HE Right Honorable Lord Keitli, K. B. Commander in Chief of His Majesty's Fleet in the Mediterranean, having, by his Proclamation, dated in Leghorn Roads on the 12th of March last, declared the Cities of Marseilles, Toulon, and Nice, and the whole Coast of the Rureva de Ponente, to be in a State of Blockade; and the Commanders, as well of His Majesty's Ships of War, as of the Ships of War belonging to His Majesty's Allies, and serving under his Lordship's Orders, having been directed to enforce the faid Blockade, by detaining and proceeding according to Law against all such Vessels as may be found attempting to infringe the same; Notice is hereby given thereof, in order that all Masters and Owners of Neutral Vessels may govern themselves accordingly.
