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**A**T the Court at *St. James's*, the 28th of *May* 1800,

**P R E S E N T,**

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

**W**HEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the Fourth Day of December last, for prohibiting the Exportation out of this Kingdom, or carrying Coastwise, Gunpowder or Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, will expire upon the Seventh Day of June next: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, and the Safety of this Kingdom, that the said Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer: His Majesty doth therefore, with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no Person or Persons whatsoever (except the Master-General of the Ordnance for His Majesty's Service) do, at any Time during the Space of Six Months, to commence from the Seventh Day of June next, presume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom, or carry Coastwise, any Gunpowder or Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, or ship or lade any Gunpowder or Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, on board any Ship or Vessel, in order to transporting the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, or carrying the same Coastwise, without Leave or Permission in that Behalf first obtained from His Majesty, or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring and suffering the respective Forfeitures and Penalties inflicted by an Act, passed in the Twenty-ninth Year of His late Majesty's Reign, intituled "An Act to empower His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Saltpetre, and to enforce the Law for empowering His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms and Ammunition; and also to empower His Majesty to restrain the carrying Coastwise of Saltpetre, Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition."—And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master-General of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

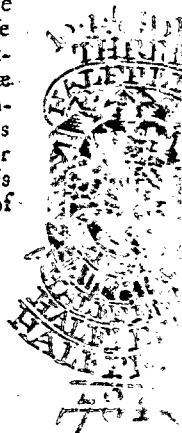

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

**W**HEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the Fourth Day of December last, prohibiting the Transportation into any Parts out of this Kingdom, of the Wood called *Lignum Vitæ*, will expire upon the Tenth Day of June next: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service that the said Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer: His Majesty doth therefore, with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, That no Person or Persons whosoever do, at any Time for the Space of Six Months, to commence from the said Tenth Day of June next, export, or attempt to export, transport, carry, or convey, or lade, or lay on board of any Ship, Vessel, or Boat, in order to be exported, transported, carried, or conveyed out of this Kingdom, any of the Wood called *Lignum Vitæ*, without Leave or Permission being first had and obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring the Forfeitures inflicted by an Act passed in the Thirty-fourth Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled "An Act for indemnifying all Persons who have been concerned in advising or carrying into Execution an Order of the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury respecting the Exportation of Pot-Ashes or Pearl-Ashes; for preventing Suits in consequence of the same; for authorizing His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation or carrying Coastwise of Pot-Ashes or Pearl-Ashes, and for making further Provisions relative thereto:" But it is, nevertheless, His Majesty's Pleasure, that nothing herein contained shall extend, or be construed to extend, to prevent any Ship or Vessel from taking or having on board any of the said Wood called *Lignum Vitæ*, which may be necessary for the Use of the said Ship or Vessel during the Course of her intended Voyage; nor to prevent the Exportation of the said Wood called *Lignum Vitæ* to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, or Man, or to His Majesty's Colonies or Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of



Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or to the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies: Provided that, upon the Exportation of the said Wood called Lignum Vitæ to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, or Man, or to His Majesty's Colonies or Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to the Island of Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or to the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies, the Exporters of the said Wood called Lignum Vitæ, do first make Oath of the true Destination of the same to the Places for which it shall be entered Outwards, before the Entry of the same shall be made; and do give full and sufficient Security, by Bond, to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, to carry the said Wood called Lignum Vitæ to the Places for which it is so entered Outwards, and none other; and such Bond shall not be cancelled, or delivered up, until Proof be made to the Satisfaction of the said Commissioners, by the Production, within a Time to be fixed by the said Commissioners, and specified in the Bond, of a Certificate or Certificates, in such Form and Manner as shall be directed by the said Commissioners, shewing that the said Wood called Lignum Vitæ has been duly landed at the Places for which it was entered Outwards: And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

I Send you herewith a Letter I have received from Captain Osborn, of His Majesty's Ship the Tremendous, giving an Account of the running on Shore on the Isle of France, and destroying the Preneuse French National Frigate, and of some Captures made during the Cruise.

SIR,

I Beg Leave to inform you, that being off the Isle of France, in Company with His Majesty's Ship Adamant, on the 11th of December last we chased a French Frigate, which ran on Shore on the West Side of the River Tombeau, about Three Miles from Port Louis in that Island; after firing several Broadfides at her she cut away her Masts; at Seven P. M. the Boats were sent to destroy her under the

Command of Lieutenant Gray of the Adamant, assisted by Lieutenant Walker of that Ship, Lieutenant Symies of the Tremendous, and Lieutenant Owen of the Marines of the Adamant, who very handsomely requested to go upon that Service. At Half past Nine the Boats returned, bringing with them the Officers and some few of the Men whom they found on board the Frigate, which proved to be La Preneuse, of Forty-four Guns and Three Hundred Men, commanded by Captain L'Hermité, to which they had set Fire in several Places, and which shortly after blew up. The prompt and spirited Manner in which this Service was performed, under a very heavy Fire from the Batteries, reflects great Honor on Lieutenant Gray and the Officers and Men under his Command.

During our Cruise the Adamant captured the Benjamin, a French Sloop laden with Coffee, from the Island of Bourbon, bound to the Isle of France, and the Bienfait, a French Brig, laden with Rice, for the same Place; and the Tremendous captured the Nuestra Senora del Carmen, a Spanish Brig, laden with Coffee, Indigo, and Bale Goods, from the Isle of France to Rio de la Plata, all of which I am happy to inform you, are arrived.

In pursuance of your Order of Yesterday's Date, I proceeded with His Majesty's Hired Cutter Rose (2d) under my Command, the Dolphin Hired Cutter, Lieutenant Jarrett, Commander, in Company, for the Purpose of examining the Creeks and Harbours of the Enemy between Cape Barfleur and Cape La Hogue.

At Half past Four this Morning observed a small Cutter to Windward; the Dolphin making the Signal of an Enemy we immediately gave Chase, and in an Hour captured her, Cape Barfleur S. E. distant about Three or Four Leagues: found her to be Le Risque à Tout French Privateer, mounting Two Four-Pounders with Musketry, Sixteen Men, Jacques Neel, Captain, out Ten Hours from Cherbourg without making any Capture.

**S**INCE the Army crossed the Danube at this Place on the 12th Instant, the Enemy has not ventured to undertake any Move of Consequence: in the Night of the 18th he passed the Danube, in considerable Force at Erbach, and the following Day reconnoitred the Position of the Austrians, on the Heights above the Town, which he found so formidable, that he recrossed the Danube in the Course of the Night, and resumed his Position between that River and the Iller, without attempting any Thing.

The Result of the different Affairs of Advanced Posts since the Arrival of the Army in its present Position, has uniformly been to the Advantage of the Austrians.
