eighth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, | intituled An A& for impowering His Majefty for 'a Time, and to an Extent to be limited, to accept the Services of fuch Parts of his Militia Forces in this Kingdom as may voluntarily offer themfelves to be employed in Ireland.

An Act for continuing until the Expiration of Six Weeks after the Commencement of the next Seffion of Parliament, an Act made in the Thirtyfeventh Year of the Reign of His prefent Majefty, intituled An Act for the better Prevention and Punifhment of Attempts to feduce Perfons ferving in His Majefly's Forces by Sea or Land from their Duty and Allegiance to His Majefly, or to incite them to Mutiny or Difobedience.

An Act to continue until the first Day of March One thousand eight hundred and three, an Act made in the Thirty-third Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, for establishing Courts of Judicature in the Island of Newfoundland, and to continue until the Expiration of Forty Days after the Commencement of the next Selfion of Parliament, feveral Laws relating to the Admission of certain Articles of Merchandize in Neutral Ships, and the iffuing of Orders in Council for that Purpofe; to the authorifing His Majefty to make Re-gulations refpecting the Trade to the Cape of Good Hope, and to the enabling His Majefty to permit Goods to be imported into this Kingdom in Neutral Ships.

THIS Day the Lords being met, a Meffage was fent to the Honorable Houfe of Commons by Sir Francis Molyneux, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that The Lords, authorifed by wirtue of His Majefty's Commilfion for de-claring His Royal Affent to feveral Alts agreed upon by both Houfes, do defire the immediate Attendance of the Honorable Houfe in the Houfe of Peers to hear the Commiffion read; and the Commons being come thither, the faid Commiffion, empowering the Lord Arch-bishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and feveral other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Affent to the faid Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Affent given to

An Act to indemnify fuch Perfons as have omitted to qualify themfelves for Offices and Employments, and to indemnify Justices of the Peace or others who have omitted to register or deliver in their Qualifications within the Time directed by Law, and for extending the Time limited for those Purpoles until the Twenty-fifth Day of December One thousand eight hundred; to indemnify Mem-bers and Officers in Cities, Corporations, and Bo-rough Towns, whole Admissions have been omitted to be flamped according to Law, or having been ftamped, have been loft or millaid, and for allowing them until the Twenty-fifth Day of December One thousand eight hundred, to provide Admissions duly flamped; to permit fuch Perfons as have omitted to make and file Affidavits of the Execu-tion of Indentures of Clerks to Attornies and Solicitors, to make and file the fame on or before the first Day of Michaelmas Term One thousand eight hundred; and for indemnifying Deputy-Lieutenants and Officers of the Militia who have

neglected to transmit Descriptions of their Qualifications to the Clerks of the Peace within the Time directed by Law, and for extending the Time limited for that Purpole until the First Day of September One thousand eight hundred.

An Act to prohibit until the Expiration of Six Weeks after the Commencement of the next Seffion of Parliament, any Perfon or Perfons from felling any Bread which shall not have been baked a certain Time.
