A PROCLAMATION,

For giving Currency to a new Coinage of Copper Money, of Two-penny and One-penny Pieces, Half-penny Pieces and Farthings.

GEORGE R.

WHEREAS in Consequence of the unanimous Address of our Commons of Great Britain in Parliament assembled, We thought fit to order that certain Pieces of Copper should be coined, which should go and pass for One Penny and Two Pennies, and that each of such Pieces of One Penny should weigh One Ounce Avoirdupois, and that each of such Two-penny Pieces should weigh Two Ounces Avoirdupois, the intrinsic Value of such Pieces of One Penny and Two Pennies, Workmanship included, corresponding as nearly as possible with the nominal Value of the same respectively; every such Piece having on one Side thereof Our Effigies or Portraiture, with Our Name or Title, and on the Reverse, the Figure of Britannia, represented sitting on a Rock in the Sea, holding a Trident in her Left Hand, and a Branch of Olive in her Right Hand, with the Year of our Lord: And whereas Penny and Two-penny Pieces of Copper of the Weight and Description aforesaid having been coined accordingly, We did, with the Advice of Our Privy Council, by Our Royal Proclamation, bearing Date the Twenty-sixth Day of July in the Thirty-seventh Year of Our Reign, ordain, declare, and command, That such Pieces of Copper Money should be current and lawful Money of Our Kingdom of Great Britain, and should pass and be received as current and lawful Money of Our said Kingdom, that is to say, such Penny Pieces as of the Value of One Penny, and such Two-penny Pieces as of the Value of Two Pennies, in all Payments and Transactions of Money; provided that no Person should be obliged to take more of such Copper Money, in any One Payment, than should be of the Value of One Shilling, after the Rate aforesaid: And whereas We have since caused great Quantities of such Penny and Two-penny Pieces to be coined and delivered, and We have also thought fit to order, That Halfpenny Pieces and Farthings should be coined, having also on one Side thereof

Our Effigies or Portraiture, with Our Name or Title, and on the Reverse the Figure of Britannia, with the Year of our Lord; all which Two-penny Pieces, One-penny Pieces, Halfpenny Pieces, and Farthings, have been coined by Matthew Boulton, of Soho, in the County of Warwick, Esquire; and We do intend, from Time to Time, as Occasion shall require, to order like Two-penny Pieces, One-penny Pieces, Halfpenny Pieces, and Farthings, or some or one of them, to be coined in like Manner, and to be delivered at such Times and in such Quantities as We shall find to be necessary for the Purposes of Circulation: We have therefore, with the Advice of Our Privy Council, thought fit to issue this Our Royal Proclamation; and We do hereby ordain, declare, and command, That all such Pieces of Copper Money, so already coined and issued, and which shall hereafter be coined and issued as aforesaid, shall be current and lawful Money of Our Kingdom of Great Britain, and shall pass and be received as current and lawful Money of Our said Kingdom, (that is to say); such Two-penny Pieces as of the Value of Two Pence, and such Penny Pieces as of the Value of One Penny; such Halfpence as of the Value of One Halfpenny, and such Farthings as of the Value of One Farthing: Provided that no Person shall be obliged to take more of such Two-penny and One-penny Pieces, in any one Payment, than shall be of the Value of One Shilling, after the Rate aforesaid; or to take more of such Halfpenny and Farthing Pieces, in any one Payment, than shall be of the Value of Sixpence, after the Rate aforesaid.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the Fifth Day of June last, for prohibiting the Exportation out of this

Kingdom, or carrying Coastwise, Gunpowder or Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, will expire upon the Seventh Day of this instant December: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, and the Safety of this Kingdom, that the said Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer: His Majesty doth therefore, with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no Person or Persons whatsoever (except the Master-General of the Ordnance for His Majesty's Service) do, at any Time during the Space of Six Months, to commence from the Seventh Day of this instant December, presume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom, or carry Coastwise, any Gunpowder or Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, or ship or lade any Gunpowder or Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, on board any Ship or Vessel, in order to transporting the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, or carrying the same Coastwise, without Leave or Permission in that Behalf first obtained from His Majesty, or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring and suffering the respective Forfeitures and Penalties inflicted by an Act, passed in the Twenty-ninth Year of His late Majesty's Reign, intituled "An Act to empower His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Saltpetre, and to enforce the Law for empowering His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms and Ammunition; and also to empower His Majesty to restrain the carrying Coastwise of Saltpetre, Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition."—And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master-General of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the Fifth Day of June last, prohibiting the Transportation into any Parts out of this Kingdom, of the Wood called *Lignum Vitæ*, will expire upon the Tenth Day of this instant December: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, that the said Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer: His Majesty doth therefore, with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, That no Person or Persons whatsoever do, at any Time for the Space of Six Months, to commence from the said Tenth Day of this instant December, export, or attempt to export, transport, carry, or convey, or lade or lay on board of any Ship, Vessel, or Boat, in order to be exported, transported, or conveyed out of this Kingdom, any of the Wood called *Lignum Vitæ*, without Leave or Permission being first had and obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring the Forfeitures inflicted by an Act, passed in the

Thirty-fourth Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled "An Act for indemnifying all Persons who have been concerned in advising or carrying into Execution an Order of the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury respecting the Exportation of Pot-Ashes or Pearl-Ashes; for preventing Suits in consequence of the same; for authorizing His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation or carrying Coastwise of Pot-Ashes or Pearl-Ashes, and for making further Provisions relative thereto:" But it is, nevertheless, His Majesty's Pleasure, that nothing herein contained shall extend, or be construed to extend, to prevent any Ship or Vessel from taking or having on board any of the said Wood called *Lignum Vitæ*, which may be necessary for the Use of the said Ship or Vessel during the Course of her intended Voyage; nor to prevent the Exportation of the said Wood called *Lignum Vitæ* to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, or Man, or to His Majesty's Colonies or Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Ports and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or to the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies: Provided that, upon the Exportation of the said Wood called *Lignum Vitæ* to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, or Man, or to His Majesty's Colonies or Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to the Island of Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Ports and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies, the Exporters of the said Wood called *Lignum Vitæ* do first make Oath of the true Destination of the same to the Places for which it shall be entered Outwards, before the Entry of the same shall be made; and do give full and sufficient Security, by Bond, to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, to carry the said Wood called *Lignum Vitæ* to the Places for which it is so entered Outwards, and none other; and such Bond shall not be cancelled, or delivered up, until Proof be made to the Satisfaction of the said Commissioners, by the Production, within a Time to be fixed by the said Commissioners, and specified in the Bond, of a Certificate or Certificates, in such Form and Manner as shall be directed by the said Commissioners, shewing that the said Wood called *Lignum Vitæ* has been duly landed at the Places for which it was entered Outwards: And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

Extract of a Letter from Vice-Admiral Lutwidge, Commander in Chief of His Majesty's Ships and Vessels in the Downes, to Evan Nepean, Esq; dated the 8th Instant.

LIEUTENANT WILDFY in the Camperdown Cutter has anchored in the Downes; and delivered to me the inclosed Letter, stated his having captured Yesterday Evening, and sent into Dover, Le Republicaine French Privateer, with Twenty Men and small Arms.

Camperdown Cutter at Sea, December 7, 1799.

SIR,

I purfuant of your Orders of the 26th Ultimo, I beg Leave to inform you, for the Information of the Lords Commiffioners of the Admiralty, at Eight P. M. I fell in with and captured clofe to the South Foreland, the Republicain French Privateer Lugger, Burden Twelve Tons, from Boulogne, Citoyen Jean Baftite Carré, Commander, carrying Twenty Men, with fmall Arms, &c. had made no Captures whatever, having failed in the Afternoon.

Copy of a Letter from Vice-Admiral Sir Thomas Pasley, Bart. Commander in Chief of His Majesty's Ships and Veffels at Plymouth, to Evan Nepean, Esq; dated the 8th Instant.

SIR,

I have the Satisfaction to transmit to you, for their Lordships' Information, Two Letters that I received from Lieutenant Tomlinfon, commanding His Majesty's Hired Armed Schooner the Speedwell, ftating his having, in Company with the Valiant Lugger, commanded by Lieutenant Maxwell, captured the Two French Privateers therein mentioned; on which Occafions much Praise is due to thefe Officers for their vigilant and alert Conduct.

The Speedwell and Valiant arrived laft Night with their Prizes.

And the May Brig belonging to Guernsey, that had been captured by the Providence French Privateer on the 3d Instant, and recaptured the following Morning by His Majesty's Sloop Suffifante off the Ifle of Bas, arrived here laft Evening; and the Prize-Mafter informs me he left the Suffifante in Chace of the Privateer, with every Profppect of fpeedily coming up with her.

I Have the Honor to inform you, that I have this Day, the Valiant in Company, Ifland of Guernsey bearing S. E. diftant Five Leagues, after a Chace of Six Hours, captured L'Heureufe Esperance French Lugger Privateer, of St. Maloes, mounting Fourteen Three-Pounders, Eight of which were thrown overboard before we came up with her. She had on board but Twenty-four Men, having manned Four Prizes fince the Commencement of this Cruize. A Brig belonging to Beaumaris fhe took this Morning after a confiderable Refiftance, I am in Hopes to fall in with before fhe reaches the French Coaft.

Speedwell at Sea, Dec. 6, 1799.

I Have the Honor to inform you, that in addition to our Succels of Yefterday, we have this Evening, the Valiant in Company, and Swin Iflands bearing South about Two Miles, after a Chace of Nine Hours (the laft Hour and Ten Minutes being a running Fight), captured a French Brig Privateer, of Fourteen Six-Pounders, and Fifty-eight

Men, called L'Heureux Speculateur, of Granville, Citizen Louis Joseph Quoniam, Commander. She has been out Four Days without taking any Thing. She is a remarkably fait Sailer, and has done a great deal of Mifchief to the Englifh Trade. The Enemy had a Man killed and Seven wounded, without, I am hapy to add, having done us any Damage.
