

Whitehall, November 19, 1799.

Whereas it has been humbly represented to the King, that between the Hours of Three and Four o'Clock in the Morning of Tuesday the 29th of October last, Two Hay Ricks, the Property of Mr. Francis Holland, of Market Deeping, in the County of Lincoln, Surgeon and Apothecary, were discovered to be in Flames; and that it appeared evident, from different concurring Circumstances, that the same were wilfully and maliciously set fire to by some evil-disposed Person or Persons.

And whereas it has further been humbly represented to His Majesty, that an anonymous threatening Letter, of which the following is a Copy, was put under the Office Door (on the Friday following) of Mr. H. Butler, the Post-Master, at Market Deeping aforesaid:

Mr. H. Butler,

If you wish Doctor Holland well, send this Post haste—Send this Post haste Mr. Butler or by God you shall suffer and all—Down with the Reed-roof Bob

Enough

Parson Mossop Deeping St James and all, hang him

Mr. Myers

Eddenham

near Bourn

Sir,

H. Hardy is innocent and if you don't let her out of Jail, we will set your House on Fire and all—There were two of us concerned and before the Year is out, we will fire him and his old thatched Buildings and all—He is a Rascal—You cannot find us out, and we will do his old thatched Place soon—Doctor Holland is a Rascal, if you be an honest Man do not believe him.
