WHEREAS by an Act passed in the Twenty-eighth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled, "An Act for regulating the Trade between the Subjects of His Majesty's Colonies and Plantations in North America, and in the West India Islands, and the Countries belonging to the United States of America, and between His Majesty's said Subjects and the Foreign Islands in the West Indies," It is, amongst other Things, enacted, That it shall and may be lawful for his Majesty in Council, by Order or Orders to be issued and published from Time to Time, to authorise, or by Warrant or Warrants, under his Sign Manual, to empower the Governor of Newfoundland for the Time being to authorise, in case of Necessity, the Importation into Newfoundland of Bread, Flour, Indian Corn, and Live Stock, from any of the Territories belonging to the said United States, for the Supply of the Inhabitants and Fishermen of the Island of Newfoundland, for the then ensuing Season only; provided always, that such Bread, Flour, Indian Corn, and Live Stock, so authorised to be imported into the Island of Newfoundland, shall not be imported except in conformity to such Rules, Regulations, and Restrictions as shall be specified in such Order or Orders, Warrant or Warrants, respectively, and except by British Subjects and in British-built Ships, owned by His Majesty's Subjects, and navigated according to Law. And whereas it is expedient and necessary that Provision be made for fully supplying the Inhabitants or Fishermen of the Island of Newfoundland, for the ensuing Season, with Bread, Flour, Indian Corn, Rice, and Live Stock; His Majesty doth thereupon, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order and declare, That, for the Supply of the Inhabitants and Fishermen of the Island of Newfoundland, for the ensuing Season only, Bread, Flour, Indian Corn, Rice, and Live Stock may be imported into the said Island from any of the Territories belonging to the said United States, by British Subjects, and in British-built Ships, owned by His Majesty's Subjects, and navigated accord-

ing to Law, and which shall, within the Space of Seven Months previous to the Time of such Importation, have cleared out from some Port in Great Britain, or some other Port of His Majesty's Dominions, in Europe, for which Purpose a Licence shall have been granted by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs in England or Scotland, or the Commissioners of His Majesty's Revenue in Ireland, or any other Person or Persons who may be duly authorised in that Kingdom respectively, in the Manner and Form hereinafter mentioned; which Licence shall continue and be in Force for Seven Calendar Months from the Day of the Date upon which such Licence is respectively granted, and no longer; provided that no such Licence as aforesaid, granted after the Thirtieth Day of September next, shall be of any Force or Effect: And His Majesty is hereby further pleased to order, That the Master, or Person having the Charge or Command of any Ship or Vessel to whom such Licence shall be granted, shall, upon the Arrival of the said Ship or Vessel at the Port, Harbour, or Place in the Island of Newfoundland, where he shall discharge such Bread, Flour, Indian Corn, Rice, and Live Stock, deliver up the said Licence to the Collector or other proper Officer of the Customs there, having first indorsed on the Back of such Licence the Marks, Numbers, and Contents of each Package of Bread, Flour, or Indian Corn, Rice, and the Number of Live Stock, under the Penalty of the Forfeiture in the said Act mentioned. And the Collector or other proper Officer of the Customs at Newfoundland is hereby enjoined and required to give a Certificate to the Master, or Person having the Charge or Command of such Ship or Vessel, of his having received the said Licence, so indorsed as before directed, and to transmit the same to the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs in England or Scotland, or to the Commissioners of His Majesty's Revenue in Ireland, respectively, by whom such Licence was granted.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the Thirty-ninth Year of His Majesty's Reign, intitled "An Act to allow the Importation of Spanish Wool in Ships belonging to Countries in Amity with His Majesty," reciting that by an Act passed in the Thirty-third Year of His Majesty's Reign, to prevent Traiterous Correspondence with His Majesty's Enemies, and by several subsequent Acts Trade and Intercourse was prohibited between Great Britain and the Countries in Hostility with His Majesty, unless such Trade and Intercourse should be specially permitted by His Majesty's Licence and Authority; and also reciting, that, for the Encouragement of the Manufactures of this Country, it was expedient to permit the Importation of Spanish Wool from any Place whatever in Ships or Vessels belonging to any

Kingdom or State in Amity with His Majesty, it was enacted that it should be lawful to and for any Person or Persons to import into this Kingdom Spanish Wool from any Port or Place whatever, in Foreign Parts, in any Ship or Vessel belonging to any Kingdom or State in Amity with His Majesty, any Thing in the said Act passed in the Thirty-third Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, or any other Act or Acts of Parliament to the contrary in anywise notwithstanding.

And whereas Doubts have arisen, whether, according to the true Construction of the said Act of the Thirty-ninth Year of His Majesty's Reign, His Majesty's Subjects are thereby authorised to purchase and import Spanish Wool under Circumstances which would make the same liable to capture, as the Property of Subjects of His Majesty trading with the Enemy, unless the Licence of His Majesty should be first obtained for that Purpose: His Majesty, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that it shall be lawful for any of His Majesty's Subjects to purchase and import into this Kingdom any Spanish Wool, in any Ship or Vessel belonging to any Kingdom or State in Amity with His Majesty, notwithstanding the Purchase and Importation thereof, may be deemed a trading with His Majesty's Enemies, and notwithstanding the same might be liable to Capture as the Property of His Majesty's Subjects trading with the Enemy, in case this Order had not been made.

And whereas some of His Majesty's Subjects may have already purchased for the Purpose of importing into this Kingdom, and others may have caused to be brought to this Kingdom for the Purpose of Importation, Spanish Wool, without having obtained His Majesty's Special Licence for the same, conceiving that such Licence had been rendered unnecessary by the said Act of the Thirty-ninth Year of His Majesty's Reign; His Majesty is pleased, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that in case any Person or Persons, being a Subject, or Subjects of His Majesty, hath, or have, since the passing of the said Act, purchased, for the Purpose of importing into this Kingdom, or caused to be brought into this Kingdom for the Purpose of Importation, any such Spanish Wool, as aforesaid, without having previously obtained any Special Licence from His Majesty for so doing; it shall be lawful for such Person or Persons to import the same, as if such Licence had been previously obtained: And this His Majesty's Order shall be deemed and taken to be a full and sufficient Licence for the Purchase, and Importation of such Wool, notwithstanding such Purchase or Importation might otherwise be deemed unlawful, as a trading with His Majesty's Enemies, in case this Order had not been made: And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, and the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

SIR,

I AM to acquaint you that His Majesty's Ship under my Command failed from Cork Harbour on the 12th Instant; and on the 14th captured the Bougainville, a French Privateer of Saint Malo, commanded by Pierre Dupont, mounting Eighteen Six-Pounders, and carrying Eighty-two Men: but I am sorry to add, that on the following Evening as the Amazon was brought-to to Sound, the Bougainville ran on board us at the Rate of Nine Knots, and rebounded off with the immediate Loss of her Fore and Main-Masts, and with so much Injury to her Hull, that there was an instantaneous Alarm of Sinking. It was not without some Risk, as the Night was dark, the Sea rough, and the Wind high, that the Boats were hoisted out of the Amazon, and all the Men saved excepting One. The Bougainville, I am told, was at this Time going down by the Stern, the Water within-board being above the afterpart of the Gun-Deck. The Injury

done to the Amazon was nothing more than carrying away the Spritsail, Yard, and Bumkin.

SIR,

ON my Way to execute your Order of Yesterday's Date, I fell in this Morning and captured, after an Hours' Chase, a French Gun Vessel No. 57, mounting an Iron Twenty-four-Pounder in her Bow, with a Number of small Arms, &c. commanded by Le Citoyen Roulland, Enseigne de Vaisseau, from the River Fegué, bound to St. Maloes, out Twenty-four Hours; several of her Crew and Passengers made their Escape in the Boat before she struck, and one was drowned in attempting to swim on Shore. Cape Frehel, bore South Half a Mile from us, when the above brought to and struck.

SIR,

ON the 11th Instant, in Latitude 43 Deg. 29 Min. N. Longitude 12 Deg. W. a Ship of a very suspicious Appearance was discovered at a great Distance from the Convoy; the Weather at the Time being extremely hazy; after a Chase of Four Hours, we got within Shot of her, when she brought to and surrendered; we found her to be the Aquilla Spanish Ship of War, pierced for Twenty-two Guns on the Main Deck, but having only Four mounted, commanded by Don Mariano Merino, from Buenos Ayres, bound to Corunna with a Cargo.

At Day-break on the 15th Instant, when proceeding on our Voyage, a Sail was seen a-head, on our approaching her she altered her Course, and endeavoured to avoid us; after a very short Chase we came up with and recaptured her; she is the Lady Harewood, a Ship that parted from the Convoy on the 1st Instant, at the Commencement of an excessive hard Gale of Wind; she was taken Two Days before in Latitude 38 Deg. N. Longitude 16 Deg. W. by the Vautour French Ship Privateer of Twenty Guns.

The Asturiana is a very large Ship; quite new, admirably found, and coppered.
