## A PROCLAMATION,

*For giving Currency to a new Coinage of Copper Money, of Two-penny and One-penny Pieces, Half-penny Pieces and Farthings.*

GEORGE R.

**W**HEREAS in Consequence of the unanimous Address of our Commons of Great Britain in Parliament assembled, We thought fit to order that certain Pieces of Copper should be coined, which should go and pass for One Penny and Two Pennies, and that each of such Pieces of One Penny should weigh One Ounce Avoirdupois, and that each of such Two-penny Pieces should weigh Two Ounces Avoirdupois, the intrinsic Value of such Pieces of One Penny and Two Pennies, Workmanship included, corresponding as nearly as possible with the nominal Value of the same respectively; every such Piece having on one Side thereof Our Effigies or Portraiture, with Our Name or Title, and on the Reverse, the Figure of Britannia, represented sitting on a Rock in the Sea, holding a Trident in her Left Hand, and a Branch of Olive in her Right Hand, with the Year of our Lord: And whereas Penny and Two-penny Pieces of Copper of the Weight and Description aforesaid having been coined accordingly, We did, with the Advice of Our Privy Council, by Our Royal Proclamation, bearing Date the Twenty-sixth Day of July in the Thirty-seventh Year of Our Reign, ordain, declare, and command, That such Pieces of Copper Money should be current and lawful Money of Our Kingdom of Great Britain, and should pass and be received as current and lawful Money of Our said Kingdom, that is to say, such Penny Pieces as of the Value of One Penny, and such Two-penny Pieces as of the Value of Two Pennies, in all Pay-

ments and Transactions of Money; provided that no Person should be obliged to take more of such Copper Money, in any One Payment, than should be of the Value of One Shilling, after the Rate aforesaid: And whereas We have since caused great Quantities of such Penny and Two-penny Pieces to be coined and delivered, and We have also thought fit to order, That Halfpenny Pieces and Farthings should be coined, having also on one Side thereof Our Effigies or Portraiture, with Our Name or Title, and on the Reverse the Figure of Britannia, with the Year of our Lord; all which Two-penny Pieces, One-penny Pieces, Halfpenny Pieces, and Farthings, have been coined by Matthew Boulton, of Soho, in the County of Warwick, Esquire; and We do intend, from Time to Time, as Occasion shall require, to order like Two-penny Pieces, One-penny Pieces, Halfpenny Pieces, and Farthings, or some or one of them, to be coined in like Manner, and to be delivered at such Times and in such Quantities as We shall find to be necessary for the Purposes of Circulation: We have therefore, with the Advice of Our Privy Council, thought fit to issue this Our Royal Proclamation; and We do hereby ordain, declare, and command, That all such Pieces of Copper Money, so already coined and issued, and which shall hereafter be coined and issued as aforesaid, shall be current and lawful Money of Our Kingdom of Great Britain, and shall pass and be received as current and lawful Money of Our said Kingdom, (that is to say); such Two-penny Pieces as of the Value of Two Pence, and such Penny Pieces as of the Value of One Penny; such Halfpence as of the Value of One Halfpenny, and such Farthings as of the Value of One Farthing: Provided that no Person shall be obliged to take more of such Two-penny and One-penny Pieces, in any one Payment, than shall be of the Value of One Shilling, after the Rate aforesaid; or to take more

of such Halfpenny and Farthing Pieces, in any one Payment, than shall be of the Value of Sixpence, after the Rate aforesaid.

Given at Our Court at St. James's, the Fourth Day of December, One thousand seven hundred and ninety-nine, and in the Fortieth Year of Our Reign.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the Fifth Day of June last, for prohibiting the Exportation out of this Kingdom, or carrying Coastwise, Gunpowder or Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, will expire upon the Seventh Day of this instant December: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, and the Safety of this Kingdom, that the said Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer: His Majesty doth therefore, with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no Person or Persons whatsoever (except the Master General of the Ordnance for His Majesty's Service) do, at any Time during the Space of Six Months, to commence from the Seventh Day of this instant December, presume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom, or carry Coastwise, any Gunpowder or Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, or ship or lade any Gunpowder or Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, on board any Ship or Vessel, in order to transporting the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, or carrying the same Coastwise, without Leave or Permission in that Behalf first obtained from His Majesty, or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring and suffering the respective Forfeitures and Penalties inflicted by an Act, passed in the Twenty-ninth Year of His late Majesty's Reign, intituled "An Act to empower His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Saltpetre, and to enforce the Law for empowering His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms and Ammunition; and also to empower His Majesty to restrain the carrying Coastwise of Saltpetre, Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition."—And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master General of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the Fifth Day of June last, prohibiting the Transportation into any Parts out of this Kingdom, of the Wood called Lignum Vitæ, will expire upon the Tenth Day of this instant December: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, that the said Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer: His Majesty doth therefore, with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, That no Person or Persons whatsoever do, at any Time for the Space of Six Months, to commence from the said Tenth Day of this instant December, export, or attempt to export, transport, carry, or convey, or lade or lay on board of any Ship, Vessel, or Boat, in order to be exported, transported, carried, or conveyed out of this Kingdom, any of the Wood called Lignum Vitæ, without Leave or Permission being first had and obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring the Forfeitures inflicted by an Act, passed in the Thirty-fourth Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled "An Act for indemnifying all Persons who have been concerned in advising or carrying into Execution an Order of the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury respecting the Exportation of Pot-Ashes or Pearl-Ashes; for preventing Suits in consequence of the same; for authorizing His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation or carrying Coastwise of Pot-Ashes or Pearl-Ashes, and for making further Provisions relative thereto." But it is, nevertheless, His Majesty's Pleasure, that nothing herein contained shall extend, or be construed to extend, to prevent any Ship or Vessel from taking or having on board any of the said Wood called Lignum Vitæ, which may be necessary for the Use of the said Ship or Vessel during the Course of her intended Voyage; nor to prevent the Exportation of the said Wood called Lignum Vitæ to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, or Man, or to His Majesty's Colonies or Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or to the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies: Provided that, upon the Exportation of the said Wood called Lignum Vitæ to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, or Man, or to His Majesty's Colonies or Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to the Island of Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of

Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies, the Exporters of the said Wood called Lignum Vitæ do first make Oath of the true Destination of the same to the Places for which it shall be entered Outwards, before the Entry of the same shall be made; and do give full and sufficient Security, by Bond, to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, to carry the said Wood called Lignum Vitæ to the Places for which it is so entered Outwards, and none other; and such Bond shall not be cancelled, or delivered up, until Proof be made to the Satisfaction of the said Commissioners, by the Production, within a Time to be fixed by the said Commissioners, and specified in the Bond, of a Certificate or Certificates, in such Form and Manner as shall be directed by the said Commissioners, shewing that the said Wood called Lignum Vitæ has been duly landed at the Places for which it was entered Outwards: And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

MY LORD,

THE early Return of His Majesty's Sloop under my Command to this Anchorage, from the Service she was employed upon, has been occasioned by my Wish to land Fifty-seven French Prisoners that composed the Officers and Crew of a very fine Schooner Privateer Le Barras, of Fourteen Guns, belonging to Dunkirk, out Four Days from Ostend, commanded by Citizen Fromentin; which Vessel I captured (the Vigilant Hired Lugger in Company) on the 30th Ultimo, Ten Leagues N. W. of the Texel.

I am happy to add she had only made One Prize, the Jane of Hull, from Sunderland, with Coals for Embden; the Master and Part of the Seamen I found on board the Schooner, making in all Sixty-seven in Number.

I Take great Pleasure in transmitting to you, for the Information of the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, a Letter I have just received from

Captain Temple, of His Majesty's Sloop Jaloufe, giving an Account of his having captured the French Lugger Privateer the Fantaisie, belonging to Dunkirk, which I had sent him in quest of on the 24th of last Month, and have no Doubt the uniform Zeal and Exertion of this Officer will meet with due Attention from their Lordships.

*His Majesty's Sloop Jaloufe, at Sea, Nov. 30, 1799.*

MY LORD, Yesterday I had the good Luck to fall in with the Privateer your Lordship sent me in quest of, and after a Chace of Five Hours I captured her; she is a new Copper-bottomed Lügger, of Fourteen Guns and Sixty Men, called the Fantaisie, of Dunkirk, and had the Day before taken Four laden Colliers, close in with Flambro' Head; I determined to get towards Ostend, and this Day I retook the Sally of Lynn, one of her Prizes, the others I have great Hopes of falling in with; I feel great Pleasure in having rescued Four Masters and Thirty-five British Seamen from the Horrors of a French Prison. The Lugger is just refitted, well stored, cost Two Thousand Six Hundred Pounds Sterling, and I think well calculated for His Majesty's Service.

SIR,

I Beg Leave to acquaint you, that Yesterday Morning at Daylight, Portee E. S. E. I fell in with a French Lugger Privateer, to which I immediately gave Chace, and an Hour after I had the Satisfaction to capture her; she proves to be Le Vrai Decide, of Fourteen Guns, Four Swivels, and Fifty Men, (Nine of whom had been left on Shore when she failed,) commanded by Citizen Desgardri, belongs to Boulogne, out Thirty Hours, in Company with Three others, and had not taken any Thing. His Majesty's Ship Cormorant was in Sight, and joined in the Chace.

SIR,

I Have the Pleasure of transmitting, for the Information of my Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, a Letter which I have received from Captain Lloyd, of His Majesty's Sloop Racoon, giving an Account of his having captured on the 3d Instant L'Intrepide French Privateer, of Sixteen Guns and Sixty Men, belonging to Calais. The Racoon anchored in the Downes this Morning; and I have the Satisfaction of learning from Lieutenant Coxwell, that the Wound which Captain Lloyd has received in the Head from a Half-Pike is not dangerous. He also informs me, that soon after the Action the Stag Cutter joined, and went in Pursuit of the Brig mentioned in Captain Lloyd's Letter.

*His Majesty's Sloop Racoon, Dover-Roads, December 4, 1799.*

SIR,

I Beg Leave to acquaint you, that Yesterday at Ten P. M. Dover North about Five or Six Miles, I observed a Lugger board a Brig; I soon discovered her to be an Enemy, and made all Sail in Chace; after a running Fire of about Forty Minutes I laid her alongside, when we were received with a smart Fire from the Cannon and small Arms, which was immediately returned with Success; finding themselves unable to make any further Resistance, Bow-sprit and Foremast gone, they thought it fit to strike. She proves to be L'Intrepide, of Calais, mounting Sixteen Guns and Sixty Men, quite new, commanded by Citizen Saillard, sailed from Boulogne Four o'Clock Yesterday Evening.

I feel myself much indebted to Lieutenant Coxwell (the only Commissioned Officer I had on board) for the great Assistance I received from him, as well as the other Officers and Men for their Attention in obeying my Orders. It is with Satisfaction I have to state (through Providence) that there is only One Man wounded, and myself slightly. The Privateer has lost Thirteen in Killed and Wounded. I am sorry to state that the Brig captured was the Welcombe, from London to Plymouth with Malt; and it was out of my Power to pursue her as I must have lost my Foremast, all my Fore-shrouds being gone on the Starboard Side. It gives me particular Pleasure to have deprived the Enemy of a Vessel which they considered the largest and best Sailer from Calais; and have the Honor to be, &c.

His Majesty's Sloop *Atalante*, giving an Account of his having Yesterday Morning, captured a French Lugger Privateer, called the *Success*, with Six Guns and Forty-eight Men, after first recapturing the Brig *Martha* of London, her Prize.

SIR, *Atalante*, at Sea, Dec. 4, 1799.

I Have the Honor to acquaint you that this Morning at Half-past Eight, I observed a Lugger in the S. W. hovering round and boarding a Brig, to which I gave immediate Chace; finding we came rapidly up, she cast off the Tow Rope, and at a Quarter past Eleven, I sent the Master in the Jolly Boat, without heaving-to, to take Possession of the Brig, left without a Soul on board; and continued the Chace of the Privateer, then Four or Five Miles a-head; at Four P. M. in a fair Chace, I had the Satisfaction to come up with and take her; *Le Succes*, of Boulogne, François Matthieu Blondin, Master, mounting Six Carriage Guns, and Forty-eight Men; Six Days from Boulogne, and taken nothing else. I found the Crew of the Prize on board, and learn her to be the *Martha*, of London, Edward Lewington, Master, from London, bound to Belfast, laden with Sundries, taken by the Privateer last Night, to the Westward of Dungeness.
