HIS Day the Lords being met, a Meffage was fent to the Honorable Houfe of Commons by Sir Francis Molyneux, Gentleman Ufher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that The Lords, authorifed by virtue of His, Majefly's Commission for declaring His Royal Affent to feveral Acts agreed upon by both Houfes, do define the immediate Attendance of this Honorable Houfe in the Houfe of Peers to hear the Commission read : and the Commons being come thither, the faid Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and feveral other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Affent to the faid Acts, was read accordingly; and the Royal Affent given to

An Act for appointing Commiffioners to put in Execution an Act of this Selfion of Parliament initialed An Act for continuing and granting to His Majeily a Duty on Penfions, Offices, and Perfonal Eltates in England, Wales, and the Town of Berwick upon Tweed, and certain Duties on Sugar, Malt, Tobacco and Snuff, for the Service of the Year One thousand eight hundred, together with those named in the Two former Acts for appointing Commiffioners of the Land Tax.

An Act for indemnifying Perfons ferving in Volunteer Corps who have omitted to take out Certificates for wearing Hair-Powder, and to amend fo much of an Act made in the Thirty fifth Year of the Reign of His prefent Majefty, initialed An Act for granting to His Majefty a Duty on Certificates iffued for using Hair-Powder, as relates to the exempting Perfons ferving in Volunteer Corps, and certain Officers in His Majefty's Navy ferving on the Eftablifhment of the Royal Holpital at Greenwich, from the faid Duty; and for obliging Perfons elaiming to be exempt from the Dutics on Horfes provided and furnished for Volunteer Corps, to deliver Certificates thereof to the proper Officers.

An Act for making and repairing the Road from the Town of Stonehaven, through the Slugmount, to the New Bridge over the River Dee at Coblehcugh, in the County of Kincardine.

An Act for continuing for Twenty-one Years, and from thence to the End of the then next Seffion of Parliament, the Term, and altering and enlarging the Powers of Two Acts made in the Thirty-fecond Year of the Reign of His late Majetty King George the Second, and in the Eighteenth Year of the Reign of His prefent Majetty, for repairing the Road from Wakefield to Aufterlands, in the Weft Riding of the County of York. An Act to continue for Twenty-one Years, and from thence to the End of the then next Seffion of

An Act to continue for Twenty-one Years, and from thence to the End of the then next Seffion of Parlianent, the Term; and alter and enlarge the Powers of an Act made in the Twenty-ninth Year of the Reign of His prefent Majefty, for amending, widening, turning, varying, altering, and keeping in Repair feveral Roads therein-mentioned, in the County-Palatine of Lancaster, fo far as the fame relates to the Road from Hashingden to Todmorden, being the Second District of the faid Roads, and for making and maintaining a Branch therefrom at or near a Place called Fearns, in Wolfenden-Booth, to Edge-Side in the fame Booth; and another Branch therefrom at or near a Place called Robert's

Mill, in Bacup-Booth, into the Rochdale Hurrpike-Road, in the Parish of Spotland, all in the faid County-Palatine of Lancaster.

An Act for more effectually Repairing the Road. from Alemouth, through Alnwick and Rothbury to Hexham, and a Branch from the faid Road between Alnwick and Rothbury, to Jockey's Dike= Bridge, in the County of Northumberland.

And Two Private Acts.

Admiralty-Office, April 26, 1800. Copy of a Letter from Mr. James Le Bair, Commander of the Mayflower Private Ship of War, to Evan Nepean, Efq; dated at Guernfey the 17th Inflant.

SIR,

Have the Honor to acquaint you, for their Lordthips' Information, that on the 8th Instant, Cape Penas, at Ten A. M. bearing S. W. Diftance about Five Leagues, faw a Schooner on our Lee Beam flanding to the Northward ; at Noon perceived faid Schooner to tack and flanding for us; fhortly after which the tacked again and flood off, we continuing to chace her; at Five P. M. came within a League of her, and shewed her our Colours, which she anfwered by hoifting the National Flag; at Eight it fell calm, in confequence of which we got out Sweeps and flood for her till Midnight : on the 9th, at Two A. M. loft Sight of her; at Five difcovered her about Four Miles a-head, the Weather continuing to be calm ; at Nine a Breeze fprung up, when we fet Sail after her ; at Three P. M. came within Gun-Shot of her, the always attempting to get off; at half pall Three the took in Sail and hove to; at Four came a break of her within Musket-Shot, when we attacked and continued to enagage her for the Space of Five Hours, without altering our Polition ; when she struck, and proved to be Le Troisieme Ferrailleur Privateer, belonging to Bourdeaux, commanded by François Lugeol, mounting Two Twelve-Pound Carronades and Twelve long Four-Pounders, Six of which are Brafs, and manned with Sixty-eight Men, Three of whom were killed and Five wounded during the Action. Our Lofs confifted in One Man killed and Four wounded.

This Schooner is about One Hundred and ninety Tons Meafurement, quite new and coppered, had been Forty Days from Bourdeaux, during which Time fhe had captured the American Schooner Active, Jonathan Holbrook, Mafter, bound from Liverpool to Bofton, and a Brig from Teignmouth to Newfoundland, which fhe burnt. Befides this I captured feveral. Vefiels during my Cruife, a Lift of which I have the Honor to fubjoin, and remain, Sir, &c. &c. Xc. JAMES LE BAIR.

- The St. Incarnacao Portuguele Brig, bound from St. Ubes to Cork, recaptured.
- The St. Francisco de Alis Spanish Ship Letter of Marque, in Ballass, mounting Six Six-Pounders and Twenty-four Men.
- The Republicain Schooner Neptune, mounting Four Four-Pounders and Twenty-feven Men, bound from Guadaloupe to the first French Port, having General Des Fourneaux and his Suite on board.
- The French Latine rigged Privateer called the Tarn, mounting Two long Nine and Four Four-Pounders, (all Brafs) and Fifty-five Men.
