WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the Fourth Day of December last, for prohibiting the Exportation out of this Kingdom, or carrying Coastwife, Gunpowder or Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, will expire upon the Seventh Day of June next: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, and the Safety of this Kingdom, that the said Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer: His Majesty doth tinued for some Time longer: His Majesty doth therefore, with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no Person or Persons whatsoever (except the Master-General of the Ordnance for His Majesty's Service) do, at any Time during the Space of Six Months, to commence from the Seventh Day of June next, presume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom, or carry Coastwise, any Gunpowder or Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, or ship or lade any Gunpowder or Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, on board any Ship or Vessel, in order to transporting the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, or carrying the same Coastwise, without Leave or Permission in that Behalf sirst obtained from His or Permission in that Behalf first obtained from His or Permitton in that Behalf first obtained from His Majesty, or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring and suffering the respective Forfeitures and Penalties inflicted by an Act, passed in the Twenty-ninth Year of Hislate Majesty's Reign, intituled "An Act to empower His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Saltpetre, and to enforce the Law for empowering His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation " powering His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation " of Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms and Ammuni-tion; and also to empower His Majesty to restrain "the carrying Coastwife of Saltpetre, Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition."—And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master General of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the Fourth Day of December last, prohibiting the Transportation into any Parts out of this Kingdom, of the Wood called Lignum Vitæ, will expire upon the Tenth Day of June next: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service that the said Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer: His Majesty doth therefore, with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, That no Person or Persons whosever do, at any Time for the Space of Six Months, to commence from the said Tenth Day of June next, export, or attempt to export, transport, carry, or export, or attempt to export, transport, carry, or convey, or lade, or lay on board of any Ship, Vesselor Boat, in order to be exported, transported, car, ried, or conveyed out of this Kingdom, any of the Wood called Lignum Vitæ, without Leave or Perwood called Lighum Vitæ, without Leave or Permission being first had and obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring the Forfeitures inslicted by an Act passed in the Thirty-south Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled "An Act for indemnifying all Persons who have "An Act for indemnitying all Perions who nave been concerned in advising or carrying into Execution an Order of the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury respecting the Exportation of Pot-Ashes or Pearl-Ashes; for preventing Suits in consequence of the same; for authorizing His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation or carrying Coastwife of Pot-Ashes or Pearl-Ashes, and for making suther Provisions relative thereto." But "making further Provisions relative thereto:" But it is, nevertheless, His Majesty's Pleasure, that nothing herein contained shall extend, or be confirued to extend, to prevent any Ship or Vessel from taking or having on board any of the said Wood called Lignum Vita, which may be necessary for the Use of the said Ship or Vessel during the Course of her intended Voyage; nor to prevent the Exportation of the faid Wood called Lignum Vitæ. to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Islands of Guernfey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, or Man, or to His Majesty's Colonies or Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of



Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or to the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies: Provided that, upon the Exportation of the faid Wood called Lignum Vitæ to Ireland, or to His Majelty's Islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, or Man, or to His Majesty's Colonies or Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to the Island of Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or to the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies, the Exporters of the faid Wood called Lignum Vitæ, do first make Oath of the true Destination of the same to the Places for which it shall be entered Outwards, before the Entry of the same shall be made; and do give full and sufficient Security, by Bond, to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of His Majelly's Customs, to carry the faid Wood called Lignum Vitæ to the Places for which it is so entered Outwards, and none other; and fuch Bond shall not be cancelled, or delivered up, until Proof be made to the Satisfaction of the faid Commissioners, by the Production, within a Time to be fixed by the faid Commissioners, and specified in the Bond, of a Certificate or Certificates, in fuch Form and Manner as shall be directed by the faid Commissioners, shewing that the faid Wood called Lignum Vitæ has been duly landed at the Places for which it was entered Outwards: And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

During our Cruize the Adamant captured the Benjamin, a French Sloop laden with Coffee, from the Island of Bourbon, bound to the Isle of France, and the Bienfait, a French Brig, laden with Rice, for the same Place; and the Tremendous captured the Neustra Senora del Carmen, a Spanish Brig, laden with Cossee, Indigo, and Bale Goods, from the Isle of France to Rio de la Plata, all of which I

am happy to inform you, are arrived.
