The KING's Moft Excellent Majefty in Council. WHEREAS His Majefty was gracioufly pleafed, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Twenty-fixth Day of December, One thousand feven hundred and ninety-two, to promife and declare, that the Bounties of Five Pounds for every Able Seaman, and Two Pounds Ten Shillings every Able Seaman, and Two Pounds Ten Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, fit for His Majefty's Service, fhould be paid in the Manner thereby di-rected to every fuch Able and Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who fhould, on or before the Twenty-eighth Day of February then following, enter themlelves to ferve in His Majefty's Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majefty's Ships or Veffels, or Officers em-ployed on Shore for raifing Men for the Service of the Royal Navy: And whereas His Majefty was alfo gracioufly pleafed, by his faid Proclama-tion, to declare, that all Able-bodied Landmen, not above the Age of Thirty-five nor under the Age above the Age of Thirty-five nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should fo enter themselves as aforefaid, should receive the Sum of Thirty Shillings each Man, as His Majefty's Royal Bounty: And whereas His Majefty was also gracioully pleafed, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Sixteenth Day of the faid Month of February, One thoufand feven hundred and ninety-three, to promife and declare, that a Reward of Twenty Shillings for every Able and Ordinary Seaman, fit. to ferve on board His Majesty's Ships, should be paid to any Person who should discover any Seaman or Seamen who might conceal him or themfelves, fo that fuch Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's Service, on or before the Thirtieth Day of April then next, by any of His Majefty's Sea Officers appointed to raife Men on Shore, or by the Captains or Commanders of any of His Majefty's Ships or Veffels in the Ports or on the Coalts of this Kingdom: And whereas the Time limited by the faid Proclamations for Payment of the faid Bounties and Reward hath been prolonged and extended to the Thirty-first Day of this instant

## PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament, paffed in the Twenty-fixth Year of His late Ma-jefty's Reign, intituled "An Act to oblige Ships "in the set of the set whatfoever, coming or imported into any Port or Place within Great Britain, or any of the Ifles before-mentioned, from any Place from whence His Majesty, his Heirs or Successfors, by and with the Advice of his or their Privy Council, shall judge it probable that the Infection may be brought, shall be obliged to make their Quarantine in fuch Place and Places, for fuch Time, and in fuch Manner as has been, or shall from Time to Time be directed by His Majefty, his Heirs or Succeffors, by his or their Order or Orders made in his or their Privy Council, and notified by Proclamation, or published in the London Gazette: And that until such Ships, Vef-fels, Perfons, Goods, and Merchandizes shall have respectively performed and be discharged from such Quarantine, no fuch Perfons, Goods, or Merchan-dizes, or any of them, shall come or be brought on Shore, or go or be put on board any other Ship or

, Veffel, in any Place within His Majelty's Dominions, unlefs in fuch Manner, and in fuch Cafes, and by fuch Licence as shall be directed or permitted by fuch Order or Orders made by His Majefty, his Heirs or Successors, in Council as aforefaid: And that all fuch Ships and Veffels, and the Perfons or Goods coming or imported in, or going or being put on board the fame; and all Ships Veffels, Boats, and Perfons receiving any Goods or Perfons out of the fame, shall be fubject to fuch Orders, Rules, and Directions concerning Quarantine, and the Prevention of Infection, as have been or shall be made by His Majesty, his Heirs and Succeffors, in Council, and notified by Proclamation, or published in the London Gazette as afore-mentioned, under fuch Pains and Penalties as are inflicted by the faid Act: And whereas by an Act, paffed in the Thirty-eighth Year of His prefent Majefty, intituled An Act to amend Two Acts, made in the Twenty-fixth Year of King George George the Second, and the Twenty-eighth Year of His present Majesty, respecting the Performance of Quarantine, &c. it is enacted, that the fail Acts passed in the Twenty-fixth Year of His late Ma-jesty's Reign, and the Twenty-eighth Year of His present Majesty's Reign, and all and every other Acts or Act of Parliament then in Force in any Way regarding the Performance of Quarantine, shall be extended to all fuch Diseafes or Distempers as His Majesty, by and with the Advice of his Privy Council, shall judge to be probably infectious, and shall fo declare by Order in Council, notified by Proclamation, or published in the London Gazette : And whereas Information has been received of a malignant Difeafe exifting in the City of Philadelphia, in the State of Penufylvania, and in New York, within the United States of America, and that the fame is probably infectious; His Majefty, by and with the Advice of his Privy Council, doth deem it expedient to declare, and by this Order doth declare, that the faid malignant Difeafe is probably infectious, within the Intent and Meaning of the faid Act of the Thirty-eighth Year of His Majefty's Reign, and doth order, and it is hereby ordered, that all Ships, Veffels, Perfons, Goods, and Merchandizes now arrived, or that shall hereafter arrive in any Port of this Kingdom, or the Ifles of Guernfey, Jerfey, Alderney, Sark, or Man, from Philadelphia and New York, or any Port within the State of Pennfylvania, or any Port within the Province of New York, do make their Quarantine for Fourteen Days, which is to commence and be computed from the Day each Ship or Veffel shall come to Anchor in the Place ap pointed for the Performance of Quarantine, and not before.

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That the Places hereinafter named shall be and are hereby appointed to be the Places wherein fuch Ships or Veffels (not having the Infection on board) fhall refpectively perform Quarantine, that is to fay; all Ships or Venels which are or thall be bound to the Port of London, or any Member, Creek, or other Parts thereof, or to the River Thames or Medway, shall perform their Quarantine in Stand-gate Creek ; all Ships or Veffels which are or shall be bound to the Ports of Ipswich, Yarmonth, Lynn, Bofton, Hull, Newcaftle, or Berwick upon

thereof, or other Place therein, shall perform their Quarantine in Whitebooth Road, between Hull and Grimíby; all Ships or Veffels which are or shall be bound to the Ports of Carlifle and Chefter, or either of them, or any Member or Creek thereof, or other Place therein, or to any Part of the Isle of Man, shall perform their Quarantine in a Place called Highlake, near Liverpool, at the West End thereof; all Ships or Vessels which are or shall be bound to the Ports of Milford, Cardiff, Gloucefter, Briftol, Bridgewater, or any of them, or any Member or Creek of them, or any of them, or to Padftow or St. Ive's, being Members of the Port of Plymouth, or to Ilfracombe or Barnstaple, being Members of the Port of Exeter, or to any other Place within the faid Ports of Milford, Cardiff, Gloucefter, Briltol, or Bridgewater, or within the faid Members or Creeks, fhall perform their Quarantine in Kingroad and Porfhute Pill; all Ships or Vessels which are or shall be bound to the Ports of Plymouth, except fuch Parts thereof as have been hereinbefore-mentioned, or to the Port of Exeter, except fuch Parts thereof as have been hereinbefore-mentioned, or to the Port of Pool, or any of the Members or Creeks, or other Places within the faid Ports of Plymouth, Exeter, and Pool, except as hereinbefore excepted; or to Falmouth, a Member of the Port of Plymouth, or any Creek thereof, or any other Place therein, shall perform their Quarantine in a Place called St. Ive's Pool, within the Mouth of the Harbour of Falmouth; all Ships or Veffels which are or fhall be bound to the Ports of Southampton, Chichefter, Sandwich, or any of them, or any of the Members or Creeks thereof, or any of them, or any other Place within the fame, shall perform their Quarantine at a Place called the Motherbank near Portimouth ; all Ships or Veffels which are or fhall be bound to the Eaftern Coaft of Scotland, comprehending the Ports of Leith, Borrowitonefs, Alloa, Dunbar, Kirkaldy, Anftruther, Prefton Pans, Dundee, Perth, Mon-trofe, and Aberdeen, or to any Member, Creek, or other Parts thereof, fhall perform their Quarantine in Inverkeithing Bay; all Ships or Veffels which are or fhall be bound to the Weftern Ports of Scotland, comprehending the Ports of Port Glafgow, Greenock, Irvine, Campbeltown, Oban, Rothfay, Fort-William, Air, Port-Patrick, Stranraer, and Wigtown, or to Member, Creek, or other Parts thereof, shall perform their Quarantine at Lamlash in the Island of Arran; all Ships or Vessels which are or shall be bound to the Northern Ports of Scotland, comprehending the Ports of Invernefs, Zetland, Orkney, Caithness, and Stornaway, or to any Member, Creek, or other Parts thereof, shall perform their Quarantine in Cromarty Bay in the Murray Firth; all Ships or Veffels which are or shall be bound to the South Well Ports of Scotland, comprehending the Ports of Dumfries and Kircudbright, or to any Member, Creek, or other Parts thereof, thall perform their Quarantine at Carflhorn, at the Mouth of the River Nith; all Ships or Veffels which are or thall be bound to the Isle of Jerley, or any Part thereof, shall per-form their Quarantine at a certain Place on the Coaft of the faid Island, called Belle Croute, or at fome Place hereinbefore appointed for Perform-Tweed, or any of them, or any Member or Creek | ance of Quarantine on the Coaft of England; and

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all Ships or Veffels which are or shall be bound to the Islands of Guernfey, Sark, or Alderney, or either of them, or any Part of them, or any of them, shall perform their Quarantine in a Place near the Island of Guernfey, called the Little Road, or at fome Place hereinbefore appointed for Performance of Quarantine on the Coaft of England.

Performance of Quarantine on the Coaft of England. That no Pilot shall go on board any Ship or Vessel, obliged to perform Quarantine, in order to conduct the fame into any Port or Place, but shall perform fuch Service in some other Boat or Vessel, which Boat or Vessel shall keep as much to the Windward of the Ship or Vessel to the Perfon shall go on board such Ship or Vessel, such to the Windward of the Ship or Vessel, such to the Windward of the Ship or Vessel, such to the Perfon shall perform Quarantine in like Manner as any Perfon coming in such Ship or Vessel shall be obliged to perform the fame.

That all Goods, Wares, and Merchandizes liable to Quarantine as aforefaid fhall be opened, unpacked, and aired, unlefs His Majefty fhall think fit, by his Order in Council, to direct otherwife, and fo remain a Week, other than Hemp and Flax, Paper, or Books, Silk, raw, thrown, or wrought; Linen, Cotton Wool, Cotton Yarn, or manufactured; Wool, raw, or anywife wrought; Feathers, Grogram, or Mohair Yarn; Human Hair, Goats Hair, Carmenia Wool, Carpets, Camblets, Burdets, or other Manufactures of Silk and Cotton; Kid Skins, and Oil in Chefts; Thread Stockings; all Goods packed with Straw or Cotton; Straw Hats and Brufhes; Matting and Artificial Flowers; which Goods and Merchandizes fo as aforefaid enumerated are to be opened, unpacked, and aired, unlefs His Majefty fhall think fit, by his Order in Council, to direct otherwife, and fo remain for the Space of a Fortnight.

That all Goods imported by fuch Ships and Veffels respectively shall be aired in the following Places: that is to fay, All fuch Goods as shall be imported to the Port of London, or any Member, Creek, or other Parts thereof, or to the River Thames or Medway, shall be aired in Standgate Creek; all fuch Goods as shall be imported to the Ports of Ipfwich, Yarmouth, Lynn, Bofton, Hell, New-caftle, or Berwick-upon-Tweed, or any of them, or any Member or Creek thereof, or other Place therein, fhall be aired in Whitebooth Road, between Hull and Grimfby; all fuch Goods as shall be imported to the Ports of Carlifle and Chefter, or either of them, or any Member or Creek thereof, or any other Place therein, or to any Part of the Isle of Man, shall be aired in a Place called Highlake near Liverpool, at the Weft End thereof; all fuch Goods as fhall be imported to the Ports of Milford, Cardiar, Gloucefter, Briftol, Bridgewater, or any of them, or any Member or Creek of them, or any of them, or to Paditow or St. Ives, being Members of the Port of Plymouth, or to Ilfracombe or Barndaple, being Members of the Port of Exeter, or to any other Place within the faid Ports of Milford, Cardiff, Gloucefter, Briftol, or Bridgewater, or within the faid Members or Creeks, shall be aired in Kingroad and Porfhute Pill; all fuch Goods as fhall be imported to the Port of Plymouth, except fuch Parts thereof as have been hereinbefore mentioned, or to the Port of Excter, except fuch Parts thereof as have been hereinbefore mentioned, or to the Port of

Pool, or any of the Members or Creeks, or other Places within the faid Ports of Plymouth, Excter, and Pool, except as before excepted, or to Fal-mouth, a Member of the Port of Plymouth, or any Creek thereof, or any other Place therein, fhall be aired in a Place called St. Ive's Pool, within the Mouth of the Harbour of Falmouth; all fuch Goods as fhall be imported to the Ports of Southampton, Chichefter, Sandwich, or any of them, or any of the Members or Creeks thereof, or of any of them, or any other Place within the fame; shall be aired at a Place called the Motherbank near Portfmouth; all fuch Goods as shall be imported to the Eastern Coast of Scotland, comprehending the Ports of Leith Borrowftonefs, Alloa, Dunbar, Kirkaldy, Anftru-ther, Prefton Pans, Dundee, Perth, Montrofe, and Aberdeen, or to any Member, Creek, or other Parts thereof, fhall be aired in Inverkeithing Bay; all fuch Goods as shall be imported to the Western Ports of Scotland, comprehending the Ports of Port Glafgow, Greenock, Irvine, Campbeltown, Oban, Rothfay, Fort William, Air, Port Patrick, Stran-raer, and Wigtown, or to any Member, Creek, or other Parts thereof, fhall be aired at Lamlash in the Island of Arran; all fuch Goods as shall be imported to the Northern Ports of Scotland, compre-hending the Ports of Inverness, Zetland, Orkney; Caithnefs, and Stornaway, or to any Member, Creek, or other Parts thereof, shall be aired in Cromarty Bay in the Murray Firth; all such Goods as shall be imported to the South-West Ports of Scotland, comprehending the Ports of Dumfries and Kirk-cudbright, or to any Member, Creek, or other Parts thereof, shall be aired at Carithorn at the Mouth of the River Nith; all fuch Goods as shall be imported to the Isle of Jersey, or any Part thereof, shall be aired at a certain Place on the Coaft of the faid Island, called Belle Croute, or at fuch Place hereinbefore appointed for Per-formance of Quarantine on the Coast of England; where the Ships, in which fuch Goods are imported, shall respectively perform their Quarantine; and all fuch Goods, as fhall be imported to the Iflands of Guernfey, Sark, or Alderney, or either of them, or any Part of them, or any of them, thall be aired in a Place near the Ifland of Guernfey, called the Little Road, or at fuch Place hereinbefore appointed for Performance of Quarantine on the Coaft of England, where the Ships in which fuch Goods are imported shall respectively perform their Quarantine.

That whatfoever Ship or Perfon shall receive any Men or Goods from on board any Ship or Veffel under Quarantine shall be compelled to perform the like Quarantine.

That fuch Perlons, as after Quarantine performed, fhall be employed in the Hold of any Ship or Veffel for the taking any Goods, not liable to retain Infection from the Goods and Merchandizes before enumerated, fhall be obliged to perform a new Quarantine.

That the Captains of every of His Majefty's Ships of War, who fhall meet any fuch Ship or Vellel coming to any of the Ports of Great Britain, or of the Ifles of Gueinfey, Jerfey, Alderney, Sark, or Man, fhall take due Care to prevent the landing any Goods, Seamen, or Paffengers from on board the fame until they fhall be put under the Direction of the Odicers of His Majefty's Cuftoms:

And the Lords Commiffioners of His Majefty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master-General and the Reft of the principal Officers of the Ord-nance, His Majefty's Secretary at War, and the Governors or Commanders in Chief, for the Time being, of the faid respective Isles of Jersey, Guernfey, Alderney, Sark, and Man, are to give the ne-ceffary Directions herein as to them may refpec-tively appertain. <sup>66</sup> of the next Selfion of Parliament," it is enacted, that from and after the paffing of the faid Act, and until the Expiration of Six Weeks from the Commencement of the then next Seffion of Parliament, it should be lawful for His Majetty, his Heirs, and Succeffors, and he and they were thereby authorized, with the Advice of his or their Privy Council, whatever might be the general Average Price of any of the faid Sorts of Corn, or of Oatmeal, in England or Scotland respectively, from Time to Time, when, and as often as the fame fhould be judged expcdient, to prohibit generally, for a limited Time, the Exportation from England and Scotland refpec-tively, of any British or Foreign Wheat, Rye, Barley, Beer, or Bigg, Peafe, Beans, Oats, or any Meal, or Flour, or Bread, Biscuit, or Malt made thereof, or any Indian Corn, or Maize, or Meal, or Flour, made thereof; and to permit generally the Im-portation into England or Scotland respectively, of any Foreign Com or other Articles as aforefaid, in any British Ship or Vessel, or in any other Ship or Veffel belonging to Perfons of any Kingdom or State in Amity with His Majelty, and navigated in any Manner whatever, without Payment of any Duty whatfoever; and also the taking out of Ware-houfe for Home Confumption, of any fuch Foreign Corn, or other Articles as aforefaid, without Pay-ment of any Duty whatfoever; and in like Man-ner to recall fuch Prohibition or Permiffion, either

That the Commissioners and other Officers of in Part or in the Whole, if Circumstances should His Majelty's Customs do use their utmost Dili- appear so to require, any Thing in any Act, or Part of any Act to the contrary notwithstanding, fubject, neverthelefs, to the Provifoes therein mentioned and hereinafter contained; which Act, by an Act of the prefent Seffion of Parliament, hath been continued till the Thirtieth Day of September One thousand eight hundred; His Majesty therefore, by and with the Advice of his Privy Council, and in purfuance of the Powers vefted in him by the faid Act, has thought fit to order, and it is hereby ordered, that from and after the Date of this prefent Order, and until the Thirtieth Day of September One thousand eight hundred, no Person or Perfons whatfoever shall export or shall load, or lay on board any Ship or other Vessel, with the Intent to export from any Port or Place of this Kingdom, any Wheat, Rye, Barley, Beer, or Bigg, Peale, Beans, Oats, or any Meal, or Flour, or Bread, Bifcuit, or Malt made thereof, or any Indian Corn, or Maize, or Meal or Flour made thereof :

His Majefty, neverthelefs, by the Advice aforefaid, hath thought fit to order, and it is hereby ordered, that nothing herein contained shall extendor be conftrued to extend, to prohibit the Exporta, tion from this Kingdom of any Foreign Corn, or Meal or Flour, that shall have been imported and warehoused in the Manner and on the Conditions mentioned in an Act passed in the Thirty-first Year of His prefent Majefty's Reign, intituled 44 An " Act for regulating the Importation and Exporta-tion of Corn, and the Payment of the Duty on " Foreign Corn imported, and of the Bounty on "British Corn exported," and shall not have been taken out of such Warehouse for Home Confumption, nor to prevent the carrying Coaftwife, or car-rying out, or the Exportation of the feveral Sorts. of Corn or other Articles as aforefaid from this Kingdom, for any of the Purpofes mentioned in the faid Act passed in the Thirty-first Year of the Reign of His prefent Majesty, or an Act passed in the Thirty-third Year of His prefent Majesty's Reign, for amending the last-mentioned Act or either of them, in like Manner, and in the same Proportions and Quantities, and from and to the fame Ports and Places, as is allowed by the faid Two Acts paffed in the Thirty-first and Thirty-third Years of His prefent Majefty's Reign, or either of them, at fuch. Times as any of the leveral Sorts of Corn or other. Articles as aforefaid are prohibited to be exported, in confequence of the Provisions contained in the Two last-mentioned Acts, fubject to the like Securities, Conditions, Regulations, and Reftrictions, Forfeitures, and Penalties as are by the faid. Two. Acts, or by either of them, in any fuch Cafe required and impofed.

And His Majefty, by and with the Advice aforefaid,. hath thought fit further to order, and it is hereby ordered, that from and after the Date of this prefent Order, and until the Thirtieth Day of September One thousand eight hundred, it shall be lawful to import into any Port or Place of this Kingdom any Foreign Corn, or other Articles as aforefaid, in any British Ship or Vessel, or in any other Ship or Vessel fel belonging to Perfons of any Kingdom or State in Amity with His Majesty, and navigated in any Manner whatever, without Payment of any Duty. whatfoever; and alfo to take out of. Warehoufe, for Home Confumption, any fuch Foreign Corn, or

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other Articles as aforefaid, without Payment of any Duty what foever.

And whereas by the faid Act, paffed in the laft Seffion of Parliament, it was further enacted, that from and after the paffing of the faid Act, and until the Expiration of Six Weeks from the Commencement of the then next Selfion of Parliament, it should be lawful for His Majesty, his Heirs, and Succeffors, and he and they were thereby autho-rized, with the Advice of his or their Privy Council, from Time to Time, when and as often as the fame shall be judged expedient, to permit generally, for a limited Time, the Importation into Great Britain, from any Port or Place whatever, in any British Ship or Vessel, or in any other Ship or Veffel belonging to Perfons of any Kingdom or State in Amity with His Majefty, and navigated in any Manner whatever, any Beans called Kidney or French Beans, Tares, Lentiles, Callivances, and all other Sorts of Pulfe, and alfo Bulls, Cows, Oxen, Calves, Sheep, Lambs, and Swine, Beef, Pork, Mutton, Veal, and Lamb, whether falted or otherwife, Bacon, Hams, Tongues, Butter, Cheefe, Po-tatoes, Rice, Sago, Sago Powder, Tapioca, Ver-micelli, Millet Sced, Poultry, Fowls, Eggs, Game, and Sour Crout, without the Payment of any Duty whatever, at all Times before the faid Expiration of Six Weeks from the Commencement of the then next Seffion of Parliament, and in like Manner to recall fuch Permiffion, either in Part or in Whole, (if Circumstances should feems fo to require, ) any Thing in any Act or Acts of Parliament to the contrary thereof in anywife notwithstanding, subject, nevertheless, to the Provisoes therein mentioned, and hereinafter contained ; which Act, by an Act passed in the prefent Seffion of Parliament, hath been continued, as aforefaid, until the Thirticth Day of September One thousand cight hundred : His Majesty thereupon, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, and in pursuance of the Powers vested in him by the faid Acts, has thought fit to order, and it is hereby ordered, that from and after the Date of this prefent Order, and until the Thirtieth Day of September One thousand eight hundred, it shall be law-ful to import into any Port or Place of this Kingdom any of the Articles aforefaid, in any British Ship or Veffel, or in any other Ship or Veffel be-longing to Perfons of any Kingdom or State in Amity with His Majefly, and navigated in any Manner whatever, without Payment of any Duty whatfoever. Have the Pleafure to inform your Lordship, that on the 16th Inftant, at Three P. M. in Latitude 44 Deg. 53 Min. Longitude 9 Deg. 53 Min. Weft, we difcovered Three large Sail on the Weather Bow, evidently Men of War, fleering S. E. with all Sails fet. I immediately tacked and flood under eafy Sail with an Intention to fpeak to the fternmoft, or to follow them till Daylight, with a View to afcer-On a nearer Approach to the tain their Force. above Ship she made the private Signal ; concluding from that the other Two Ships were Enemies, I made all possible Sail in Chace. At Daylight I found her to be His Majesty's Ship Naiad, and another Frigate in company, which I took to be the Alcmene, and Two large Frigates a head. At Seven the Naiad made my Signal to pass the sternmost, VV America, has been furrendered to His Ma-jefty's Arms, and the Territory and Forts in the being within random Shot of the fternmoft, I fired a

few Guns in palling, which made her alter her Course. At Half-past Eleven the headmost Ship bore up athwart us, at the Diffance of Half Mul-ket-Shot: by the Abilities and meritorious Conduct of the Officers, the steady Spirit and prompt Obedience to my Orders of the Seamen and Ma-rines, with a well-directed Fire of Two Broadfides from the Ethalion, and a running Fight of an Hour, exchanging Bow and Stern Chaces, the latter Part within Half Piftol-Shot, I had the Pleafure of feeing her haul down Spanish Colours to His Majesty's Ship under my Command.

She proves to be the Thetis Spanish Frigate, of Thirty-Six Guns, Twelve and Six Pounders, and Two Hundred and Fifty Men, commanded by Don Juan de Mendoza, from Vera Cruz bound to any Port in Spain she could fetch, with One Million Four Hundred and Eleven Thousand Five Hundred and Twenty-fix Dollars, and a Quantity of Cocoaon board. I have the additional Satisfaction to acquaint your Lordship, that not a single Man is hurt on board the Ethalion. The other Spanish Frigate is called the Brigida, commanded by Don Antonio Pillou the fame Force and Lading as the Thetis. The laft Time I faw the Naiad, which was just before the Action took place, was nearly within Gun-Shot of her ; and I have no Doubt of her being captured.

I beg Leave to recommend to your Lordship's Notice Lieutenant Pym, the senior Officer; the able Affiftance I received from him on the Quarter-Deck, and his indefatigable Exertions in thifting the wounded Masts and Yards on board the Thetis, do him the utmost Credit. I cannot pass over in Silence the Praife due to Lieutenant Jauncey and Quilliam, for their great Attention to the Guns on the Main-Deck, nor that of Mr. Ducker the Mafter, and Lieutenant Peake of the Marines, for their Aid on the Quarter-Deck ; the Warrant and Petty Officers, Seamen, and Marines, also merit your Lordship's Notice.

Naiad, off Cape Finiflerre, OBober 19, 1799.

Have great Pleafure in being able to acquaint you, that the Ships named in the Margin \* (which your Lordhip has done me the Margin " (which your Lordhip has done me the Honor to put under my Orders) captured Yellerday Morn-ing, the Spanish Frigate Sauta Brigida, of Thirty-tix Guns, and having on board Three Hundred Men, commanded by Don Antonio Fillou.

This Frigate, my Lord, in Company with an-other called the Thetis, left Vera Cruz on the 21ft August last, and I had the good Fortune to fall in with them both, on the Evening of the 16th Infant, in Latitude 44 Deg. 1 Min. N. Long. 12 Deg. 35 Min. W. at Eight P. M. the Naiad then a fingle Ship, and to which I immediately gave Chace; before Midnight I difcovered them to be Veffels belonging to the Enemy, and was joined by the Ethalion: when the Day broke I was also joined by the Alemene, when the Triton was difcovered far a-flern still, owing to the superior failing of the latter Ship; after a Chace which lafted Thirtytwo Hours, I fet myfelf down as indebted for a most valuable Capture. The Two Frigates at Seven A. M. perceiving themfelves not in a State to with-fland our united Force, took different Routes, upon which I made the Ethalion's Signals to pais the fternmoft Ship of the Enemy, as fhe at that Time took the lead in Point of failing, and fand for and engage the Headmost Vessel, which was obeyed with that Alacrity by Captain Young that I make no Doubt but the has experienced a fimilar Fate to her Companion; but as the Santa Brigida made a determinate Push on a Southern Course, a Separation of courfe took place.

The latter Frigate of the Enemy having rounded Cape Finisterre on the Morning of the 18th Instant by her faft Sailing, about Five o'Clock her Commander thoved to very close to the Rocks of Monte Lora, that the Triton, who was first in Purfuit, (Captain Gore being regardlele of every Thing but clofing with the Enemy,) firuck upon the faid Rocks, going Seven Knots at the Time. I fear her damage is confiderable; however file was foon off ageir, and commenced an animated Fire on the Enemy, as did Captain Digby, with an Officer-like Prefence of Mind keeping in that Direction to cut off the Extrance of Port de Vidre. At Eight A. M. the Three Frigates closed with the Enemy midd the Back of Comparison of the Free amidf the Rochs of Commarunto, at the Entrance of Musus, when the Colours were hauled down, and we found ourfelves all in foul Ground together. A fortunate Breeze przeg up from the Shore, and we were cuzbled to put the Ships Heads to the Sea, and began to full Priloners, when a Spanish Squadron combiling of Four large Ships, One with a broad Pendant, came out of Vigo with an Inten-tion, I formate, of refacing the Frize. This being the Opicions of Captain Gore and Digby allo, every Exertion was made to fecure the Prifoners and get the Shipe under my Command ready to receive them; but on their perceiving my Determination' they have up and ma inth Vigo. Light and variable Winds have kept me fill in Sight of the Spanish' Coaft, which is To-day one continued Blaze, and as I was aware of another Squadron of Spanifly Ships being in Corunta, have thought it my Duty

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to keep all together for the Protection of the Prize, which is of immenfe Value, having on board One Million Four Hundred Thousand Dollars, inde-pendent of a Cargo of equal Effimation. My Companions in Chace, Captains Gore and Digby, make the most favourable Report of the Zeal and Perfeverance of their respective Officers and Crews : and in Juffice to the Officers and Ship's Company I have the Honor to command; I can only fay, that their Anxiety to get alongfide the Enemy's Fri-gates whilft alone, was equal to what it was after-wards when my Force became fuperior; and on that, as on all former Occafions, I profited by the able Affistance of J. H. Marshall, my First Lieutenant, to whom I have given Charge of the Prize. I inclose a Lift of Killed and Wounded on this Occafion either by Shot or Cafualties.

M. after a Chace of One Hundred and Fourteen Miles in Nine Hours and a Half; she is called Le Bordelais, belonging to Bourdeaux, pierced for Twenty fix Guns, mounts Sixteen long Twelve-Pounders Brass, with Eight Thirty-fix Pounder Brafs Carronades, and Two Hundred and Two Men, out Nineteen Days from Paffage, and had captured One American Ship loaded with Tobacco, and One Portuguele Ship from Cork with Provisions. She is a most beautiful new Ship, well calculated for His Majefty's Service; was the largeft, and effeemed the faffeft fail-ing Privateer out of France: I fend a Copy of her Dimensions for your Information.

It is but Juffice to this Officer to obferve, that his Exertions and Gallastry at all Opportunities do him the highest Hovor.

SIR, Speedy, at Sea, Ollober 4, 1799. Have the Honor to inform you, that Yelterday, I whilft running through the Gut of Gibraltar in Sight of the British Convoy, I observed a Number of fmall Veffels coming out of Algeliras, and concluded they were Spanish Gun Boats endeavouring to cut off some of the Merchant Ships; I therefore fteered for them in order to leep them as far as poffible from the Body of the Fleet, but upon poincie from the Body of the Fleet, but upon our near Approach, perceiving they were Spanish Coasters (Eight in Number), under the Protection of a Cutter and Schooner, made all Sail in Chace, and foon feparated the Two flernmost from the Body: they ran under the Guns of a Castle which opened a Fire upon us, and prevented our bringing them off. We continued the Purfuit of bringing them off. We continued the Puriuit of the others, paffing under the Shot from Tariffe Caftle, and at Four P. M. came up with Four more in a Bay to the Eaftward of Cape Trafalguar; One immediately anchored near a Fort, and the other Three under a Caffle which had One Gun mounted : as it blew very heavy from the Eaftward; and being on a Lee-Shore, we could not go as near them as I could wifh, but anchored within Four Cables Length, and bringing our Guns to bear upon the Caftle (which appeared to be in a very ruinous State and did not return our Fire); and the Veffels, in a fhort Time, compelled the Spaniards to abandon them all, first cutting their Cables, by which Means they drove on Shore. I then fent Lieutenant Parker to endeavour to bring them off, and shortly after Mr. Marshall (the Master) to assist; or, if that was not practicable, to fet them on Fire; neither of which could be effected from the heavy Surf breaking entirely over them, and rendering the Approach dangerous to the Boats. They, however, boarded them, brought away fome of their Fire-Arms, threw the Remainder overboard,

leaving them full of Water and complete Wrecks. One Veffel was laden with Brandy and Paper, One with English Manufactures, (Cutlery, Hardware, &c.) and the Third in Ballast.

I beg Leave to express the high Satisfaction I received from the Conduct of Lieutenant Parker in boarding the Veffels under the Walls of the Caftle, while exposed to Musketry from the Beach ; also of Mr. Ricketts, the Purfer, who was a Volunteer upon that Service. The Attention of Mr. Mar-fhall, the Mafter, to the Anchoring His Majefty's Sloop, and the able Affiltance I have received from him upon former Occasions, renders him worthy of the fullest Confidence.

## Head-Quarters, Schagen Brug,

SIR, October 20, 1799. IN my late Communications I have reprefented to you the Circumstances under which I found it expedient to withdraw the Army from its forward Position in Front of Alkmaer, within that which it at prefent occupies, and which I truft will have appeared to His Majefty fufficient to warrant the Measure.

The Seafon of the Year which has already affumed here the Aspect of Winter, gave me, from Day to Day, additional Reason to apprehend that any Attempt towards a Profecution of the Campaign in this Country could not be attended with decifive Advantages, whilft the Impossibility of co-vering the Troops in the narrow Diftrict of the Country in our Possession during the Winter, and the precarious State of Supplies to be expected in that Seafon, added to the Conviction I felt that the most advisable Measure to be pursued, was to remove with the Army to England, an Operation |

which, although it might have exposed the Army to fome Lofs in its Execution, I judged in my Mind preferable to any other which could be adopted.

Under this Imprefiion, and confidering that ferious Lofs might enfue from Delay, I have been in-duced to conclude an Armiftice, in conjunction with Vice-Admiral Mitchell, with General Brune, com-manding the French and Batavian Armies, of which the Conditions are inclosed, and which, although they provide for delivering up a large Number of Priloners of War, now in our Hands, yet I truft will not be thought by His Majefty an inadequate Compensation for many valuable Lives which must have been loft, after the Object which has hithereo directed them no longer promifed Success ; and when the only Means which prefented themfelves of enfuring a fecure Retreat were those of reforting to the deftructive Measure of Inundation from the Sca, which, as it would have involved the Inhabitants of the Northern Part of this Province in Ruin for a Series of Years, mult have been highly repugnant to the Feelings, as well as contrary to the Character and Practice of the British Nation.

I reft confident that the Motives which I have here detailed will excufe me to his Majefty for having acted without waiting for previous Infructions from Home, and that I shall have the Satisfaction of knowing that my Conduct in this Refpect has met with his Majesty's gracious Approbation.

### TRANSLATION.

ARTICLES agreed upon between Major-General Knox, duly authorized by His Royal Highnefs the Duke of York, Commander in Chief of the Com-bined English and Ruffian Army, and Citizen Rostollant, General of Brigade and Adjutant-General, duly authorized by Citizen Brune, General and Com-mander in Chief of the French and Batavian Army.

Art. I. From the Date of this Convention all Hoftilities shall cease between the Two Armies.

Art. II. The Line of Demarcation between the faid Armies, shall be the Line of their respective Out-Pofts as they now exift.

Art. III. The Continuation of all Works Offenfive and Defenfive shall be fufpended on both Sides, and no new ones shall be undertaken.

Art. IV. The mounted Batteries taken Poffeffion of at the Helder, or at other Politions within the Line, now occupied by the Combined English and Ruffian Army, shall be restored in the State in which they were taken, or (in cafe of Improvement) in their prefent State, and all the Dutch Artillery taken therein shall be preferved.

Art. V. The Combined English and Russian Army shall embark as foon as possible, and shall evacuate the Territory, Coasts, Islands, and internal Navigation of the Dutch Republic, by the 30th of November 1799, without committing any Devasta-tion, by Inundations, cutting the Dykes, or other, ways injuring the Sources of Navigation,



Art. VI. Any Ships of War or other Veffels which may arrive with Reinforcements for the Combined British and Russian Army, shall not land the fame, and shall be fent away as foon as possible.

Art. VII. General Brune shall be at Liberty to fend an Officer within the Lines of the Zuyp and to the Helder, to report to him the State of the Batteries and the Progrefs of the Embarkation. His Royal Highnefs the Duke of York shall be equally at Liberty to fend an Officer within the French and Batavian Lines, to fatisfy himfelf that no new Works are carried on on their Side. An Officer of Rank and Diftinction shall be fent from each Army respectively, to guarantee the Execution of this Convention.

Art. VIII. Eight Thouland Prifoners of War, French and Batavians, taken before the prefent Campaign, and now detained in England, shall be reftored without Conditions to their refpective Countries. The Proportion and the Choice of fuch Prifoners for each, to be determined between the Two Major-General Knox shall remain with Republics. the French Army to guarantee the Execution of this Article.

Art. IX. The Cartel agreed upon between the Two Armies for the Exchange of the Prifoners taken during the prefent Campaign, shall continue in full Force till it shall be carried into complete Execution ; and it is further agreed that the Dutch Admiral De Winter shall be confidered as exchanged.

Concluded at Alkmaer, the 18th of October, 1799, by the underfigned General Officers, furnished with full Powers to this Effect.
