And whereas the above Theat (in Part) has been put in Execution by some evil-minded Person or Persons unknown, in the wilfully setting Fire on the Evening of Wednesday the 12th Instant to Two-Barns, a Cow-House, a Quantity of Hay and Straw, a Fattening Calf, and several other Articles, which were consumed, situate on an Estate the Property of George Taldin Foot, Esq; and in the Occupation of John Holloway, and known by the Name of Hayters Common Barn, and Premises, in the Parish of White-Parish aforesaid;
