WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the Seventeenth Day of May last, prohibiting the Transporting into any Parts out of this Kingdom, any Pot-Ashes or Pearl-Ashes, (except as in the faid Order is mentioned,) will expire upon the Seventh Day of November next: And whereas it is judged expedient that the faid Prohibition should be continued for tome Time longer: His Majesty doth therefore, with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, That no Person or Persons whosoever do, at any Time during the Space of Six Months, to commence from the said Seventh Day of November next, export, or attempt to export, transport, carry, or convey, or lade or lay on board of any Ship, Vessel, or Boat, in order to be exported, transported, carried, or conveyed out of this Kingdom, any Pot-Ash or Pearl-Ash, without Leave or Permission being first had and obtained from His Majesty, or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring the Forfeitures inflicted by an Act, passed in the Thirtyfourth Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled "An "A& for indemnifying all Persons who have been " concerned in advising or carrying into Exe-" cution an Order of the Lords Commissioners of

" His Majesty's Treasury respecting the Exportation " of Pot-Ashes or Pearl-Ashes; for preventing Suits " in consequence of the same; for authorising His " Majesty to prohibit the Exportation or carrying "Coastwife of Pot-Ashes or Pearl-Ashes, and for "making further Provisions relative thereto:" But it is, nevertheless, His Majesty's Pleasure, that nothing herein contained shall extend, or be construed to extend, to prevent the Exportation of the faid Articles to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, or Man, or to His Majesty's Colonies or Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or to the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies: Provided that, upon the Exportation of the faid Articles to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, or Man, or to His Majesty's Colonies or Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to the Island of Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies, the Exporters of the said Articles do first make Oath of the true Destination of the same to the Places for which they shall be entered Outwards, before the Entry of the same shall be made; and do give full and fufficient Security, by Bond, to the Satiffaction of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, to carry the faid Articles to the Places for which they are fo entered Outwards, and none other: and fuch Bond shall not be cancelled, or delivered up. until Proof be made to the Satisfaction of the faid Commissioners, by the Production, within a Time to be fixed by the faid Commissioners, and specified in the Bond, of a Certificate or Certificates, in fuch Form and Manner as shall be directed by the faid Commissioners, shewing that the faid Articles have all been duly landed at the Places for which they were entered Outwards: And the Right Honorable

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council, HEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the Twenty-fixth Day of April last, prohibiting the Exportation out of this Kingdom of any Sort of Rock Salt, did expire upon the Twenty-ninth Day of this instant October; And whereas it is judged expedient that the faid Prohibition should be continued for some Time Jonger; His Majesty doth therefore, with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no Person or Persons whatfoever do at any Time, during the Space of Six Months, to commence from the faid Twentyninth Day of this instant October, export, or attempt to export, transport, carry, or convey, or load or lay on hoard of any Ship, Vessel, or Boat, in order to be exported, transported, carried, or conveyed out of any Port or Place in Great Britain, any Sort of Rock Salt whatfoever, without Leave or Permission being first had and obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring the Forfeitures inflicted by an Act, paffed in the Thirty-fixth Year of His prefent Majesty's Reign, intituled "An Act for indemnifying all Persons who have been concerned in adviting or carrying "into Execution an Order of His Majesty in " Council respecting the Exportation of Rock 4 Salt, for preventing Suits in consequence of the fame, for authoriting His Majesty to prohibit the " Exportation or carrying Coastwife of Rock Salt, " and for making further Provisions relative there-" to:" His Majesty, nevertheless, by the Advice aforefaid, hath thought fit to order, that nothing herein contained shall prevent Rock Salt being carried Coastwife, under the usual Rules, Regulations, and Restrictions, nor the Exportation of the same to Ireland, or to any other of His Majesty's Dominions, under the usual Conditions and Regulations, and upon Security being given by the Exporter, and Two other Persons, (of whom the Master of the Wessel shall be one,) by Bond, in such Penalty as shall be directed by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, that the faid Rock Salt shall be exported to some Port or Place in His Majesty's Dominions, and none other; and that a Certificate shall be produced, within Six Months from the Date of the Bond, if such Rock Salt shall be entered out for any Part of His Majesty's Dominions in Europe;

and within Twelve Months, if for any Part of His Majesty's Dominions in America or the West Indies; and within Eighteen Months, if for any of the British Settlementsor Factories in Asia or Africa, under the Hand of the Principal Officer of the Cultoms at the Port or Place where such Rock Salt shall be so landed; and if there shall be no Officer of the Cuftoms, then under the Hand of the Chief Magistrate of the Place, tellifying that the faid Rock Salt has been duly landed at the Port or Place for which the fame was entered out --- And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respec-W. THE Russian Army under the Command of General Korfakof took ... - B. Head-Quarters, Stockach, Oc-General Korsakof took up a Position, after its Retreat from Zurich, with its Right to Eglizaw and its Left to Conftance. The Bridges of Dieffenhofen and Stein were occupied by it in Front, and a Garrison of Two Thousand Men were placed in a Tête de Pont at Buesingen, a Village between Diessenhofen and Schaffhausen, where a Pontoon Bridge had been placed by the Austrians. On the 8th, the Enemy appeared in Force in the Neighbourhood of Buesingen. It was evident that he reach it.

came for the Purpole of reconnoiting the Polition. and though he retired in the Evening there was Reason to believe he had not retreated far. An immediate Attack on the Tête de Pont was ex-

On the Morning of the 9th, General Korsakof resolved to pass the Rhine for the Purpose of driving the Enemy from their Position. He took with him Ten Battalions and Twenty-two Squadrons.

The Army advanced for about a League without discovering any Traces of the Enemy. They at last, however, found him in considerable Force, They at and strongly posted, with his Lest to the Village of Schlatten, and his Right to a Wood which he had also occupied. It is impossible for Words to do Justice to the Intrepidity with which the Ruslians immediately attacked them. The whole Line fell upon them with their Bayonets, and the French flew for Protection to the Woods, where, under Cover of their Chasseurs, they endeavoured to take a fecond Polition. They were driven from this likewife by the Russians, and a third Polition, which they took in the Neighbourhood of the Village of Tublikon, was likely to have proved still more unfortunate to them. Two of their Battalions had already thrown down their Arms, and were on the Point of furrendering, when a Regiment of French Cavalry, followed by a large Column of Infantry, commanded by Massena in Person, came in View and faved them.

The Object of the Expedition was to drive the Enemy from the Woods in the Neighbourhood of the Tête de Pont, and this Object being effected, it became no longer prudent, with fo small a Corps, to risk an Action with a Force now become so superior, or to advance further unsupported, against the Enemy, who, from the Neighbourhood of their Army, had an Opportunity of receiving still greater Reinforcements. After driving the Enemy there-fore nearly to the River Thur, the Army retreated by the Road on which they had advanced, and entered their Camp about Six o'Clock in the Evening.

While these Operations were going on in the Neighbourhood of Buesingen the Enemy attacked the Bridge of Diessenhofen and the Town of Constance, which confirmed us in the Belief that the Attack would have taken place on the Tête de Pont, if the offensive Operations on the Side of the Ruffians had not prevented it.

At Diessenhosen they were repulsed by General Wornoff, who with a very small Number of Men very gallantly defended himself during the Whole of the Day, and, after occasioning a very great Lots of Men to the French, took several Prisoners and Three Pieces of Cannon.

At Constance, where the Corps of the Prince of Condé were stationed, the Enemy were more successful. The Position which the Prince was obliged to take up for the Defence of the Town was vaitly too extensive for his fmall Number of Men, and being unable to guard all the different Points susinciently, the Enemy, after directing all his Efforts unsuccessfully against their Front, contrived at last to advance a Corps unperceived through the Vine-yards, force the Left of the Fosition, and enter the Town before the Rest of the Prince's Corps, who had commenced their Retreat, were enabled to

On their Arrival at the Gates, they found them in the Posession of the Enemy, and no other Retreat left but that which was to be obtained by forcing their Way through a Town, of which the Streets were already occupied. In effecting it they furtained a confiderable Lofs; but the Gallantry which was displayed by all the Corps, and particularly by the Grenadiers of Bourbon, in the Execution of this desperate Measure, was, as I am in-

formed, entirely beyond the Reach of Praise.

The Loss of Constance was accompanied by the
Loss of the Bridge at that Place, and this latter Circumstance endangered considerably the Left of the Russian Polition. General Korsakof, on receiving the Intelligence, thought it advisable to concentrate his Force and retire his Men from the Tête de Pont during the Night, a Measure which has now become a Matter of Regret, the Bridge of Constance having been retaken on the 10th.

I am forry to inform your Lordship that our Loss in these different Attacks amounts to nearly Fifteen Hundred Men, killed, wounded, and miffing: the Lofs of the Enemy must have been very considerable; but I have not had an Opportunity of ascertaining it. A considerable Number of Prisoners fell into our Hands at the Attack of Buesingen, but, with the Exception of about Fifty, they contrived to make their Escape during the Retreat. Four Pieces of Cannon fell into our Hands, Three of which, al-ready mentioned, at the Attack of Diessenhosen, the Fourth in the Neighbourhood of Schlatten.
