MY LORD, Cruizer at Sea, March 24, 1800. I Beg Leave to acquaint you, that on the 23d Initant, in the act of boarding Two Brigs, I difcovered a fufpicious Sail to the Eaftward, to which I immediately gave Chace ; and after a Chace of Five Hours, came up with and captured the French Cutter Privateer Perfeverant, of Fourteen Guns and Forty-feven Men, commanded by Cap-tain Delattre, belonging to Dunkirk. She is a remarkably fine Veffel, Copper-bottomed, and has captured an amazing Number of Veffels in the North Sea.

MY LORD, Have the Pleafure to inform you, that Yefferday, upon boarding a Brig belonging to Bremen, the Master informed me he had been hailed about Three Hours before by a French Brig fleering to the North Eaft. I immediately made all Sail poffible in that Quarter, and at Half past Eight ran alongfide of her, when the ftruck to His Majetty's Sloop. She proved to be the Flibuftier, of Fourteen Guns and Fifty-four Men, commanded by Captain Cany, belonging to Dunkirk; failed the Day before, and had taken nothing.

SIR, Have the Honor to acquaint you, for their Lord-hips' Information, that His Majefty's Brig Seaflower, under my Command, on the Morning of the 19th Instant, Guernfey, bearing S. E. by S. Six Leagues, faw a ftrange Sail bearing S. by W. Two or Three Leagues, to which we immediately gave Chace, and I have the Satisfaction to inform, that after a long Chace of Ten Hours and a Half, came up and captured her; Cape Frahal, bearing S. by E. Three Leagues; the proved to be the Chaler Lugger Privateer of St. Maloes, mounting Fourteen Carriage Guns, and Thirty Men ; Nine of her Guns fhe threw overboard during the Chace; commanded by Citizen Gillies, out Ten Days from Raro without taking any Thing ; fhe is quite new and fails faft.
