Council, upon Pain of incurring the Forfeitures inflicted by an Act, passed in the Thirty-third Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled "An Act to enable His Majesty to restrain the Exportation of Naval Stores, and more effectually to prevent the Exportation of Salt-Petre, Arms, and Ammunition, when prohibited by Proclamation or Order in Council." #### A PROCLAMATION,

*For giving Currency to a new Coinage of Copper Money, of Two-penny and One-penny Pieces, Half-penny Pieces and Farthings.*

GEORGE R.

WHEREAS in Consequence of the unanimous Address of our Commons of Great Britain in Parliament assembled, We thought fit to order that certain Pieces of Copper should be coined, which should go and pass for One Penny and Two Pennies, and that each of such Pieces of One Penny should weigh One Ounce Avoirdupois, and that each of such Two-penny Pieces should weigh Two Ounces Avoirdupois, the intrinsic Value of such Pieces of One Penny and Two Pennies, Workmanship included, corresponding as nearly as possible with the nominal Value of the same respectively; every such Piece having on one Side thereof Our Effigies or Portraiture, with Our Name or Title, and on the Reverse, the Figure of Britannia, represented sitting on a Rock in the Sea, holding a Trident in her Left Hand, and a Branch of Olive in her Right Hand, with the Year of our Lord: And whereas Penny and Two-penny Pieces of Copper of the Weight and Description aforesaid having been coined accordingly, We did, with the Advice of Our Privy Council, by Our Royal Proclamation, bearing Date the Twenty-sixth Day of July in the Thirty-seventh Year of Our Reign, ordain, declare, and command, That such Pieces of Copper Money should be current and lawful Money of Our Kingdom of Great Britain, and should pass and be received as current and lawful Money of Our said Kingdom, that is to say, such Penny Pieces as of the Value of One Penny, and such Two-penny Pieces as of the Value of Two Pennies, in all Payments and Transactions of Money; provided that no Person should be obliged to take more of such Copper Money, in any One Payment, than should be of the Value of One Shilling, after the Rate aforesaid: And whereas We have since caused great Quantities of such Penny and Two-penny Pieces to be coined and delivered, and We have also thought fit to order, That Halfpenny Pieces and Farthings should be coined, having also on one Side thereof Our Effigies or Portraiture, with Our Name or Title, and on the Reverse the Figure of Britannia, with the Year of our Lord; all which Two-penny Pieces, One-penny Pieces, Halfpenny Pieces, and Farthings, have been coined by Matthew Boulton, of Soho, in the County of Warwick, Esquire; and We do intend, from Time to Time, as Occasion shall require, to order like Two-penny Pieces, One-penny Pieces, Halfpenny Pieces, and Farthings, or some or one of them, to be coined in like Manner, and to be delivered at such Times and in such Quantities as We shall find to be necessary for the Purposes of Circulation: We have therefore, with the Advice of Our Privy Council, thought fit to issue this Our Royal Proclamation; and We do hereby ordain, declare, and command, That all such Pieces of Copper Money, so already coined and is-

fued, and which shall hereafter be coined and issued as aforefaid, shall be current and lawful Money of Our Kingdom of Great Britain, and shall pafs and be received as current and lawful Money of Our faid Kingdom, (that is to fay); fuch Two-penny Pieces as of the Value of Two Pence, and fuch Penny Pieces as of the Value of One Penny; fuch Halfpence as of the Value of One Halfpenny, and fuch Farthings as of the Value of One Farthing: Provided that no Perfon shall be obliged to take more of fuch Two-penny and One-penny Pieces, in any one Payment, than shall be of the Value of One Shilling, after the Rate aforefaid; or to take more of fuch Halfpenny and Farthing Pieces, in any one Payment, than shall be of the Value of Sixpence, after the Rate aforefaid.

A DISPATCH, of which the following is a Copy, has this Day been received from the Right Honorable Lord William Bentinck, by the Right Honorable Lord Grenville, His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Foreign Department.

Head-Quarters, Morozzo,

November 14, 1799.

MY LORD,

IT gives me great Satisfaction to be able to state to your Lordship, that it is the Determination of the Commander in Chief to undertake immediately the Siege of Coni, and push it on with all possible Vigor. This Resolution has been adopted in consequence of the Events which have taken place since the Battle of the 4th, and which prove the Defeat of the Enemy on that Day to have been most complete. The Prisoners taken on the 4th and 5th amount to Four Thousand Three Hundred, which Number is much greater than was at first supposed. The Austrians lost Two Thousand in Killed and Wounded. On the 11th the Division of General Ott attacked that Part of the Enemy which remained at Borgo Saint Dalmazzo, and drove them as far as Robillante. On the same Day Major-General Somasiva pursued the French in the Valley of the Stura as far as Demonte, of which he took Possession, and made One Hundred Prisoners. Major-General Gotterheim also obliged the French to evacuate the Villages of La Chiusa, Boves, and Poveragna. General Championet had assembled his whole Force at Mondovi, and upon the Mountains behind the River Ellero, as far as Monasterlo. As long as he occupied this Position, it was impossible to undertake the Siege of Coni. General Melas therefore gave Orders that a general Attack should be made on the 13th. A Letter from Championet to Saint Cyr had been intercepted, which shewed that the latter was not able to pursue the Advantage which he had gained over General Kray in the last Action which I had the Honor of stating to your Lordship. For this Reason the Division of General Metrowski, which had marched as far as Cherasco for the Purpose of reinforcing General Kray, was ordered to return to the Camp of the Trinita on the 12th, and to form the Left of the Attack on the Town of Mondovi. The Remainder of the Army marched in Two Columns. The one, by La Chiusa, upon Monasterlo; the other, by Villa Nova, upon the Centre of the Enemy's Line. From the Difficulties of the Roads the Attacks were not made till very late, and the Enemy, without making much Resistance, abandoned all his Positions. The People of Mondovi opened the Gates of the Lower Town to the Austrians. The French Army retired to Vico, and evacuated the Citadel of Mondovi in the Night.

General Championet is retreating towards Ormaia, and Major-General Bellegarde is sent with a considerable Corps in his Pursuit. The Austrian Army marches this Day to Beinette, and will To-morrow take up the necessary Positions to cover the Siege. I never yet have seen Inveteracy and Detestation of the French so general, and carried to such Lengths as it is here: the whole People are armed; and, headed by a Priest, perform the most wonderful Exploits. In the Beginning of the Campaign they took both Ceva and Mondovi from the French; and in the Action of Yesterday, a Body of Fifteen Thousand prevented a very strong Column of the Enemy from marching by a particular Road; the Country, being mountainous, is peculiarly favorable to their irregular Mode of fighting. The Siege will begin in the Course of Ten Days.
