Grateful to Providence for that happy Constitution, under which Britons have so long enjoyed every Blessing that can sweeten and adorn social Life, we reflect with the deepest Regret on those groundless Complaints and Murmurings which were heard at no distant Period in every Corner of our Land, and which furnished a just Subject of Alarm to the Friends of Order and Peace: but we rejoice to think that the Exertions of the Virtuous, the Writings of the Wise, and the seasonable Interposition of public Authority, have served by the Blessing of Heaven to counteract the insidious Acts of the disaffected; and it affords us the sincerest Satisfaction to be able to assure your Majesty, that among the great Body of the People committed to our Care, there prevails an unshaken Attachment to our excellent Constitution in Church and State, and a just Abhorrence of that System of Impiety and Anarchy which hath spread Misery and Desolation through many Parts of the Earth.

In reviewing the Events of a War, on the Success of which depends the Preservation of all that is dear to a virtuous Mind, we admire the Wisdom and the Steadiness of your Majesty's Councils, which have kept alive the Hopes, and animated the Exertions of the other States of Europe; and while our devout Acknowledgments ascend to the Lord of Hosts, who hath supported our righteous Cause, with heartfelt Pleasure we congratulate your Majesty on the many important Advantages which have been obtained, in the Course of last Year, by the Arms of our Country, and our Allies. We recollect with Joy, that during this Period, Italy hath been delivered from the Tyranny of lawless Force; that to the Kingdom of Naples, its ancient Constitution hath been restored; that in Egypt a desperate Plan hath been frustrated, by which our Enemies hoped to spread Sedition and Tumult through the remotest Regions of the Earth; that the Defeat of a formidable Rival, whom their restless Hostility had excited against us, hath placed the British Possessions in India in a State of permanent Tranquillity; and that on the Coast of Holland, a Fleet equipped for the very Purpose of conveying Invaders to our Shores, hath surrendered to us without a Battle, adding a new and a glorious Trophy to the many signal Victories which the Valour of our Seamen hath obtained.

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Bishop of London, the Dean and Chapter of Saint Paul's, and the Clergy of the Cities of London and Westminster, beg Permission to approach your Royal Presence with our heartfelt Congratulations to your Majesty on your late providential Deliverance from the nefarious Attempt of a desperate Assassin.

Although we cannot but contemplate this atrocious Deed with Horror and Dismay, yet, however detestable in the Intention, it has in the Event brought along with it no small Consolation to our Minds. It has given a fresh Proof to us that there is a Power on high, superior to all the Machinations of Man, which sees and turns aside from your Majesty's sacred Person, every hostile Blow that is aimed against it. It has at the same Time afforded your Majesty an Opportunity of displaying that calm, composed, and steady Fortitude which stands unappalled amidst Dangers, that make every other Heart in the Kingdom tremble for a beloved Sovereign; and it has also called forth from all your Majesty's Subjects such unequivocal Marks of Affection and Attachment to your Majesty's Person and Government, such universal Indignation against the Mischance that has dared to lift up his hand against you; such undissembled Joy at the Failure of his diabolical Purpose, as cannot fail to give your Majesty the sincerest Satisfaction, and to convince you (were any Proof necessary) that your Majesty reigns in the Hearts of all your Subjects.

We are, Sir, indeed most devoutly thankful to the Almighty for having once more preserved a Life inexpressibly dear to us, and in which are bound up the most important Interests, not only of this Kingdom, but of the whole Christian World. The firm and the noble stand your Majesty has made for so many Years against the common Enemies of Mankind has rendered your Majesty's Name illustrious upon the Continent, and given the Nations of Europe a lively Interest in your personal Safety and Welfare.

But to us, who have the Happiness of living under your immediate Protection, who have daily Instances before our Eyes of your paternal Tenderness for your People, and your inviolable Regard for our envied Constitution both in Church and State, who feel the Influence of that Example which throws new Lustre round the Throne, and adds Weight to the great Cause of Morality and Religion. To us, every Danger that approaches your Royal Person gives an Alarm which no Words can express, and which nothing but a firm Trust in the Divine Favour can quiet and compose.

Under these Impressions we cannot but feel most deeply the Magnitude of the Blessing which has been just vouchsafed to us; and we can never cease

imploping the great Ruler of the Universe, that he would still be pleased to cover your Majesty with that heavenly Shield which has been so often interposed between you and Danger; and that he would in his Mercy preserve to us for many Years to come, the Father of his People, the Guardian of our Liberty, our Laws; and our Religion, and the intrepid Defender of every Thing that is most dear to us as Men, as Britons; and as Christians.

A DISPATCH, of which the following is an Extract, has been received from the Right Honorable Lord Minto, His Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary at Vienna, by the Right Honorable Lord Grenville, His Majesty's Secretary of State for the Foreign Department.

Vienna, May 28, 1800.

I Have the Pleasure to acquaint your Lordship that the Citadel of Savona surrendered on the 15th Instant. The Garrison are Prisoners of War. I have the Honor to inclose the Extraordinary Court Gazette published on that Occasion.

Extraordinary Supplement of the Vienna Gazette, May 27, 1800.

BY Captain Salomon, of the Regiment of Lattermann, who arrived here last Night as Courier, Count Melas, General of Cavalry, has sent Intelligence from Nizza dated the 17th Instant; that according to the Report of Major-General Francis Count Saint Julien the Enemy's General Buget, who defended the Citadel of Savona, finding himself under the Necessity of capitulating, on the 15th a Capitulation had immediately been concluded upon the following Conditions:

The Garrison of the Enemy was to march out on the 16th at Three o'Clock in the Afternoon, with the usual Honors, and as will be seen by the following Articles of Capitulation, to be marched as Prisoners of War into the States of Upper Austria:

The General could not as yet specify the Strength of the Garrison, nor the Amount of the Cannon and Ammunition and Magazines of different Sorts in the Citadel, as Major-General Count Saint Julien had delayed sending an Account of them until the Enemy shall have evacuated the Place.

Captain Salomon has on this Occasion gained much Reputation.

General Melas mentions at the same Time that the Enemy's Generalissimo had made several Attacks on the 13th in considerable Force on Field-Marshal-Lieutenant Count Hohenzollern at Durazzo, but had been repulled by our Troops.

The Enemy's General of Division Soult, a Chief of Brigade, and many of the Enemy have been made Prisoners of War in these Attacks; and the General promises to forward by the first Opportunity the Particulars sent him by the Field-Marshal-Lieutenant.

CAPITULATION between the Imperial Royal General Count Saint Julien, Commander of the Troops blockading Savona, and the French General of Brigade Bugey, Commander of the said Citadel.

Art. I. The French Garrison shall march out of the Citadel of Savona with all Honors of War, with Arms and Baggage, Drums beating and Colours flying, and shall march by the shortest Way to France, without being made Prisoners of War; they shall be escorted by the Imperial Royal Troops to the first Posts of the French, and during their March they shall be supplied with the necessary Subsistence.

Answer.—The French Garrison is to march Tomorrow Afternoon, the 16th of May, at Three o'Clock, out of the Citadel, with the usual Honors of War, Arms, Baggage, Drums beating and Colours flying, but they shall lay down their Arms upon the Glacis, and become Prisoners of War; they will be conveyed to the Interior of Italy till the General in Chief of the Imperial Army in Italy takes other Measures on this Point.

Addition to the first Article.

The Officers of the Garrison are to keep their Swords or Sabres as well as their Horses and Baggage; and the Privates their Knapfacks; all those who are not amongst the Number of Combatants shall have Permission, the French to return to France, and the Italians to their own Country. The Surgeons are excepted, and whoever else belong to the Service of the Sick, who are to remain to take Care of the Sick and Wounded who may be unable to follow the Garrison.

Art. II. The Officers of the Garrison shall be provided with the necessary Means to convey their Baggage and Property with them.

Answer.—Agreed.

Art. III. The Sick and Wounded shall be transported by Sea, and those who cannot be removed shall remain in the Hospitals of Savona, and shall be entitled to return to France after their Recovery.

Answer.—The Sick and Wounded shall be treated with every Attention that Humanity requires, but after their Recovery they shall remain Prisoners of War.

Art. IV. The Troops of Liguria (Genoa) shall be at Liberty to follow the Garrison to France, or to return to their own Country without being molested in any Way on that Account.

Answer.—Every one who belongs to the Combatants of the Garrison is included in the Answer given to the First Article.

ADDITIONAL ARTICLE.

The Austrian Officers who might be Prisoners of War in the Citadel, are to be considered as exchanged as soon as the Imperial Troops shall have taken Possession of the Place. Immediately after the Capitulation is signed the Hostages shall be exchanged, and the Gate of the Castle shall be put in Possession of the Imperial Troops.

All Plans and Writings which have any Relation to the Place and its Fortifications, as well as all Cannon and Ammunition, are to be delivered faithfully to those who are sent on the Part of the Imperialists for that Purpose.

The Garrison shall not be sent to Germany but be allowed to stay in Italy, and shall be amongst the first offered to be exchanged.

Answer.—The Garrison of Savona shall only remain in Italy until a farther Decision of the Commander in Chief on this Head is received; concerning their early exchange I shall interest myself personally.

YOU will be pleased to acquaint their Lordships with the Reduction of the important Fortress of Savona this Day by Famine, in consequence of the Vigilance and Activity of His Majesty's Officers, and those of the King of Naples, whose Boats have rowed Guard during Forty-one Nights with a Perseverance highly creditable to them all, particularly Captain Downman of the Santa Dorothea, Captain Settimo of the Neapolitan Brig Strombolo, and Lieutenant Jackson, acting Captain of His Majesty's Sloop Camelion, to whose Care the Blockade of Savona has been more especially committed. I have seen the Terms proposed, accepted them, and authorized Captain Downman to sign the Capitulation, (in Conjunction with Major-General Count Saint Julien,) in my Absence.

I understand the Garrison consisted of about Eight Hundred Men. A Copy of the Articles of Capitulation, and a Return of Military Stores, &c. shall be transmitted by the next Opportunity.
