PRÉSENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS His Majesty was graciously pleafed, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Twenty-fixth Day of December, One thousand seven hundred and ninety-two, to promise and declare, that the Bounties of Five Pounds for every Able Seaman, and Two Pounds Ten Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, fit for His Majesty's Service, should be paid in the Manner thereby directed to every fuch Able and Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should, on or before the Twenty-eighth Day of February then following, enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majesty's Ships or Vessels, or Officers employed on Shore for raifing Men for the Service of the Royal Navy: And whereas His Majesty was also graciously pleased, by his faid Proclamation, to declare, that all Able-bodied Landmen, not above the Age of Thirty-five nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should so enter themselves as aforefaid, should receive the Sum of Thirty Shillings each Man, as His Majesty's Royal Bounty: And whereas His Majesty was also graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Sixteenth Day of the faid Month of February, One thousand seven hundred and ninety-three, to promise and declare, that a Reward of Twenty Shillings for every Able and Ordinary Seaman, fit to ferve on board His Majesty's Ships, should be paid to any Person who should discover any Seaman or Seamen who might conceal him or themselves, so that fuch Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's Service, on or before the Thirtieth Day of April then next, by any of His Majesty's

Sea Officers appointed to raile Men on Shore, or by the Captains or Commanders of any of His Majesty's Ships or Vessels in the Ports or on the Coasts of this Kingdom: And whereas the Time limited by the faid Proclamations for Payment of the faid Bounties and Reward hath been prolonged and extended to the Thirty first Day of this instant December; and it being judged expedient for His Majesty's Service that the faid Bounties and Reward should be continued to be paid for some Time longer; His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, that the Time limited for Payment of the faid Bounties and Reward be prolonged and extended from the faid Thirty-first Day of this instant December to the Thirty-first Day of March next inclusive: --Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majefty's Order in Council of the Twenty-fixth. Day of June last, prohibiting the transporting into any Parts out of this Kingdom; any Pig-Iron; Bar-Iron, Hemp, Pitch, Tar, Rosin, Turpentine; Anchors, Cables, Cordage, Masts, Yards, Bowsprits, Oars, Oakum, Oker, Sheet-Copper, or other Naval Stores, will expire upon the Twenty-fifth Day of this instant December: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, and the Safety of this Kingdom, that the said Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer; His Majesty doth therefore, with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no Person or Persons whosoever do at any Time, for the Space of Six Months, to commence from the said Twenty-fifth Day of this in-

ftant December, presume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom, any Pig-Iron, Bar-Iron, Hemp, Pitch, Tar, Rosin, Turpentine, Anchors, Cables, Cordage, Masts, Yards, Bowsprits, Oars, Oakum, Oker, Sheet Copper, or other Naval Stores, or ship or lade any of the Articles above meetinged on board any Ship or Vestal in order mentioned on board any Ship or Vessel, in order to transporting the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, without Leave or Permission being first had and obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring the Forfeitures inflicted by an Act, passed in the Thirty-third Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled " An Act to ena! " ble His Majesty to restrain the Exportation of Na-" val Stores, and more effectually to prevent the Ex-" portation of Salt-Petre, Arms, and Ammunition, "when prohibited by Proclamation or Order in "Council." But it is, nevertheless, His Majesty's Pleasure, that nothing herein contained shall extend, or be confirmed to extend, to any of His Majesty's Ships of War, or any other Ships or Vessels or Boats, in the Service of His Majesty, or employed or freighted by His Majesty's Board of Ordnance, or by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Name of His Majesty' jesty's Navy; nor to prevent any Ship or Vessel from taking or having on board such Quantities of Naval Stores as may be necessary for the Use of fuch Ship or Veffel during the Course of her intended Voyage, or by Licence from the Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, or the Commissioners of the Admiralty for the Time being; nor to the Exportation of the faid feveral Articles to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Yards or Garrisons, or to His Majesty's Colonies or Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or to the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies: Provided that, upon the Exportation of any of the faid Articles, for the Purposes of Trade, to Ire-land, or to His Majesty's Yards or Garrisons, or to His Majcity's Colonies and Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to the Island of New-foundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies, the Exporters of such Articles do first make Oath of the true Destination of the fame to the Places for which they shall be entered Outwards, before the Entry of the same shall be made, and do give full and sufficient Security, by Bond, to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, to carry the said Articles to the Places for which they are so entered Outwards, and for the Purposes specified, and none other; and fuch Bond shall not be cancelled or delivered up, until Proof be made, to the Satisfaction of the faid Commissioners, by the Production, within a Time to be fixed by the faid Commif-tioners, and specified in the Bond, of a Certificate or Certificates, in such Form and Manner as shall be directed by the faid Commissioners, shewing that the faid Articles have been duly landed at the Places for which they were entered Outwards. And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners Ports, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them máy respectively appertain.

By the KING. PROCLAMATION,

For giving Currency to a new Coinage of Copper Money, of Two-penny and One-penny Pieces, Half-penny Pieces and Farthings.

GEORGE R.

HEREAS in Consequence of the unani-mous Address of our Commons of Great Britain in Parliament assembled, We thought fit to order that certain Pieces of Copper should be coined, which should go and pass for One Penny and Two Pennies, and that each of such Pieces of One Penny should weigh One Ounce Avoirdupois, and that each of such Two penny Pieces should with Two Pennses Amin's pennish to the Common Pieces should weigh Two Ounces Avoirdupois, the intrinsic Value of fuch Pieces of Oue Penny and Two Pennics, Workmanship included, corresponding as nearly as possible with the nominal Value of the same respectively; every fuch Picce having on one Side thereof Our Effigies or Portraiture, with Our Name or Title, and on the Reverse, the Figure of Britannia, represented sitting on a Rock in the Sea, holding a Trident in her Left Hand, and a Branch of Olive in her Right Hand, with the Year of our Lord: And whereas Penny and Two-penny Pieces of Copper of the Weight and Description aforesaid having been coined accordingly, We did, with the Advice of Our Privy Council, by Our Royal Proclamation, bearing Date the Twenty-fixth Day of July in the Thirty-seventh Year of Our Reign, ordain, declare, and command, That such Pieces of Copper Money should be current and lawful Money of Our Kingdom of Great Britain, and should pass and be received as current and lawful Money of Our faid Kingdom, that is to fay, such Penny Pieces as of the Value of One Penny, and such Two-penny Pieces as of the Value of Two Pennies, in all Pay-ments and Transactions of Money; provided that no Person should be obliged to take more of such Copper Money, in any One Payment, than should be of the Value of One Shilling, after the Rate aforesaid: And whereas We have since caused great Quantities of fuch Penny and Two-penny Pieces to be coined and delivered, and We have also thought fit to order, That Halfpenny Pieces and Farthings should be coined, having also on one Side thereof Our Effigies or Portraiture, with Our Name of Title, and on the Reverse the Figure of Britannia, with the Year of our Lord; all which Two-penny Pieces, One-penny Pieces, Halfpenny Pieces, and Farthings, have been coined by Matthew Boulton, of Soho, in the County of Warwick, Esquire; and We do intend, from Time to Time, as Occasion shall require, to order like Two-penny Pieces, Onepenny Pieces, Halfpenny Pieces, and Farthings, or some or one of them, to be coined in like Manner, and to be delivered at fuch Times and in fuch Quantities as We shall find to be necessary for the Purposes of Circulation: We have therefore, with of His Majelty's Treasury, the Commissioners for the Advice of Our Privy Council, thought sit to executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of liftue this Our Royal Proclamation; and We do Great Britain, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque hereby ordain, declare, and command, That all such

Pieces of Copper Money, so already coined and isfued, and which shall hereafter be coined and issued as aforefaid, shall be current and lawful Money of Our Kingdom of Great Britain, and shall pass and be received as current and lawful Money of Our faid Kingdom, (that is to fay); such Two-penny Pieces as of the Value of Two Pence, and such Penny Pieces as of the Value of One Penny; such Halfpence as of the Value of One Halfpenny, and such Farthings as of the Value of One Farthing: Provided that no Person shall be obliged to take more of such Two-penny and One-penny Pieces, in any one Payment, than shall be of the Value of One Shilling, after the Rate aforefaid; or to take more of such Halfpenny and Farthing Pieces, in any one Payment, than shall be of the Value of Sixpence, after the Rate aforefaid.
