PROCLAMATION, A For giving Currency to a new Coinage of Copper

Money, of Two-penny and One-penny Pieces, Half-penny Pieces and Farthings.

GEORGE R.

W HEREAS in Confequence of the unani-mous Addrefs of our Commons of Great Britain in Parliament affembled, We thought fit to order that certain Pieces of Copper should be coined, which should go and pais for One Penny and Two Pennies, and that each of fuch Pieces of One Penny should weigh One Ounce Avoirdupois, and that each of fuch Two penny Pieces should weigh Two Ounces Avoirdupois, the intrinsic Value of fuch Pieces of One Penny and Two Pageice of Juch Pieces of One Penny and Two Pennies, Workmanship included, corresponding as nearly as poffible with the nominal Value of the fame refpectively; every fuch Piece having on one Side thereof Our Effigies or Portraiture, with Our Name or Title, and on the Reverfe, the Figure of Britannia, reprefented fitting on a Rock in the Sea, holding a Trident in her Left Hand, and a Branch of Olive in her Right Hand, with the Year of our Lord : And whereas Penny and Two-penny Pieces of Copper of the Weight and Description aforefaid having been coined accordingly, We did, with the Ad-vice of Our Privy Council, by Our Royal Proclamation, bearing Date the Twenty-fixth Day of July in the Thirty-feventh Year of Our Reign, ordain, declare, and command, That fuch Pieces of Copper Money (hould be current and lawful Money of Our Kingdom of Great Britain, and (hould pals and be received as current and lawful Money of Our faid Kingdom, that is to fay, fuch Penny Pieces as of the Value of One Penny, and fuch Two-penny Pieces as of the Value of Two Pennies, in all Pay-ments and Transactions of Money; provided that no Perfon flould be obliged to take more of fuch Copper Money, in any One Payment, than should be of the Value of One Shilling, after the Rate aforefaid : And whereas We have fince caufed great Quantities of fuch Penny and Two-penny Pieces to be coined and delivered, and We have allo thought fit to order, That Halfpenny Pieces and Farthings should be coined, having also on one Side thereof

Our Effigies or Portraiture, with Our Name or Title, and on the Reverse the Figure of Britannia, with the Year of our Lord; all which Two-penny Pieces, One penny Pieces, Halfpenny Pieces, and Farthings, have been coined by Matthew Boulton, We do intend, from Time to Time, as Occasion fhall require, to order like Two-penny Pieces, Onepenny Pieces, Halfpenny Pieces, and Farthings, or fome or one of them, to be coined in like Manner, and to be delivered at fuch Times and in fuch Quantities as We shall find to be necessary for the Purpoles of Circulation: We have therefore, with the Advice of Our Privy Council, thought fit to iffue this Our Royal Proclamation; and We do hereby ordain, declare, and command, That all fuch Pieces of Copper Money, fo already coined and if-fued, and which shall hereafter be coined and islued as aforefaid, shall be current and lawful Money of Our Kingdom of Great Britain, and shall pass and be received as current and lawful Money of Our faid Kingdom, (that is to fay); fuch Two-penny Pieces as of the Value of Two Pence, and fuch Penny Pieces as of the Value of One Penny; fuch Halfpence as of the Value of One Halfpenny, and fuch Farthings as of the Value of One Farthing: Provided that no Perfon shall be obliged to take more of fuch Two-penny and One-penny Pieces, in any one Payment, than shall be of the Value of One Shilling, after the Rate aforefaid; or to take more of fuch Halfpenny and Farthing Pieces, in any one Payment, than shall be of the Value of Sixpence, after the Rate aforefaid.

T the Court at St. James's, the 18th of December 1799,

P R E S E N T, The KING's Moft Excellent Majelty in Council, WHEREAS His Majefty was gracioufly plcafed, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Twenty-fixth Day of December, One thousand feven hundred and ninety-two, to promife and declare, that the Bounties of Five Pounds for every Able Seaman, and Two Pounds Ten Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, fit for His Majefly's Service, fhould be paid in the Manner thereby directed to every fuch Able and Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who fhould, on or before the Twenty-eighth Day of February then following, enter themielves to ferve in His Majefty's Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majefty's Ships or Veffels, or Officers employed on Shore for railing Men for the Service of the Royal Navy : And whereas His Majelty was alfo gracioufly pleafed, by his faid Proclamation, to declare, that all Able-bodied Landmen, not above the Age of Thirty-five nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should fo enter themfelves as aforefaid, fhould receive the Sum of Thirty Shillings each Man, as His Majefty's Royal Bounty : And whereas His Majelty was also gracioully pleafed, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Sixteenth Day of the faid Month of February, One thousand feven hundred and ninety-three, to promife and declare, that a Reward of Twenty Shillings for every Able and Ordinary Seaman, fit to ferve on board His Majefty's Ships, fhould be paid to any Perfon who fhould difcover any Seaman or Seamen who might conceal him or themfelves, fo that fuch Seaman or Seamen should be taken for that men Seaman or Seaman mould be taken for His Majefty's Service, on or before the Thirtieth Day of April then next, by any of His Majefty's Sea Officer's appointed to raife Men on Shore, or by the Captains or Commanders of any of His Majefty's Ships or Veffels in the Ports or on the Capta of this Kingdom. And whereas the Utter Coafts of this Kingdom: And whereas the Time limited by the faid Proclamations for Payment of the faid Bounties and Reward hath been prolonged and extended to the Thirty-firlt Day of this inflant December; and it being judged expedient for His Majefty's Service that the faid Bounties and Re-ward should be continued to be paid for some Time longer; His Majefty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, that the Time limited for Payment of the faid Bounties and Re-and govern themfelves accordingly.
