SALISBURY.

Dublin-Castle, January 15, 1800.

THIS Day His Excellency the Lord Lieutenant went in State to the House of Peers, and being seated on the Throne with the usual Solemnity, the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod was sent with a Message from His Excellency to the House of Commons, signifying his Pleasure that they should immediately attend His Excellency in the House of Peers. The Commons being come thither accordingly, His Excellency made the following Speech:

My Lords and Gentlemen,

I have received His Majesty's Commands to assemble you in Parliament.

Upon a Review of the important and glorious Events that have distinguished the Period which has elapsed since I last addressed you, the most gratifying and encouraging Reflections present themselves to our Consideration.

By the brilliant Course of Victories; achieved by the Combined Imperial Armies, the various Kingdoms and States of Italy have been delivered from the Ravages and the Tyranny of the French.

The Throne of Naples, and our friendly Connection with that Kingdom have been restored.

The French Expedition to Egypt has been checked in its Career by the Exertions of the Turkish Arms, assisted by a small Detachment of His Majesty's Forces, and the Gallantry of their heroic Commander.

The hostile Plans of the common Enemy in India have terminated in the total Destruction of the Power which had been misfed by their Artifices; and, through the timely, vigorous, and decisive Counsels of the Marquis Wellesley, and the consummate Skill and Valour of His Majesty's Generals, Officers, and Troops, the British Possessions in that Quarter of the Globe have been beneficially extended and effectually secured.

By the Descent of His Majesty's Forces and of his Russian Allies on the Coast of Holland, the Dutch Fleet has been happily rescued from the

Power of the Enemy; and although the Season, peculiarly unfavorable to Military Operations, produced the Necessity of relinquishing an Enterprise so fortunately began, and prevented the complete Accomplishment of His Majesty's Views, yet the Result of that Expedition has been peculiarly beneficial to this Kingdom, in removing all Fear of Attack on our Coasts from a Quarter whence it had been so often planned, and in enabling His Majesty's Fleet to direct their Vigilance exclusively to the single Port from whence the Enemy can attack this Country with any Hope even of a temporary Success.

My utmost Care has been exerted to carry into Execution the extraordinary Powers which you have committed to my Discretion with Vigour, and at the same Time with Moderation. All Tendency to Insurrection has been effectually repressed; but it gives me true Concern to acquaint you, that the painful Necessity of acting with Severity has been too frequently imposed upon me; and although public Tranquillity has been in a great Measure restored, yet I have to lament that a Disposition to Outrage and Conspiracy still continues in several Districts; that much Industry is used to keep alive the Spirit of Disaffection, and to encourage among the lower Classes the Hopes of French Assistance.

I trust that the recent Revolution in France cannot fail to open the Eyes of such of His Majesty's Subjects as have been deluded by the Artifices which have been unremittingly employed to withdraw them from their Allegiance; and that it will restore and increase the Love of Constitutional Order and of regulated Freedom, by demonstrating that the Principles of false Liberty tend ultimately to Despotism, and that the criminal Struggles of democratic Factions naturally close in Military Usurpation.

So long as the French Government, under whatever Form it exerts its Influence, shall persevere in the Schemes of Destruction and Projects of Ambition, subversive at once of the Liberties of Europe and the Security of His Majesty's Dominions, there can be no wise Alternative but to prosecute the War with increasing Energy. It is by great Exertions alone that either their Views of Aggrandisement can be frustrated, or a solid Peace procured. His Majesty has therefore availed himself, with peculiar Satisfaction, of the cordial and great Assistance which has been afforded him by his faithful Ally the Emperor of Russia, and has thought right to make every Exertion for augmenting the disposable Military Force of his own Dominions: His Majesty, therefore, has been highly gratified in accepting the Services so generally offered by the English Militia; and I am to express to you the entire Confidence which His Majesty feels, that the Zeal and Loyalty of his Militia of this Kingdom, in forwarding, at this important Crisis, the active Operations of the Empire, will not be less prompt and conspicuous.

The Apprehension of General Scarcity, which some Time since took place, called for my early Attention to that most important Subject; and I was induced, with the Advice of the Council, to offer Premiums for the early Importation of Grain. This Measure will, I flatter myself, meet your Approbation; and I have full Confidence in your Wis-

dom, if it shall be necessary to resort to any further extraordinary Means for procuring a Supply.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons,

The evident Necessity of securing this Kingdom from every Danger, whether Foreign or Domestic; and of rendering the Success of Invasion, if attempted, impracticable, will demonstrate to you the Wisdom of continuing that enlarged System of Defence you have so wisely adopted.

I have, therefore, ordered the Public Accounts and Estimates for the ensuing Year to be laid before you, and have the fullest Confidence that in the Supply which such a Situation shall appear to you to require, you will equally consult the Safety of the Kingdom, and the Honor of His Majesty's Government.

I am induced to hope that the great Increase of the Revenue which has taken place in the present Year may enable you to raise the Sums which may be wanted for the current Service without any distressing Addition to the Burthens of the People.

My Lords and Gentlemen,

I recommend to your usual Attention the Agriculture, the Manufactures, and particularly the Linen-Manufacture, of Ireland; and I doubt not that the Protestant Charter-Schools, and those public Institutions, whether of Charity or Education, which have been protected by your Liberality, will still receive a judicious Encouragement.

It will be for your Wisdom to consider how far it will be necessary to continue any of those extraordinary Powers with which you have strengthened the Authority of His Majesty's Government, for the more effectual Suppression and Punishment of rebellious Conspiracy and Outrage.

His Majesty places the most entire Reliance upon your Firmness and Wisdom, and he has no Doubt that you will anxiously pursue such Measures as shall be best calculated for bringing the present War to an honorable Termination, and for restoring the Country to permanent Tranquillity.

It will be my constant Object to attend to your Suggestions and Advice, that I may by this Means most beneficially accomplish the Commands I have received from His Majesty, and most effectually forward the Interests and Happiness of this Kingdom.

To His Excellency Charles Marquis Cornwallis, Lord Lieutenant-General and General-Governor of Ireland,

The humble Address of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal in Parliament assembled.

May it please your Excellency,

WE, His Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Lords Spiritual and Temporal in Parliament assembled, return your Excellency our most sincere Thanks for your Excellency's Speech from the Throne.

The Continuation of your Excellency in the Government of this Kingdom is an additional Proof of His Majesty's parental Attention to its Security and Prosperity, and, under the Protection of your Excellency's eminent Abilities, and the Moderation and Wisdom of your Administration, we feel the utmost Confidence that the Safety of Ireland is ensured, and its Interests and Welfare protected and confirmed.

We beg Leave most cordially to congratulate your Excellency upon the gratifying and encouraging Reflections which present themselves to our Consideration, upon a Review of the important and glorious Events that have distinguished the Period which has elapsed since the last Session of Parliament.

When we contemplate the brilliant Course of Victories achieved by the Combined Imperial Armies, by which the various Kingdoms and States of Italy have been delivered from the Ravages and the Tyranny of the French; the Restoration of the Throne of Naples, and of our friendly Connection with that Kingdom; the French Expedition to Egypt checked in its Career by the Exertion of the Turkish Arms, assisted by a small Detachment of His Majesty's Forces, and the Gallantry of their heroic Commander; the hostile Plans of the common Enemy in India terminated in the total Destruction of the Power which had been misled by their Artifices, and through the timely, vigorous, and decisive Councils of the Marquis Wellesley, and the consummate Skill and Valour of His Majesty's Generals, Officers, and Troops, the British Possessions in that Quarter of the Globe beneficially extended and effectually secured, it is impossible not to express our most lively Satisfaction at Events so glorious and so advantageous to the Interest of the Empire, and although the Season, peculiarly unfavorable to Military Operations, produced the Necessity of relinquishing the Enterprize undertaken against Holland by His Majesty's Forces and his Russian Allies, so fortunately begun in the Rescue of the Dutch Fleet from the Power of the Enemy, and prevented the complete Accomplishment of His Majesty's Views, yet we must consider the Result of that Expedition as peculiarly beneficial to this Kingdom, in removing all Fear of Attack on our Coast from a Quarter whence it had been so often planned, and in enabling His Majesty's Fleets to direct their Vigilance exclusively to the single Port from which the Enemy can attack this Country with any Hope even of a temporary Success.

We are fully sensible of the Care your Excellency has exerted to carry into Execution the extraordinary Powers committed to your Discretion with Vigour, and at the same Time with Moderation, and that, although the painful Necessity of acting with Severity has been often imposed upon you, yet that you have never resorted to that Severity but for the most salutary Purposes; and whilst we lament with your Excellency that although public Tranquillity has been in a great Measure restored, a Disposition to Outrage and Conspiracy still continues in several Districts, and that much Industry is used to keep alive the Spirit of Disaffection, and to encourage among the lower Classes the Hopes of French Assistance, we trust at the same

Time that your Excellency's Perseverance in the Line of Conduct you have adopted will finally extinguish such Dispositions, and completely restore internal Tranquillity.

The late Revolution in France cannot fail to open the Eyes of those who have been deluded by the Artifices which have been unremittingly employed to withdraw them from their Allegiance; and it certainly must tend to restore and encrease the Love of Constitutional Order and of regulated Freedom, by demonstrating that the Principles of false Liberty tend ultimately to Despotism, and that the criminal Struggles of Democratic Faction naturally close in Military Usurpation.

We feel most strongly that so long as the French Government, under whatever Form it exerts its Influence, shall persevere in Schemes of Destruction and Projects of Ambition, subversive at once of the Liberties of Europe and of the Security of His Majesty's Dominions, there can be no wise Alternative but to prosecute the War with increasing Energy, and that it is by great Exertions alone that either their Views of Aggrandizement can be frustrated or a solid Peace procured.

We beg Leave to express, through your Excellency, the Gratitude we entertain for His Majesty's parental Care, at the present Crisis, in availing himself of the cordial and great Assistance which has been afforded him by his faithful Ally the Emperor of Russia, and in making every Exertion for augmenting the disposable Military Force of his own Dominions; and we trust that the Confidence which His Majesty feels that the Zeal and Loyalty of his Militia of this Kingdom will not be less prompt and conspicuous than that of his English Militia, will be justified by their Offers of Service being equally general, to forward, at this important Conjunction, the active Operations of the Empire.

Your Excellency's early Attention to the Apprehension of general Scarcity, which some Time since took place, by which you were induced, with the Advice of the Council, to offer Premiums for the early Importation of Grain, not only meets with our Approbation, but is entitled to our most grateful Acknowledgments; and your Excellency may be assured of our ready Concurrence and Co-operation, if it shall be necessary, to resort to any farther extraordinary Means for procuring a Supply.

Your Excellency may rely upon our Attention to the Agriculture, the Manufactures, and particularly the Linen Manufacture of Ireland, and that the Protestant Charter Schools, and the public Institutions, both of Charity and of Education, which we have hitherto protected, shall still receive our Encouragement.

We shall not fail to take into Consideration how far it may be necessary to continue those extraordinary Powers with which we strengthened the Authority of His Majesty's Government for the more effectual Suppression and Punishment of rebellious Conspiracy and Outrage.

His Majesty may place the most entire Reliance upon our firm and cordial Co-operation and Support, and we think it our Duty anxiously to pursue such Measures as may be best calculated for bringing the present War to an honorable Termination,

and for restoring the Country to permanent Tranquillity.

The Zeal your Excellency has invariably displayed in securing the Safety and restoring the Tranquillity of this Kingdom, and the Attention you have paid to its Welfare and Prosperity, are Pledges to us of your Continuance in the same salutary Exertions, and your Excellency may fully rely on our hearty Co-operation in such Measures as may most beneficially accomplish the gracious Wishes of His Majesty, and most effectually forward the Interests and Happiness of this Kingdom.

The humble Address of the Knights, Citizens, and Burgeesses, in Parliament assembled.

May it please your Excellency,

WE, His Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Commons of Ireland in Parliament assembled, beg Leave to return your Excellency our humble Thanks for your excellent Speech from the Throne.

In the Continuance of your Excellency as our Chief Governor, we have experienced a new and affecting Instance of His Majesty's Solicitude for the Welfare, and of his Condescension to the Wishes of his faithful People of Ireland; and we entreat your Excellency to believe, that we esteem it a signal Happiness to this Country to be placed, in the present Crisis, under the wise, firm, vigilant, and impartial Councils of a Nobleman whose Administration has so eminently conduced to the Benefit and Security of the Kingdom committed to his Care.

The important and glorious Events which have distinguished the Interval that has elapsed since the Close of the last Session of Parliament, affords us the most genuine and heartfelt Pleasure.

We have seen, with the highest Gratification, that by the splendid Series of Victories achieved

by the Combined Imperial Armies, the various Kingdoms and States of Italy have been rescued from the predatory Tyranny of French Power.

Among the fortunate Effects of those Exertions, it is a Subject of much Joy to us to observe the Restoration of the Throne of Naples to its lawful Possessor, and the Renewal of our former friendly Intercourse with that Kingdom.

We have derived the most sincere Satisfaction from the signal Check which the French Expedition to Egypt has sustained from the Exertions of Turkish Arms, animated by the gallant Co-operation of a small Detachment of His Majesty's Forces under the Direction of a Commander, whose Skill and Heroism entitle him to our warmest Applause and Admiration.

It is a Source of just Pride and Exultation to us that the hostile Projects of the common Enemy in India, have terminated in the entire Destruction of the Power which their Artifices had deluded into the Support of their ambitious Schemes; and that the timely, vigorous, and decisive Councils of the Marquis Wellesley, aided by the tried Abilities and Intrepidity of His Majesty's Generals, Officers, and Troops, have both beneficially enlarged the British Possessions in that Quarter of the Globe, and placed them in a State of solid and permanent Security.

We are truly sensible to the important Advantage which has accrued from the Descent of His Majesty's Forces and his Russian Allies on the Coast of Holland, by the Rescue of the Dutch Fleet from the Power of the Enemy; and although the Season proved so peculiarly unfavourable for Military Operations, as to render it impracticable to persist in an Enterprize so fortunately commenced, and thus prevented the entire Accomplishment of His Majesty's Views, yet the Result of the Expedition has been productive of the most beneficial Effects to this Kingdom, by removing all Fear of an Attack on our Coasts from a Quarter whence it had been so often planned, and by enabling His Majesty's Fleets to direct their undivided Attention to the only Port from which the Enemy can make any Attempt on this Country with any Hope even of a temporary Success.

We are truly sensible of the Benefits which have resulted from the judicious and salutary Exercise of the extraordinary Powers that were committed by Parliament to your Excellency's Discretion. Though we sympathize with your Excellency in regretting the Necessity which has existed for frequent Exertions of Severity, we are convinced that under the patient, humane, and scrupulous Attention with which your Excellency has administered that important Trust, no Act of Rigour has been adopted which Justice did not require, and which was not indispensable for the Order and Safety of the State; at the same Time it is a Subject of the most unfeigned Concern to us, that a Tendency to Outrage should still continue in several Districts, and that Means should be industriously employed for keeping alive the Spirit of Disaffection, and cherishing the Hope of French Co-operation. We sincerely participate in the Hope which your Excellency has so forcibly expressed, that the recent Revolution in France will open the Eyes of those who have been deluded by

the Artifices which have been unremittingly employed to withdraw them from their Allegiance; it cannot, we trust, fail to restore and cherish the Love of Constitutional Order, and of a genuine and well-regulated Freedom, by demonstrating that the Principles of a false and spurious Liberty lead only to Despotism and an ignominious Servitude; and that Military Usurpation is the natural Termination to the criminal Efforts of Democratic Faction.

Most strongly do we feel that so long as the French Government, whatever Shape it may assume, shall persevere in Schemes of Destruction and Projects of Ambition, no less subversive of the Liberties of Europe than menacing to the Security of His Majesty's Dominions, there can be no wise or safe Alternative but to increase our Efforts in the Prosecution of the War, engaged as we are in a Contest which, by involving the dearest and most valuable Interests of social Life, calls for all our Constancy, and an unusual Share of public Spirit. We are thoroughly convinced, that it is by great Exertion alone that those Views of Aggrandisement can be frustrated, or a solid Peace procured.

We have seen with peculiar Satisfaction that His Majesty hath availed himself of the cordial and great Assistance which he has received from his faithful Ally the Emperor of Russia; and we gratefully acknowledge the wise and prudent Exertions which His Majesty has adopted for augmenting the disposable Military Force of his Dominions. The generous Co-operation given to His Majesty's Views on that Occasion by the English Militia has afforded an animating Example of Patriotism to all Parts of the Empire; and we are convinced that the Militia of this Kingdom will be anxious to prove that they deserve the Confidence His Majesty is pleased to repose in their Zeal and Loyalty, by displaying an equal Ardour for promoting His Majesty's Service, and forwarding, at this important Crisis, the active Operations of the Empire. Impressed with a full Persuasion of the beneficial Consequences likely to be derived from the speedy Accomplishment of this great and salutary Object, we shall not fail most cheerfully to concur in the Measures which shall appear best adapted for its Attainment.

The early Precautions which were adopted by your Excellency in Consequence of the Apprehensions that were some Time since of a general Scarcity, demands our grateful Acknowledgments; and your Excellency may rely on our ready Concurrence in giving a Parliamentary Sanction to the judicious and beneficial Measures which your Excellency has pursued by the Advice of the Council.

We are deeply impressed with the Wisdom and Policy of continuing that enlarged System of Defence, the Benefit of which has been experienced, and which is calculated to protect the Country from every Danger, whether Foreign or Domestic, and to render the Success of Invasion, if attempted, impracticable.

We thank your Excellency for having ordered the Public Accounts and Estimates for the ensuing Year to be laid before us. Our Zeal for His Majesty's Service, and the Security of the Kingdom, prompt us in a peculiar Manner to make a Provision adequate to the Exigencies of the Conjunction;

and it affords us infinite Satisfaction to learn that the improved State of the Revenue in the present Year will much facilitate our Endeavours for this Purpose; and is likely to enable us to raise the necessary Supplies without any distressing Addition to the Burthens of the People.

We entertain a strong Sense of your Excellency's Anxiety for promoting the true Interests of this Kingdom, in directing our Attention to its Agriculture, its Manufactures, and particularly to its Linen-Manufacture; as well as to the Protestant Charter-Schools and the other public Institutions, whether of Charity or Education; which have usually received the Bounty of Parliament: Your Excellency may be assured that those important Objects of National Prosperity shall not fail to engage our accustomed Regard and Liberality.

Your Excellency may rely on our taking into our early Consideration the Expediency of continuing any of those extraordinary Powers by which the Executive Government has been strengthened; for the more effectual Repression and Punishment of Rebellious Conspiracy and Outrage.

We cannot with sufficient Gratitude express our Acknowledgments for His Majesty's gracious reliance on our Firmness and Zeal in maintaining the great Cause in which we are engaged; and we beseech your Excellency to assure his Majesty of our unshaken Attachment to His Person, Family, and Government, and of our unalterable Resolution to pursue such Measures as shall be best calculated for insuring a safe and honorable Conclusion of the present War, and for re-establishing in the Country permanent Tranquillity.

Of your Excellency's unwearied Endeavours for promoting the Happiness and Prosperity of this Kingdom we have experienced the most substantial Proofs; and grateful for the Advantages we enjoy under your Administration, we are prompted no less by Zeal than Duty to employ our most sedulous Exertions for the Advancement of His Majesty's Service, and for the Ease and Honor of your Excellency's Government.
