"By an Act passed in the Thirty-ninth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, Chap. 9, His Majesty is authorized to direct, and has by his Order in Council dated the 16th October 1799 directed, That until the 30th Day of September 1800 it shall be lawful to import into any Port or Place of this Kingdom any Beans called Kidney or French Beans, Tares, Lentiles, Callivances, and all other Sorts of Pulse; and also Bulls, Cows, Oxen, Calves, Sheep, Lambs, and Swine, Beef, Pork, Mutton, Veal, and Lamb, whether Salted or otherwise, Bacon, Hams, Tongues, Butter, Cheese, Potatoes, Rice, Sago, Sago Powder, Tapioca, Vermicelli, Millet-Seed, Poultry, Fowls, Eggs, Game, and Sour Crout in any British Ship or Vessel, or in any other Ship or Vessel belonging to Persons of any Kingdom or State in Amity with His Majesty, and navigated in any Manner whatever, without Payment of any Duty whatsoever; Provided that a due Entry be made of all such Articles with the proper Officers of the

Customs at the Port where the same shall be imported."
