

An Act to enact, that Part of an Act passed in the Parliament of England in the Eighth Year of Richard the Second, shall not continue to be of Force in this Kingdom, any Law to the contrary notwithstanding.

An Act to empower the Lord Lieutenant or other Chief Governor or Governors of Ireland to apprehend and detain such Persons as he or they shall suspect for conspiring against His Majesty's Person and Government.

An Act for continuing an Act passed in the Thirty-third Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled, An Act for establishing Regulations respecting Aliens arriving in this Kingdom or resident therein, in certain Cases, and Subjects of this Kingdom who have served or are serving in foreign Armies; and for continuing another Act passed in the Thirty-sixth Year of His present Majesty's Reign, intituled An Act to prevent the Importation of Arms, Gunpowder, and Ammunition into this Kingdom, and making and removing, selling and keeping of Gunpowder, Arms, and Ammunition without Licence.

An Act for the Relief of uncertified Bankrupts.
