WE, taking into Our most serious Consideration the just and necessary War in which We are engaged, for the Maintenance of the Independence of Our Crown, for the Defence and Protection of the Commerce, and of the Rights and Liberties, Civil and Religious, of Our Subjects, and putting Our Trust in Almighty God, that He will graciously bless Our Arms, both by Sea and Land, have resolved, and do, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, hereby command, That a Public Fast and Humiliation be observed throughout that Part of Our Kingdom of Great Britain called England, Our Dominion of Wales, and Town of Berwick upon Tweed, on Wednesday the Twelfth Day of March next; that so both We and our People may humble Ourselves before Almighty God, in order to obtain Pardon of Our Sins; and may, in the most devout and solemn Manner, send up Our Prayers and Supplications to the Divine Majesty, for averting those heavy Judgements which Our manifold Sins and Provocations have most justly deserved; and imploring His Blessing and Assistance on Our Arms, and for restoring and perpetuating Peace, Safety, and Prosperity to Us and Our Kingdoms: And we do strictly charge and command, That the said Public Fast be reverently and devoutly observed by all Our loving Subjects in England, Our Dominion of Wales, and Town of Berwick upon Tweed, as they tender the Favor of Almighty God, and would avoid His Wrath and Indignation; and upon Pain of such Punishment as We may justly inflict on all such as contemn and neglect the Performance of so religious and necessary a Duty. And for the better and more orderly solemnizing the same, We have

given Directions to the Most Reverend the Archbishops, and the Right Reverend the Bishops of England, to compose a Form of Prayer suitable to this Occasion, to be used in all Churches, Chapels, and Places of Publick Worship; and to take Care the same be timely dispersed throughout their respective Dioceses.

Kingdoms: And we do strictly charge and command, That the said Publick Fast be reverently and devoutly observed by all Our loving Subjects in Scotland, as they tender the Favor of Almighty God, and would avoid His Wrath and Indignation; and upon Pain of such Punishment as We may justly inflict on all such as contemn and neglect the Performance of so religious and necessary a Duty, Our Will is therefore, and We charge, That this Our Proclamation seen, ye forthwith pass to the Market Cross of Edinburgh, and all other Places needful, and there, in Our Name and Authority, make Publication hereof, that none pretend Ignorance: And Our Will and Pleasure is, That Our Solicitor do cause printed Copies hereof to be sent to the Sheriffs of the several Shires, Stewarts of Stewartries, and Bailiffs of Regalities, and their Clerks, whom We ordain to see the same published; and We appoint them to send Copies hereof to the several Parish Churches within their Bounds, that upon the Lord's Day immediately preceding the Day above-mentioned, the same may be published, and read from the Pulpits, immediately after Divine Service.

WHEREAS it has been represented to His Majesty at this Board, that the malignant and infectious Disease of the Nature of the Plague, which some Time since manifested itself at Philadelphia and New York, has totally ceased; His Majesty, taking the same into Consideration, and being desirous to remove all Restraints upon Trade, so far as may be consistent with the Safety of his Subjects, is pleased, by and with the Advice of his Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, That the Quarantine laid by His Majesty's Order in Council of the Sixteenth of October last upon all Ships, Persons, Goods, and Merchandizes arriving or to arrive from Philadelphia and New York, or any Port within the State of Pennsylvania, or any Port within the Province of New York, be taken off; and that all such Ships and Vessels be permitted to discharge their respective Ladings without unpacking, opening, and airing, and without performing any Quarantine, as freely as they might have done in case such Order of the Sixteenth of October last had not been made, any Thing in the said Order contained to the contrary notwithstanding: And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master-General of the

Ordinance, His Majesty's Secretary at War, and the Governors or Commanders in Chief of the Isles of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, Sark, and Man, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain. *W. Fawcener.*

Extract of a Letter from Admiral Sir Hyde Parker, Knt. Commander in Chief of His Majesty's Ships and Vessels at Jamaica, to Evan Nepean, Esq; Secretary of the Admiralty, dated in Port-Royal Harbour, December 1, 1799.

SIR,

YOU will be pleased to communicate to my Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, that His Majesty's Ship Calypso arrived here the 21st of last Month with a Part of the English and Cork Convoys which had been dispersed by a Spanish Squadron off the Mona Passage. On the 23d Ultimo, His Majesty's Ship Crescent arrived with the Remainder of the Convoy; the General Goddard Storeship only excepted.

Captain Lobb's Conduct on this Occasion (as their Lordships will perceive by the Copy of his Letter enclosed) was that of a judicious Officer.

SIR, *Crescent, Port-Royal, Nov. 22, 1799.*

I AM exceedingly sorry to acquaint you, that on the Dawn of the 15th Instant, the S. W. End of Porto Rico bearing N. E. Ten or Twelve Leagues, we unfortunately fell in with a Squadron belonging to the Enemy consisting of a Line of Battle Ship, Frigate, and Corvette.

As the Two former were directly in our Course on the Larboard Tack, I made the Convoy's Signal to haul to the Wind on the Starboard Tack: made Sail to reconpoitre them; and on joining the Calypso, (which had previously chased,) perfectly coincided with Captain Baker that they were Enemies; and made Signal to the Convoys for that Purpose.

The Line of Battle Ship and Frigate keeping close together, I was in great Hopes of drawing them from the Convoy by keeping within random Shot to Windward, and bore up for that Purpose, making the Calypso's Signal to chase N. W. the Direction the Body of the Convoy was then in:—at Nine the Enemy tacked, and I was under the Necessity of making the Signal to disperse.

The Calypso bore up for that Part of the Convoy that were running to Leeward. The Corvette which had been seen some Time before was standing for the Ships that had kept their Wind; I immediately made Sail to relieve them, and had the good Fortune to capture her.

The Enemy were previously chasing the Ships to Leeward; and I was happy to observe them haul their Wind, I suppose, on perceiving the Situation of the Corvette; but this, as well as their other Manœuvres during the Course of the Day appeared so very undetermined, that they did not take the necessary Steps to prevent our taking Possession of her; nor had they brought to any of the Convoy at Dark, notwithstanding they had been near them for Twelve Hours; and their Situation was such as to give me sanguine Hopes not any have been captured.

The Squadron proved to be Spanish, from Saint Domingo bound to the Havannah, consisting of the *Asia*, of 64 Guns and 550 Men, Commodore Don Francisco Montes.

Amphitrite, of 44 Guns and 360 Men, Captain Don Diego Villagomez.

Galgo, of 16 Guns and 100 Men, Captain Don Jose de Arias.

I Beg you to lay before my Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, the inclosed Letter which I have received from Captain Rogers, of the Mercury, giving an Account of his having captured the French Brig Privateer L'Egyptienne, which has lately done considerable Mischief in the Channel.

SIR, *Mercury, Spithead, Feb. 6, 1800.*

I Beg to acquaint you, that on the 24th January, cruising agreeably to your Orders, I recaptured (Scilly, bearing N. by E. 28 Leagues) the Ship Aimwell, of Whitby, from Quebec bound to London, with a valuable Cargo; she had been taken Fifteen Days before in Lat. 49 Deg. 30 Min. N. Long. 13 Deg. 30 Min. W. by l'Arriège, French Privateer, belonging to Bourdeaux.

I have also to acquaint you, that Yesterday Morning returning to Spithead, I captured off the Isle of Wight, l'Egyptienne, French Brig Privateer, mounting Fifteen Brafs Guns, and manned with Sixty-six Men; she is a new Vessel, and sailed from Cherbourg the Evening before, and was close in with Peverel Point, when discovered by the Mercury, looking out for Vessels going in at the Needles; she had however taken nothing.

P. S. I should mention that the Privateer, when the Mercury got close up with her, very wantonly, when in the Act of hauling down her Colours, (not having fired a Shot before,) discharged her Musketry into us, by which one of my People was shot in the Body, but the Wound is not mortal.

Extract of a Letter from Admiral Lord Viscount Duncan, Commander in Chief of His Majesty's Ships and Vessels in the North Sea, to Evan Nepean, Esq; dated at Yarmouth, the 7th Instant.

BY Lieutenant O'Neill's Letter their Lordships will see he has captured a small Dutch Privateer, and as the Cobourg is in want of Ordnance Stores, which are not to be had here, shall let her go to the Nore for a Supply.

Marshal de Cobourg Hired Armed Brig,

MY LORD, *Yarmouth Roads, Feb. 7, 1800.*

I Beg to inform you, that cruising to effect the Purport of your Lordship's Order of the 18th Ult. on the 1st Instant, the Texel in sight bearing South, observing a Cutter to windward standing for us, which, from her Signals and Movements,

we presumed to be an Enemy; we practised several necessary Deceptions to decoy her nearly into our Wake, when, on tacking and giving her a few Guns, she lowered her Sails down, and was taken Possession of; proves to be the Flushing Dutch Privateer, commanded by Mynheer Van C. G. Hamendel, mounting Four Two-Pounders, and Twenty-eight Men, out from Helvoet Three Days, and had not captured any Thing.

As several Artificers and Manufacturers, Subjects of Great Britain, have, from Time to Time, gone into Foreign Countries to exercise their several Callings, contrary to the Laws of these Kingdoms; the following Abstracts of Acts of Parliament of Their late Majesties King George the First and Second, and of His present Majesty, for preventing such Practices, are published, for the Information of all Persons who may be ignorant of the Penalties they may incur by Disobedience to them: And it will be observed, that such Penalties likewise extend to those who are any ways concerned or instrumental in the Sending or Enticing Artificers or Manufacturers out of these Kingdoms, or in the Exportation of the Tools and Instruments used by them, as well as to the Artificers or Manufacturers themselves.

Statute 5 George I. Chap. 27.

IF any Person shall contract with, entice, or solicit, any Artificer in Wool, Iron, Steel, Brafs, or other Metal, Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other Artificer of Great Britain, to go into Foreign Countries out of the King's Dominions, and shall be convicted thereof, upon Indictment or Information in any of the Courts at Westminster, or at the Assizes or Quarter Sessions, he shall be fined any Sum not exceeding ONE HUNDRED POUNDS for the first Offence, and shall be imprisoned Three Months, and till the Fine be paid. And if any Person having been once convicted shall offend again, he shall be fined at the Discretion of the Court, and imprisoned Twelve Months, and till the Fine be paid.

If any of the King's Subjects, being such Artificers, shall go into any Country out of His Majesty's Dominions, to exercise or teach the said Trades to Foreigners; and if any of the King's Subjects in any such Foreign Country, exercising any of the said Trades, shall not return into this

Realm within Six Months after Warning given by the Ambassador, Minister, or Consul of Great Britain; in the Country where such Artificers shall be, or by any Person authorised by such Ambassador, &c. or by one of the Secretaries of State, and from henceforth inhabit within this Realm; such Persons shall be incapable of taking any Legacy, or of being an Executor or Administrator, or of taking any Lands, &c. within this Kingdom, by Descent, Devise, or Purchase, and shall forfeit all Lands, Goods, &c. within this Kingdom, to His Majesty's Use, and shall be deemed Alien, and out of His Majesty's Protection.

Upon Complaint made, upon Oath, before any Justice of Peace, that any Person is endeavouring to seduce any such Artificer, or that any such Artificer hath contracted or is preparing to go out of His Majesty's Dominions, for the Purposes aforesaid, such Justice may send his Warrant to bring the Person complained of before him, or before some other Justice; and if it shall appear by the Oath of One Witness, or by Confession, that he was guilty of any of the said Offences, such Justice may bind him to appear at the next Assizes or Quarter Sessions: And if such Person shall refuse to give Security, the Justice may commit him to Gaol till the next Assizes or Quarter Sessions, and until he shall be delivered by due Course of Law. And if any such Artificer shall be convicted, upon Indictment, of any such Promise, Contract, or Preparation to go beyond the Seas, for the Purpose aforesaid, he shall give such Security to the King not to depart out of His Majesty's Dominions, as such Court shall think reasonable, and shall be imprisoned till Security given.

If any of the above Offences shall be committed in Scotland, the same shall be prosecuted in the Court of Justiciary or the Circuits there.

Statute 23 George II. Chap. 13.

IF any Person shall contract with, or endeavour to seduce any Artificer in Wool, Mohair, Cotton, or Silk, or in Iron, Steel, Brass, or other Metal, or any Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other Artificer in any other of the Manufactures of Great Britain or Ireland, to go out of this Kingdom or Ireland into any Foreign Country not within the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, and shall be convicted, upon Indictment or Information, in the Kings Bench at Westminster, or by Indictment at the Assizes or General Gaol Delivery for the County, &c. wherein such Offence shall be committed in England, or by Indictment in the Court of Justiciary or any of the Circuit Courts in Scotland, or by Indictment or Information in the King's Bench at Dublin, if such Offence be committed in Ireland; the Person so convicted shall, for every Artificer contracted with or seduced, forfeit FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS, and shall suffer Imprisonment in the Common Gaol of the County or Stewartry wherein such Offender shall be convicted for Twelve Calendar Months, and until Forfeiture be paid: And in case of a subsequent Offence of the same Kind, the Persons so again offending shall forfeit, for every Person contracted with or seduced, ONE THOUSAND POUNDS, and shall suffer Imprisonment in the Common Gaol

of the County or Stewartry wherein such Offender shall be convicted; for Two Years, and until such Forfeiture be paid.

If any Person in Great Britain or Ireland shall put on board any Ship or Boat, not bound directly to some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to some other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, any such Tools or Utensils as are commonly used in, or proper for the Preparing, Working up, or Finishing of the Woollen or Silk Manufactures, or any Part of such Tools, he shall, for every Offence, forfeit all such Tools, or Parts thereof, put on board, and TWO HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered by Action of Debt, &c. in any Court of Record at Westminster, or in the Court of Session in Scotland, or at any of the Four Courts in Dublin respectively, wherein no Effoin, &c. shall be allowed.

It shall be lawful for any Officer of the Customs in Great Britain, or for any Officer of the Revenue in Ireland, to seize and secure, in some of His Majesty's Warehouses, all such Tools or Utensils prohibited to be exported, as such Officer shall find on board any Vessel not bound directly to some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to some other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain; and all Tools so seized shall, after Condemnation, be publicly sold to the best Bidder; and one Moiety of the Produce shall be to the Use of His Majesty, and the other Moiety to the Officer who shall seize and secure the same.

If the Captain of any Vessel in Great Britain or Ireland knowingly permit any of the said Tools, prohibited to be exported, to be put on board his Vessel, he shall, for every such Offence, forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered as the Penalties inflicted upon Persons exporting the Tools; and, if the Vessel belongs to His Majesty, the Captain shall not only forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, but shall also forfeit his Employment, and be incapable of any Employment under His Majesty.

If any Officer of the Customs in Great Britain or of the Revenue in Ireland, take, or knowingly suffer to be taken, any Entry outward, or sign any Cocket or Sufferance for the Shipping or Exporting of any of the said Tools, or knowingly suffer the same to be done, he shall forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered as aforesaid, and also forfeit his Office, and be incapable of any Office under His Majesty.

One Moiety of the Forfeitures shall be applied to the Use of His Majesty, and the other Moiety to the Use of the Person who shall sue for the same.

Statutes 14, 21, 25, and 26 of His present Majesty.

BY these Statutes the like Penalties and Forfeitures as above-mentioned are extended to Persons packing or putting on board any Vessel, not bound directly for some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, any Machine, Engine, Tool, Press, Paper, Utensil, or Implement whatsoever, used in or proper for the working or finishing of the Cotton, Steel, or Iron Manufactures of this Kingdom, or any Part or Parts of such Machines or Implements, or any Models or Plans thereof; and all Captains of Ships and other Persons receiving or being in Possession



of any such Articles, with an Intent to export the same to Foreign Parts, and all Custom-house Officers suffering an Entry to be made thereof, are respectively liable to the like Penalties as are above-mentioned, in the case of Tools and Utensils, used in the Woollen and Silk Manufactures.

NOTICE TO MARINERS.
