Lisbon, June 5.

The Count d'Estree failed from hence, as we told you in our last, with the men of War under his Command, bound according to the general report, for the West Indies. The Pyrats of Sally but the Chevalier de Chasteau-Renaud is with some French men of War in search of them.

Stockholme, June 12. The King and Queen will not come hither till the beginning of the next month, against which time several Triumphal Arches are making, as well as other preparations, for their Reception; after which the Queen will be Crowned in this City, and that Solemnity is likewise preparing for. As well the French as Danish Ambassadors keep with the Court, which is at present at a place called Orebro; but they have sent greatest part of their family with their Baggage hither.

Warsaw, June 20. The last week the great Tower of Cracow was burnt with Lightning; In the Ruines was afterwards found an Iron Chest, in which was a great many Medals, and among the rest, one, which is believed to be of Lechus, Founder of this Monarchy, who reigned Anno 550. We have advice that the Tartars are drawing together in two Bodies, the one near Caminiec, and the other near Niemirow; and that the Turks are passing the Danube with a resolution to march directly to our Frontiers, to adjust the differences they have with us concerning the Limits, with their Swords in their hands. There are lately come to Caminiec two or three thousand Janizaries, who were a Convoy to a great Train of Artillery that's brought thither. The King and Queen intend to go and pass some time at Fawaraw in Russia; and at the same time the Marquis de Bezhune, Ambassador from France, will part hence, to assist as Mediator at the Conferences that are appointed to be held on the Frontiers of Moscovy, for the determining the differences that are between the two Crowns concerning the Limits. The Moscovite Ambassadors here continue to Treat with the Commissioners of this Crown, about the League against the Turks.

Madrid, June 20. This Court was in a great deal of joy, occasioned by the belief it had of the Queens being with Child, which it seems proves otherwise. This Crown designing to have a Squadron of Men of War at Sea the Prince of Parma is made choice of to Command it, and accordingly he is expected here very soon. We do not yet hear what Relation our Affairs taken in the matter concerning the Title of Duke of Burgundy, which the French should quit. It has been for some time discussed at Court, that the Duke de Villa Her (whose time is out) will very speedily return from his Government of the

Spanish Netherlands, but it is not said, who is to be his Successor.

Vienna, June 27. This City which was almost become Desolate, begins to flourish again, and is very much enlivened by the assurance we have, that the Imperial Court will in a short time return hither. The Resident of the Elector of Brandenburg is already come hither, as several other persons of quality daily do. We have Advice from Hungary, that a Battle has been lately fought between the Turks and Moscovites, and that the latter had the advantage, though the loss of Men had been great on both sides.

Hamburg, July 1. The French; it's said, use great endeavors in Sweden, to bring that Crown into a new Alliance with them, of which, among others, this should be one condition, That the King of Sweden should maintain constantly in the Dutchy of Bremen an Army of 20000 Men, of which, one half should be of French Troops, and Commanded by French General Officers; what there is of reality in it, time must shew. The Margrave of Baden is gone from Berlin, where he was very well received by the Elector of Brandenburg, to confer with the Princes of Lunenburg, whom it's not doubted, but he will find in the same good dispositions to contribute what in themselves, to the Peace and Security of the Empire. Yesterday came hither from Zell the French Envoye, the Marquis d'Arcy, but will make no long stay in this City. The King and Queen of Denmark arrived the 30th past at Oldenburg.

Strasburg, July 1. The French have made themselves Masters of the Castle of Falkenburg; having employed their Cannon and their Bombs one day only against it, and now we are expecting what Enterprize they will take next in hand; whatever it be, they are likely to succeed in it, for there appears not any force on foot to make head against them. The Marquis de Boufflers is with a Body of Horse and Dragoons at Paltzburg, from whence he will march towards the Saar.

Francfort, July 3. The Governor of the Castle of Falkenburg has at last surrendered the same to the French, who attacked it only one day, but during that short time, made such use of their Bombs and their Cannon, that the Garrison desired a Treaty. Some think the Governor will be questioned by the Elector Palatine, for having been wanting in Defence of the Place, which it's said, was capable of a much better, than was made. We are assured that Levies will be begun very suddenly in these parts for the Emperors Service.

Berlin, July 3. The Margrave of Baden, the Emperors Envoye, is gone from hence, very well satisfied with the assurances our Elector gave him of his resolution to remain firm in the Interest of the Empire; he is gone to the Courts of the Princes of Lunenburg, and in his return home will call upon several other Princes, to let them know the Emperors Sentiments in the present posture of affairs, and

and to exhort them to joyn in such common measures, as shall be thought necessary for the security of the Empire. The Fire at *Straelfond* was so fierce, that it has left but 140 Houles standing in the Town. The French Forces increase every day on the *Rhine*; and we believe they have by this time taken the Castle of *Falkenburg*, belonging to the Elector Palatine.

Cologne, July 5. The report still continues that several French Troops are coming to quarter in this Diocess, and in the Countrey of *Fuliers*, which we give the more credit to, since we have an account from *Liege*, that they are laying two Bridges over the *Meuse* at *Dinant*. The Bishop of *Strasbourg*, and Prince *William of Furstemberg* are still here.

Brussels, July 9. The Duke of *Villa Hermosa* is expected here from *Antwerp* on Sunday next; where its probable he will at last, obtain the Subsidies he demands. Our Letters from the *Hague* of the Fifth Instant tell us, that the Count d' *Avaux* the French Ambassador had assured the States, that the King his Master had not any design to attack or molest the *Spanish* or the *United-Netherlands*, but that he was resolved to live in a perfect Amity and good Correspondence with both. At the same time we have an account from *Burgundy*, of a Decree, by which all those, that have any Lands or Possessions in that Countrey, and shall continue in the Spanish Service, are declared Traytors. We are told that the French are going to lay two Bridges over the *Meuse* at *Dinant*, in order to their passing their Troops into the Countrey of *Liege*, which very much allarms all those parts. From *Germany* we have Advice, that the Castle of *Falkenburg* is surrendered to the French, which it was expected would have made a better Defence, being by its situation very strong, and provided with a sufficient Garrison, and all things necessary.

Amsterdam, July 9. In the *Texel* are arriv'd Seven Ships from *East India*, and two more are hourly expected, which will considerably raise the Actions of that Company. From *Cologne* they write, that they were made very uneasie in those parts, by a report that has continued some time, that a French Army will come and quarter upon them.

Hague, July 9. The Danish Minister here has lately presented a very sharp Memorial to the States-General, in which he demands the restitution of a Ship taken some time since by the *Zealanders* in the *West Indies*, and tells them, that the King his Master was resolved to grant Letters of Reprisals; if speedy satisfaction was not given. Upon which the States have resolved to write to that King, to complain of this manner of proceeding. To morrow the States of *Holland* meet, but will not continue long together, not having any matters of importance before them. People here begin to be very confident that the French King will not attempt any thing upon *Flanders* this Summer.

Marfeilles, July 2. The 18 French Gallies which have been so long at *Bocca*, put to Sea yesterday morning, under the Command of the Duke de *Vivonne*, and took their course to the Westward; so that we may suddenly expect to hear of them from the Coast of *Spain*, as we may of the other twelve, under the Command of Monsieur de *Navailles* from the Coast of *Italy*, it being now 10 or 12 days since they

failed from these Islands. Much about the same time 11 or 12 men of War failed from *Thoulon*, Commanded by Monsieur du *Quesne*, designed as is said, for *Tripoli*. We have Advice that six Algerines have taken their course towards the *Levant*.

Paris, July 6. All things are now preparing for the Kings journey for *Flanders*, which he will begin in few days. The fourth Instant the Sieur *Hoëg*, Ambassador from *Denmark*, had Audience of the King, and acquainted him with the marriage between the King of *Sweden* and the Princess of *Denmark*. We have advice that the Castle of *Falkenburg*, situate on the River *Queish*, is surrendered to the Baron de *Monclar*, Lieutenant-General of the Kings Troops in *Alsace*, and that the Marquis of *Boufflers* was with Eight Regiments of Horse at *Pulzbourg*, from whence he was to march towards the *Saar*, and to encamp there till the middle of the next month.

Plymouth, June 29. Two days since came into this Port the *Mermaid* Frigate, having Orders to cruise in the Channel.

Whitehall, July 1. This day the Parliament met at *Westminster*, and was Prorogued by Commission till the 22 of this month.

Whitehall, July 2. *John Giles*, who is accused to be one of those that made that barbarous attempt upon Mr. *Arnold*, is to be indicted for the same at the next Sessions at the *Old Bailey*.
