**A**T the Court at *St. James's*, the 16th of October 1799,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

**W**HEREAS His Majesty was graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Twenty-sixth Day of December, One thousand seven hundred and ninety-two, to promise and declare, that the Bounties of Five Pounds for every Able Seaman, and Two Pounds Ten Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, fit for His Majesty's Service, should be paid in the Manner thereby directed to every such Able and Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should, on or before the Twenty-eighth Day of February then following, enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majesty's Ships or Vessels, or Officers employed on Shore for raising Men for the Service of the Royal Navy: And whereas His Majesty was also graciously pleased, by his said Proclamation, to declare, that all Able-bodied Landmen, not above the Age of Thirty-five nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should so enter themselves as aforesaid, should receive the Sum of Thirty Shillings each Man, as His Majesty's Royal Bounty: And whereas His Majesty was also graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Sixteenth Day of the said Month of February, One thousand seven hundred and ninety-three, to promise and declare, that a Reward of Twenty Shillings for every Able and Ordinary Seaman, fit to serve on board His Majesty's Ships, should be paid to any Person who should discover any Seaman or Seamen who might conceal him or themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's Service, on or before the Thirtieth Day of April then next, by any of His Majesty's Sea Officers appointed to raise Men on Shore, or by the Captains or Commanders of any of His Majesty's Ships or Vessels in the Ports or on the Coasts of this Kingdom: And whereas the Time limited by the said Proclamations for Payment of the said Bounties and Reward hath been prolonged and extended to the Thirty-first Day of this instant

October; and it being judged expedient for His Majesty's Service that the said Bounties and Reward should be continued to be paid for some Time longer; His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, that the Time limited for Payment of the said Bounties and Reward be prolonged and extended from the said Thirty-first Day of this instant October to the Thirty-first Day of December next inclusive:—Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

**W**HEREAS by an Act of Parliament, passed in the Twenty-sixth Year of His late Majesty's Reign, intituled "An Act to oblige Ships more effectually to perform their Quarantine, and for the better preventing the Plague being brought from Foreign Parts into Great Britain or Ireland, or the Isles of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, or Man," it is among many other Things enacted, that all Ships and Vessels arriving, and all Persons, Goods, and Merchandizes whatsoever, coming or imported into any Port or Place within Great Britain, or any of the Isles before-mentioned, from any Place from whence His Majesty, his Heirs or Successors, by and with the Advice of his or their Privy Council, shall judge it probable that the Infection may be brought, shall be obliged to make their Quarantine in such Place and Places, for such Time, and in such Manner as has been, or shall from Time to Time be directed by His Majesty, his Heirs or Successors, by his or their Order or Orders made in his or their Privy Council, and notified by Proclamation, or published in the London Gazette: And that until such Ships, Vessels, Persons, Goods, and Merchandizes shall have respectively performed and be discharged from such Quarantine, no such Persons, Goods, or Merchandizes, or any of them, shall come or be brought on Shore, or go or be put on board any other Ship or

Vessel, in any Place within His Majesty's Dominions, unless in such Manner, and in such Cases, and by such Licence as shall be directed or permitted by such Order or Orders made by His Majesty, his Heirs or Successors, in Council as aforesaid: And that all such Ships and Vessels, and the Persons or Goods coming or imported in, or going or being put on board the same; and all Ships Vessels, Boats, and Persons receiving any Goods or Persons out of the same, shall be subject to such Orders, Rules, and Directions concerning Quarantine, and the Prevention of Infection, as have been or shall be made by His Majesty, his Heirs and Successors, in Council, and notified by Proclamation, or published in the London Gazette as aforesaid, under such Pains and Penalties as are inflicted by the said Act: And whereas by an Act, passed in the Thirty-eighth Year of His present Majesty, intituled An Act to amend Two Acts, made in the Twenty-sixth Year of King George the Second, and the Twenty-eighth Year of His present Majesty, respecting the Performance of Quarantine, &c. it is enacted, that the said Acts passed in the Twenty-sixth Year of His late Majesty's Reign, and the Twenty-eighth Year of His present Majesty's Reign, and all and every other Acts or Act of Parliament then in Force in any Way regarding the Performance of Quarantine, shall be extended to all such Diseases or Distempers as His Majesty, by and with the Advice of his Privy Council, shall judge to be probably infectious, and shall so declare by Order in Council, notified by Proclamation, or published in the London Gazette: And whereas Information has been received of a malignant Disease existing in the City of Philadelphia, in the State of Pennsylvania, and in New York, within the United States of America, and that the same is probably infectious; His Majesty, by and with the Advice of his Privy Council, doth deem it expedient to declare, and by this Order doth declare, that the said malignant Disease is probably infectious, within the Intent and Meaning of the said Act of the Thirty-eighth Year of His Majesty's Reign, and doth order, and it is hereby ordered, that all Ships, Vessels, Persons, Goods, and Merchandizes now arrived, or that shall hereafter arrive in any Port of this Kingdom, or the Isles of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, or Man, from Philadelphia and New York, or any Port within the State of Pennsylvania, or any Port within the Province of New York, do make their Quarantine for Fourteen Days, which is to commence and be computed from the Day each Ship or Vessel shall come to Anchor in the Place appointed for the Performance of Quarantine, and not before.

That the Places hereinafter named shall be and are hereby appointed to be the Places wherein such Ships or Vessels (not having the Infection on board) shall respectively perform Quarantine, that is to say; all Ships or Vessels which are or shall be bound to the Port of London, or any Member, Creek, or other Parts thereof, or to the River Thames or Medway, shall perform their Quarantine in Standgate Creek; all Ships or Vessels which are or shall be bound to the Ports of Ipswich, Yarmouth, Lynn, Boston, Hull, Newcastle, or Berwick upon Tweed, or any of them, or any Member or Creek

thereof, or other Place therein, shall perform their Quarantine in Whitebooth Road, between Hull and Grimsby; all Ships or Vessels which are or shall be bound to the Ports of Carlisle and Chester, or either of them, or any Member or Creek thereof, or other Place therein, or to any Part of the Isle of Man, shall perform their Quarantine in a Place called Highlake, near Liverpool, at the West End thereof; all Ships or Vessels which are or shall be bound to the Ports of Milford, Cardiff, Gloucester, Bristol, Bridgewater, or any of them, or any Member or Creek of them, or any of them, or to Padstow or St. Ives, being Members of the Port of Plymouth, or to Ilfracombe or Barnstaple, being Members of the Port of Exeter, or to any other Place within the said Ports of Milford, Cardiff, Gloucester, Bristol, or Bridgewater, or within the said Members or Creeks, shall perform their Quarantine in Kingroad and Porshute Pill; all Ships or Vessels which are or shall be bound to the Ports of Plymouth, except such Parts thereof as have been hereinbefore-mentioned, or to the Port of Exeter, except such Parts thereof as have been hereinbefore-mentioned, or to the Port of Pool, or any of the Members or Creeks, or other Places within the said Ports of Plymouth, Exeter, and Pool, except as hereinbefore excepted; or to Falmouth, a Member of the Port of Plymouth, or any Creek thereof, or any other Place therein, shall perform their Quarantine in a Place called St. Ives Pool, within the Mouth of the Harbour of Falmouth; all Ships or Vessels which are or shall be bound to the Ports of Southampton, Chichester, Sandwich, or any of them, or any of the Members or Creeks thereof, or any of them, or any other Place within the same, shall perform their Quarantine at a Place called the Motherbank near Portsmouth; all Ships or Vessels which are or shall be bound to the Eastern Coast of Scotland, comprehending the Ports of Leith, Borrowstouness, Alloa, Dunbar, Kirkcaldy, Anstruther, Preston Pans, Dundee, Perth, Montrose, and Aberdeen, or to any Member, Creek, or other Parts thereof, shall perform their Quarantine in Inverkeithing Bay; all Ships or Vessels which are or shall be bound to the Western Ports of Scotland, comprehending the Ports of Port Glasgow, Greenock, Irvine, Campbeltown, Oban, Rothesay, Fort-William, Air, Port-Patrick, Stranraer, and Wigton, or to Member, Creek, or other Parts thereof, shall perform their Quarantine at Lamlash in the Island of Arran; all Ships or Vessels which are or shall be bound to the Northern Ports of Scotland, comprehending the Ports of Inverness, Zetland, Orkney, Caithness, and Stornoway, or to any Member, Creek, or other Parts thereof, shall perform their Quarantine in Cromarty Bay in the Murray Firth; all Ships or Vessels which are or shall be bound to the South West Ports of Scotland, comprehending the Ports of Dumfries and Kircudbright, or to any Member, Creek, or other Parts thereof, shall perform their Quarantine at Carlhorn, at the Mouth of the River Nith; all Ships or Vessels which are or shall be bound to the Isle of Jersey, or any Part thereof, shall perform their Quarantine at a certain Place on the Coast of the said Island, called Belle Croute, or at some Place hereinbefore appointed for Performance of Quarantine on the Coast of England; and

all Ships or Vessels which are or shall be bound to the Islands of Guernsey, Sark, or Alderney, or either of them, or any Part of them, or any of them, shall perform their Quarantine in a Place near the Island of Guernsey, called the Little Road, or at some Place hereinbefore appointed for Performance of Quarantine on the Coast of England.

That no Pilot shall go on board any Ship or Vessel, obliged to perform Quarantine, in order to conduct the same into any Port or Place, but shall perform such Service in some other Boat or Vessel, which Boat or Vessel shall keep as much to the Windward of the Ship or Vessel so to be conducted as possible; and if any Pilot or other Person shall go on board such Ship or Vessel, such Pilot or other Person shall perform Quarantine in like Manner as any Person coming in such Ship or Vessel shall be obliged to perform the same.

That all Goods, Wares, and Merchandizes liable to Quarantine as aforesaid shall be opened, unpacked, and aired, unless His Majesty shall think fit, by his Order in Council, to direct otherwise, and so remain a Week, other than Hemp and Flax, Paper, or Books, Silk, raw, thrown, or wrought; Linen, Cotton Wool, Cotton Yarn, or manufactured; Wool, raw, or anywise wrought; Feathers, Grogam, or Mohair Yarn; Human Hair, Goats Hair, Carmania Wool, Carpets, Camblets, Burdets, or other Manufactures of Silk and Cotton; Kid Skins, and Skins in the Wool or Hair; Spunges, Wines, and Oil in Chests; Thread Stockings; all Goods packed with Straw or Cotton; Straw Hats and Brushes; Matting and Artificial Flowers; which Goods and Merchandizes so as aforesaid enumerated are to be opened, unpacked, and aired, unless His Majesty shall think fit, by his Order in Council, to direct otherwise, and so remain for the Space of a Fortnight.

That all Goods imported by such Ships and Vessels respectively shall be aired in the following Places: that is to say, All such Goods as shall be imported to the Port of London, or any Member, Creek, or other Parts thereof, or to the River Thames or Medway, shall be aired in Standgate Creek; all such Goods as shall be imported to the Ports of Ipswich, Yarmouth, Lynn, Boston, Hull, Newcastle, or Berwick-upon-Tweed, or any of them, or any Member or Creek thereof, or other Place therein, shall be aired in Whitebooth Road, between Hull and Grimsby; all such Goods as shall be imported to the Ports of Carlisle and Chester, or either of them, or any Member or Creek thereof, or any other Place therein, or to any Part of the Isle of Man, shall be aired in a Place called Highlake near Liverpool, at the West End thereof; all such Goods as shall be imported to the Ports of Milford, Cardiff, Gloucester, Bristol, Bridgewater, or any of them, or any Member or Creek of them, or any of them, or to Padstow or St. Ives, being Members of the Port of Plymouth, or to Ilfracombe or Barnstaple, being Members of the Port of Exeter, or to any other Place within the said Ports of Milford, Cardiff, Gloucester, Bristol, or Bridgewater, or within the said Members or Creeks, shall be aired in Kingroad and Porshute Pill; all such Goods as shall be imported to the Port of Plymouth, except such Parts thereof as have been hereinbefore mentioned, or to the Port of Exeter, except such Parts thereof as have been hereinbefore mentioned, or to the Port of

Pool, or any of the Members or Creeks, or other Places within the said Ports of Plymouth, Exeter, and Pool, except as before excepted, or to Falmouth, a Member of the Port of Plymouth, or any Creek thereof, or any other Place therein, shall be aired in a Place called St. Ives Pool, within the Mouth of the Harbour of Falmouth; all such Goods as shall be imported to the Ports of Southampton, Chichester, Sandwich, or any of them, or any of the Members or Creeks thereof, or of any of them, or any other Place within the same, shall be aired at a Place called the Motherbank near Portsmouth; all such Goods as shall be imported to the Eastern Coast of Scotland, comprehending the Ports of Leith, Borrowstones, Alloa, Dunbar, Kirkaldy, Anstruther, Preston Pans, Dundee, Perth, Montrose, and Aberdeen, or to any Member, Creek, or other Parts thereof, shall be aired in Inverkeithing Bay; all such Goods as shall be imported to the Western Ports of Scotland, comprehending the Ports of Port Glasgow, Greenock, Irvine, Campbeltown, Oban, Rothsay, Fort William, Air, Port Patrick, Stranraer, and Wigtown, or to any Member, Creek, or other Parts thereof, shall be aired at Lamlash in the Island of Arran; all such Goods as shall be imported to the Northern Ports of Scotland, comprehending the Ports of Inverness, Zetland, Orkney, Caithness, and Stornaway, or to any Member, Creek, or other Parts thereof, shall be aired in Cromarty Bay in the Murray Firth; all such Goods as shall be imported to the South-West Ports of Scotland, comprehending the Ports of Dumfries and Kirkcudbright, or to any Member, Creek, or other Parts thereof, shall be aired at Carthorn at the Mouth of the River Nith; all such Goods as shall be imported to the Isle of Jersey, or any Part thereof, shall be aired at a certain Place on the Coast of the said Island, called Belle Croute, or at such Place hereinbefore appointed for Performance of Quarantine on the Coast of England; where the Ships, in which such Goods are imported, shall respectively perform their Quarantine; and all such Goods, as shall be imported to the Islands of Guernsey, Sark, or Alderney, or either of them, or any Part of them, or any of them, shall be aired in a Place near the Island of Guernsey, called the Little Road, or at such Place hereinbefore appointed for Performance of Quarantine on the Coast of England, where the Ships in which such Goods are imported shall respectively perform their Quarantine.

That whatsoever Ship or Person shall receive any Men or Goods from on board any Ship or Vessel under Quarantine shall be compelled to perform the like Quarantine.

That such Persons, as after Quarantine performed, shall be employed in the Hold of any Ship or Vessel for the taking any Goods, not liable to retain Infection from the Goods and Merchandizes before enumerated, shall be obliged to perform a new Quarantine.

That the Captains of every of His Majesty's Ships of War, who shall meet any such Ship or Vessel coming to any of the Ports of Great Britain, or of the Isles of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, or Man, shall take due Care to prevent the landing any Goods, Seamen, or Passengers from on board the same until they shall be put under the Direction of the Officers of His Majesty's Customs.

That the Commissioners and other Officers of His Majesty's Customs do use their utmost Diligence and Care that the Quarantine before directed be duly performed.

That the Commanders of His Majesty's Ships of War, as likewise the Commanders of His Majesty's Forts and Garrisons lying near the Sea Coasts, and all Justices of the Peace, Mayors, Sheriffs, Bailiffs, Chief Magistrates, Constables, Headboroughs, Tythingmen, and all other Officers and Ministers of Justice, be aiding and assisting to the said Officers of His Majesty's Customs, and to all others that shall be concerned in stopping all such Ships as aforesaid, and in bringing them to the Places appointed for the Performance of their Quarantine, and in due Performance thereof.

And the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master-General and the Rest of the principal Officers of the Ordnance, His Majesty's Secretary at War, and the Governors or Commanders in Chief, for the Time being, of the said respective Isles of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, Sark, and Man, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the last Session of Parliament, intituled "An Act for enabling His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation and permit the Importation of Corn, and for allowing the Importation of other Articles of Provision without Payment of Duty, to continue in Force until Six Weeks from the Commencement of the next Session of Parliament," it is enacted, that from and after the passing of the said Act, and until the Expiration of Six Weeks from the Commencement of the then next Session of Parliament, it should be lawful for His Majesty, his Heirs, and Successors, and he and they were thereby authorized, with the Advice of his or their Privy Council, whatever might be the general Average Price of any of the said Sorts of Corn, or of Oatmeal, in England or Scotland respectively, from Time to Time, when, and as often as the same should be judged expedient, to prohibit generally, for a limited Time, the Exportation from England and Scotland respectively, of any British or Foreign Wheat, Rye, Barley, Beer, or Bigg, Pease, Beans, Oats, or any Meal, or Flour, or Bread, Biscuit, or Malt-made thereof, or any Indian Corn, or Maize, or Meal, or Flour, made thereof; and to permit generally the Importation into England or Scotland respectively, of any Foreign Corn or other Articles as aforesaid, in any British Ship or Vessel, or in any other Ship or Vessel belonging to Persons of any Kingdom or State in Amity with His Majesty, and navigated in any Manner whatever, without Payment of any Duty whatsoever; and also the taking out of Warehouse for Home Consumption, of any such Foreign Corn, or other Articles as aforesaid, without Payment of any Duty whatsoever; and in like Manner to recall such Prohibition or Permission, either

in Part or in the Whole, if Circumstances should appear so to require, any Thing in any Act, or Part of any Act to the contrary notwithstanding, subject, nevertheless, to the Provisions therein mentioned and hereinafter contained; which Act, by an Act of the present Session of Parliament, hath been continued till the Thirtieth Day of September One thousand eight hundred; His Majesty therefore, by and with the Advice of his Privy Council, and in pursuance of the Powers vested in him by the said Act, has thought fit to order, and it is hereby ordered, that from and after the Date of this present Order, and until the Thirtieth Day of September One thousand eight hundred, no Person or Persons whatsoever shall export or shall load, or lay on board any Ship or other Vessel, with the Intent to export from any Port or Place of this Kingdom, any Wheat, Rye, Barley, Beer, or Bigg, Pease, Beans, Oats, or any Meal, or Flour, or Bread, Biscuit, or Malt made thereof, or any Indian Corn, or Maize, or Meal or Flour made thereof:

His Majesty, nevertheless, by the Advice aforesaid, hath thought fit to order, and it is hereby ordered, that nothing herein contained shall extend or be construed to extend, to prohibit the Exportation from this Kingdom of any Foreign Corn, or Meal or Flour, that shall have been imported and warehoused in the Manner and on the Conditions mentioned in an Act passed in the Thirty-first Year of His present Majesty's Reign, intituled "An Act for regulating the Importation and Exportation of Corn, and the Payment of the Duty on Foreign Corn imported, and of the Bounty on British Corn exported," and shall not have been taken out of such Warehouse for Home Consumption, nor to prevent the carrying Coastwise, or carrying out, or the Exportation of the several Sorts of Corn or other Articles as aforesaid from this Kingdom, for any of the Purposes mentioned in the said Act passed in the Thirty-first Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, or an Act passed in the Thirty-third Year of His present Majesty's Reign, for amending the last-mentioned Act or either of them, in like Manner, and in the same Proportions and Quantities, and from and to the same Ports and Places, as is allowed by the said Two Acts passed in the Thirty-first and Thirty-third Years of His present Majesty's Reign, or either of them, at such Times as any of the several Sorts of Corn or other Articles as aforesaid are prohibited to be exported, in consequence of the Provisions contained in the Two last-mentioned Acts, subject to the like Securities, Conditions, Regulations, and Restrictions, Forfeitures, and Penalties as are by the said Two Acts, or by either of them, in any such Case required and imposed.

And His Majesty, by and with the Advice aforesaid, hath thought fit further to order, and it is hereby ordered, that from and after the Date of this present Order, and until the Thirtieth Day of September One thousand eight hundred, it shall be lawful to import into any Port or Place of this Kingdom any Foreign Corn, or other Articles as aforesaid, in any British Ship or Vessel, or in any other Ship or Vessel belonging to Persons of any Kingdom or State in Amity with His Majesty, and navigated in any Manner whatever, without Payment of any Duty whatsoever; and also to take out of Warehouse, for Home Consumption, any such Foreign Corn, or

other Articles as aforesaid, without Payment of any Duty whatsoever.

And whereas by the said Act, passed in the last Session of Parliament, it was further enacted, that from and after the passing of the said Act, and until the Expiration of Six Weeks from the Commencement of the then next Session of Parliament, it should be lawful for His Majesty, his Heirs, and Successors, and he and they were thereby authorized, with the Advice of his or their Privy Council, from Time to Time, when and as often as the same shall be judged expedient, to permit generally, for a limited Time, the Importation into Great Britain, from any Port or Place whatever, in any British Ship or Vessel, or in any other Ship or Vessel belonging to Persons of any Kingdom or State in Amity with His Majesty, and navigated in any Manner whatever, any Beans called Kidney or French Beans, Tares, Lentiles, Callivances, and all other Sorts of Pulse, and also Bulls, Cows, Oxen, Calves, Sheep, Lambs, and Swine, Beef, Pork, Mutton, Veal, and Lamb, whether salted or otherwise, Bacon, Hams, Tongues, Butter, Cheese, Potatoes, Rice, Sago, Sago Powder, Tapioca, Vermicelli, Millet Seed, Poultry, Fowls, Eggs, Game, and Sour Crout, without the Payment of any Duty whatever, at all Times before the said Expiration of Six Weeks from the Commencement of the then next Session of Parliament, and in like Manner to recall such Permission, either in Part or in Whole, (if Circumstances should seem so to require,) any Thing in any Act or Acts of Parliament to the contrary thereof in anywise notwithstanding, subject, nevertheless, to the Proviso's therein mentioned, and hereinafter contained; which Act, by an Act passed in the present Session of Parliament, hath been continued, as aforesaid, until the Thirtieth Day of September One thousand eight hundred: His Majesty thereupon, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, and in pursuance of the Powers vested in him by the said Acts, has thought fit to order, and it is hereby ordered, that from and after the Date of this present Order, and until the Thirtieth Day of September One thousand eight hundred, it shall be lawful to import into any Port or Place of this Kingdom any of the Articles aforesaid, in any British Ship or Vessel, or in any other Ship or Vessel belonging to Persons of any Kingdom or State in Amity with His Majesty, and navigated in any Manner whatever, without Payment of any Duty whatsoever. Provided always that a due Entry shall be made of all such Articles as aforesaid that shall be so imported, with the proper Officers of the Customs at the Port where the same shall be imported, under the Penalties and Forfeitures in the said Act mentioned. And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary Directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS the Colony of Surinam, in South America, has been surrendered to His Majesty's Arms, and the Territory and Forts in the

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same are delivered up to His Majesty, and the said Colony is now in His Majesty's Possession; His Majesty is thereupon pleased to order and declare, and it is hereby ordered and declared, That all His loving Subjects may lawfully trade to and from the said Colony of Surinam; subject, nevertheless, to the same Duties, Rules, Regulations, Conditions, Restrictions, Penalties, and Forfeitures to which the Trade to and from His Majesty's Colonies, Plantations, and Islands in the West Indies is, or shall be, subject by Law.

And His Majesty is further pleased to order and declare, and it is hereby ordered and declared, That all Commodities being of the Growth, Produce, or Manufacture of the said Colony of Surinam, being in His Majesty's Possession, shall be permitted to be imported into any of the Ports of this Kingdom in British Ships, owned by His Majesty's Subjects, and navigated according to Law, subject to the same Duties, Rules, Regulations, Restrictions, Conditions, Penalties, and Forfeitures as Articles of the like Sort are subject to, coming from His Majesty's Colonies, Plantations, or Islands in the West Indies: And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, and the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

S I R,

IT is with sincere Satisfaction I acquaint you, that Lieutenant Jauncey, of His Majesty's Ship *Ethalion*, is just arrived here from Plymouth, by whom I have received a Letter from Captain Young, stating his having captured on the 16th Instant the *Thetis* Spanish Frigate, with much Treasure and a valuable Cargo of Cocoa on board; also informing me, that another Spanish Frigate, her *Confort*, has, no Doubt, been taken by the *Naiad*. Enclosed is a Copy of Captain Young's Letter, which I transmit for their Lordships' Information.

*His Majesty's Ship Ethalion, Plymouth Sound, October 21, 1799.*

MY LORD, I Have the Pleasure to inform your Lordship, that on the 16th Instant, at Three P. M. in Latitude 44 Deg. 53 Min. Longitude 9 Deg. 53 Min. West, we discovered Three large Sail on the Weather Bow, evidently Men of War, steering S. E. with all Sails set. I immediately tacked and stood under easy Sail with an Intention to speak to the sternmost, or to follow them till Daylight, with a View to ascertain their Force. On a nearer Approach to the above Ship she made the private Signal; concluding from that the other Two Ships were Enemies; I made all possible Sail in Chace. At Daylight I found her to be His Majesty's Ship *Naiad*, and another Frigate in company, which I took to be the *Alcmene*, and Two large Frigates a-head. At Seven the *Naiad* made my Signal to pass the sternmost, and stand on for the headmost. At Nine A. M. being within random Shot of the sternmost, I fired a

few Guns in passing, which made her alter her Course. At Half-past Eleven the headmost Ship bore up athwart us, at the Distance of Half Muffet-Shot: by the Abilities and meritorious Conduct of the Officers, the steady Spirit and prompt Obedience to my Orders of the Seamen and Marines, with a well-directed Fire of Two Broadides from the Ethalion, and a running Fight of an Hour, exchanging Bow and Stern Chaces, the latter Part within Half Pistol-Shot, I had the Pleasure of seeing her haul down Spanish Colours to His Majesty's Ship under my Command.

She proves to be the Thetis Spanish Frigate, of Thirty-Six Guns, Twelve and Six Pounders, and Two Hundred and Fifty Men, commanded by Don Juan de Mendoza, from Vera Cruz bound to any Port in Spain she could fetch, with One Million Four Hundred and Eleven Thousand Five Hundred and Twenty-six Dollars, and a Quantity of Cocoa on board. I have the additional Satisfaction to acquaint your Lordship, that not a single Man is hurt on board the Ethalion. The other Spanish Frigate is called the Brigida, commanded by Don Antonio Pillou the same Force and Lading as the Thetis. The last Time I saw the Naiad, which was just before the Action took place, was nearly within Gun-Shot of her; and I have no Doubt of her being captured.

I beg Leave to recommend to your Lordship's Notice Lieutenant Pym, the senior Officer; the able Assistance I received from him on the Quarter-Deck, and his indefatigable Exertions in shifting the wounded Masts and Yards on board the Thetis, do him the utmost Credit. I cannot pass over in Silence the Praise due to Lieutenant Jauncey and Quilliam, for their great Attention to the Guns on the Main-Deck, nor that of Mr. Ducker the Master, and Lieutenant Peake of the Marines, for their Aid on the Quarter-Deck; the Warrant and Petty Officers, Seamen, and Marines, also merit your Lordship's Notice.

CAPTAIN DIGBY, of His Majesty's Ship Alcmena, is just arrived here; he came from Plymouth by Land, charged with Dispatches from Captain Pierrepont, of His Majesty's Ship Naiad, stating, with other Occurrences, the important Capture of the Santa Brigida, Spanish Frigate, Consort of the Thetis, (as stated in Captain Young's Letter of Yesterday's Date,) Copies of which you will here-with receive for their Lordships' Information, whom I sincerely congratulate upon this fortunate Event, which does so much Credit to Captain Pierrepont, and all the Officers, Seamen, and Marines of the different Ships under his Command, for the meritorious and persevering Conduct manifested upon this Occasion.

October 19, 1799.

MY LORD,

I Have great Pleasure in being able to acquaint you, that the Ships named in the Margin\* (which your Lordship has done me the Honor to put under my Orders) captured Yesterday Morning, the Spanish Frigate Santa Brigida, of Thirty-six Guns, and having on board Three Hundred Men, commanded by Don Antonio Pillou.

This Frigate, my Lord, in Company with another called the Thetis, left Vera Cruz on the 21st August last, and I had the good Fortune to fall in with them both, on the Evening of the 16th Instant, in Latitude 44 Deg. 1 Min. N. Long. 12 Deg. 35 Min. W. at Eight P. M. the Naiad then a single Ship, and to which I immediately gave Chase; before Midnight I discovered them to be Vessels belonging to the Enemy, and was joined by the Ethalion: when the Day broke I was also joined by the Alcmena, when the Triton was discovered far a-stern still, owing to the superior sailing of the latter Ship; after a Chase which lasted Thirty-two Hours, I set myself down as indebted for a most valuable Capture. The Two Frigates at Seven A. M. perceiving themselves not in a State to withstand our united Force, took different Routes, upon which I made the Ethalion's Signals to pass the sternmost Ship of the Enemy, as she at that Time took the lead in Point of sailing, and stand for and engage the Headmost Vessel, which was obeyed with that Alacrity by Captain Young that I make no Doubt but she has experienced a similar Fate to her Companion; but as the Santa Brigida made a determinate Push on a Southern Course, a Separation of course took place.

The latter Frigate of the Enemy having rounded Cape Finislerre on the Morning of the 18th Instant by her fast Sailing, about Five o'Clock her Commander shoved so very close to the Rocks of Monte Lora, that the Triton, who was first in Pursuit, (Captain Gore being regardless of every Thing but closing with the Enemy,) struck upon the said Rocks, going Seven Knots at the Time. I fear her damage is considerable; however she was soon off again, and commenced an animated Fire on the Enemy, as did Captain Digby, with an Officer-like Presence of Mind keeping in that Direction to cut off the Entrance of Port de Vidre. At Eight A. M. the Three Frigates closed with the Enemy amidst the Rocks of Commaruto, at the Entrance of Minus, when the Colours were hauled down, and we found ourselves all in foul Ground together. A fortunate Breeze sprang up from the Shore, and we were enabled to put the Ships Heads to the Sea, and began to lift Prisoners, when a Spanish Squadron consisting of Four large Ships, One with a broad Pendant, came out of Vigo with an Intention, I suppose, of retaking the Prize. This being the Opinion of Captain Gore and Digby also, every Exertion was made to secure the Prisoners and get the Ships under my Command ready to receive them; but on their perceiving my Determination they bore up and ran into Vigo. Light and variable Winds have kept me still in Sight of the Spanish Coast, which is To-day one continued Blaze, and as I was aware of another Squadron of Spanish Ships being in Company, have thought it my Duty

to keep all together for the Protection of the Prize, which is of immense Value, having on board One Million Four Hundred Thousand Dollars, independent of a Cargo of equal Estimation. My Companions in Chace, Captains Gore and Digby, make the most favourable Report of the Zeal and Perseverance of their respective Officers and Crews: and in Justice to the Officers and Ship's Company I have the Honor to command, I can only say, that their Anxiety to get alongside the Enemy's Frigates whilst alone, was equal to what it was afterwards when my Force became superior; and on that, as on all former Occasions, I profited by the able Assistance of J. H. Marshall, my First Lieutenant, to whom I have given Charge of the Prize. I inclose a List of Killed and Wounded on this Occasion either by Shot or Casualties.

I Have the Honor to inform you, that on the 11th Instant, the Wind then blowing a heavy Gale from the S. S. W. we discovered a strange Sail to Leeward, which we immediately pursued, and had the good Fortune to capture at Five P. M. after a Chace of One Hundred and Fourteen Miles in Nine Hours and a Half; she is called Le Bordelais, belonging to Bourdeaux, pierced for Twenty-six Guns, mounts Sixteen long Twelve-Pounders Brads, with Eight Thirty-six Pounder Brads Carronades, and Two Hundred and Two Men, out Nineteen Days from Passage, and had captured One American Ship loaded with Tobacco, and One Portuguese Ship from Cork with Provisions. She is a most beautiful new Ship, well calculated for His Majesty's Service; was the largest, and esteemed the fastest sailing Privateer out of France: I send a Copy of her Dimensions for your Information.

YOU will please to lay before my Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty Copy of a Letter from Captain Brenton, of the Speedy, relating the Destruction of Three Spanish Vessels he chased on the 3d Instant. It is but Justice to this Officer to observe, that his Exertions and Gallantry at all Opportunities do him the highest Honor.

*Speedy, at Sea, October 4, 1799.*

I Have the Honor to inform you, that Yesterday, whilst running through the Gut of Gibraltar in Sight of the British Convoy, I observed a Number of small Vessels coming out of Algieras, and concluded they were Spanish Gun Boats endeavouring to cut off some of the Merchant Ships; I therefore steered for them in order to keep them as far as possible from the Body of the Fleet, but upon our near Approach, perceiving they were Spanish Coasters (Eight in Number), under the Protection of a Cutter and Schooner, made all Sail in Chace, and soon separated the Two sternmost from the Body: they ran under the Guns of a Castle which opened a Fire upon us, and prevented our bringing them off. We continued the Pursuit of the others, passing under the Shot from Tariffe Castle, and at Four P. M. came up with Four more in a Bay to the Eastward of Cape Trafalgar; One immediately anchored near a Fort, and the other Three under a Castle which had One Gun mounted: as it blew very heavy from the Eastward, and being on a Lee-Shore, we could not go as near them as I could wish, but anchored within Four Cables Length, and bringing our Guns to bear upon the Castle (which appeared to be in a very ruinous State and did not return our Fire); and the Vessels, in a short Time, compelled the Spaniards to abandon them all, first cutting their Cables, by which Means they drove on Shore. I then sent Lieutenant Parker to endeavour to bring them off, and shortly after Mr. Marshall (the Master) to assist; or, if that was not practicable, to set them on fire; neither of which could be effected from the heavy Surf breaking entirely over them, and rendering the Approach dangerous to the Boats. They, however, boarded them, brought away some of their Fire-Arms, threw the Remainder overboard,



leaving them full of Water and complete Wrecks. One Vessel was laden with Brandy and Paper, One with English Manufactures, (Cutlery, Hardware, &c.) and the Third in Ballast.

I beg Leave to express the high Satisfaction I received from the Conduct of Lieutenant Parker in boarding the Vessels under the Walls of the Castle, while exposed to Musketry from the Beach; also of Mr. Ricketts, the Purser, who was a Volunteer upon that Service. The Attention of Mr. Marshall, the Master, to the Anchoring His Majesty's Sloop, and the able Assistance I have received from him upon former Occasions, renders him worthy of the fullest Confidence.

LEUTENANT-COLONEL CLINTON, Aide de Camp to His Royal Highness the Duke of York, arrived this Morning at the Office of the Right Honorable Henry Dundas, with Dispatches, of which the following are Copies.

Head-Quarters, Schagen Brug,  
October 20, 1799.

S I R,

IN my late Communications I have represented to you the Circumstances under which I found it expedient to withdraw the Army from its forward Position in Front of Alkmaer, within that which it at present occupies, and which I trust will have appeared to His Majesty sufficient to warrant the Measure.

The Season of the Year which has already assumed here the Aspect of Winter, gave me, from Day to Day, additional Reason to apprehend that any Attempt towards a Prosecution of the Campaign in this Country could not be attended with decisive Advantages, whilst the Impossibility of covering the Troops in the narrow District of the Country in our Possession during the Winter, and the precarious State of Supplies to be expected in that Season, added to the Conviction I felt that the most advisable Measure to be pursued, was to remove with the Army to England, an Operation

which, although it might have exposed the Army to some Loss in its Execution, I judged in my Mind preferable to any other which could be adopted.

Under this Impression, and considering that serious Loss might ensue from Delay, I have been induced to conclude an Armistice, in conjunction with Vice-Admiral Mitchell, with General Brune, commanding the French and Batavian Armies, of which the Conditions are inclosed, and which, although they provide for delivering up a large Number of Prisoners of War, now in our Hands, yet I trust will not be thought by His Majesty an inadequate Compensation for many valuable Lives which must have been lost, after the Object which has hitherto directed them no longer promised Success; and when the only Means which presented themselves of ensuring a secure Retreat were those of resorting to the destructive Measure of Inundation from the Sea, which, as it would have involved the Inhabitants of the Northern Part of this Province in Ruin for a Series of Years, must have been highly repugnant to the Feelings, as well as contrary to the Character and Practice of the British Nation.

I rest confident that the Motives which I have here detailed will excuse me to his Majesty for having acted without waiting for previous Instructions from Home, and that I shall have the Satisfaction of knowing that my Conduct in this Respect has met with his Majesty's gracious Approbation.

#### TRANSLATION.

ARTICLES agreed upon between Major-General Knox, duly authorized by His Royal Highness the Duke of York, Commander in Chief of the Combined English and Russian Army, and Citizen Rosolant, General of Brigade and Adjutant-General, duly authorized by Citizen Brune, General and Commander in Chief of the French and Batavian Army.

Art. I. From the Date of this Convention all Hostilities shall cease between the Two Armies.

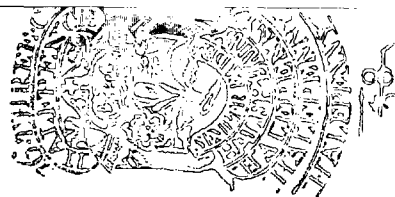
Art. II. The Line of Demarcation between the said Armies, shall be the Line of their respective Out-Posts as they now exist.

Art. III. The Continuation of all Works Offensive and Defensive shall be suspended on both Sides; and no new ones shall be undertaken.

Art. IV. The mounted Batteries taken Possession of at the Helder, or at other Positions within the Line, now occupied by the Combined English and Russian Army, shall be restored in the State in which they were taken, or (in case of Improvement) in their present State, and all the Dutch Artillery taken therein shall be preserved.

Art. V. The Combined English and Russian Army shall embark as soon as possible, and shall evacuate the Territory, Coasts, Islands, and internal Navigation of the Dutch Republic, by the 30th of November 1799, without committing any Devastation, by Inundations, cutting the Dykes, or other ways injuring the Sources of Navigation.





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Art. VI. Any Ships of War or other Vessels which may arrive with Reinforcements for the Combined British and Russian Army, shall not land the same, and shall be sent away as soon as possible.

Art. VII. General Bruné shall be at Liberty to send an Officer within the Lines of the Zuyp and to the Helder, to report to him the State of the Batteries and the Progress of the Embarkation. His Royal Highness the Duke of York shall be equally at Liberty to send an Officer within the French and Batavian Lines, to satisfy himself that no new Works are carried on on their Side. An Officer of Rank and Distinction shall be sent from each Army respectively, to guarantee the Execution of this Convention.

Art. VIII. Eight Thousand Prisoners of War, French and Batavians, taken before the present Campaign, and now detained in England, shall be restored without Conditions to their respective Countries. The Proportion and the Choice of such Prisoners for each, to be determined between the Two Republics. Major-General Knox shall remain with the French Army to guarantee the Execution of this Article.

Art. IX. The Cartel agreed upon between the Two Armies for the Exchange of the Prisoners taken during the present Campaign, shall continue in full Force till it shall be carried into complete Execution; and it is further agreed that the Dutch Admiral De Winter shall be considered as exchanged.

Concluded at Alkmaar, the 18th of October, 1799, by the undersigned General Officers, furnished with full Powers to this Effect.
