Here is to all Bicester Gentlemen as calls themselves clever Gentlemen if they dont rise Poor Mens pay as they can live better we will rise and Fight for our Lives better fight and be killed nor be starved an inch at a time As for your Association Beggar Boys we dont mind no more nor a parcel of Old Women for if we dont have more Bread in short time we will have more Blood for the Farmers and Millers and Bakers are all Damned Rogues but they shall go to rack in short time for we will slaughter them and set Wheat Ricks on Fire As for our Town Bakers we will choke them and make them up like their Cakes in their Ovens and Burn their Premises down all round this Neighbourhood that Birmingham Waggon has Carried a deal a Wheat away but for the future they shall be looked into as for the Shopkeepers pinch the poor of their Weight and Hogkillers be Rascals they buy their Hogs at 12 Shillings a Score and sells them after the Rate of 20 Shillings but the Justices should look into those things but they rather all them Starving but rather than starve we will rise and Fight for our Lives and they will not we will Burn them alive as for these Justices and Gentlemen have enclosed the Fields and the cause of laying down the hails The Devil will Whip them into Heletails
