurnction, any first Foreign Corners for Home Confumption, any fuch Foreign Corn, or

And whereas by the faid Act, passed in the last Session of Parliament, it was further enacted, that from and after the passing of the said Act, and until the Expiration of Six Weeks from the Commencement of the then next Session of Parliament, it should be lawful for His Majesty, his Heirs, and Successors, and he and they were thereby authorized, with the Advice of his or their Privy Council, from Time to Time, when and as often as the fame shall be judged expedient, to permit generally, for a limited Time, the Importation into Great Britain, from any Port or Place whatever, in any British Ship or Vessel, or in any other Ship or Vessel belonging to Persons of any Kingdom or State in Amity with His Majesty, and navigated in any Manner whatever, any Beans called Kidney or French Beans, Tares, Lentiles, Callivances, and all other Sorts of Pulle, and also Bulls, Cows, Oxen, Calves, Sheep, Lambs, and Swine, Beef, Pork, Mutton, Veal, and Lamb, whether salted or otherwife, Bacon, Hams, Tongues, Butter, Cheefe, Potatoes, Rice, Sago, Sago Powder, Tapioca, Vermicelli, Millet Seed, Poultry, Fowls, Eggs, Game, and Sour Crout, without the Payment of any Duty whatever, at all Times before the faid Expiration of Six Weeks from the Commencement of the then next Seffion of Parliament, and in like Manner to recall fuch Permission, either in Partor in Whole, (if Circumstances should seems so to require,) any Thing in any Act or Acts of Parliament to the contrary thereof in anywife notwithstanding, subject, nevertheless, to the Provisoes therein mentioned, and hereinaster contained; which Act, by an Act passed in the present Session of Parliament, hath been continued, as aforesaid, until the Thirtieth Day of September One thousand eight hundred: His Majesty thereupon, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, and in pursuance of the Powers vested in him by the said Acts, has thought fit to order, and it is hereby ordered, that from and after the Date of this present Order, and until the Thirtieth Day of September One thousand eight hundred, it shall be lawful to import into any Port or Place of this Kingdom any of the Articles aforesaid, in any British Ship or Vessel, or in any other Ship or Vessel belonging to Persons of any Kingdom or State in Amity with His Majesty, and navigated in any Manner whatever, without Payment of any Duty whatfoever. Fasukener. may respectively appertain.

His Majesty's Gun Brig Hasty, off SIR, Marken, Odober 7, 1799.

Beg to inform you, that I Yesterday sailed from Usk, with the Hasty, Defender, and Cracker Bries and Isa Schusty, Defender, and Cracker Brigs, and Isis Schuyt; and having reached this Place by Four A.M. I proceeded with the Boats to attempt cutting out the Dutch Gun Boats lying on or near the Pampus, and am happy to fay, fucceeded in getting Possession of Four without the Loss of a Man. They each mount Four long Guns or Carronades, and have between Twenty and Thirty Men; one of them built on Purpose for a Gun Vessel and quite new, carrying Two long Eighteen-Pounders in her Bow, and Two Eighteen-Pounder Carronades on her Broadfide; the Rest are Schuyts.

I beg to recommend to your Notice Messers. Hall and Winter, Midshipmen, for their spirited Behaviour on this Occasion, as also all the Seamen engaged, for their Alacrity in boarding, and good Conduct after having gained Possession. I have sent the Defender with Charge of the Gun Boats,

Have the Honor to inform you, that at Five o'Clock this Morning the Enemy made a general Attack on this Town in Four different Parts. Their Advanced Party attempted to storm the North Battery. We soon got them between Two Fires; our Tars with Pikes surrounded them, and they immediately laid down their Arms. Their Force was One Officer, One Serjeant, One Corporal, and Twenty-eight Men, Two of the latter killed. We had no sooner secured our Prisoners than they attacked us with the Remainder of their Force, Six Hundred and Seventy in Number: our little Army did Wonders; for with Sailors and Marines our Force was only One Hundred and Fifty-seven. We fought them for Four Hours and a Half, when the Enemy gave Way in all Directions: I immediately ordered the Marines to pursue them. Their breaking down a Bridge prevented their Colours and Two Field Pieces from falling into our Hands; but before this was effected the heavy Fire from the Marines had killed Eighten of the Enemy and wounded about Twenty; and in their general Attack they had Five Men killed and Nine wounded.

Lemmer Town, West Friesland,

It is impossible for me to speak too highly of the Men and Officers under my Command. Lieutenant Wyburn of the Marines, as also Lieutenants Howel, Higginson, and Gardner, behaved with Honor to themselves and Credit to their Country. Lieutenant Norman of the Navy, as also Mr. Lane, Mr. Iron, Mr. Wheatly, Mr. Travers, and Mr. Petty distinguished themselves in a most gallant Manner, as did likewise the Whole of the Sailors

and Marines.

It affords me great Satisfaction to inform you we had not a Man hurt.

Eing detained here by contrary Winds, which deprived me of the Pleasure of acting with you in the Zuyder Zee, I proceeded to reconnoitre the Port of Delfzel, where I discovered a Sloop of War and a Schooner lying within Mussket Shot of the Batteries; and conceiving it practicable to carry them by a Coup-de-Main, I gave the necessary Orders for that Purpose, but the Weather proving tempessuous nothing could be effected until the 8th,

at Night. Delfzel being diffant Twenty Miles from the Circe, the Boats proceeded with the First of the Tide, and arrived there just as the Moon went down; at which Time I ordered the Attack to be made by Lieutenant Maughan upon the Ship, and Lieutenant Pawle upon the Schooner, who boarded and carried them in a most gallant Manner, and I am happy to say without any Loss, notwithstanding the Enemy's Guns were loaded, primed, and the Matches lighted. The Name of the Ship is the Lynx, of Twelve Guns, Eight and Twelve-Pounders, and Seventysive Men; that of the Schooner, the Perseus, mounting Eight Four-Pounders, and Forty Men.

The Officers, Seamen, and Marines employed upon this Service deserve my warmest Acknowledgments for their cool, filent, and steady Conduct, to which our Success was in a great Measure owing: and I feel great Satisfaction in having an Opportunity to do Justice to the Merits of my First Lieutenant, Mr. Maughan, whose Zeal for the Service I have often witnessed; and also to Mr. Pawle, my Second Lieutenant, whom I kave had frequent Oc-

casion to commend.

To Lieutenant Buckle, of the Hawke Cutter, and Captain May, a Naval Officer in the Service of the Prince of Orange, who very handfomely volunteered their Services with me on this Occasion, I am much indebted for their Advice and Assistance.
