Extract of a Letter from Vice-Admiral Lord Hugh Seymour, Commander in Chief of His Majesty's Ships and Vessels at the Leeward Islands, to Evan Nepean, Esq; dated Fort-Royal Bay, Martinique, 10th April 1800.

Am happy to acquaint you for their Lordships' Information, that fince I closed my Letter of the 28th of March, Five of the Enemy's small Privateers have been taken, the Penfée, of Four Guns and Sixty-five Men, and the Sapajon, of Six Guns and Forty-eight Men, by the Sans Pareil; the Renard, of Three Guns and Fifteen Men, and Confa-lateur, of One Gun and Thirty-fix Men, by the Surinam and the Perseverance of Sixteen Guns and Eighty-seven Men, by the Unité; the last of which threw her Guns overboard during the Chace.
