THE late atrocious Attempt on the Life of our beloved Sovereign, while it has excited a most serious Alarm in the Breast of every loyal Subject, has, in its most providential Defeat, bound us in Gratitude to Almighty God for this striking Instance of his Mercy in sparing to these Kingdoms a Life so eminently precious, not alone to Britons,

but essential in the present Juncture of Affairs, to the great Interests of Europe:—we may add to the Happiness of the human Race.

That this daring Act of Wickedness could have proceeded only from the Hand of Frenzy we have not a Shadow of Doubt; for we are firmly convinced there are none who possess the Benefit of Reason to whom the exalted Virtue of your Majesty's Character does not appear as a Shield of Protection guarding your sacred Person against any Assault which could be meditated by Treason or by Malice. But safe as we trust the Royal Person shall ever be under the Protection of Heaven from all such Attempts, we tremble under the Sense of the Precariousness of those Blessings of which we have so narrowly escaped the total Privation: and while we earnestly entreat our gracious Sovereign to be doubly careful of a Life, of which the Value to his People is beyond all Estimate, we shall continue to put up our ardent Prayers to Heaven to watch over your sacred Head, and long preserve to these Kingdoms the multiplied Blessings we derive from your paternal Care and Affection.
